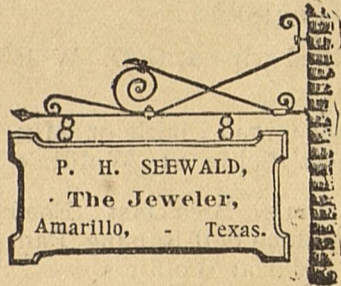

ORDINANCE NO. 23.

An Ordinance declaring the streets and avenues of Amarillo to be public thoroughfares and providing for the working and improvement of the same.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Amarillo: That the several streets and avenues of the City of Amarillo be and the same are hereby declared to be public thoroughfares and shall be worked and improved as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. All male persons between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years shall be liable, and it is hereby made their duty to work on, repair and clean out the streets and avenues of this city under the provisions of this Ordinance, except ministers of the gospel in the active discharge of their ministerial duties and invalids who shall be exempt. But no person shall be compelled to work on any street or avenue who has not been residing in this city for the space of fifteen days immediately preceding such summons.

Section 3. Any person liable to street work duty, and who has been summoned to such duty, shall have the privilege to furnish an able-bodied substitute to work in his place which substitute shall be accepted by the street committee if he is capable of performing a reasonable amount of work; otherwise he shall not be accepted. Every person liable to work on the streets and avenues by paying to the street committee at any time before the day appointed to work on the streets and avenues, the sum of one dollar for each day that he is summoned to work, shall be exempt from working for each day paid for and also exempt from any penalty for failure to work for the time for which he has paid.

Section 4. Each person summoned to work on a street or avenue shall take with him an ax, hoe, pick, spade or such tool as he is desired and directed by the street committee, or if he have no such tool as he is desired and directed by the street committee to take with him he shall take such other suitable tool as he may have.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of each street hand to perform his duties as such in accordance with the directions of the street committee or any member thereof, and a day's work within the meaning of this ordinance shall be eight hours efficient service when said service is voluntarily performed. And no person shall be compelled to work on any street or avenue of this city

more than five days in each year.

Section 6. That the street committee is hereby constituted supervisors of the streets and avenues in this city, and they shall supervise said streets and avenues as often as may be necessary, and shall receive as compensation therefor _____ dollars per day for the time actually employed in the discharge of their duties, to be paid out of the _____ fund of the city; provided, that no member of said committee shall receive pay for more than ten days in each year. The street committee shall also make a report to the first regular meeting of the city council held in the year, said report to be made under oath and to state—

1. The condition of all streets and avenues in the city.
2. The condition of all culverts, gutters and bridges;
3. The amount of money remaining on hand subject to be expended upon the streets and avenues.

Said report shall be spread upon the minutes of the council, to be considered in improving the streets and avenues and determining the amount of taxes to be levied therefor.

Section 7. The general laws of this state defining the powers and prescribing the duties of road overseers, in so far as the same are applicable, shall apply to and govern the street committee in the performance of their duties as supervisors of the streets and avenues of this city, where such powers and duties are not otherwise defined by this or any other ordinance of the city.

Section 8. If any person liable under this ordinance to work upon the streets and avenues of this city shall wilfully fail or refuse to attend, either by person or by able and competent substitute, at the time and place designated by the street committee, after being legally summoned, or shall fail, on or before the day for which he is summoned to attend, to pay to such street committee the sum of one dollar per day for each day he may have been notified to work on the streets and avenues, or, having attended, shall fail to perform any duty required of him by this ordinance and such street committee, he shall be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than ten dollars.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
