Santa's elf visits

Just before press time a decision from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards reverses a statement by the commission a week earlier. That is, that the Cooke County jail, only two years old, is sub-standard because of overcrowding. The change of rating is satisfying but the same can not be said for the accompanying prediction that the county will soon be required to expand, and taxpayers will have to dig up a few million dollars to provide accommodations which the jail birds neither need nor deserve.

The modern idea of dealing with criminals is all wrong. It seems to be based on the idea that inmates, if permitted to live as well as free citizens, will be inclined to quit the crime when they return to society. But it isn't working that way. Only a small percentage of them are rehabilitated. More likely they use their leisure to plan improvements of their crime system to reduce the risk of capture when they resume operations.

One has to wonder, too, whether the pampering is related to crimes inside the prisons, like beatings, murder and rape. If the tough guys had to spend more time at punishing hard work, and less time at living it up, they would have less opportunity as well as less energy to continue, or even intensify, their criminal inclinations. Another idea that might help is to segregate the trouble makers from the rank and file, then give them stricter supervision and a more punishing work load. It ought to be understood that the people who are meanest in and out of prison can look for the tougher sentence. That way it will follow also that prisoners who are deserving and are trying sincerely to reform will get more considerate treatment.

Back to the issue of overcrowding: the directors of our prison systems ought to remember that the first purpose of the penal system is to make criminals pay for their misdeeds. The idea of improving them in the meantime and returning them to society as responsible citizens is praiseworthy but that doesn't excuse them from the punishments they deserve. Nor does it seem to fit into the rehabilitation program. Pampering the wrong-doer with comforts seems like a poor way to convince him that crime does not pay.

And let's not forget us taxpayers. We pay the police to seek the criminals and the courts to try them and finally we pay for their upkeep in confinement. We're already stuck for all that and now we're told we owe them certain comforts. Do we? Really? Some people ought to be reminded that society is already doing a lot for the criminals, and if that's not enough to please them, it's time for them to start making adjustments. After all, the jailbirds now are enjoying more space and more convenience than thousands of the regular people who pay toward their support. Let's take up this issue from the standpoint of the taxpayers.

Regarding the depressing predictions that the need of jail space will double by the end of the century, it seems that our first interest should be to reduce the numbers rather than provide more space for them. That can be done by cracking down on crime in a determined effort

Parade will celebrate arrival

Weather permitting, the Christmas parade and Santa's visit here Saturday at 2 p.m. should be a dandy. Indications Wednesday are that it may be smaller than expected, but it promises to be the best yet in quality.

Information released by the parade committee, including Jane Monday, Deb Klement and David Fette, is that 15 units are booked for the event, and hopefully more will be added. Presently on the list are floats for the Learning Center, Callisburg Friskie Bluebirds, Fischer's Market, Chamber of Commerce and the Rainbow Assembly No. 14 of Gainesville; the Hornet

band and junior high band of Muenster Public School; the Sacred Heart drill team; Cub Scout packs 664 of Muenster and 663 and 652 of Gainesville; homecoming queens of Sacred Heart High and Muenster High; Gainesville Riding Club and mounted Muensterites; and Santa with his elves. Muenster police will lead and follow the parade, the VFW honor guard will head it.

Procedure of the event will be the principal improvement over the park. Units are asked to assemble at the east city limit and take assigned places to be in proper order as they move past the announcer. The lineup also includes judging floats and identifying winners of the first three awards then providing the information for the announcer to reveal. All units are to be recognized by the announcer. Mike Otts will be at the mike and will also provide Christmas music between

times and as background. Floats will be judged before the parade but marching and riding units and a special President's Award unit will be judged as the parade proceeds and announced immediately after.

Santa's appearance, the main event for the children will be different this year. The jolly gent will be attended by elves, not another Santa in the park. The reason is that kids used to be confused by two Santas but this time they will know who's who. Elves will mingle and help give goodies. Santa's number one interest is Christmas talk with the little ones.

After arrival Santa and his helper will occupy his throne at the mid-park in front of the large Christmas tree erected last Saturday by the Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce.

Another attraction. A clown will be there selling helium filled balloons.

City awaits county decision on locating ambulance here

The Cooke County commissioners court at its regular meeting next Monday is expected to decide whether one of the county's ambulances will be located in Muenster. The court's action then will determine whether the county will use the facilities pledged by the city.

If the court decision is affirmative Muenster will proceed to renovate a house

to serve as headquarters and residence for two ambulance operators and also erect a shelter for the vehicle. If the court declines the project will be ended.

The site concerned is the former Boyles home, across from the KC hall. The city has contracted for its use and will direct the preparation work. The Chamber of Commerce and Muenster Jaycees have

pledged contributions to the project.

In other action the city had its final reading on a proposal to annex 3,533 acres at the east city limit. Its purpose is to make city services available. Tender Loving Care Day Care Center and the Glenn Hess shop.

The council also approved closing the city hall office on December 24 and 31, the days preceding Christmas and New Years.

City appoints 3 to library board

The city council Monday night made its annual appointments to the Muenster Library Board, naming Frank Felderhoff, Joe Sicking and Norbert Koesler to succeed Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Bayer and Debbie Endres. The terms are for three years.

Other members now serving are Tony Trubenbach, Jim Hoedebeck, Sue Trachta and Pauline Stelzer.

The board's no. 1 present activity is the beginning of a five year remodeling plan. The library is closed November 24 to December 14 to avoid interruptions on the job. This stage of the project consists principally in removing four walls, thereby adding two former

rooms to the main room. That is followed by plaster and paint and acoustical ceiling and addition of racks

and shelves wherever desired. Floor work is also planned when the budget permits.

KC lighting contest stresses Keeping Christ in Christmas

Muenster Knights of Columbus, again reminding the community to keep Christ in Christmas, is conveying the idea by sponsoring its annual lighting contest on the subject and has erected a handsome colored sign measuring 20 x 9 and located near the east city limit north of Hwy. 82. A work party installed it last Sunday.

The contest is open to everybody in the community and displays are to be scenes relating to the first Christmas, for instance the nativity, the holy infant and mother, angels, shepherds, wise men, etc. Prizes are not offered this year, however three of the scenes will be recognized as No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3.

Juvenile thief captured early after stealing local pickup

A pickup truck stolen here Tuesday morning was recovered and the thief apprehended early in the afternoon by members of the Wise County sheriff's department.

The culprit was a juvenile runaway from the Texas Correctional School at Gainesville and has been returned to the institution.

The boy's escapade began with escaping and hitch hiking to Muenster. James Geray of Lindsay gave him

the ride. He was seen wandering about in the vicinity of the Ranch and Muenster Mill about 10 o'clock. Meanwhile a crew of workers was busy remodeling inside the Ranch, some with their pickups parked in the alley and keys left in the switch.

At 10:30 Wayne Wimmer discovered his 1980 white Chevrolet pickup was gone. Chief of Police, Helen Tompkins, notified immediately, sent an alert to all areas of North Texas.

Wise County officers spotted the vehicle abandoned at the side of the road and also saw a person running in the distance. After driving as far as terrain permitted they continued pursuit on foot and captured the boy.

In the thief's possession were the keys to the stolen Chevrolet and another set of keys which had been stolen from Dick Pagel's Ford pickup. Officers reasoned that his purpose apparently was to keep someone from pursuing him in the vehicle.

County jail rated OK

Good news for Cooke County. The anticipated sub-standard rating of the county jail failed to materialize Tuesday in an official inspection by a member of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. He said the jail is 100 per cent in compliance with state jail standards.

Judge Jim Robertson commented that the jail was certified "by the skin of our teeth."

The commissioners got a scare a week earlier when Jack Crump of the state certification commission said he would be surprised if the jail passes inspection because it averages three prisoners more than the jail design specifies. The other inspector Robert Dearing said, however, that the jail meets the standards because no prisoner spends more than 72 hours sleeping on a mattress on the floor.

Nevertheless he recommended that the county

proceed with expansion plans to avoid overcrowding. Judge Robertson said he expects to take up the subject at the next commissioners meeting, adding

that the county has no choice in the matter and needs to get started. His optimistic estimate is that the project can be finished in a year.

Larry Holloway is newest on Muenster police force



The newest member of the Muenster Police Department is Larry Holloway who came here after serving

14 months with the Electra police following 320 hours of special training in the North Texas Regional Police Academy of Wichita Falls.

Before going into police work he was with the Gold Cross Ambulance Service of Wichita Falls where he served as a certified emergency medical technician (EMT) and an ambulance driver. At the same time he was a medical investigator of the county.

Holloway is a native of Wichita Falls, 32 years old. He and his wife Michelle have two sons, Larry Jr., 5, attending Kindergarten, and Jason, 3.

Inequity of Social Security

Undoubtedly the issue of Social Security is one of the most volatile, emotion-laden in all of American public policy. There is good reason for this, for Social Security has had a devastating effect on the country.

While many people see the program as economic salvation for the elderly, it has had, is having, and will continue to have a very serious adverse effect on the spiritual, economic and social lives of all our people.

"This is because the program affects not only the elderly, who benefit financially from the program, but also every one of the 17 million workers who are paying for it, and the cost to them has lately grown pretty high."

In his paper, "The Trouble with Social Security," Rev. John Rushdoony, comments on some of these adverse effects. First of all, rather than contributing to overall security, "the social security system promotes insecurity. It limits our ability to save; it prevents us from investing in sound pension plans, and it fuels inflation. If instead of a federally operated system, the law required free-market insurance and pension plans to provide the benefits, we would then have a sound and stable system."

One of the major flaws in the Social Security system is its lack of equity — its inherent unfairness. Economic consultant Horace W. Brock, wrote recently:

"It is possible to measure how much Social Security discriminates between any two generations by constructing an intergenerational 'inequity ratio'. He further said: 'In a study... my company has computed the inequity ratio between today's retirees and the next generation who will retire after the year 2010. Using the Social Security Trustee's own demographic and economic assumptions, we found that the resulting ratio is 2.5 to 1 in favor of today's retirees — that is, today's elderly are receiving 2 1/2 times as much as today's young workers can expect when they retire.'"

Brock goes on to point out that the situation will be much worse because these figures are based on an assumption that future workers "will bear 40 percent payroll taxes — triple today's 13.4 percent Social Security tax."

He points out that such tax rates are "politically un-supportable" and that we can expect compromises in benefits for later retirees which will increase the inequity ratio to an outrageous 4 to 1 or even 6 to 1 if the economy performs poorly.

The ratio of workers per beneficiary of the Social Security System is very interesting and has important implications. In 1940 the ratio was 159 paying in to every one receiving benefits. By 1950 this ratio had dropped to 16 to 1. Today only three workers are paying in for every beneficiary and soon the ratio will be 2 to 1.

Increases in Social Security taxes can go on only until the 17 million workers who are paying for the program decide it is time to remove from office those politicians who have been buying the votes of the 37 million who benefit from the program.

When the present generation of workers learns it must pay into Social Security far more than it will ever receive in pensions, some form of change will be demanded. It is tragic that political demagogues have built into the System such a class conflict in their grasp for political power, but it is coming.

SUPPORT FOR AFGHAN FREEDOM FIGHTERS

Still reeling from the losses suffered by its terrorist client, the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), during the recent fighting in Lebanon, the Soviet Union seems to be conducting a frenzied diplomatic offensive aimed at currying favor with the Arab world.

The offensive began in mid-September, according to the Advanced International Studies Institute's authoritative *Soviet World Outlook*, and continues even now.

It is generally conceded that the Soviets, for example, were behind the on-again, off-again effort to oust Israel from the United Nations, which was aborted by a powerful United States lobbying effort. The final vote, on October 26, was 75 to 9, with 31 abstentions.

Interestingly, despite their diplomatic and military support for the PLO, and their careful efforts to cozy up to the Arabs, the Soviets have serious credibility problems in the Moslem world.

In one word, the problem is this: Afghanistan. The Soviet Union has been bogged down in Afghanistan for three years now. Though the western news media do not have open access to the area—and, therefore, reporting is sketchy—it is quite apparent that the Soviets have suffered heavy casualties, and are far from having the situation under control.

On October 27, for example, the *New York Times* reported from New Delhi, India, that Afghan freedom fighters had staged three daring attacks on communist militiamen in Kabul, the Afghan capital. The communists didn't deny the report.

The United States, while condemning the invasion and occupation of Afghanistan, could and should be doing more.

And, in fact, while the lame duck session of Congress may accomplish little else, it is expected to approve a bipartisan resolution calling on the U.S. government to provide Afghan freedom fighters "with material assistance."

With 99 co-sponsors, the resolution has the near-unanimous support of the Senate. The House is likely to approve a similar measure.

One of the prime sponsors of the resolution, Senate Democrat Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts, said the objective of the resolution is four-fold:

- 1) To convey to the Afghan people that the Congress has not forgotten them;
- 2) To inform the administration that the Congress regards Afghanistan a logical place to contest Soviet aggression;
- 3) To provide, as appropriate, material assistance to the Afghan Resistance (the Mujahideen), and
- 4) To strengthen the hand of the Mujahideen in any negotiations with the Russians or their puppets in Kabul.

Senator Tsongas, and the co-sponsors of a similar House resolution, are correct. Still, resolutions expressing the sense of the Congress are really just nice words on paper.

Exactly what steps the administration should take, and what kind of "material assistance" should be supplied to the Mujahideen, are more difficult decisions—decisions that will likely see Senator Tsongas and Senate doves on one side, and the administration on another.

Let's hope not. But let's not be surprised if this is what happens. (Feulner is President of The Heritage Foundation, a Washington-based public policy research institute.)

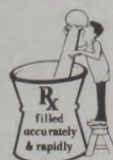
Aggie profs author guide-book on succeeding in college

COLLEGE STATION — College students make more bad grades because of family and personal problems than lack of ability, says the co-author of a book on how-to-succeed-in-college.

Dr. Rod O'Connor, professor of chemistry and director of Texas A&M University's first-year chemistry program, says the failure rate of college students could be cut dramatically if such problems could be resolved so they wouldn't "mess up grades."

"I've seen more F's because the students are too tired, in the midst of a girlfriend/boyfriend fight, their parents are getting a divorce or they just aren't eating right," O'Connor said.

After years of teaching freshmen, O'Connor and fellow chemist Dr. Tom Taylor have formalized the book titled "Toward Success in College." The book began about 10 years ago as a pamphlet designed to help incoming students. It is currently being marketed nationally by Burgess Publishing of Minneapolis, Minn.

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Avalanche of AMPI letters protests USDA milk assessment

ARLINGTON, TEXAS -- Agriculture to protest the 50 cents/hundredweight assessment that Agriculture Secretary John Block has announced will become effective on all milk marketed, December 1, 1982.

AMPI ranks as the nation's leading dairy farmer cooperative with 33,000 members from 20 states, located throughout the midwest, south and southwest, who produce about 12 percent of the nation's milk supply.

"USDA has received a very clear and telling message," declared Elkin. "The assessment won't be effective and it should be stopped. In the short-run, it will only aggravate -- not correct -- surplus milk conditions by leaving many dairy farm families with no other choice but to increase their milk production to offset severe cash-flow pressures."

"We have several Secretary Block on several occasions to cancel the assessment," continued Elkin. "The enabling legislation passed by Congress does not make an assessment mandatory, but rather gives the Secretary of Agriculture the sole discretionary authority as to whether to take such

action. By implementing the assessment, Secretary Block must accept responsibility for the crippling impact it will have on U.S. dairy farm families."

Elkin explained that AMPI is pursuing alternative legislation that would provide a positive incentive to reduce production, while maintaining stability for dairy farmers. AMPI is making arrangements to share copies of all the letters of its members with their U.S. Senators and Representatives when the 98th Congress convenes next year.

"Dairy farmers need to receive a clear and positive signal to reduce milk production," Elkin said. "One of the Major shortcomings of the assessment is that it treats all producers the same way, whether they increase, decrease or hold production steady."

Over the last year, the dairy industry has repeatedly expressed a willingness to accept production controls, but this type of approach has been rejected by the Administration as unacceptable. "The Administration's farm policy is inconsistent: they endorse production controls when it comes to wheat and feed grains, but reject them when it comes to dairy," Elkin added.

Elkin noted that more than 2,300 people involved in allied farm business wrote USDA to express opposition to the dairy assessment during the comment period. Agri-businesses recognize the impact that depressed farm prices are having on them and realize that a reduction in the dairy farmer's cash-flow will deal a serious blow to industries and rural communities throughout America. Rational and long-term farm policy is not only vital for the agricultural economy, but for the national economy as well."

"The Administration had to learn that lower prices were not the answer to the overproduction of grain before turning to a constructive program of acreage reduction and land diversion," Elkin concluded. "We hope that the same error does not have to be repeated in addressing dairy surpluses. It is foolish and shortsighted to destroy the productive capacity of our dairy industry, when all that is needed is a 'set-aside' of a portion of that capacity."
