business - that's no small feat when you consider that it takes most small business - that's no small feat when you consider that it takes most small
businesses starting out today at least three years before they can turn any profita all.
One of the many bits of advice he offered me years ago illustrated the philosophy with which he chronicled Muenster's history since 1936, "If
you can't say something nice about somebody, don't say anything at all." There were, of course, many times when Dad found at necessary to report
tragedy and controversy in his newspaper, but he always did so in a way that was dignified and fair to those people involved in the stories.
It's certainly obvious that Dad was opinionated; but here again, he without being disagreeable. Every week, Dad would crank out an opinion or set of opinions that was almost certain to irritate some other viewpoint. But his intent was not to irritate; his intent was to make people th
sad, but sometimes people won't think unless they're forced to.
This seemingly pushy approach was only one way in which Dad exerted
a well-meant, but sometimes demanding, influence. And that influence is the primary reason that I feel I have so much for which to be thankful.
