Christian civilization got a welcome assist from Brazil last week when that country's authorities not only discovered but also scuttled a sneaky plot to send tons of munitions to Central America Marxists under the guise of medical supplies. Four Libyan cargo planes were relieved of their contraband loads and were sent back empty.

This column was highly pleased by the news even though it has not learned what happened or will happen to the shipment. It would be happy to discover that all of the war material, which was reported as consigned to Nicaragua for transfer to El Salvador guerrillas, was instead turguerrillas, was instead tur-ned over to the other side of ned over to the other side of the Central American con-flict. But in the absence of that disclosure it's comfor-ting to think at least that the Marxists are deprived.

Another pleasing factor is also implied here. That is that Brazil apparently has made an important decision in favor of the free world. All of us would enjoy some assurance that Brazil has not been taken in by Communist indoctrination. This even sustains the wish that Brazil and possibly some neighbors of Central and South America will be on freedom's side if and when the chips are down. the chips are down.

A welcome US development from the LYbian caper is that lots of Americans had their eyes opened, and President Reagan got better response to his charge that the Reds of Cuba and USSR were pouring extensive help were pouring extensive help into Nicaragua to be used by El Salvador rebels to topple the legitimate government of that country.

Recent reports tell that the Recent reports tell that the Sandanistas, who took charge when Somoza was booted out of Nicaragua, were having serious problems and were getting help from Russia and Cuba for their own civil conflict and for guerrilla war in El Salvador. That is the and for guerrilla war in El Salvador. That is the situation the President referred to in asking our congress for military aid to Salvador. He believes that the pendulum is swinging the other way in Central America and it's possible to not only save the key courty but also to spark a try but also to spark a recovery of civilization.

At this writing, the subject of Reagan's Wednesday night speech is not defintely told, but it can be assumed that he feels the urgency of the situation and favors striking while the iron is hot. striking while the iron is hot. Perhaps intelligence sources tell him the time is right. Perhaps he knows the Marxists are hurt by loss of the arms shipment. Perhaps he's learned that his friends and not the enemy will have the benefit of those arms. Whatever the case, the President thinks he has an important message that we need to hear. 

City gets \$4,669 sales tax rebate

The city of Muenster has received a check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock, in the amount of \$4,669.41 as a rebate for the 1 percent city sales tax remitted by local business to the state. The taxes were collected on local sales made in February and reported to the comptroller by the end of March.

Remittances to other cities of the area along with the total of 1983 to date and percentage of change were reported as follows by the reported to the comptroller by the end of March.

The payment increases Muenster receipts to \$28,505, which is 3.59 percent higher than last year's \$27,517. In that respect the city enjoys a better record than the average of all the state. With the check Bullock explained that the sales tax is down more then aper cent statewide, the first time in the 21 years of city sales tax that the amount has dropped. He further stated that the oil and gas industry pays about 30 percent of the

City, county sign mutual aid pact

County Commissioners voted Monday to approve a mutual aid agreement between Cooke County and the City of Muenster which will essentially spell out the rules for sharing law enforcement officials between the two parties.

The agreement was made pursuant to state statutes which provide for the entrance into such mutual aid contracts and, as the agreement reads, "... is intended to cover day-to-day mutual aid but may be extended by mutual agreement of the parties to cover a state of emergency caused by natural disaster or other public calamity."

Such an agreement, whereby one party could request the help of the other in an emergency, is nothing

new in essence, Muenster City Attorney Chuck Bar-tush, Jr. says. The two par-ties for years have had an unwritten agreement to help each other out. But the formal contract agreement spelis out several rules in the areas of liability, authority and compensation that have been a little hazy until now.

Bartush said Monday that the two parties have been willing to help each other in the past, but without ironclad rules, the law enforcement officials never knew if problems could arise because of some technicality.

For instance, generally, municipal officers lose jurisdiction once they leave the city limits, but this contract gives such officers the same authority as a sheriff's

deputies when the sheriff requests assistance, which clears up any question of authority.

Concerning liability, both the City of Muenster and Cooke County will be considered working in a governmental capacity when working with each other for the good of the public as a whole and neither will be held liable for the actions of their employees. their employees.

The contract also stipulates that neither party shall be required to pay any compensation to any other party for service provided under the agreement. It is agreed that the mutual benefits and protections are considered compensation enough. enough.

Bartush said, however, that the contract in no way

binds a party to respond with assistance whenever called upon if lending assistance would mean neglecting a party's first responsibility. For instance, if a request were made by the county sheriff for assistance from Muenster, the Muenster police chief is free to turn down the request if, in the police chief's judgment, it would mean jeopardizing local security.

Muenster Police Chief Helen Tompkins said Mon-day she believes the city has more to gain from the agreement, but that the main advantage to be gained by County Sheriff Dan Tiller is in having someone in the area to call on when in need. She said she also believes the agreement will

working relationship bet-ween the city and county law officers — a relationship that is already better now than it has been in years, she

Bartush said he believes the agreement will work to the benefit of both parties and will provide for more efficient police protection overall in the county. He said this agreement is the only such pact in existence in Cooke County and he believes other local departments would do well

"Frankly, I don't under-stand why more of them aren't doing it now," he said. "Because, after all, it benefits all the people con-cerned."

The Owner's Manual

AST WEEK we looked at the crossing of the Jordan River by Joshua and the Israelites. This week we will look at another crossing of the Jordan River on dry land, described in the 2nd chapter of II Kings.

In this chapter Elijah is about to leave this earth and be taken up to heaven, and Elisha insists on accompanying him in order to witness this event. In verses 7 and 8 of this chapter we read, "Now fifty men of the sons of the prophets went and stood opposite them at a distance, while the two of them stood by the Jordan. And Elijah took his mantle and folded it together and struck the waters, and they were divided here and there, so that the two of them crossed over on dry land."

As fifty men from a group of prophets, known as the "sons of the prophets," stood at a distance walching, Elijah parted the waters of the Jordan by smiting them with his mantle. In this, as in many other respects, Elijah resembled Moses, who by God's power divided the waters of the Red Sea by stretching out his hand over it.

In verse 9 we read, "And it came to pass, when they had crossed over, that Elijah said to Elisha, ask what I

S INCE MAN began the slow organization of a growing society from family, to clan, to tribe, to the nation, he has been engaged in ideological conflict. This conflict revolves around the question of who shall exercise power and authority and how much shall be permitted.

of freedom and the forces of regimentation.

Over 500 years were to pass before any truly significant progress was made in expanding the frontiers of freedom — and it happened here in America in the late 1700s. The 13 Colonies experimented with government for 150 years, each under its own colonial system, with limited European oversight. Following the Revolutionary War they went through a critical 14 year period, trying to decide what to do with their freedom. The ultimate outcome was the formation of a totally new form of government, under the Constitution of the United States of America.

shall do for you before I am taken from you. And Elisha said, Please let a double portion of your spirit be upon me." Elisha's request for a "double share of your spirit" does not reflect the ambition of a disciple who hopes to outstrip his master. He appeals to the Deuteronomic law that gave the eldest son a double portion of his father's goods. Elisha requests that he be acknowledged as Elijah's heir, inheriting the role traditionally associated with the firstborn.

Continuing in verses 10 and 11, "And he said, you have asked a hard thing. Nevertheless, if you see me when I am taken from you, it shall be so for you; but if not it shall not be so. Then it came about as they were going along and talking, that behold, there appeared a chariot of fire and horses of fire which separated the two of them. And Elijah went up by a whirlwind to heaven." It was not in Elijah's power to give the Spirit, he could but ask it for his friend, and give him a parting sign that the petition was granted. The text does not say that Elijah was carried into heaven," a way of saying that God came for him. This

will also be the experience of believers living at the time of Christ's return.

We conclude our study with verses 12-14, "And Elisha saw it and cried out, My father, my father, the chariots of Israel and its horsemen! And he saw him no more. Then he took hold of his own clothes and tore them in two pieces. He also took up the mantle of Elijah that fell from him, and returned and stood by the bank of the Jordon. And he took the mantle of Elijah that fell from him, and struck the waters and said, Where is the Lord, the God of Elijah? And when he also had struck the waters, they were divided here and there; and Elisha crossed over. "We need to realize there is nothing magical about the mantle of Elijah. God only allowed it to be used as an instrument by Elijah and Elisha through which He demonstrated His power. The question "Where is the Lord, the God of Elijah?" is designed to test whether or not the Lord's power has in fact been transmitted to Elisha. The parting of the water, imitative of Elijah's previous action, confirms the fact that the Lord's power is, in deed, now mediated through Elisha, that he is the true successor. to Elijah

among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed,..."
Notice how this brief, simple statement clearly sets out the relationship between man and government, between individual rights and authority.

Man and his rights are first; man is fundamental, basic. Man then creates government — Authority.

Why? Only to protect and secure, his rights.

Whereas man creates government, government then can only possess those powers inherent in the governmental document. From America, the spirit of revolution to attain individual rights, spread round the world. The forces of freedom were on a roll, as sports fans would say, while the forces of regimentation were being deposed. Where not overthrown

The spirit of this movement was given expression in a few sentences in our reversed basic historical document, the Declaration of Independence, where it was affirmed.

"...That (all men) are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights,... that to secure these rights, governments are instituted not overthrown, authoritarian governments were liberalized. The results were spectacular. Mankind progressed as never before.

N THE sports world, successful teams recognize that while a strong defense is essential, an aggressive offense wins the game. On Madison Avenue, advertising wizards stake millions on their belief in the power of persuasion; and in the battle of ideas the same principles ap-

suasion; and in the battle of ideas the same principles apply.

"Project Democracy," while still in the planning stages, is an \$85-million program designed to promote democracy and counter totalitarianism around the world— and to do so openly. In his June 8, 1982, speech to the British Parliament, President Reagan called for "a global campain for democracy... a plan and a hope for the long—term the march of freedom and democracy which will leave Marxism-Leninism on the ash heap of history as it has left other tyrannies which stifle the freedom and muzzle the self-expression of people."

Unfortunately, the United States often finds itself on the defensive in this battle of conflicting ideologies, and even afraid to state simple truths. In a recent Newsweek column, Meg Greenfield of The Washington Post addressed this issue saying, "Some of us have become self-conscious and afraid to espouse or defend American democratic virtues wholeheartedly and out loud. And we have become equally skittish about saying what is self-

democratic virtues wholeheartedly and out foud. And we have become equally skittish about saying what is self-evidently true of the — yes — evil of the Soviet system of repression. That system represents the antithesis of liberal values, and yet it is widely thought know-nothing to say so and downright imperial to wish to find peaceful means by which to share the better parts of our democratic legacy with those who still have a choice."

Project Democracy is designed to be a long-term, co-

Project Democracy is designed to be a long-term, cooperative, non-partisan venture,

operative, non-partisan venture, involving the Congress and private groups and transcending the particluar policy goals of any one administration.

Among other things, Project Democracy would establish educational programs worldwide to promote the role of business and free enterprise in democratic systems; help Soviet emigres to become familiar with all aspects of American life; encourage the development of American

studies abroad by sponsoring conferences and granting scholarships to foreign students to study in the U.S.; develop programs to promote democracy in Central America; sponsor travel and exchanges of U.S. and foreign religious leaders; and provide increased support for AFL-CIO overseas programs by assisting democratic trade unions and free labor movements. In addition, a world-wide book-publishing project would be established to sell a collection of books about U.S. democratic insitutions, including such works as the Federalist Papers.

The project was put together by officials from the State Department, United States Information Agency (USIA) and the Agency of International Development (AID). Project Democracy will supplement many of the existing USIA programs and break new ground in several areas. Since funds must be approved by Congress, the House and Senate will get to review the program every year.

But even now, some congressmen are getting squeamish about the project saying it will be nothing more than an exercise in "propaganda." We must remember there is a fundamental difference between Soviet-and Nazi-style propaganda — which by its very nature is predicated on lies and designed to be hidden, manipulative, sinister and intended to penetrate and control the innermost corners of a person's mind — and disseminating information openly and forthrightly about the fundamental principles of a system in which dignity and individual liberty have been allowed to grow.

In the final analysis, the ultimate battle between East and West, Communism and Democracy, is more likely to

In the final analysis, the ultimate battle between East and West, Communism and Democracy, is more likely to be fought with words than bombs. It is a war that is being fought all over the globe every hour of every day.

For too many years U.S. policymakers have thought only about military conflict — while the Soviets and their cronies have engaged in a propaganda war of massive execution.

It would be morally wrong for the United States to imitate the Soviet truth-twisters. It is equally wrong to remain silent. We must be real contestants in the "war of ideas."

"Germans from all over the country"

The accompanying article presents a brief sketch of Muenster as it was slightly more than two years after its founding, which was dated by the early settlers as the feast of Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1889. These few words and the group of ads made up a page in the Texas Live Stock and Agricultural Journal published at Saint Jo on January 15, 1892. The Enterprise is grateful to Albert Hess for the loan of a reproduction of that issue and to Angelo Nasche who called it to our at-

An interesting fact revealed in the article is that Muenster was well established during the first two years and its residents were recommending the community most highly as a place to come and live.

This Muenster page was one of 24 which made up Vol. 1, No. 1, of the Texas Live Stock and Agricultural Jour-nal edited by Thomas F. Hughes of Saint Jo. Besides containing a fascinating variety of stories on farm life, it revealed that Saint Jo and Montague were thriving and prominent. Their business people had placed about half of more than 100 advertisements in the publication. Other ads were for business in Nocona, Bowie, Montague, Gainesville, Belcher, Belcherville, Har dy, Sunset and Ardmore (Indian Territory), even for a horse importer of Wisconsin and another of Ontario who supplied stock to Gainesville dealers. 



Generations ago, marksmanship, competition and membership in a gun club faded from the observance and from frame of reference.

Now the fun-filled salute to German heritage and hospitality attracts housands of visitors who dance the polka, eat miles of sausages, strudel and cheeses, and sample German cuisine, prepared by great-grandchildren of the

Now there are carnival rides for children, two stages with almost nonstop entertainment, talent shows, folk dancing, accordion music and vodeling,

disco music, polka music, big band music, square dancers, a bike rally, a motorcycle road-eo, horseshoes, a jazzercize demo...and contests...you name 'em...chug-a-lug, pretty baby, ladies smile, pretty feet, beards, men's beer belly, local talent, tobacco spitting, etc.

Maifest and Schützenfest were forerunners of our modern Germanfest, but today's Germanfest is related only in Gemutlichkeit, fellowship, good food and drink, music and dancing, and sin-

Emphasis in the three days of celebration is now on reunioning, the nostalgic appeal of "coming back home", crafts, good food, putting the community's "best foot forward" and the enormous popularity of the Fun Run and the race runners party.

The first Run in 1976 drew 250 runners. In 1982 there were more than 3500 runners in the 15 kilometer and 5 kilometer races.

If the growth pattern continues, the 1982 attendance of about 55,000 might reach more than 60,000.

In 1976 when Muenster observed the Bicentennial, a combined attendance of the 4 day celebration, totaled about

How everything got started the 1899 Muenster Schützenfest

by Elfreda Fette

Muenster's first big community party was celebrated in May 1899 in the old Muenster Park. It was attended by everyone in the new town, according to tales old timers tell their greatgrandchildren.

Families came in wagons and on horseback, from a wide rural area, and friends and relatives came from Lindsay and Gainesville, prepared to remain

more than one day.

Known as "Maifest" (German for May Feast) between 1889 and 1899 it was soon referred to as "Schutzenfest". The three-day party was planned and controlled by members of the "Schutzen Verein," a social organization of marksmen, in modern words, "a gun club." It was the main social event of year, marked by reunions, fellowship and camaraderie.

As generations passed and interests changed, the big event faded in observance and practice. Mostly it retained only its aura and appeal for the retelling. But in its hey-day, Maifest and Schützenfest were celebrated with gusto and a bent for hi-jinks. It was conducted with great good humor, but in a somewhat different vein than Mardi Gras, or Octoberfest or Germanfest.

At that same time, Muenster's first settlers recalled also their forefathers' love of military training, marching and discipline in their native Germany and the old army under Bismark.

First leaders of the Schutzen Verein between the year 1889 and 1899 were Henry Richter "Herr Oberst" or Commander; Dr. Melcher First Major; Ber-

participated in the contests, the marches and the brass band, but the whole community and surrounding areas entered into the spirit of celebration, with anticipation, enthusiasm and total commit-

For the early settlers in Muenster, life was not easy. Economy was tight; work was demanding and conveniences were sparse. Times for leisure were "few and far between." Travel was slow and distances seeemed greater than they

People came to the celebration mostly in wagons or on horseback. But come they did - from all over the county to share the fun and feast that local townsfolk spent months in preparing.

those who prepared was Joseph Markowitz who, many months earlier, scouted the woods for a chunk of elm wood, the toughest he could find.

From it he carved an eagle. It was an ornate bird having a wing spread of more than three feet, with a crown on its head, a sphere in one claw and a spear in the other claw. Markowitz was a master craftsman, with a shop near the present location of Knabe Tire and Radiator. He secured the bird atop a high pole, awaiting the opening of the festival, to become its focal point.

In true German tradition, the celebration was preceded by a religious observance. Following Sunday after-

noon Vespers in church, there was an opening parade, with military or martial overtones, pomp and ceremony, and as elaborate as possible.

Led by the uniformed brass band, marching proudly down Main street (the word was "stolz", or "proud of their image") members of the Schutzen Verein, the marksmen, in military for mation, carried the carved eagle. Pre ceding them were four officers on hor seback, in uniforms, with gold braid and shoulder epaulets, sabers at their sides and plumes on their hats. At the park the eagle was mounted on a 60 ft. pole.

On Monday the marksmen returned with their families, all marching ceremoniously to the music of the band. The eagle was their target in a show of marksmanship; the contest was held to name the Schutzenkoenig, King of the Schutzenfest. The contest was strictly disciplined and conducted according to established rules. Competition was keen, the honor was coveted because ther were two prizes; the winner received \$25 and named his Schutzenfest Queen, who reigned with him for two days.

Marksmen first took aim at the eagle's crown, then at the wing tips and then progressively chipping away until one of them succeeded in shooting the wooden bird from its perch. The contest usually took most of the day. The winner was carried on the shoulders of his friends to the bar, where it was his duty to treat everyone, and his privilege to name his Oueen. They were the honored ones at the dancing that followed on both days. The Schützenfest Queen and her two

'Fest shows growth through seven years

Germanfest had a humble beginning as the community's part in the national observance of bicentennial year, 1976. It was sponsored by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce, as it has been every year since, and its first chairman was Leonard Endres. It was a four-day event held on the Community Center parking lot and named German Week Intended primarily as a get-together of home folks and former residents, it was hailed afterward as Muenster's biggest and best homecoming ever. Principal attractions were an abundance of eats and drinks, day-time entertainment, nighttime dancing, and the first German Fun Run, with 251 entries in the 10 mile race. Total attendance was estimated at 500. The Fun Run then and every year since has been sponsored by the Muenster Knights of Columbus and directed by Dan Hamric and Ronnie Hess.

Encouraged by that kind of success, the chamber had visions of a better per-formance in 1977. With Alvin Fuhrman as chairman, it directed energies toward additions and improvements. At the same time it arranged wider distribution of publicity while reaping welcome benefits from the good word spread by the previous year's visitors. 12,000, and the Fun Run likewise more than doubled with 569 entries and 526

finishers on the 15 kilometer course.

That kind of crowd obviously crowded the Community Center parking lot, convincing the chamber that the festival needed more space to continue its success story. So, in 1978 the site was moved to Muenster City Park, and John Pagel as the chairman. Public response left no doubt that Germanfest and German Fun Run were both widely accepted as calendar marking events in North Texas, and much farther. Attendance that year jumped to 20,000, including visitors from many states and a number of foreign countries. Mr. and Mrs. Al Wiesman, who have had charge of the guest book from the start, said that 23 from Germany had signed. Fun Run had 1345 entries and 1165 finishers.

Success continued into 1979, when Germanfest again was the biggest and

best ever. With Chairman Alvin Fuhrman and a hard working committee on the job, and the recommendations of former visitors spreading ever farther, and fine weather assisting, the attendance made a 50 percent increase to almost 30,000. They came from almost all states along with 36 from 13 foreign countries. Fun Run that year had only 1402 registrants and 1066 finishers, the let-down explained by a conflicting race in Dalles and a change here from Sunday to

1980 was more of the same. Dick Ferber and Monica Hess were co-chairmen and the crowd was estimated as more than 30,000. Also Fun Run increased about 50 per cent as 2010 signed up and 1971 finished.

The growth continued in 1981 when the usual fine array of food and fun

was aided by ideal weather, and Co-chairmen Dick Ferber and Alvin Fuhrman had the pleasure of seeing an in-crease of more than 30 percent to an alltime high of about 40,000. Fun Run's increase was small but reached a new high of 2040 and the number of finishers was 2018. Another indicator of crowd size was 506 kegs of beer.

And last year's event was the giant of them all with a guess of 50 to 55 thousand as compared with 40 thousand in 1981. Again, factors receiving the credit are favorable weather and Germanfest's widespread reputation as an orderly fun event in a pleasant at-mosphere. A few of the related firgures are 593 kegs of beer, 8250 pounds of sausage, 1700 pounds of potatoes, 750 chickens, 550 pounds of bratwurst. The Fun Run was equally gigantic, ranking it the third largest running event in the state with more than 3200 registered. Alvin Fuhrman and Dick Ferber repeated as co-chairmen.

Inspired by the festival's amazing background, the Germanfest committee and booth occupants are going all out to continue the good work. They have added several features and are giving greater attention to the German theme enhancing German atmosphere and tradition. This year's co-chairmen are Alvin Fuhrman and Wavne Klement.

The next day, Tuesday, there was another contest, and the target was a wooden star, measuring 4-6 ft., and mounted on the same 60 ft. pole. The prize was \$5.00 and this winner's queen was chosen by chance.

The third day of the festival was

clean-up day, this too in true German

Much of this information was gathered through repeated interviews and conversations with Theo Miller, Joe Hoenig, Mrs. Jennie Schilling, Mrs. Hubert Felderhoff and Mrs. Ben Luke, who were teenagers and even pre-teens at the time. They were all very gracious and generous in giving time to recall and retell stories told them by their parents. Many other stories, too numerous to recount, followed Shutzenfest.

Names of the first officers and first Schutzenkoenigs (the King) were obtained from Brother Thomas Moster's "History of Muenster," and Fr. Joseph Fuhrmann's "History of Muenster."

Theo Miller recalled that before the Schutzenfest was so named, it was originally call Maifest (May Feast). He described the wooden eagle carved by Joseph Markowitz, father of Charlie Markowitz, Mrs. Luke Temple, Mrs. John Temple and Mary and Anna Markowitz. He said that Theodore Wiesman, father of Mrs. J.J. Haverkamp, Mrs. Al Fleitman and Ted Wiesman, directed the target shooting, calling contestants by name, and announcing their scores.

Target misses were called "Loch Im



ladies-in-waiting always wore white dresses, with silk red, white and blue Natur!' (Hole in Nature) or (a Hit in the Air!), a source of much mirth and good Air!), a source of much mirth and good natured ribbing. Miller said too that his father was the drum major for the German Band, carrying a long pole with a gilded globe on top. His father was also the beer agent, having the kegs shipped in from Dallas on the railroad, in an ice car. The ice was in 300 lb. chunks.

His mother was in charge of the old kitchen for the festival with Mrs. Mary Lehnertz, mother of Joe Lehnertz and Martha Lehnertz (Mrs. Bert Fisch); and Mrs. Franz Hess Sr. mother of Frank and Justin Hess and Mmes. Wm. Walterscheid, John Hartman, Joe Walterscheid, and John Henscheid. They of course had many helpers in preparing roast beef, sausage, nevitable sauerkraut and baked foods. There was a tent with tables and chairs for serving and eating. The celebration ntinued into the night and lanterns and kerosene torches were used for

Theo Miller added that people came in wagons, with loose hay in the bed, some to be used to feed the horses, some to be used for weary children to sleep on as the parents drove home.

Joe Hoenig recalled that as a child he watched the German band parade to the park, and admired their splendid uniforms. He said he remembered seeing the shipment of beer kegs as it arrived at the railroad depot, for Schutzenfest and





County Agent's Report

Over the weekend we were in some wheat fields in the county that had infestations of powdery mildew ranging from light to severely infested.

Producers can use cultural and management practices to reduce damage caused by this fungus. Powdery mildew fungus is both soil and airborne. The fungus attacks stem and leaves which can lead to low test weight and shrivelled grain. Control can best be done through resideue management, rotation, planting date, fertilization, and the use of resistant varieties.

and the use of resistant varieties.

Residue Management
The fungi that causes powdery mildew can overwinter on wheat stubble from the previous year's crop. When residue is not destroyed, infection on the new crop is more likely to occur early in the season. Burying stubble early is a good way to reduce damage by this fungi. If you do not rotate, this is especially a good idea to bury all wheat stubble. Burning won't give as good control since the bases of plants, roots, and stems are not totally

PIK program to have impact

The high level of farmer participation in the PIK (payment-in-kind) program will have a marked impact on agricultural production expenses, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Overall demand for farm production inputs should decline due to the high unanticipated levels of PIK partitipation," says Dr. Forrest Stegelin. "This will affect nearly all expenses associated with crop production, but especially fertilizer, seed, pesticides, fuels and energy, and operating

Rotation - Some diseases are selective to certain crops and rotation with non-host crops like grain sorghum, legumes, or in some areas of Cooke County, corn is beingused with good success. Residue buildup is enhanced in a continuous wheat farming system.

Planting dates - If you don't plan to graze your wheat, then planting dates should be set later in the fall. Active early fall growth encourages diseases like powdery mildew. Wheat does most of its growth in the spring so late planted grain will catch up with early seeded grain in top growth. However, if grazing is a factor in your operation, then this will also help reduce the spread of some fungal diseases.


