## Robbery suspects jailed

Two men were in the Cooke County jail Monday on charges of aggravated robbery after they held up Kountry Korner convenience store in Muenster Monday afternoon.

Scotty Lynn Collum and Mark Alan Trostle, both from the Sherman area, were arraigned Tuesday morning and placed under \$75,000 bond each for allegedly taking about \$200 at gunpoint from the store on west Highway 82 in Muenster. The robbery occurred between 12:45 and 1 p.m.

According to store manager Danny Walterscheid, who was at home on his lunch break at the time, this is what happened:

The two men pulled up and one came inside while the other stayed in the car. The one inside got a case of beer and two cartons of cigarettes, then when the cash register was open he pulled a gun, put a mask over his face and told the clerk to give him all the money.

After cleaning out the cash register, the robber took the two employees — both women — into the office at the back of the store and told them to stay there. He then ripped the phone out, killing the line, and left the store.

The suspects were arrested within about 15 minutes of the holdup as they drove into

Gainesville. Quick thinking on the part of a store employee here, and a quick response from the police in Muenster and Gainesville, contributed to the speedy arrest.

According to Walterscheid, when the suspect came into the store one of the clerks had a customer at the drive-in window. Sensing she was about to be held up, the clerk asked the customer to get the license number on the suspects' car.

Police were notified by a customer who had been at the gas pumps outside while the robbery occurred. He came into the store shortly afterward to pay for gas, and when he found no one at the

cash register he went to the back, finding both clerks in the office. They sent him to the police station.

The suspects' license number was immediately broadcast to area law enforcement officers, and Gainesville police officer Pete Bailey pulled the pair's white 1984 Ford LTD over on Highway 82 as they entered the city around 1:15.

Officers recovered a .25 caliber automatic pistol from the suspects' car, and found currency and change from the robbery totalling about \$159.

## Jaycees ready for rattlin' good time

Hsssssssssssst! Wanna get rattled? Want to sink your teeth into a chicken-fried snake? Want to gaze into a pit that would give Indiana Jones the cold shivers?

Then come to the roundup. This year's 17th annual Rattlesnake Roundup, sponsored by the Gainesville Jaycees, promises to be the biggest ever, according to club members.

"Conditions have been good for rattlesnakes this year," show organizer Allen Goldsmith said. "This year's roundup is three weeks later than it's been in previous years. We've got more snakes and we've had more inquiries than ever before — it looks like the biggest show we've ever done."

The show will unfold at the National Guard Armory April 13-14, with the doors open from 9 to 5 both days. Competition will feature trophies for the most pounds of live snakes brought in, the longest snake and the snake with the most rattlers.

A pit-full of live rattlesnakes will be the main attraction at the Armory, with snake-handling expert Bill Ransberger from Sweetwater putting on several demonstrations each day, along with Jaycees from Sweetwater, home of the world's largest roundup. Gainesville Jaycees will also be in the pit with the rattlers.

Guided snake hunts will be available as well, so that people can watch the experts snuff out and capture the reptiles in their native environment.

More than 25 different vendors will be at the Armory, selling a wide variety of goods including Mexican imports, jewelry, lamps, toys and tobacco — and a vast selection of snakeskin products such as belts, hatbands, etc.

First aid lectures will also be given, and a snake-eating contest will be open to the public. Snake skins and snake meat — fried and raw — will be for sale as well.

Snake clubs will be competing for \$50 prize money for the most pounds of snakes turned in and another \$50 for the longest snake.

As an added attraction, the Jaycees will sponsor the Rattlesnake Roundup Dance at the Gainesville KC Hall Saturday night, April 13, from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Admission to the dance will be \$5 per person in advance and \$7.50 per person at the door.

Tickets to the Roundup Saturday and Sunday are \$3 for adults and \$1 for children under 12. All proceeds will go to help the Jaycees carry on their numerous charitable projects in the community.

## City, school voting Saturday

Voters will go to the polls in Muenster and throughout the state Saturday to determine school board, city council and hospital district elections.

Muenster's city council features the only local race of the day, between lumberman Ted Henschel,

the incumbent, and challenger Wylie Lewis, owner of a trucking business here.

Only four city residents cast absentee ballots before voting closed at City Hall Tuesday afternoon.

Councilman Willie Wimmer is unopposed in his re-election bid, and former longtime city councilman Richard Grewing has a clear shot at the mayor's position being vacated by Ronnie Felderhoff, who chose not to run again.

In the school board election, no

absentee voters turned out as three incumbents are unchallenged in their bids for re-election.

Board president Joe Hellman and trustees Harold Bindel and Richard Pagel should all win another term as they enter Saturday's voting without opposition.

The Muenster Memorial Hospital board of trustees likewise lacks a contest, with Al Trubebach, Alphonse Felderhoff and Dr. Marvin Knight all unopposed in their re-election bids.

The board will get one new face, as attorney Chuck Bartush is

without an opponent in his race for the seat being vacated by Paul Fetsch. Fetsch is stepping down from the board.

Voting will take place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday in the lobby of the Muenster Public School. All three elections will be held at the same location.

Lindsay has a city council race going, with four candidates seeking three positions.

Incumbents David Arendt and Earl Cunningham are seeking re-

Relative to the current trend toward mandatory seat belt laws in state legislatures, Columnist James J. Kilpatrick said that "highway safety is a good cause, but it cannot justify bad law, and that is what we're drifting into here."

He observes that New York, New Jersey and Illinois already have adopted the law and thirty other states are considering it.

One might think that the nation suddenly has become safety conscious, but it seems more correct to regard the movement as a sort of blackmail, a direct consequence of a federal regulation handed down by the secretary of transportation in July 1984.

The regulation specifies that, effective September 1989, all cars sold in the U.S. must be equipped with either air bags or automatic seat belts — unless. That is, UNLESS states that together contain two thirds of the nation's population enact mandatory seat belt laws by April 1, 1989. It's a heads you lose, tails you lose situation, a choice of compulsions without a trace of freedom. Choose whether you'd rather be compelled to buckle up under threat of fine or imprisonment, or if you'd rather be compelled to pay hundreds of dollars for an air bag. It's like giving you a choice between two poisons. You're the loser either way. It seems America has been told to choose the lesser of two evils.

Before getting worked up about this highly arbitrary alternative we can console ourselves with the thought that using seat belts, is itself a good idea in that it is a life saver. Studies by state troopers and other officials indicate that in a large majority of survivable accidents, the dead were found unbuckled. And they estimate that if even 70 percent of occupants fastened their seat belts, 6,800 lives could be saved every year. No one can question the value of seat belts and the voluntary use of them, as in affect now, is wise. But compulsory use, despite its known merit, is a violation of freedom. As such it parts from American tradition. Buckling up is a good idea. But can the same be said for MAKING us buckle up?

As we allow imagination to wander we can think of many activities or habits or products that cause serious illness or death. Included are practically all sports Please see CONFETTI, page 2

## Back in jail:

### Cooke escapee nabbed Tuesday in Saint Jo

An anonymous tip in Nocona led to the capture Tuesday of a Cooke County jail escapee in Saint Jo just after 11 a.m.

Carl Houston Boggess, 44, was arrested without incident on the parking lot of Corley's grocery store in Saint Jo when most of the law enforcement officers in Montague County converged following a morning-long search.

Boggess, who was facing trial on a "habitual criminal" charge in Cooke County, made his way through Muenster Sunday after breaking out of the county jail in

Gainesville. He had been at large for two-and-a-half days before his capture.

Montague County sheriff Harry Walker said the net began to close around the escapee Tuesday morning after the Nocona police received an anonymous tip that Boggess was driving a borrowed white Ford.

"We got with the Nocona police and went to the location where the car was supposed to be," he said. "We talked to a lady there who told us her son had left with Boggess in the car."

Officers first checked a Nocona area junkyard where the pair had been headed, but were about an hour behind them. When they weren't there, Walker instructed all units to head for Saint Jo, where Boggess has lived most of his life.

The car was parked beside Corley's Super Save on Highway 82. Units of the sheriff's department, highway patrol, Saint Jo and Nocona police departments, Montague County D.A.'s office and

## Denton man killed on highway 82

A 21-year-old Denton man was killed five miles west of Lindsay early Saturday morning as he walked along Highway 82.

According to the report by Highway Patrol officers, a 1978 Ford van driven by Willis Henry Mitchell III, 22, of Denton, was eastbound on 82 when it struck a

pedestrian walking east on the center stripe of the highway.

The van veered left to avoid hitting the pedestrian, who was wearing a gray shirt and blue-jeans, but he apparently fell or stumbled in front of the van and was hit by the right front portion of the vehicle.

The pedestrian, Darrell David Heath, was killed instantly.

The accident occurred at 1:40 a.m. Vernie Keel Funeral Home transported Heath's body to Gainesville Memorial Hospital for blood testing.

No charges were filed by the investigating officer.

Prizes will be given in each division for the highest number of eggs found, as well as second and third. Special plastic eggs containing cash prizes will be scattered as well.

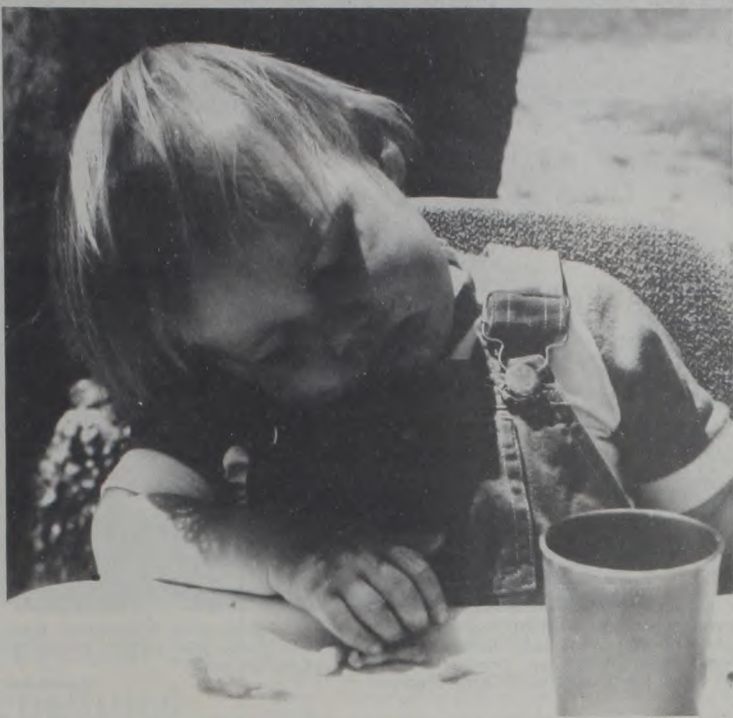

## Escaped felon nabbed

the game warden were on the scene for the arrest.

Bogges and his companion were arrested outside the store, Walker said. Neither man was armed, and there was no struggle or incident.

Both men were taken to the Montague County jail. Bogges was arraigned on a charge of escape and transferred Tuesday afternoon to Cooke County. His companion was released.

**Pair escape through vent**  
According to Cooke County sheriff John Aston, Bogges and another inmate, Stephen Wayne Useton, 23, got out of jail sometime before 10 p.m. Saturday by way of a 14-by-14 inch air conditioning vent.

The inmates removed the vent cover, got up into the vent, then worked their way through the main vent to the air conditioning unit on top of the building, where they tore off the filters, kicked out

the louvered doors and got out onto the roof.

They made their escape by jumping off the roof of the building.

"From noon to 10 p.m. the inmates have access to the day room," Aston said. "We assume that sometime before 10 p.m. they got up into the vent. The second man must have had help, because the vent is 10 feet off the floor — we're still investigating that."

Aston said the two escapees had made their beds up to look as if someone was in them. Their absence was not discovered until 12:30 Sunday afternoon, when a head count confirmed they were missing.

Useton, who was jailed for aggravated robbery, was captured by a county sheriff's deputy around 6:45 Sunday evening as he walked down a gravel road southwest of Lindsay.

According to Aston, the two had gone to a park in the Lindsay

area, where Useton stopped to rest. They split up there, with Bogges going on west and Useton heading south.

Bogges had been sighted around 3:30 p.m. Sunday near the Budweiser warehouse in Muenster. He is under indictment for theft over \$750, and has several felony convictions on his record. The 44-year-old convict was facing a life sentence in prison if convicted under the state's "habitual criminal" statute.

Bogges had been considered armed and dangerous by law officers because of his criminal record, which is extensive. Aston had predicted he would head for Montague County, where his family lives.

A sheriff's department spokesman said Tuesday that the air conditioning vents in the jail had already been fitted with bars to prevent their use as an escape route in the future.

Peace Dorothy Smith arraigned Trostle, who had originally given his name as Russell Thomas Johnston, and Collum, on charges of aggravated robbery, setting bond at \$75,000 on each man. In addition, Collum was arraigned on a probation violation out of Freestone County, where he is

under indictment for burglary of a motor vehicle. Bond on that count was set at \$10,000.

Sheriff's department investigator Jim Bleything, who is working with Muenster police chief Helen Tompkins on the case, said the two suspects apparently picked up and robbed a hitchhiker at Gainesville just before the

Kountry Korners holdup.

Ted Robinson, who said he was thumbing his way toward Wichita Falls, told Bleything two men matching the suspects' description took all his money, then took his clothes and one shoe and scattered them along the roadway as they left him between Gainesville and Muenster.

No charges had been filed at presstime in connection with that incident.

# MHS qualifies eight

## Lindsay wins district UIL competition

Muenster High School students won debate, informative speaking and persuasive speaking, but Lindsay's string of district championships remained unbroken as they took overall honors in last week's UIL academic competition, held at Cooke County College.

Lindsay students took firsts in number sense, ready writing, science and spelling as their team compiled 140 points in the track-meet style team scoring. Valley View was second with 120, and Muenster and Gunter tied for third with 70 points apiece.

Muenster dominated the debate competition as the team of Jean Pagel and Mikael Fette edged another MHS team, Jamie Walterscheid and Sam Fleitman, for the championship. The top three teams get to go to regional competition, slated for April 12 at Kilgore.

Lindsay's Leroy Hermes and Wayne Fleitman placed third in debate, and another Muenster team, Craig Monday and Rodney Hess, took fourth place to qualify as the first alternate to the regional meet.

In extemporaneous persuasive speaking, Drue Bynum won a first-place medal for Muenster and fellow Hornet Pat Herr took second.

In extemporaneous informative speaking, Jackie Farrell of Muenster was the district champion and Valerie Vogel placed fourth, winning first alternate honors.

Tammie Reiter finished second in spelling for Muenster, while Jean Trubenbach was fifth in calculator applications, Amy Davidson took fifth in ready writing, Deann Walterscheid and Tracey Walterscheid finished fifth and sixth in typewriting, and Anita Meurer took sixth in science competition.

The top three individuals in each event also qualify for regional competition, with the next two earning designation as first and second alternates.

Lucy Fuhrmann led Lindsay's district-winning effort, capturing first place in both ready writing and spelling. Minnie Hundt won the number sense competition and

Victor Schmidtkofer, Cheryl Denison and Michelle Miller swept the top three places in science competition.

Other district champions included Michael Fabrizio of Krum in Lincoln-Douglas debate, Tammy Denton of Collinsville in poetry speaking and Le'Ann Pembroke of Valley View in prose interpretation.

Rachel MacCracken of Gunter captured first in news writing in the journalism contest, while Era's Delania Raney took top honors in feature writing. Another Era entrant, Kevin Hinzman, won the editorial writing contest and Jeff Gravley of Gunter won headline writing.

Sheryl Reed of Collinsville won the calculator applications contest. Valley View swept shorthand with Julie Bartlett, Ginger Camp and Le'Ann Pembroke finishing one-two-three, and Tonya Reed of Gunter won top honors in typewriting.

Schools receive 15 points for an individual first place, 10 for a second and five for a third. The standard debate competition nets 20 for the winners, 15 for the runners-up and 10 for the third-place finishers.

Collinsville won the one-act play competition, held last week, while Gunter finished second. One-act play competition is not figured on team point totals.

Kim Hess led Muenster's junior high effort, winning first place in oral reading competition. Cheryl Bayer took second in spelling and John Herr finished fourth in number sense.

# Stenholm speaks for small hospitals

Congressman Charles Stenholm last week urged the release of a report on the effect of the new system of Medicare payment on rural hospitals.

Speaking on behalf of small hospitals, Stenholm called for the "prompt delivery" of a report on a study being conducted by the Department of Health and Human Services. The report, which was to have been released seven months ago, will determine the effect of the Diagnostic Related Group (DRG) system of payments on rural hospitals.

Stenholm and other area representatives believe the current system favors urban areas and is unfair to small-town hospitals.

"The payment assumes that rural wages and other costs are lower than those in urban areas," he said. "Because of this theory, rural hospital reimbursements currently are 25 to 47 percent less than those to their urban counter-

parts for precisely the same services. I am convinced this is entirely unfair."

Stenholm cites several other imbalances in the DRG program:

— it does not take into account that in order to provide quality medical care, rural hospitals must pay competitive salaries — and must sometimes pay even more than urban hospitals to attract employees to sparsely populated areas;

— hospitals in small towns often do not have the opportunity to purchase goods in quantity, at discount prices, like larger

hospitals; — rural areas have a disproportionately higher percentage of elderly residents than most metropolitan areas, and those citizens require more care and a longer hospital stay, on the average, than younger people.

To make his point, Stenholm noted that the median age in the United States was 30 years according to the 1980 census. The median age in 27 of Stenholm's 35 counties is higher than the national average — the highest being Cooke County with a median age of 44.3.

Cooke County was only slightly above the average with a median age of 30.8.

In addition to a higher median age, the percentage of residents over 65 is also higher in this district than in the rest of the nation. Nationwide, elderly citizens make up 11.3 percent of the population, but in the 17th Congressional District the number is 15.6. The county with the highest percentage of elderly is Coleman County, with 25.6 of its 10,439 people over 65.

In Cooke County, 14.5 percent of the 27,656 people were 65 or

older according to the 1980 census.

"In my district, many people have to travel quite some distances to receive health care," Stenholm said. "The sparsity of the population and the size of the hospitals may not be typical, but that makes those West Texans no less deserving of access to quality health care."

"The only way they're going to continue receiving that care is if the DRG formulas are adjusted to allow the rural hospitals to survive."

## New rules pinch Muenster Hospital

Administrator feels change unlikely despite efforts

Muenster Memorial Hospital administrator David Bright says the things Stenholm is saying (see story above) about the plight of rural hospitals hold true for the 33-bed facility here.

"He should know it by now," Bright said Monday. "Enough of us have written and told him."

Muenster Memorial Hospital was in the last group to go on the DRG system of Medicare reimbursement, starting when their fiscal year began last July 1. Under the system, a price is established for each illness, with a particular pricing system for each hospital based on both that hospital's history and regional averages.

"I have no argument with the pricing structure," Bright said. "The cost-reimbursement system we were on had a lot of problems. I favor a system that is firm: that says 'This is what you're going to get, now do a good job.'"

"I do have a problem with the way the rural people are being treated versus the way urban people are being treated," he said.

Bright explained that while a hospital in Dallas has a "labor market" of nurses, technicians and other health-care workers to draw on, a rural hospital such as Muenster Memorial has to recruit people to move into the community. Often, housing problems or just the slower pace of small-town life work against that effort.

"Labor costs us less, in some respects, than it does in Dallas, but in some respects it costs us more. We're not as bad off as some of the smaller hospitals that are closer to the metropolitan areas — they have to compete directly with big hospitals because people can commute."

The advanced age of many Muenster Memorial patients is one of the main problems the hospital has breaking even under the new Medicare system, Bright said. Pa-

tients of advanced age often require more care than the DRG system will pay for.

For example: Under the DRG, Medicare will pay Muenster Memorial Hospital \$1,670 to treat a case of simple pneumonia and pleurisy in a patient over 70. The "mean" length of stay for that treatment is 8.5 days.

In other words, if MMH can get the patient out in 8.5 days or less, they should be able to break even or perhaps come out a little ahead.

But if the patient stays in the hospital 29 days, the hospital still just gets \$1,670. After that, through a special provision called a "day-outlier", the hospital can be paid an additional \$196.50 a day — a rate determined by dividing the original \$1,670 by 8.5 days.

So if the patient is in the hospital a total of 35 days, Muenster Memorial will get the original \$1,670, then, after a required two-day grace period, they will get \$196.50 a day for the last three days, for a total of \$2,260.

But through February of this year, the approximate cost for a patient at Muenster Memorial was \$257 a day. Thus, while the hospital only received \$2,260 for the pneumonia patient, its costs were actually more than \$9,000. By law, they cannot recoup that loss.

"There are ways to recover more than the original DRG amount, through the outlier provisions," Bright said. "But the cost of care has to get so high, you're going to lose your shirt before that kicks in."

On top of that, there is a nationwide limit on the amount of outliers that can be paid. "I haven't found anybody yet who has been able to get any outlier business," Bright noted.

Another problem is the misunderstanding many, if not most, Medicare patients have about the system. According to Bright, the government has not educated the beneficiaries as to the strict admission stan-

dards and other limits placed on doctors and hospitals under the new system.

"Many patients think all they've got to do is pack their bags and come to the hospital," he said. "They can't. Along with the DRG system have come some very drastic limitations on admissions. Some people have to be treated on an out-patient basis, even for certain surgeries, and other surgical procedures have to be approved by Medicare before a doctor can perform them."

Bright said that nationwide, since the DRG system was put in place, hospital admissions have dropped, patient-days have dropped and the length of the average hospital stay has dropped. The changes are not just affecting Medicare, but commercial insurance carriers as well.

"It has reached the point now to where they are investigating the hospitals to see if we're using the system as a tool to turn sick people out too early," Bright said.

As to the changes Stenholm is asking for, the local administrator said he doubts anything will be done about the DRG system of pricing anytime soon.

A provision currently in the plan is designed to gradually phase in prices on the national average instead of a hospital's own historical costs. That shift to national averages will help the Muenster hospital, but Bright said it "is being fought tooth and nail" by larger hospitals in the northeast whose historical costs are much higher than the national averages.

"There's tremendous pressure on Congress to declare a moratorium on the changeover and keep things as they are," he said. "There's also a wage-index study going on to update the formula for DRG prices, but they're dragging their feet on that, too."

Meanwhile, Muenster Memorial will continue to furnish health care to a wide area at a relatively low cost, taking whatever Medicare sees fit to pay them.

Congressman Charles Stenholm announced this week that a regional show in the fourth annual competition will be held in Gainesville on Wednesday, April 24. The contest will be held at the Powell Fine Art gallery, 201 Lindsay, and will include artists from Cooke, Jack, Montague and Wise counties.

All entries must be in place by noon on the 24th, or may be brought in on the Monday or Tuesday before the 24th.

The Gainesville contest will be one of eight regional shows being held in Stenholm's vast 17th Congressional district. Five top winners from Gainesville will compete with those from similar contests to be held in Abilene, Big Spring, Graham, Snyder, Post, Stephenville and Weatherford.

The contest will culminate May 25 with an awards dinner at the Abilene.

Artwork must be no larger than 30" by 30" unframed, and two-dimensional. Landscapes should portray Texas scenes. Paintings, drawings, collages and prints are eligible.

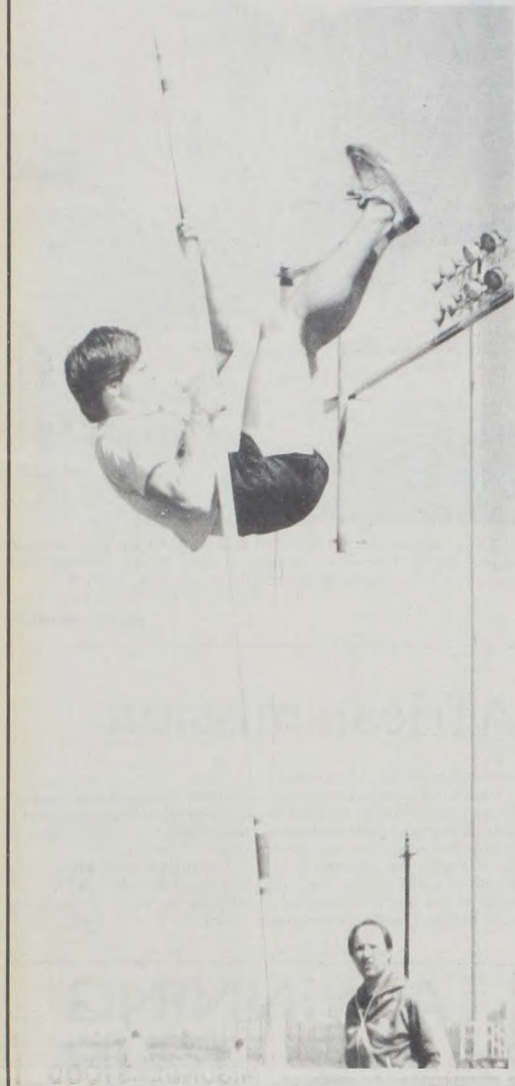

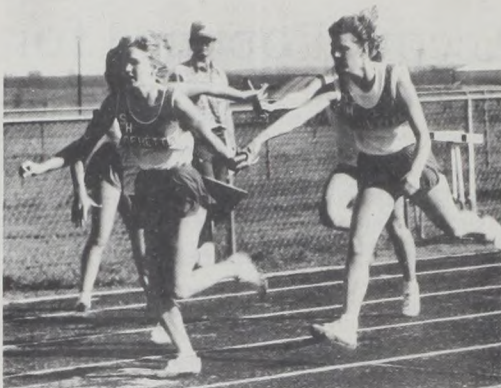

# Agricultural briefs

## Financial stress ...

Farmers in Texas are under severe financial stress, the same as in other states throughout the country, according to an economist with the Extension Service.

Net farm income in Texas in 1984 totalled only about half of what it was five years ago; thus, the purchasing power of the Texas farmer is only about 25 to 30 percent of what it was in 1979 due to depressed crop and livestock prices, steadily increasing costs, adverse weather conditions and high real interest rates which not only increase costs, but strengthen the dollar abroad and reduce export sales.

## Farmland values slip ...

After bucking the trend of declining farm real estate values over the rest of the country, farmland prices in Texas finally slipped a little the past year.

Texas farmland is now worth about \$725 per acre in non-irrigated areas, a decline of almost seven percent from the past year. Irrigated cropland also declined slightly to about \$980 an acre, and rangeland dropped by about two percent to \$600 an acre.

Prospects for 1985 indicate that Texas farm real estate values will continue to slip despite urban sprawl and potential income from natural resources.

## Cattle outlook 'bullish' ...

Fed cattle marketings will likely be declining in the months ahead, and that's good news in the cattle industry.

The tapering off of fed cattle marketings along with reduced feedlot placements should help strengthen overall cattle prices, according to a Texas A&M economist. While beef supplies should decrease, pork and lamb production is also expected to be down although some gains are expected in poultry.

# Local dairymen attend meet

## Cooke County represented at AMPI convention

David Schniederjan, Lee Wolf and Marvin Rauschuber of Cooke County were among the elected officials who took part in the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) annual meeting in Chicago, March 27-30.

During their four days in Chicago, the dairy farmers worked with colleagues from 20 Midwestern and South Central states in determining cooperative policy. The 1985 Farm Bill was a major topic of discussion.

AMPI is the nation's largest dairy farm cooperative, with 30,000 members producing 11 percent of the nation's milk supply. Local dairymen are members of the organization's Southern Region.

Wolf, the dairy farmer from Gainesville who serves as Southern Region president,

outlined the progress dairymen had made in balancing the supply and demand for dairy products.

Milk production dropped almost three percent nationally, from 140 billion pounds in 1983 to 135 billion pounds in 1984. Sales increased by approximately two and one-half percent during this same period. Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) purchases were cut in half, and the cost of the dairy price support programs was reduced by one billion dollars.

E.L. Wise, Southern Region manager in Arlington, reported the region's production decreased 5.5 percent in 1984, nearly twice the national average. A greater proportion of the Southern Region's supply was sold to Grade A handlers than in the previous years, increasing from 72 to 78 percent of the milk produced. This

represented an increase of 95 million pounds.

The Southern Region collected over \$20 million in premiums over and above the minimum prices established under the Federal Milk Marketing Orders. Region operating costs were reduced through greater efficiencies and the use of technological advances in data processing, manufacturing and other services.

The eight plants that the Southern Region operates — including the cheese plant in Muenster — continued to play a key role in the cooperative's marketing program. The plants processed over one billion pounds of milk and produced a variety of products including butter, dry milk powder, ice cream and ice cream blends, condensed milk and Cheddar cheese. Packaged butter

sales increased by 55 percent and cheese by 16 percent.

The Region's Consumer Services Division is one of the regional organizations qualified to use funds generated by the National Dairy Promotion and Research Order. The Region operates a 5.5 million dollar generic advertising, sales promotion and nutrition education program.

Resolutions on promotion and component pricing dominated the discussion at the Southern Region delegate session. These resolutions originated at district meetings throughout the Region and were brought to the annual meeting through a system that provides members with an opportunity to be involved in establishing the operating policies of their cooperative.

# County Agent's Report

Whether you seed vegetables directly in the garden or indoors in containers, never be timid about thinning. One of the most serious problems in home vegetable gardens is that plants are frequently too crowded.

Plenty of seed should be planted to insure a stand, but if good germination occurs, plants are often too crowded in the row for good growth.

Thin young seedlings at an early age to insure a stand which will result in good yields of high quality vegetables at harvest time. Too many seedlings in the row can act just like weeds and compete with each other for water, nutrients

and sunlight.

Seedlings should be thinned before they are two inches tall and before their roots become intertwined. Be sure the soil is moist when thinning.

Rather than thin plants to be the recommended stand in one operation, thin in two stages. During the first thinning operation, leave twice as many plants as actually needed. The second time around, then to a final stand. This will allow for some losses due to insect, diseases or related problems.

By the way, when thinning vegetable crops such as cucumbers, squash, melons and okra,

pinch or cut off unwanted plants rather than pulling them up. Pulling may damage the roots of plants you wish to keep.

If stands are poor and uneven in other parts of the garden, transplant such crops as lettuce, beets, chard, cabbage, carrots, onions, peppers, tomatoes and eggplants

to other areas. If thinnings are to be transplanted, gently dig the plants up to avoid severe root damage.

Many thinnings can be used for the dinner table. Young tender lettuce is a superior salad item, and baby carrots are a real gourmet treat.

# SCS fish program deadline April 16

Ponds are full and water temperatures are rising, so now is the time to stock fish according to Ray Svacina of the Upper Elm/Red Soil and Water Conservation District.

The deadline for placing orders for fish purchased from the SCS is April 16. Fish will be delivered April 25 at the Gainesville Livestock yards.

Svacina said by June the water temperature will be too warm to safely handle fish.

"Fish farmers have been preparing all winter for the spring fish stocking season," he said. "We urge pond owners to place their orders now while the selection of species and sizes is good. Later, the species you want may be unavailable."

The SCS normally recommends channel catfish, or blue catfish, in ponds less than one surface acre. A commercially available catfish ration can be fed, or flathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat.

If largemouth bass are already in the pond, the SCS recommends stocking catfish that are at least eight inches long and no minnows.

SCS personnel at Gainesville can help pond owners with most aspects of pond management, including construction, stocking, fertilization, weed control and harvest.

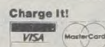

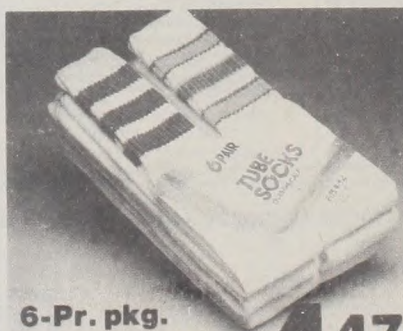
