



Frequently something that does not happen can be classed as good news. That was the case early this month when the committee on health and welfare in the Texas House of Representatives rejected a bill that was proposed and supported by the State Health Department providing for higher licensure fees for Texas hospitals, and the increased revenue therefrom to be used to finance increased and more extensive licensure surveys.

If passed, the bill would have raised licensure fees from the present \$25 minimum to \$50 plus \$2 per bed. To hospitals of the state this would have hiked that expense item from 250 to 850 per cent, and it would have increased the Health Department's revenue from that source by about \$150,000 a year.

Fortunately Texas Hospital Association got wind of the bill and pointed out its cost — in addition to explaining that seventeen state and federal agencies are already burdening Texas hospitals with duplicative and expensive surveys, so an additional unnecessary inspection was hardly advisable.

People who complain about increasing hospital costs need to consider the implications of the bill that might have passed. First there was the increased charge of the fee, then the extra cost in providing the additional information that was wanted in the survey. Furthermore the duplication already in effect represents a vast amount of already existing waste.

Needless to say, hospitals can't just absorb the extra costs. Rather they figure them in when determining rates, so we patients eventually do the paying.

A similar situation applies to the vast increases of premiums for mal-practice insurance, which have been so much in the news lately. Anyone knows that when doctors and hospitals are soaked 200 to 500 per cent more for insurance they manage to get the money from the patients. They have to, to make ends meet.

Still another big problem relates to the many bureaucratic requirements of HEW, especially in regard to Medicare and Medicaid payments. The deluge of required reports becomes an expensive item to the hospital and patients, especially if funds are withheld because reports are considered inadequate.

Costs of drugs, labor, food, utilities, etc., are not the only reason why hospital and medical expense have soared lately. Government officials and we the public usually are much more at fault.

One wonders how many jury members allowing fat damages in malpractice cases realize the exasperating chain reaction they have started. They allow themselves to be convinced by slick attorneys that the poor defendant is entitled to generous settlement from the rich doctor and insurance companies. Well, that forces the doctors and companies to up their charges. The juror needs to understand that his generosity with doctor and hospital funds will be back to haunt him when he becomes a patient.

To the enthusiastic cheers of over 300 persons, a surprised Miss Dorothy Hartman last Saturday accepted this year's Jaycee award for Muenster's outstanding citizen. The presentation was made as the principal feature of the Thirtieth Annual Awards and Installation Banquet held in the Community Center.

In giving the award Robert Miller, outgoing president, called attention to Miss Hartman's long record of community service, dating back to 1938 when she started as office attendant for the late Dr. T. S. Myrick. Along with her

regular work she assisted and kept records in a community wide immunization program and made regular calls on area shut-ins.

Since Dr. Myrick's death in 1959 Miss Hartman became involved in the fund drive for a new hospital, working principally at keeping records on pledges. And since the hospital opened she has resumed serving the community through doctors' offices. Prior to the opening of the hospital she was one of the volunteers moving in supplies.

Miss Hartman is still busy with community service as a member of the VFW Auxiliary, the Catholic Daughters and the parish liturgical commission. In the latter connection she was chairman of the parish Paschal Supper on Holy Thursday.

Two other awards known previously to only a few were those to the key man and the outstanding project chairman. Willie Fisher was chosen as the key man, the title which is practically equivalent to Number 1 of the chapter. Outstanding project of the year was the membership drive in which Steve Hess earned the award as chairman. Both of those awards also were presented by Robert Miller.

Library Problems Aired at Meeting Of Muenster CC

An appeal for help by the Muenster Library was the principal concern of Chamber of Commerce members at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday.

Present to tell the library's story was Miss Sylvia Hofbauer, chairman of the library board, and Mrs. James Walterscheid, president of the recently organized Friends of the Library.

The ladies pointed out that the library is popular with children but gets little attention from older people, who apparently are too busy for reading. Accordingly they proposed additional services such as community bulletin board, films and talks on hobbies, home canning, home repairs, etc., which can be both interesting and profitable. They said the library needs to be more useful to justify the many free hours of work and the tax money spent on it.

Mayor David Bright added that the library is due to become more expensive, since supply of free labor is dwindling and prices keep going up, and it can keep going only with more help from city and county and qualifying for state aid. However, unless interest increases the expenditure is not justified. We're entering a sort of probation time, he said, in which the community will need to show convincingly that it wants a library.

Members also discussed a proposed festival for the Bicentennial, probably early in May next year. But they made no firm plans beyond applying the community's German heritage to the plans. The suggestion was to make it a week long affair.

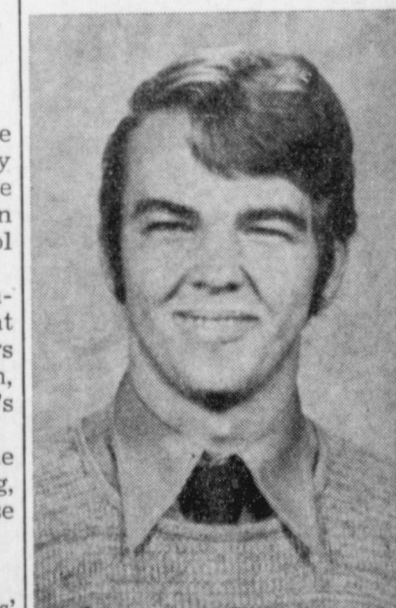

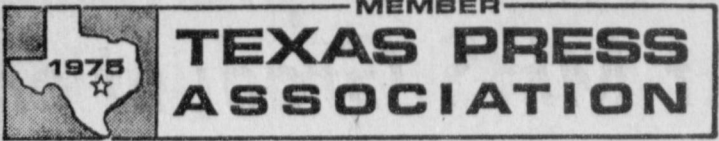

The honor is awarded to students who have excelled academically by attaining a grade point ratio of 3.25 or higher out of a possible 4.0.

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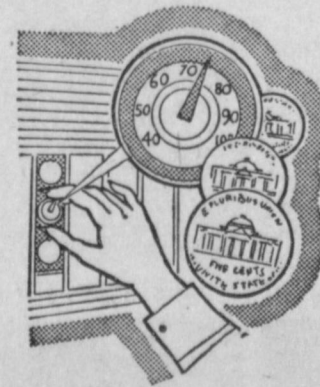
