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One of the most satisfying incidents in recent years of this country's history was the bold and decisive rescue of the ship Mayaguez and its crew from the newly established Communist regime of Cambodia. As quoted from one of the high ranking men in our military, "It's good to win one for a change."

That seems to have been the sentiment all across the country. Favorable comment from all sides apparently reflected a revival of national pride. And the apparent complete absence of critical comment revived memories of other years when public sentiment was overwhelmingly in support of our government's action.

Reason tells us that public approval was not 100 per cent strong. We know that the element which has been cheering for the enemy throughout the Vietnam war, was not cheering for US in this incident. But it's pleasing to think that it does not have another opportunity to gloat, and its traitorous attitude is completely overwhelmed by the outpouring of loyalty and pride.

This recalls memories of an incident many years ago when a band of North African pirates captured an American seaman and demanded ransom for his return. Our official answer to the ransom message was "we'll have our seaman alive or your leader dead." The American was promptly returned, unharmed.

Procedure has changed a lot since then and a couple of days were lost in diplomatic efforts for release of ship and crew. But it's a noteworthy fact that action was shaping up while talk was going on. Assuming that it takes about two days to organize such a mission, anyone can see that there was no hesitancy in the US decision. Other nations no doubt were aware of that fact and were influenced by it in their many official statements of praise.

We hope it isn't just wishful thinking to assume that the rescue incident will have extensive favorable influence in relations with other countries as well as the morale of our country. We had been through a disappointing and humiliating experience when the country we supported for more than ten years was taken over by communists, and obviously the enemy was adding insult to injury. The act of piracy was intended to degrade us before the world. As in the Pueblo affair, the reds were preparing to exploit our humiliation as far as they could. It would be a great propaganda achievement to reduce a world super-power to the status of beggar.

Well, the scheme backfired. Comment from many nations afterward showed that US made a big step in world respect whereas red prestige went the other way. And as for propaganda effect, one of the red countries revealed the absurdity of its position by accusing US of piracy in rescuing its own boat and crew.

Maybe it isn't too much to hope that the incident is the beginning of a new era for United States. Vietnam should have taught us that we are over-reaching our national responsibility in trying to police the world. In our own self interest we need to understand that, like it or not, there are times when we should not interfere. But at the same time we must preserve our identity as a sovereign country by demanding respect from other countries. We like to think that henceforth we will provoke less hostility from other nations but also tolerate less insult.

Doing that would do wonders for the American spirit. As in happier times of our past it would inspire unity and patriotism and replace much of the ugly, divisive and disloyal attitude which has haunted us in the past decade.

All of us have been inclined to think that we did not belong in the Vietnam war, especially because of the no-win policy. But there has never been a legitimate excuse for supporting the enemy. Our show of national character will make that element of our population more reluctant to reveal its real position, and others more reluctant to be sympathetic.

He was a former Texaco lease pumper, having been retired on his 65th birthday, only three weeks before his death.

Survivors are his wife, Teresa, and a brother, Ernest, of Wichita Falls.

Awards Banquet Honors Leading MHS Students

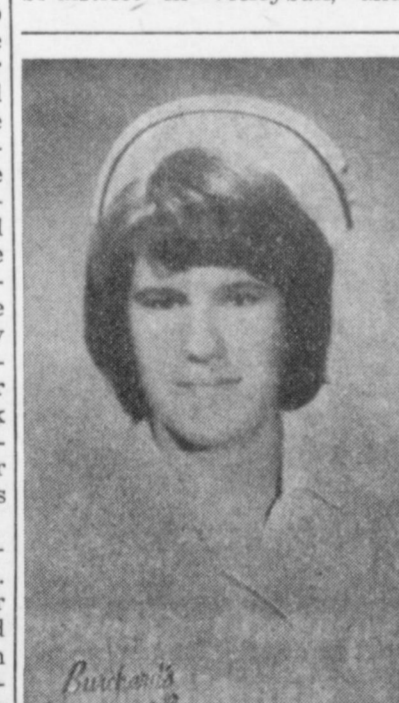
Outstanding students in academics and athletics at Muenster High School were recognized Monday night in the annual all awards banquet sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Organization.

He will also be employed by Crawford Flying Service which has a contract with the U.S. Forestry Service, flying patrol for forest fires.

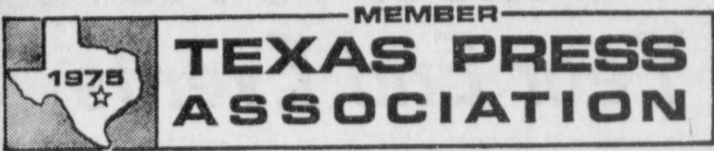

SS Allows Up to \$2500 Income per Year for Students

"One of the most productive benefits paid by Social Security is the monthly benefits paid to students between the ages of 18-22 because of the retirement, disability, or death of their parent," Gus Jones, Manager of the Sherman Social Security Office stated. "In this age of ever increasing costs of education, these monthly benefits enable many students to continue their schooling," Jones continued.

"However, even with this help, many students must work to finish paying for their education, and this fact serves to remind us that some students who draw social security will need to report their work to their social security office," Jones explained. According to Jones, students can work and earn \$2520 in 1975 without it affecting their monthly benefits. This is an increase over the \$2400 persons were allowed to make in 1974.

If the beneficiary earns over \$2520, then \$1 of their social security student benefit must be withheld for every \$2 earned over the \$2520 limit. However, even if the student makes over \$2520, he will still get his full social security check for any month that he does not earn wages of over \$210 and is not performing substantial services in self-employment.

"In addition to work over the allowable limit, student beneficiaries also need to report if they quit school or if they get married," Jones added.

Sales Tax Check Now Each Month Latest Was \$4,875

The city of Muenster has just received a check for \$4,875.56 from State Comptroller Bob Bullock in the second round of monthly city sales tax payments. The first payment arriving a month ago was \$1,580.99.

A letter with the remittance revealed that the big payment of the quarter will be made in June when returns for the

complete quarter have been turned in. Those returns include the hundreds from smaller operators who pay the entire quarter in one check whereas larger businesses have to pay each month.

Similarly small cities receive their pay quarterly instead of monthly. If the amount is below \$500 the payment is made at the quarter only. However the full amount is paid then, no matter how small it is.

A statement with the state's check shows that the gross collection was \$5,223.71 and the 2 per cent service fee was \$104.47. Also \$243.68 was held back for contingency, leaving a net of \$4,875.56.

Gross collection for the previous month was \$1,693.98, deduction for the state's fee was \$33.88, and the amount retained was \$79.02, for a net of \$1,580.99.

Total of the checks sent out was \$19.9 million. Amounts remitted to some other cities of the area were Gainesville \$34,064, Lindsay \$1,364, Saint Jo \$1,802, Nocona 6,466, Bowie \$9,956, Pilot Point \$2,569, Sanger \$1,481.

County Ranks in State's Top 10 in Milk Production

Despite a year of high costs and low profits, Cooke County ranked in the state's top ten counties in milk production in 1974.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, milk production for the county reached 84 million pounds, an increase of 17 million pounds from 1973.

Nationally, Texas ranked ninth in milk production with a total of almost 3.4 billion pounds.

Cash receipts from milk marketings added more than \$304 million to the state's economy, while the total farm value of milk rose 15 per cent to almost \$313 million.

"However," White said, "production costs increased at a faster rate than farm profits. Last year, sixteen per cent dairy feed averaged \$142 a ton — a 22 per cent rise from 1973.

"The same dairy feed was selling for \$80 a ton in 1972. That is a 78 per cent price jump in just two years. The average price paid per ton of alfalfa hay has increased 54 per cent from 1972."

During the same two-year period, the monthly price paid to farmers increased 28 per cent. During 1974 Texas dairymen averaged \$9.22 per 100 pounds of milk.

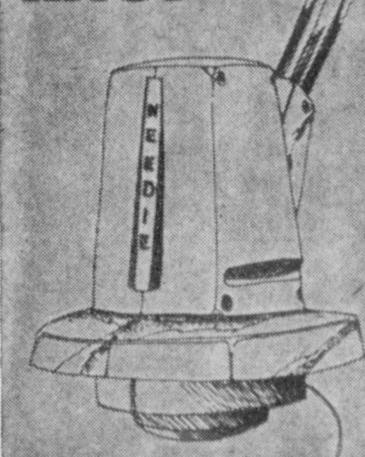

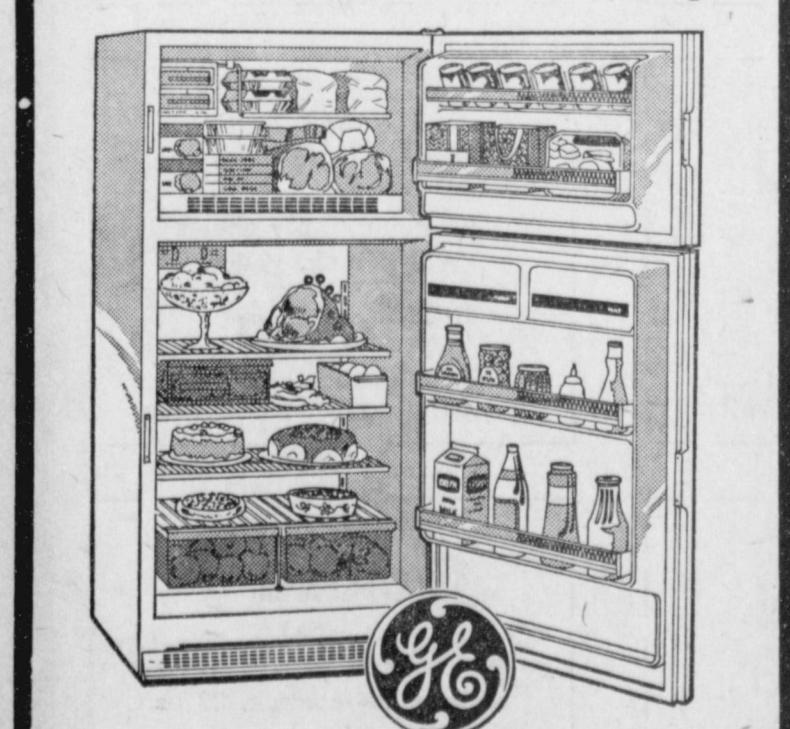

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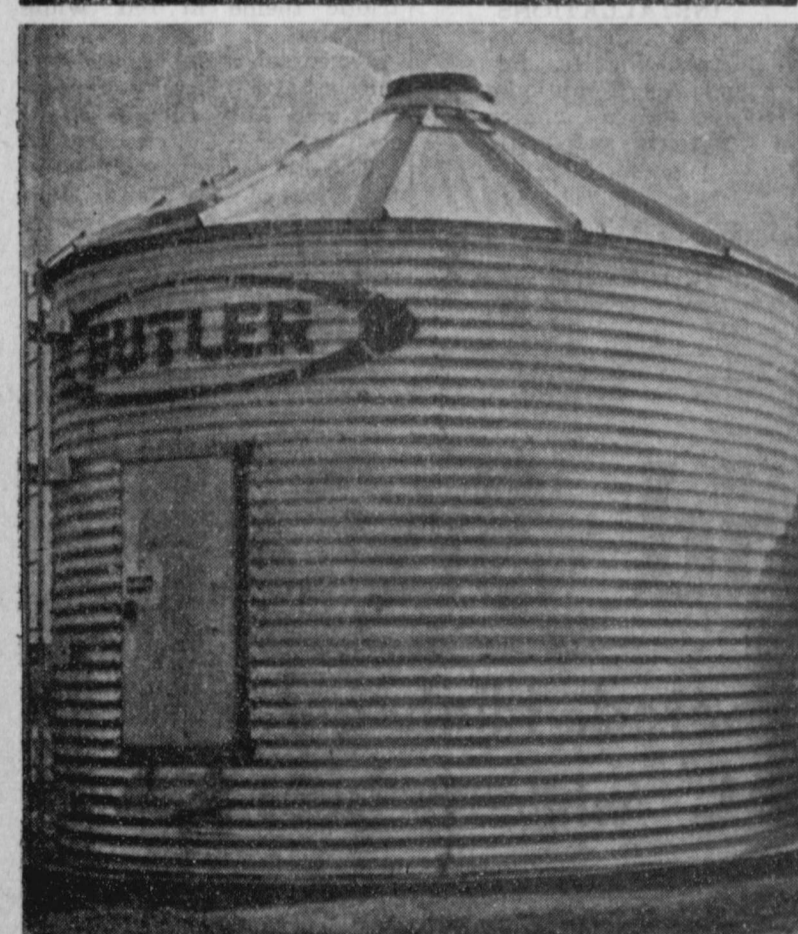

In event of a head injury, if the victim is unconscious, do not try to arouse him. Avoid turning the body, if possible. If face is flushed, raise head and shoulders — if ashen or normal, keep the body flat. If the victim vomits, lay him abdomen down, face sideways. Do not administer stimulants, such as coffee or ammonia — get prompt medical help.

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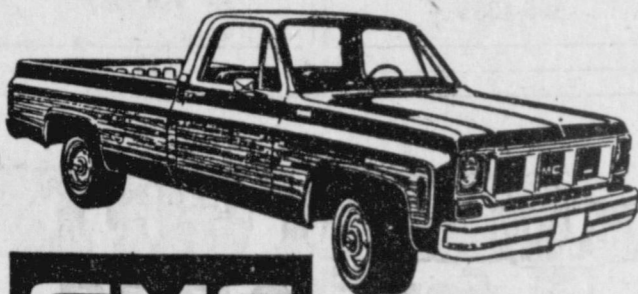


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Winners Named in Intramural Tennis

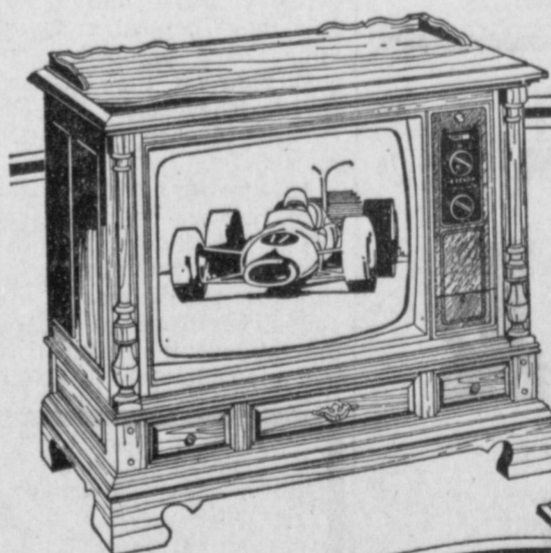

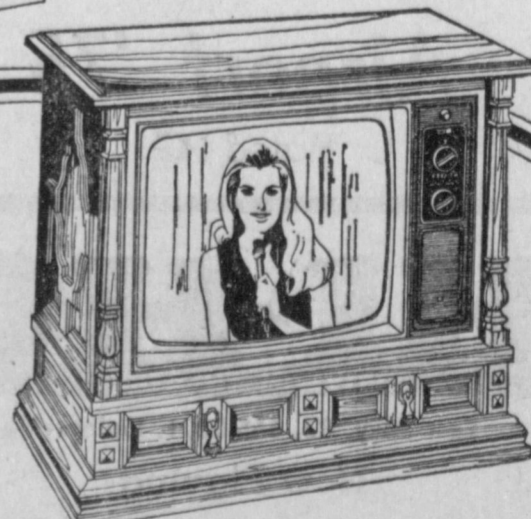

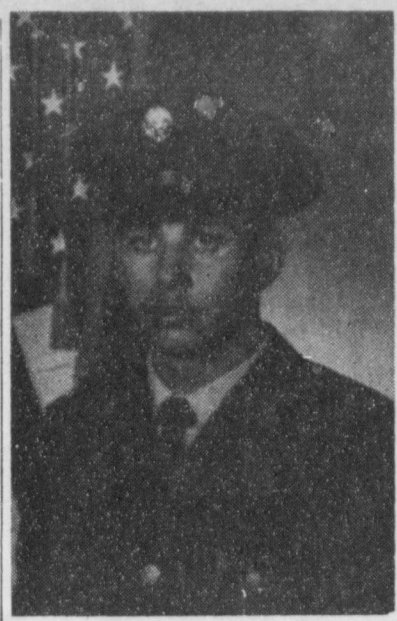

Jerry Klement Directs USDA Rural Development Conference

The Southwest Federal Regional Council of the Rural Development Service consisting of the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, under the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture, sponsored a "Dialogue for Development - a Rural Focus" on May 14-15, 1975 at the Royal Coach Inn in Dallas. The conference was under the direction of Jerry Klement, Staff Assistant with the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development Service. He is the son of the J. A. Klements of Muenster.

The purpose of the conference was to improve the effectiveness of rural development efforts through establishing a dialogue between the many persons and organizations involved in helping to make the rural areas a better place, in which to live and work.

The theme of the conference was that local people are best able to determine their own needs. The resources to meet these needs are scattered throughout the government and private sector, and substantial interaction is necessary to effectively meet local needs.

The conference was conducted for leaders in all levels of government and the private sector who are interested in rural development.

Those in attendance were county and city officials, business leaders, association leaders, and interested citizens having regional interest; State legislators, COG and substate development district boards and staff; Educational institutions; Public and private interest groups; State agencies with rural development programs; Federal agencies with rural development programs; Statewide rural development committees.

The program also included

a four hour discussion in which participants had an exchange of information, ideas and techniques relevant to rural development efforts. Gene Davenport, Member and Community Service Manager with Cooke County Electric Cooperative, served as one of the moderators in this part of the program.

They discussed the diversity of conditions both in terms of problems and opportunities found in rural areas. They talked about how the different rural settlement patterns effect the operation of service delivery systems, and how to develop a common understanding of basic rural development goals, concepts and processes. Another problem discussed was the difficulty sometimes experienced in resolving conflicts between national and local goals and priorities.

Exhibits and handouts were available describing public and private resources available to assist people in rural areas. During the entire program representatives from each agency were present to answer questions and discuss individual problems.
