#### Bill on Addition to Hospital District Approved by House

Legislation authorizing an annexation to Muenster Hospital District got on its way last week when passed by the Texas House of Representatives. Representative Bill Sullivant sent word that it, along High was 2nd and Sacred with a bill creating the Gainesville Hospital District, had been approved in the House.





#### Official Memorandum

By Governor Dolph Briscoe

GREETINGS:

The power of information to improve the quality of life is limitless. Providing the source of information power for Texas citizens is the purpose of the libraries in this state.

The state, local governments and enterprising business organizations have established and maintain these generators of intellectual energy.

A network of power lines has been formed by the Texas Library System to make available to every person in the state the sharing of resources of public libraries and those maintained by educational institutions and cooperating private corpora-

Through the use of local libraries and the statewide system, each individual can find wider horizons, increase skills and find life enrichment. We will only be limited if library collection's of materials and staff to make them available are not adequate to individual and community needs.

Library Week in Texas provides an opportunity for acknowledging the role of libraries as sources of information power.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of April 13-19, 1975, as

LIBRARY WEEK

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

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

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
