
signs, or anything else.

After all these months we're beginning to learn something about Uncle Sam's wonder rifle, the famous Garand model, better known in the army as the Ml. It really is a dandy. Deserving of all the praise it has received. The army claims that, everything considered-accuracy, fire power, dependability, simplicity—it's the world's best. Nine of them can squirt as much lead as a machine gun. A fair barrage in itself.

Opinions vary, however. - Some of our old fogey army men, who have been fondling the Springfield rifle for years insist they won't have the new fangled thing. Say they won't take chances in a tight spot with any automatic contraption. They like the certainty of bolt action.

There are remarks also about the Springfield's greater accuracy. it's conceded to be the hardest and straightest shooting combat rifle, you know. As if that made a lot of difference. First of all an army rifle is more accurate than most of the men who fire it. In the second place a slug an inch to either side is just as effective as one placed squarely between a Jap's eyes We've had the chance to tean the Garand down and see what makes it tick. This week we're go ing to see how it performs-rather. we perform with it. The good old rifle range again. We're looking forward to it. Besides, we'll get the feel of machine guns and tommy guns in action. We're determined that when the time comes for us to take our places over-there we'll be able to blast a few enemy planes. According to the story they gave us back in rookie days, that's the kind of fighting an outfit like ours has to expect. Besides building and maintaining air fields we have to defend them. Usually against air raids. Occasionally it may require skirmishes with enemy infiltration parties. It's interesting to notice how men are taking this more serious training. They're ready, even impatient, to go across without any more delay. Others, even while admitting they don't want to rush into the fight, are calmly waiting for the order. Salvage of Silk, Nylon Hosiery Started Here

Women Asked To Give Their Worn-Out And **Discarded Stockings**

Women's out-worn and discarded stockings are going to war. These cast-offs will provide the War and Navy departments with large stocks of silk and nylon for the manufacture of essential war materials.

The drive, inaugurated recently in the county, got under way here during the weekend when Mrs. J. M. Weinzapfel, director of the campaign in this city, provided local business houses with containers with display cards, designating them as "Hosiery Collection Depots.'

All hose must be clean, but that is the only requirement in regard to their condition.

Every effort is being made to get all old hose in the county together by January 1st.

All silk, all nylon, silk and nylon mixtures, and mixtures of rayon and silk, nylon and rayon, silk and cotton, nylon and cotton are enlisted in this drive.

Much of the silk from these nose will be used to make powder bags, in which powder is placed for generating the power required to expel a shell from guns of major calibre. Silk is the only thing that will burn without leaving embers, and the guns can be fired with greater speed without having to be cleaned before a new charge is inserted, it was explained. The nylon will be used to make other articles necessary to war.

Mrs. Felix Johnson, Jr, of Gainsville is the county chairman of this particular drive and she appointed Mrs. Weinzapfel to take charge of the work in this community.

Receptacles have been placed n the M. J. Endres, Jacob Pagel, Carra Pagel and Farmer's stores. The hosiery will be delivered to Supplies Corporation, Green Island, New York. The retailer does not make any profit on the collection of these items. He is responsible for any costs involved in preparing the hose for shipment, but sends his package with carrying charges collect to the government agency. Every woman and girl in Muenster is urged to practicipate in this campaign.


