Forestburg votes for three trustees

One trustee was elected Saturday and two will be elected on April 3 by voters of the Forestburg Independent School District.

At a special election on Jan. 16, Glen Romine was elected to fill the vacancy resulting from the recent death of Hershil Holzbog. Romine was the only candidate on the ballot and there were several write-ins. About 75 voted.

The election of April 3 is the regular annual election ordered by trustees after

communication by telephone. It will name trustees for the places now held by David Souther and Charles Dill whose terms are expiring. Both have announced they will seek re-election.

Others who wish to file as candidates must do so before March 3 in the superintendent's office of the Forestburg school.

Absentee votes may be cast in the superintendent's office between March 15 and March 30.

City gets \$4138 sales tax rebate

The City of Muenster has received its first sales tax check for the current year. It was in the amount of \$4,138.86 for the one per cent tax remitted by local business on sales for the pay period ending January 10, 1982.

The rebate check from the

state comptroller is 6.91 per cent lower than for the corresponding period last year, however the decline is not unusual. The state report shows a decline in many cities in spite of an over all gain of \$1.6 million in all Texas cities. Combined rebates to 737 cities were \$34.7 million.

Rebates to other cities of this area and their percentage of variation from last year's first checks were reported as follows:

Gainesville, \$39,698, down 15%; Lindsay, \$1,736 down 57.33%; Nocona, \$7,393, up 33.75%; Pilot Point, \$2,231, down 25.73%; Saint Jo, \$715, down 67.40%; Sanger, \$1,940, up 13.45%; Valley View, \$619, down 26.44%; Whitesboro, \$2,051, down 33.77%.
