

President Reagan's nomination of Sandra O'Connor to succeed Justice Stewart on the Supreme Court has touched off a wave of protest from Moral Majority and Pro-Life people to the nominee's record on abortion and ERA. The reference is to her support of the issues several years ago as a member of the Arizona legislature. Otherwise her credentials are generally regarded as highly acceptable.

Of course, the first thing to remember is that there would be a howl no matter who was named. In fact, if the choice had been for antiabortion or anti-ERA there would have been at least as much static from the liberals. So this could be a matter of displeasing the side that is less likely to cause a lot of trouble.

First of all, the President's choice is calculated to please those who have been clamoring for a woman on the court. In addition, her ability and judgment are highly recommended by the Arizona Bar Association, and her political philosophy is endorsed by conservative leaders including both senators, Goldwater and DeConcini. On the basis of conservative principle she is a great improvement over Stewart who was a supporter of the "exclusion" rule, preventing criminals from being prosecuted through illegally obtained evidence. Chief Justice Burger has criticized him for "punishing the public for mistakes and misdeeds of law enforcement officers" In addition Steward has been consistiently liberal on matters of civil rights and abortion. There is no question that the change from Stewart to O'Connor will be a big step toward restoring the basics of traditional Americanism. First of all, the President's

And even on the two controversial issues, abortion and ERA, the objection might be rated as questionable. The proabortion vote referred to was years ago, but a recent statement says she is personally opposed to abortion. Politicians as well as other people sometimes change their minds. With so many other conservative credentials, it's more likely that she is conservative on those two subjects. It's also possible that this situation is somewhat like Reagan's choice of a running mate in the 1976 campaign. Many objected to the choice of a liberal but the record later showed that he had joined the conservatives. Sandra O'Connor could be just what the Moral Majority wants. And even on the two cont-

From the side of practical politics, it's also possible that the President has gone a long way toward bringing conservative qualities to the court and is willing to accept a few less positive qualities. a few less positive qualities in the bargain. Even though the nominee doesn't

in the bargain. Even though the nominee doesn't measure up 100 percent to the desired traits she can be a definite asset.

Still another consideration: the appointment of Mrs. O'Connor can improve the president's position in his next nomination. At that time the liberals, who are getting homination. At that time the liberals, who are getting their way in the present nomination, can't complain if his choice changes to conservative.

Regardless of political angles, it looks like a good bet to go along with Reagan in his court selection. He has shown that he is a man of principle and judgment. He is dedicated to restoring the is dedicated to restoring the economic, social and moral values by which America attained its greatness, and his record shows that he's trying conscientiously to pick the best people for the job. Sen. Glasgow reports on county assistance

One of the problems con-fronting the legislature during the past regular session was the need to give session was the need to gyre-local governments assistan-ce, particularly financial, as they were facing a tremen-dous increase in the cost of government through in-flation.

Two bills were passed that gave county governments

Two bills were passed that gave county governments financial assistance.

The first was S.B. 150 that allowed the counties to keep a greater share of the license tag receipts that they collected. Under this bill, the counties would be entitled to keep the first \$50,000 collected and an amount equal to \$350 for each mile of county

roads up to five hundred miles (this could be as much as \$175,000 more). The counties then would be able to keep one-half of the amount collected thereafter up to an additional amount of \$125,000.

of \$125,000.

Present law only allowed counties to keep a maximum of \$175,000 whereas the new law would allow a maximum amount of \$350,000 to be kept.

kept. A second bill, S.B. 151, A second bill, S.B. 151, restored the lateral road fund to the counties for their use in maintenance and construction of county roads. The bill provided for a total of 7.3 million dollars to go each year to the rural counties under the Act.

Use of smaller cars increases problems for the handicapped

COLLEGE STATION — Smaller cars make it increasingly difficult for people in wheelchairs to drive and ride in automobiles, says a engineer with the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI).

Some 100,000 to 200,000 disabled persons are capable of operating vehicles with adaptive equipment, but most are being held back because development of adequate equipment has been slow and devices are expensive, said Dr. Rodger J. Koppa, head of TTI's Human Factors Division.

Koppa said small cars make it much harder for a wheel-chair user to get in the car and take the wheelchair along.

The TII engineer says that development of a special purpose body on a front-wheel drive vehicle that incorporates a wheelchair and driver entry as integral parts of the design is needed. Development of a better driver restraint, which provides stability at the controls and crash protection, is also a necessity.

TTI is a part of the Texas A&M University System.

Plains coreopsis is a slender, erect, branched annual up to two feet tall. It grows in patches along roadsides and pastures. It may grow so thick that a field may appear solid yellow in color. Other common names are Garden coreopsis, Golden wave, Tickseed, and Coreopsis.

The leaves are opposite, pinnately divided into linear lobes with the upper leaves less divided.

The plant has numerous composite flowers about 1 inch across. The disk flowers are brown. There may be 7 to 8 yellow rays with red-brown spot at the base of the ray, 3 lobed on the end. The flowers may vary from pure golden yellow to yellow. Plains coreopsis blooms in the spring and early summer.

Plains coreopsis is especially desirable for cut-flower arrangements and several species are cultivated in flower beds.

Plants of the genera Thelesperma (Greenthread) and Coreopsis are very similar, distinguished only by characters of the minute disc flowers and by the teeth of the rays, 3 in Thelesperma and 4 in Coreopsis.

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

Drought likewise is less of a problem. Water consumption reached a peak of 595,000 gallons on July 14, a comfortable contrast with last year's peak of 720,000 gallons on July 1. This year's second high was 541,000 gallons, contrasting with 695,000 last year.

According to Water Superintendent Wayne Tate, the city could be in trouble without help of the shallow wells which are being widely used for outside watering. With a potential of some 432,000 gallons daily, they probably produce over 200,000 gallons a day, enough to cause trouble if the water were taken from the city lines. Without the 30 odd wells the city could still be in trouble if one of its deep wells failed.
