President Robert T. Lewis welcomed everyone and made comments about the importance of the member-consumer atten-dance at the annual meeting. He also recognized the cooperative's employees for their dedication and commitment to their jobs. Michael E. Sloan, General Magaer, reported on the operations of the Cooperative for the year by stating, "1985 saw continued growth for the Cooperative in kilowatt hour sales, in plant investment and in sales, in plant investment and in the number of consumers served. While it was not the best year of the past several years insofar as net margins produced, in today's rapidly changing and seemingly mixed-up business environment one has to continually look on the positive side even though at times it is difficult to do so." Mr. Sloan went on to say that, We loward hour calce construed to

"kilowatt hour sales continued to increase but at a level well below 1984. The annual percentage in-crease was 3.9 percent with farm and residential consumption increasing slightly more than com-mercial."

He then added, "Revenue in 1985 increased by \$334,346 as a result of the increase in kilowatt hour sales, while revenue per kilowatt hour declined by ap-proximately one-quarter mil due to slightly reduced fuel and pur-chased power adjustment costs chased power adjustment costs from regular reports whi passed on through the fuel and Please see Co-op, page 2

PUC orders TP&L refund

The Public Utility Commission today issued a final order which allows Texas Power & Light Co. to refund money which was over-collected from customers under the previous fixed charge for fuel. The order allows TP&L, Texas Electric Service Co. and Dallas Power & Light to refund \$140.3 million, the amount overcollected through Jan. 31.

million, the amount overcollected through Jan. 31. Harry Bomar, Manager of the TP&L Gainesville District, said the average residential customer will receive a refund of \$34. Bomar explained that TP&L residential customers will receive a credit on their May bills, based on their kilowatt-hour use multiplied by an agreed-upon "refund fac-tor."

The new charges are expected to save customers about five percent on their bills. Bomar said the savings have been made possible

by the declining cost of natural gas. "The decreased cost of natural gas has allowed us to aggressively seek the less expensive gas fuel,

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
