Both de-note the responsibility of the Federal Reserve Sys-tem for insuring the cur-rency. rency.

In the past most currency carried the legend, "silver certificate", denoting that the currency was redeem-able in silver equivalents at the U.S. Treasury in Washington, D.C. Heavy demands for currency made it obvious that such huge reserves of silver could not be kept on hand for such redemptions, so the change was made to Federal Rewas made a serve Notes.

Now the currency is backed 100 per cent by a variety of collateral con-sisting of government se-curities, gold certificates and other special assets (in-cluding silver).


