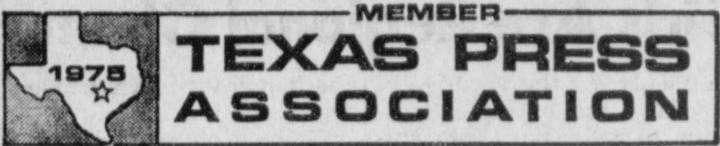

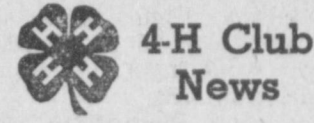
Kevin Switzer

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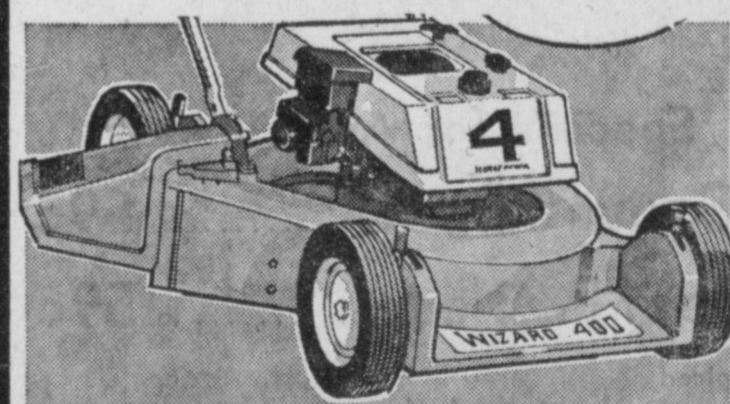
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Rebecca Crow, David Schreiber United in Windthorst Ceremony

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Official Memorandum

By Governor Dolph Briscoe

GREETINGS: The power of information to improve the quality of life is limitless. Providing the source of information power for Texas citizens is the purpose of the libraries in this state.

The state, local governments and enterprising business organizations have established and maintain these generators of intellectual energy.

A network of power lines has been formed by the Texas Library System to make available to every person in the state the sharing of resources of public libraries and those maintained by educational institutions and cooperating private corporations.

Through the use of local libraries and the state-wide system, each individual can find wider horizons, increase skills and find life enrichment. We will only be limited if library collections of materials and staff to make them available are not adequate to individual and community needs.

Library Week in Texas provides an opportunity for acknowledging the role of libraries as sources of information power.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of April 13-19, 1975, as

LIBRARY WEEK

in Texas, and urge Texans to use and support the improvement of library services in our state.

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NOTES FROM THE LIBRARY

Now at your library are more basic reference books. United States Government Manual, 1974-75, is the official handbook of the Federal Government. It describes the purposes and programs of most Govern-

ment agencies and lists top personnel. These descriptions emphasize activities, not internal agency structure. This year a new section — "Of, By, and For the People — Selected Federal Bicentennial Activities" — has been added detailing activities of certain Federal agencies in connection with the upcoming Bicentennial celebration. Another book, The Statistical Abstract of the United States, 1974, is the standard summary of statistics on the social, political, and economic organization of the United States. Especially noteworthy among the tables in this year's edition are those on energy and fuels. Other new

reference works are Dictionary of the Bible, Webster's Biographical Dictionary and the New World Secretarial Handbook.

If you didn't come to the library during National Library Week in Texas come anytime soon and see the display of pottery by local artists. The library is now open during the noon hour on Tuesdays and/or Thursdays.

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When TP&L's cost of boiler fuel exceeds 20 cents per million BTU's (the equivalent of 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas), the adjustment provision permits us to pass on to our customers the additional cost. We make no profit on the fuel.

Beginning this month, a notation on your electric bill will show what the per-kilowatt-hour fuel

charge is for the month. Multiply this amount by the total number of kilowatt-hours on your bill and you have the fuel adjustment charge. Every customer pays the same fuel adjustment rate for each kilowatt-hour used.

"What is TP&L doing to offset rising fuel prices?"

To offset the rising prices of natural gas and fuel oil, TP&L is constructing large generating units which will use relatively low cost lignite coal. Two such units have been in operation since 1972. Eleven additional units are scheduled to be placed in service in the period from 1975 to 1982.

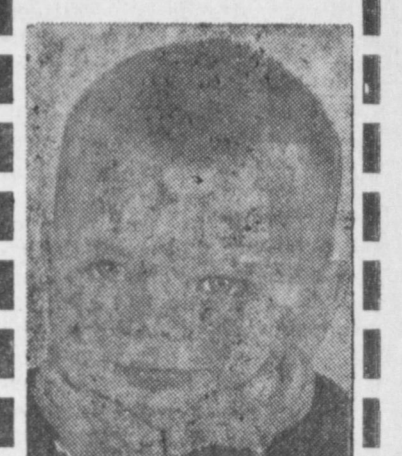
