# WILL CARRY HEAVY **PENALTY JULY 1ST**

On April 1st, the last period of payment of delinquent taxes without full penalty began, it was pointed out this week by Tax Collector Lee Meek. This period extends until June 30, 1934. Taxes paid during April, May and June will carry a 6 per cent penalty, but on July 1, the full penalty will be applied to all delinquent taxes, Mr. Meek pointed out.

After July 1, the penalty will be 10 per cent, plus 6 per cent interest from the date the taxes first became delinquent. Thus, 30 per cent will be added to all 1930 delinquent taxes: 24 per cent will be added to all 1931 delinquent taxes; and 18 per cent will be added to 1932 delinquent taxes.

Mr. Meek this week received a communication from Geo. H. Sheppard, comptroller, reminding him that this penalty must be collected after July 1, on all delinquent taxes paid.

Taxpayers are urged to make payment of delinquent taxes during this period if possible, in order to avoid the heavy penalty which must be applied in July and

From time to time, since 1930, the Legislature has been suspending interest and penalties on delinquent taxes. The last such suspension was made last May. This provided that a 2 per cent penalty apply on all taxes delinquent on February 1, 1933 (later changed to include all delinquent split taxes), if paid by December 30, 1933, and 4 per cent penalty if paid by March 31, 1934; and 6 per cent if paid between April 1 and June

Mr. Meek urges all Brown county tax payers who can possibly do o to pay up their back taxes before July 1, in order to avoid the heavy penalty which he will be forced to collect after that date.

#### BROWNWOOD BANNER

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace in a recent address in Kansas City said that from the standpoint of future national development there are three possible courses for

The Middle Ground

America to take: Nationalism, Internationalism, or a planned middle road. The last course was recommended by the Secre-

If we accept internationalism, Mr. Wallace points out, we must stand ready to import nearly a billion dollarrs' worth more goods each year than we did in 1929. We must lower tariffs and we must readjuct farming and industrial operations to meet the planned inflow of foreign

We have been traveling in the direction of nationalism during the past few months, the Secretary observes, and if we should elect to go the whole distance, we must permanently retire from production 40 to 100 million acres of crop land, depending on its quality. In Mr. Wallace's opinion this can be achieved only by compulsory control of marketing, licensing of plowed land, and base and surplus quotas for every farmer for every product for every month in the year. "It may be necessary to make a public utility out of agriculture," the Secretary said in his address, "Every plowed field would have its permit sticking up on

The Secretary is opposed to going so far as this, just as he is opposed to internationalism. He advocates a middle course under which tariffs would be lowered sufficiently to bring in another half billion dollars worth of foreign goods annually, and 25 million acres of good agricultural land would be retired from cultivation. Under the Wallace plan, we would have to buy as much more abroad as we sell abroad, and painful readjustments must be made. Simply raising wages won't solve the problem of surpluses, he points out-no matter how prosperous a man is, he can only eat and wear and use so much. What we must do is to swap things of which we have too much, for things we want, that are made in foreign countries.

Apparently, this is the course to which the Administration is tending. Secretary Wallace has emerged during the past few months as one of the outstanding cabinet officers, and while he was not, in his Kansas City address, speaking for the Administration, there can be no doubt but that he is an important factor in directing its destinies.

Experienced political observers see a strengthening of the position of C. C. McDonald, candidate for governor, in the endorsement of the state Democratic executive committee of Jas. E. Ferguson for

The Governor's national committeeman, to succeed Jed Adams, resigned. Whether that strengthening, if such it be, will be of sufficient aid to place Mr. McDonald in the run-off remains to be seen. At the present time, it looks rather doubtful to us.

In the first place, McDonald, although recognized as a capable man, is running his race this year largely upon the Ferguson endorsement. That endorsement, however great a factor it may be in crystalizing the Ferguson votes, has never been of sufficient strength to place a candidate in the governor's chair.

But this year, even granting the Ferguson strength is greater than it has been in many years, finds that strength more divided than usual. Thousands of those who voted for Mrs. Ferguson two years ago frankly did so in the hope of getting a state job. There were few jobs to award, and many have been disappointed. They cannot hope to see a change in the state line-up if McDonald is elected governor, and hence, if they still are hopeful of getting state jobs, they will be forced to vote for some candidate who will make as many jobs as possible available.

Any one of the candidates, except McDonald, can be counted on to do this. With the present line-up, no other candidate would care to keep the present appointive officers. McDonald can do nothing else and retain the Ferguson support, since it is given largely for the purpose of holding intact a strong political organization.

On the other hand, Maury Hughes has many qualities that will recommend him to the Ferguson voter. He is a frank, outspoken wet. He is a young man, comparatively new in state politics, with no political enemies to shout down as the campaign grows warmer. He is capable, and an able campaigner. McDonald has picked up many scars of battle since he first emerged into the state picture more than 20 years ago as Governor Colquitt's secretary of state. But he still is a power to be reckoned with, especially with the Ferguson influence pushing with all its might to get him into the second primary.

It is early to be making predictions, but from the distance of four months from primary date, it appears that the campaign gradually is shaping around Alfred, Hughes,

As the new city officials prepare to take over the reins of government in Brownwood, it must be with a knowledge that they have behind them a record that it will be diffi-

#### rifty Famous rontiersmen By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

Champion of the Santa Fe Trail

FOUR STATES TOUCH! 3

IN AUGUST, 1846, Tom Tobin, scout and guide for Gen. Stephen Kearney, while carrying dispaches from Santa Fe to Fort Leavenworth Kan., made the trip of 830 miles in a little less than 11 days, averaging better than 75 miles a day. That was considered a great feat of long-distance riding, but Felix N. Aubrey, French-Candian hunter and trapper, declared that he could have covered the same distance in two-thirds of that time.

When his statement was challenged, Aubrey offered to back his words with money and the result was a wager of \$5,000 with no restrictions as to the number of horses he might use. All he had to do was to cover the distance from Santa Fe to Independence, Mo., in seven days and eight hours.

In preparation for his trip Aubrey selected six good horses and had them led with eastward-bound army wagon trains, which he would

For the first leg of his journey Aubrey had selected a blooded racing mare, which he pushed to the limit of her endurance, confident that he would overtake the train leading his forst remount before it had gone 100 miles from Santa Fe. But the train had traveled faster than he anticipated, and it was not until his game little mare had staggered past Wagon Mound, 150 miles from Santa Fe, that he sighted

Stopping only long enough to jerk the saddle from his tired mare and clap it on the fresh horse, grab some food that was handed him, so he could eat it as he rode, Aubrey sped on. His next stop was at a ford on the Arkansas, since known by his name, where he took time out for a few hours' rest. Then he entered on the most perilous part of his journey. The country ahead of him was overrun with hostile Indians and he did not dare to stop for sleep until he had overtaken a wagon train. During the whole journey Aubrey stopped

for sleep only three times. Several times he was pursued by Indians and only the fleetness of his mounts saved him from capture and death. But he made the journey safely and in five days and fourteen hours after leaving Santa Fe he rode into Independence. He had covered the same distance as Tobin in just a little more than half the time required Tobin and he had used only seven horses as compared to Tobin's nine. Not counting time out for sleep and meals, the French-Canadian had averaged six miles an hour for the entire distance, a feat of endurance that has few duplicates in history.
