## In case you'd like to see a swell bouquet for modern artillery training and Fort Sill in particular, take a look at the current issue of Time. It will give you a good idea of why the Heinies in Tunisia and Sicily were inclined to scatter when the Yanks cracked down with their big guns.

Veterans of the last war, who certainly learned to respect artillery, can hardly imagine the terrifying efficiency of today's barrage. Less than a minute after a target is pointed out a dozen 105 shells are headed for it. A job that would have taken nearer an hour 25 years ago.

## In explaining this phenomenal

improvement Time gives most credit to the Graphical Firing Table, a contraption very similar to a standard engineer's slide rule. It gives at a glance all the data usually computed by means of long firing tables plus complex calculations to compensate for varying conditions in powder, temperature, etc. The GFT is set to compensate for the variations, after which there's nothing left to do but note the desired range and read off the data

Sharing credit with the GFT is the plotting board, which may consist of a map or a plain piece of paper mounted on beaver board. On it are shown the gun position, a base point and a few previously designated check points — all distances plotted to scale, of course.

**Rules** Announced For Overseas Mail For Christmas The Christmas shopping season

is here — even though the weather is still hot. Mailing of gifts for Army and Navy personnel overseas must begin by September 15, if the men and women in the armed forces are not to be disappointed; and September 15 is less than three

weeks away. Christmas gifts may be mailed by parcel post to overseas army personnel only between September 15 and October 15. After the latter date, such parcels may not be mailed unless a written request presented with each parcel. No

Both Muenster schools will open for another scholastic season on September 13, it has been announ-

**Registrations at Sacred Heart** school are expected to be substantially the same as last year, around the 300 mark. Thirteen Benedictine Sisters from Jonesboro, Ark., are connected with the system, eight in the grade department, three in high school, one music teacher and one housekeeper. It had not been learned this week who the teachers will be, but it is understood that there will be several changes in the teaching personnel. Five of the Sisters are here now and the remaining eight will arrive this week end.

Public School personnel is also incomplete. This week only three of the five necessary teachers are signed up. They are Doyle Blodgett, former teacher at Hood, who will be superintendent, and Miss Elfreda Luke and Mrs. Loyal Burchfiel, who taught last year. Miss Mary Wiedemann and Mrs. D.C. Kline will not be on the staff this year. The former is employed at Camp Howze, and the latter was used last term only as a substitute teacher.

The school board stated this week that efforts are being made to secure the two remaining teachers needed to carry on a high school and that correspondence is taking place with two prospective instructors, but nothing definite had been decided by Wednesday.



**PRE-PEARL HARBOR FATHERS CONTINUE** 

It will probably be necessary to nduct 446,000 pre-Pearl Harbor fathers by January in order to meet quotas for the balance of this year. Draft Director Lewis B. Hershey announced Monday in an

The figure was given in a letter to the 6.500 local draft boards explaining why the ban on drafting pre-Pearl Harbor fathers, except those in non-deferable work and therefore subject to induction at any time, had been lifted effective Oct. 1.

Since he put the number of draft age father (18 through 37) in non-agricultural work at 6,559, 000, Hershey's figure showed approximately 7 out of 100 of them can expect to be in uniform before the year ends. Perhaps 21 out of 100 may be sent to induction stations, however

It is clear that if a pre-Pearl Harbor father now becomes employed in a war plant he may be considered for occupational deferment. In view of the fact that replaceability has become extremely important in tight labor areas, local boards will undoubtto the occupational deferment of has been announced. 
"We will have to complete our calls by taking fathers as they may be needed after all other available men have been exhausted' Hershey said. He added that 907,-000 men would have to be induct-ed between Oct. 1 and Jan. 1 to estimated army and navy calls. 
