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Texans opposing capital punishment stirred up quite a spectacle last week at the execution of Charlie Brooks Jr., convicted of the 1976 murder of a used car salesman. Thousands of the dissenters were doing their utmost to stop the execution, making a concerted effort to convince all Texans that the action is immoral and cruel and a violation of human rights.

Without question, the media's attitude was out of line on the issue. It tried ad nauseam to turn public opinion against the law, stressing the sorrows of the man and his relatives and friends as well as regrets for his crime and assurance that he would certainly mend his ways if pardoned.

And there was more. Interviews by the dozens, mostly expressing sympathy, but few endorsing just punishment for the crime or concern for the killer's victim or the possibilities of reducing crime by dealing with it sternly.

Other action of propaganda potential was the repeated mention of appeals for clemency to the governor and the supreme court. Every newscast seemed to mention that the favorable answer was still being awaited.

And finally, how about the details of execution? Telling one step of the process after another, strapping to the death table, inserting the needle and injecting the poison...all of which must have a revolting effect on the average person.

Considering the abundance and obvious bias of the pro leniency publicity, one has to suspect that it was a deliberate effort to cheat justice. It revealed that opposition to just punishment, and especially to capital punishment, is alarmingly strong, and the nation has a long way to go in restoring a proper standard of justice as well as an effective way to deal with crime.

Meanwhile let's hope that the shabby handling of the Brooks publicity has had a different kind of revolting effect on lots of the media. Surely it can see that it has been a party to offensive brain washing which is unworthy of the profession and harmful to society.

It has been said that self discipline is a requirement of freedom. Human nature tends to get out of line unless it applies self control. Applying this principle to free press one has to conclude that self discipline is needed to avoid the kind of spectacle we have just observed.

In fact, it seems best to go all the way and avoid the sordid reporting and biased comment altogether. Let the case be closed as the court's verdict is announced. If anything has to be said let it be a short statement of fact without the propaganda appeal.

In defense of capital punishment and other levels of justice, it's high time to convince people, criminals as well as their sympathizers that it makes sense in several ways. Regardless of skeptics, it has a deterrent effect in crime and it emphasizes that crime deserves a punishment. And certainly it defies the twisted reasoning of unjust and inhuman punishment. The significant point is that severity of punishment is immaterial. No matter how severe, it can always be avoided by avoiding the crime. The fine for a traffic violation seems like a stiff penalty for a small offense. But that doesn't matter if the law is observed. Likewise there is no punishment, lenient or tough, if there is no crime.

Santa parade gets second chance

The community's Christmas parade and Santa visit, postponed by last week's snow storm, will have another chance Saturday in weather which, according to mid-week forecasts will be more favorable.

Last Saturday's change of plans materialized in the morning as the blizzard moved in and all units of the parade were notified by phone that the show could not go on. At that time most of them said they will return but a few remain indefinite. Consequently the original plans are unchanged.

Assembly time is 1 p.m. on Mesquite Street just north of Highway 82. The intention is to judge floats and identify the three award winners, to assign positions to all parade units and to prepare information so that they can be identified when passing in front of the announcer. Mike Otts will be at the mike and will also provide Christmas music between times and as background.

Floats will be judged before the parade, but marching and riding units and a special President's Award will be judged as the parade proceeds, and announced immediately after.

Santa's appearance, the main event for children, has been changed for this year. He will be attended by elves who will mingle and help give goodies while he spends most of his time visiting with the little ones.

His headquarters will be a special throne at the Mid-Park in front of a big Christmas tree erected by the Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce. The goodies are provided jointly by the Chamber and the Jaycees.

Another attraction is a clown selling helium filled balloons.

The parade committee includes Jane Monday, Deb Klement, and David Fette. Floats booked for the event are the Learning Center, Callisburg Friskie Bluebirds, Fischer's Market, Chamber

of Commerce, and Rainbow Assembly No. 14 of Gainesville. Other entries are the Hornet band and junior high band of Muenster Public School, the Sacred Heart drill team, Cub Scout packs of Muenster and Gainesville, Homecoming queen of Muenster and Sacred Heart High, Gainesville Riding Club and Mounted Muensterites, Santa and his elves and the Gainesville unit of Texas National Guard. The VFW honor guard will head the parade, Muenster police will lead and follow it.



Season's first snow arrives

Just in time to postpone the Christmas parade and Santa visit, the season's first snowfall arrived last Saturday in a blizzard that reduced visibility to less than 100 yards. It came about 10 a.m. and fell intermittently until near 5 p.m. leaving a 4 inch blanket with a moisture content of .25 inch.

Counting snow since the beginning of the year, this brings the community total to 11 inches. Earlier measures 3.5 inches on Jan. 31 and 3.5 on Feb. 26. Combining the snow with 1.56 inch of rain adds to 1.81 inch and ups the December measure to 1.98 inch and the 1982 total to 36.79. At this time the total is very near the normal measure of the year.

Outlook encouraging for locating ambulance here

Prospects of locating a unit of the county ambulance service in Muenster are very bright, according to a report from Ronnie Felderhoff of the Muenster City Council following a meeting Monday with the Cooke County Commissioners Court.

Felderhoff presented the court with a statement of support with more than 500 signatures from residents of the west part of Cooke County indicating that the service is wanted here. He

said there is a great deal of enthusiasm for the local station, and in contacting people he has heard nothing but praise for the idea.

Felderhoff also showed the commissioners a copy of the proposed 2 year lease agreement to the property intended as the station site at a cost of \$4,875 a year. The court took no action on the contract because it had not been included on its meeting agenda, however it agreed to place the matter on the agenda of its next meeting

on December 22. It also asked that the contract be amended to require that major repairs, if needed during the two years, will be paid by the property owner rather than the county.

The location concerned is the Boyles Estate House at the intersection of Third and Oak Streets. The city has agreed to renovate the house with help from the Chamber of Commerce to serve as a residence for the ambulance operators and also to add a garage to shelter the vehicle.

Looking Ahead

According to a recent NBC Associated Press poll, "73 percent of all Americans have little or no confidence that Social Security benefits will be available to them when it is their turn to retire."

This pessimistic attitude is based largely on the fact that the people know the Social Security program is un-sound, in need of immediate reform, but because of the political sensitivity of the issue, they fear it cannot be reformed properly.

In spite of this pessimism, for the good of the country and millions of people, it is imperative that reform be attempted.

Dr. Hans Sennholz, noted free market economist and chairman of the department at Grove City College, stated recently:

"The financial dilemma of the Social Security System is giving rise to numerous reform proposals. Many turn out to be new concoctions of the same old redistribution medicine, prescribing new victims for old beneficiaries...

"Reformation is a work of time. A national institution, however wrong and harmful it may be, cannot be totally changed at once. We must rebuild and regenerate the moral awareness that will slowly bring people to adopt what would offend them if it were introduced by legislation and force."

In line with his belief, that reform of Social Security to insure its equity and survival must begin with truthful information, Sennholz offers certain concrete proposals.

First, in order to make certain Social Security beneficiaries realize the truth regarding their benefits, "Every check should carry a stub that reveals the dollar amount contributed to the System by him and his employer and the cumulative amount of benefits received by him at that time.

Second, when a beneficiary receives back what he paid in during his working years, he should undergo a means test. Said Sennholz, "A millionaire who has received an amount equal to his contribution should receive no more. A poor retiree who is lacking the means of support should continue to draw his benefits. But they should be truthfully called 'Social Security assistance.'"

Third, when the assistance or welfare component is called for, children of a retired worker should be asked to contribute to the support of their parents. Sennholz points out that, "As the parents are responsible for their children, so are children responsible for their parents. No Social Security System should eradicate this moral law and Biblical commandment."

Fourth, there should be religious and moral exemptions from participation in Social Security, just as there is conscientious objector status provided for those whose principles will not permit them to bear arms, even in defense of their country.

And fifth, "To grant relief to the primary victims of the System and abate the frantic shifting of burdens to future generations, we should seek to protect our youth by limiting its losses.

To this end it is proposed that no worker should be forced to contribute more than twice the amount he would pay to a private insurer for identical coverage and benefits."

Regardless how we may feel as individuals regarding these specific recommendations, the fact remains, the Social Security System must be reformed and these suggestions represent concerns which are probably as good as any which are being presented.

IRS tips

Keeping accurate financial records is probably one of the best tax saving actions that a taxpayer can take, the Internal Revenue Service advises.

When the time comes for filing a federal tax return, good records can mean the difference between filing an accurate return or an inaccurate one, the Internal Revenue Service says. Also, good records can ensure that taxpayers take all the deductions and benefits to which they are entitled.

Taxpayers are not required to use a specific recordkeeping system. However, receipts, cancelled checks, bills, old returns, and other written documents are essential in proving expenses. Tax records should be kept at least three years after the return is due or

filed, or two years after the tax was paid, whichever is later.

An exception to the three-year retention rule is a property transaction, such as the purchase of real estate. These records should be kept for as long as they are helpful in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

More detailed information about recordkeeping appears in the free IRS Publication 552, "Recordkeeping Requirements and a List of Tax Publications." Taxpayers can obtain the free publication by mail by using the handy order blank contained in the tax package or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the local telephone directory.

Texas-grown Christmas Trees

For a real Texas Christmas this year, be sure your Christmas tree is a genuine Texas product, says a forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. About 100,000 Texas-grown Christmas trees should be available this year in retail lots and on a "choose-and-cut" basis.

Sales of these trees should total \$1.2 million to growers. Texas currently boasts about 3,200 acres of Christmas trees, mainly in eastern areas, with some 1,000 trees per acre. Texas-grown trees are generally fresher, more fragrant and usually less expensive than those shipped in from other states.



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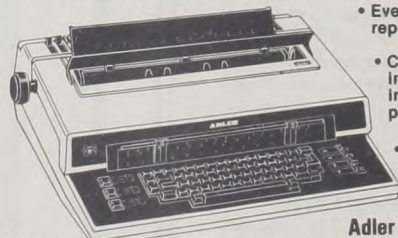
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Nurses hear talk on legal aspects

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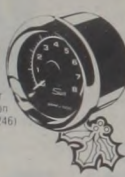

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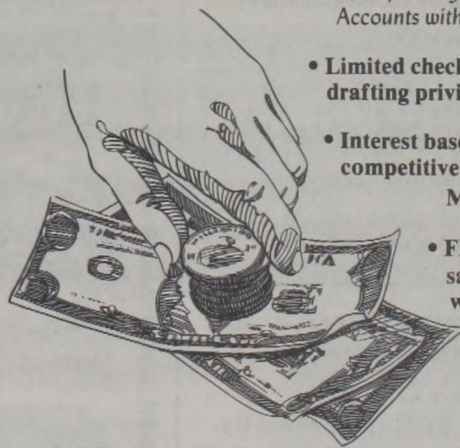
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J.W. Fleitmans visit Canadian kin for winter vacation

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Plainview man is TFB president

A record 1,417 voting delegates at the 49th annual Texas Farm Bureau Convention elected a state president and signaled a change in the direction of the farm program here Dec. 1.

S.M. True, Jr., a Plainview cotton, soybean and feed grain farmer, was elected president, defeating Carrol G. Chaloupka who had served as president for the past eight years.

The audience cheered the early-morning announcement by Chaloupka that Texas Farm Bureau had achieved number one status among state Farm Bureaus, with its 306,359 member

families during 1982. It marked the first time ever that TFB has held that distinction. American Farm Bureau Federation showed an increase of 102,590 member families in 1982, with TFB contributing 30,112 of that total.

In recommendations for national policy, the delegates approved a supply management farm program featuring a mandatory acreage set aside. Under that program, the delegates wanted a 30 percent set aside of wheat and feed grain acreage for the next year, including a 15 percent paid diversion.

The delegates rejected a proposal for federal crop insurance to be handled through the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The delegates wanted the federal crop insurance program to refrain from what they termed "misleading advertisement" and asked that information be listed on premiums and indemnities.

The delegates wanted a change in warehouse bankruptcy laws, establishing rights and first priorities of producers holding title to stored grain. They also voted to support a proposed federal pecan marketing order that would raise money for research and promotion.

Some of the state policies adopted included the following:

-A proposal calling for "increased brucellosis research to develop improved vaccines for adult cattle and improved techniques of detection and a control or cure for brucellosis."

-A state fire ant program which includes aerial application, use of a durable chemical which remains effective long enough for ants to find and consume it; uses of ground application for spot treatment as a followup to aerial application, and makes it plain to the Environmental Protection Agency that fire ants are destroying small animals and ground nesting birds.

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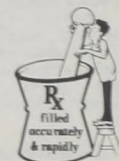

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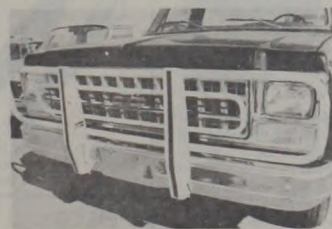

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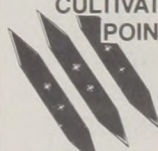

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Immunization clinic schedule

The Texas Department of Health Region 5 Office in Arlington announces immunization clinic to be held in Muenster at Sacred Heart Community Center, on Wednesday, December 22, 1982, from 10 to noon. The clinic will provide immunization against diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP) polio, rubeloa (red measles) and rubella (German measles), for infants 2 months through 18 years.

(Exception: females over age 12 will not receive rubella vaccine without a physician's consultation and prescription). Immunizations are incomplete if a child has not received three (3) doses of DTP and polio vaccine with at least one dose administered past the fourth birthday. All children under 18 years must have an informed consent form read and signed by the parent or legal guardian. If possible, the parent should accompany the child to the clinic. Immunization records should accompany the child to the clinic and be examined by the Public Health Nurse who will answer any questions. Another free clinic at the Community Center will be conducted by the Health Department on December 22, 1 to 3 p.m., on hypertension.
