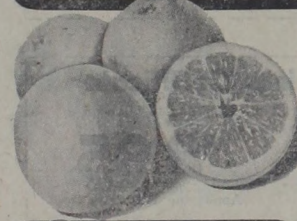

YOU CAN BANK ON IT!

One of the things worth repeating is the formula for getting the total in your checkbook to agree with the figures on your bank statement. Reconciliation is the name of the process. The following steps will make it easier for you:

- 1 - Don't wait around, do the reconciliation the day you receive your bank statement.
- 2 - Take your checks from the bank statement, put them in numerical order and compare them with your checkbook. Mark your checkbook to indicate which checks have cleared the bank (these will be in the statement).
- 3 - Subtract from the balance showing in your checkbook any bank charges or draft payments not shown in your checkbook.
- 4 - Now on the statement, add the total of any deposits you've made which are not shown on the statement to the last balance shown (on the statement).
- 5 - From this new total, subtract any checks written which are not listed on the statement. This should be the same figure as the adjusted total in your checkbook.

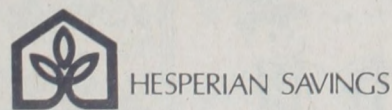

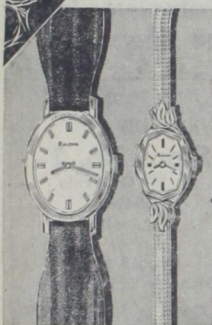

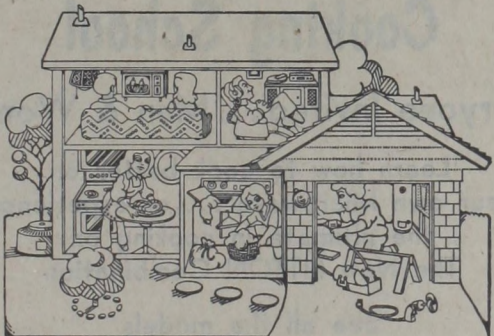
