This fact was brought to public attention again just a few days ago when a judge of this state freed a convic-ted rapist because one word had been omitted in charging him. It was another case which had no bearing whatever on the person's guilt but only a mistake in legal procedure. According to columnist James Kilpatrick the exclusionary rule originated in 1914 when federal mar-shals without a warrant broke down the door of a Missouri home and rum-maged through desks and bureaus to obtain evidence

maged through desks and bureaus to obtain evidence against a lottery suspect. "There was no pretense of authority, probable cause or anthing else. The court, shocked by the marshals' conduct, unanimously held that evidence so seized could not be used against the defendant at a trial." There is no doubt that our

not be used against the defendant at a trai." There is no doubt that our legal system is being fouled up frequently by the ex-clusionary rule. Consequen-tly many people, including, some of the legal profession, think the time has come to abolish it. As Judge Wilkey of a US Circuit Court stated, the guilt of the ac-cused has nothing whatever to do with the conduct of an investigating officer. And he might have added that the guilt has nothing to do with the mistake of a clerk or stenographer preparing legal papers. When the ex-clusionary rule is applied to this extent the only result is that justice is cheated and a guilty person is allowed to of. **While there is widespread** support for abolishing the rvations about unapproved police action in seeking evidence. As in the decision of 1914, along with many present investigative procedures, it is assumed

of 1914, along with many present investigative procedures, it is assumed that the rights of individuals must be respected. Hence it is also assumed there should be a "reasonable belief" ex-ception in doing away with the rule so that incidents like that of 1914 can be avoided. That exception obviously

A person who escapes investigation because of resonable belief of innocence may actually be guilty and escaping justice because no one does anything about it. It seems that the first and most important goal in our system of justice is to ap-prehend and convict the criminals...and, of course, to make them serve just punishment. Furthermore, it seems that any method of procedure which establishes this verdict ought to be ac-

He was identified as a pillar of the community, a great con-tributor to civic, social and spiritual welfare. And he was gratefully remembered as the benefactor of many who got their start with a loan from him and received financial advice from him.

The newly elected direc-tors join the following seven previous members of the board: David Bright, J.R. Dangelmayr, Earl Fisher, J.W. Fisher, Herbert Meurer, John David Meurer and Henry Weinzapfel. With the beginning of the 98th Congress and the New Year it would be useful for our national leaders to consider

resolutions to tackle the hard decisions facing our nation our nation. We should resolve to gain control of federal spending

our nation. We should resolve to gain control of federal spending, This will require us to deal with so-called "uncontrollable" spending which calls for dispensing money to anyone who meets eligibility requirements without regard for total budgetary consideration. It is growth in this type of spend-ing which has brought us to a fiscal crisis, and only action to control its growth will solve our problems. We also should resolve to face the Social Security issue, to ensure the system remains sound and will continue to pro-vide retirement income for those who have contributed dur-ing their working careers. This is the purpose for which social Security was designed, and is its first responsibility. As we begin our work for this Congress, we must resolve to maintain our program to rebuild our national defense capability, and not to be stampeded by short-term publical considerations into failing to fulfill this obligation. We must address our nation's economic problems. This will ential stimulating real economic growth in ways which will encourage the creation of new, long-term jobs in the private sector. At the same time, we must resolve to avoid yielding to the temptation to accept quick-fix temporary solutions which in the long run will only make our problems. WOISE

Finally, we must resolve to discipline ourselves to act in timely fashion on the legislation which faces us. Last month, we were forced to pass a continuing resolution to pay for most of the government's activities during the rest

pay for most of the government's activities during the rest of the year because we failed to pass appropriations legisla-tion by the end of the Congress. But delaying passage of important spending bills until the 11th hour as did the last Congress is not a responsible way to govern. Certainly, it does not allow for the full con-sideration and deliberation we owe our constituents. In re-

sideration and deliberation we owe our constituents. In re-cent years, Congress more and more often has delayed, missed its self-imposed deadlines, and failed to pass the most basic of legislation until the last moment. There is no reason for this delay. For example, last year, the Senate Armed Services Committee, which I chair, sent the full Senate the defense authorization bill April 13. The Senate the we the levidence May 12 and needs it within the full senate the defense authorization bin April 13. The Senate took up the legislation May 13 and passed it within a few days. However, it was August 17 before the House had acted and House and Senate conferees worked out dif-ferences in the two versions of the bill so that it could be passed in final form. This delay inevitably put off the defense appropriations bill which also had to be nassed before money could be

bill, which also had to be passed before money could be spent. Indeed, this legislation was finally thrown into the continuing resolution, which was enacted in the closing moments of the 97th Congress and signed by the President on December 23.

I hope my colleagues will resolve that this year such delay will not be tolerated. Only if we do will we be able to meet our responsibilities to you, the people whom we represent

Men jobs are compared — white and black teachers with the same education and experience, for example — blacks and white are almost indistinguishable, Professor Williams finds in his important new book, *The State Against Blacks* (McGraw-Hill, 1982). The Bureau of Labor Statistics can't make up its mind. Commissioner Samuel Ehrenhalt has compiled evidence showing that the number of black professionals, technicians and managers increased to 2.3 million between 1970 and 1980, more than doubling. In some job categories, blacks far outgained whites during the decade, the Ehrenhalt study shows. A report by BLS economist Diane Westcott, mean-while, argues that workplace progress during the 1970s was while, argues that workplace progress during the 1970s was slower than in the 1960s.

Which only goes to show that you can prove anything with statistics.

Rounding out the new literature on this subject is a lavishly printed volume you are unlikely to find in any bookstore: Who's Who in Black Corporate America, pub-lished by a young Washington entrepreneur, William Reed. Ished by a young Washington entrepreneur, William Reed. The book is fascinating because Reed doesn't fool around with statistical analyses, sob stories, juicy quotes, pictures, or any other literary or academic device. The book just gives us 268 pages of biographical profiles of black men and women — largely out of the public eye — who have parleyed their talent, education, and determination into pos-itions of corporate responsibility: manufacturing, market-ing, and sales executives; scientists; engineers; presidents and vice presidents of various companies; corporate board members; entrepreneurs. members; entrepreneurs.

These aren't affirmative action officers, minority re-cruitment specialists, or OEO compliance officials who were chosen because of their blackness. These are people who have quietly made it in corporate America, and are on their way up — even while others like Davis and Watson on their way up — even suggest it can't happen.

"The great political irony is that, though previous ad-ministrations are chiefly responsible for the huge deficit spending, the present ad-ministration is in danger of getting practically the entire blame for the depression by the mass of volets." blame for the depression by the mass of voters." Since high interest rates caused the present recession we should want to know what caused the high interest rates. The major causes were in-flation and federal budget deficits. There are several com-ponents which combine to make up nominal interest rates. The original rate historically has been 2 to 3 percent. Added to that is a long-term risk premium of about 2 percent.

"Our basic purpose in presenting this special workshop was twofold," explained CCC outreach counselor Linda Mast who coordinated the program. "First we wanted to express our thanks to the secretaries for their assistance to the Cooke County College staff during the school year. Also, we wanted to bring them the latest job-related educational information." Among CCC staffers par-ticipating in the program were Mary Jo Leach, secretary to the Dean of Students and president of the college's Secretarial Association. She introduced the workshop and explained how college secretaries take advantage of courses at CCC to upgrade their professional skills. More detailed infor-mation regarding instruc-tional programs specifically related to word processing was given by Maxine Stilley director of the division of business administration at CCC. She reported that the word processor is creating. 1983. "Just how long farmers can hang on financially is the big question," says Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Right now, many are scraping the bottom of the barrel as far as their finan-cial resources ate concerned — thanks to three con-secutive years of poor prices. And they can't last much longer. Only those who are virtually debt-free will be able to make it." Returns to assets of debt-free farmers will average in the range of minus 3 to minus 7 percent in 1982, says Anderson, while retur-ns to farmers with a heavy debt load will be a negative 14 to 18 percent. "With those kinds of figures, it's easy to see that farmers must depend less on debt finan-cing," he said. Tarmers generally are vic-tins of overproduction in amajor slowdown in farm ex-ports and domestic demand. This has led to growing stockpiles of most crops. Present farm programs designed to reduce these stockpiles have been a flop, Anderson said. So farmers

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

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
