## Parade favored by good weather and attendance

Weather from daybreak until about midmorning Saturday was not quite encouraging, but long before noon the sun broke through feebly to allow the parade to go on in relative comfort for both its participants and its audience, in spite of clouds and wind.

The parade stepped off smartly at 1:30 p.m. from Mesquite Street, coming west down Hwy. 82 and turning north at Main and Division, as far as East Fourth.

Leading the way was the Muenster Girl Scout Troop 45 with the American Flag and the Scout Troop Flag, accompanied by Loretta Felderhoff. Included were Junior Troop 43, accompanied by Irene Hartman, and Brownie Troop 60 with Emily Klement.

There were 18 total entries and all were excellent. Crowd reaction indicated appreciation and approval.

President's Award - for most unique entry - Muenster Public School Band.

Best Theme Interpretation - "Trail Blazers" Camp Fire Girls - Float name, "Babes in Toyland."

Business Award - Muenster Telephone Corporation won for second year - float title, "Calling Toyland."

Best Marching Unit - Sacred Heart Drill Team, doing a routine to "Jingle Bells," in very close competition with Lindsay Knight Lites Drill Team.

Honorable Mention went to Muenster Elementary School's First Grade with "Toyland or Bust" for uniqueness and "cuteness."

## County unites with Saint Jo to promote Red River bridge

Cooke County Commissioners and County Judge Jim Robertson held a well-attended meeting Monday morning concerning the proposed Red River Bridge.

Texas Highway Department representatives Dale Cantrell and Leiland Jett explained the recent history of this latest effort as reported in *The Enterprise* last week. Then they answered questions.

There will be a meeting in Austin Jan. 27, 1988 at which interested parties may present their studies and opinions to the Texas Highway Commission. That is the focus of petitions, a cover letter and resolutions passed by the Cooke County Commissioners' Court and the Gainesville Area Chamber of Commerce supporting the bridge idea and the Highway Department's preliminary proposal that the best site is northwest of Bulcher

in Cooke County. The petitions and resolutions were all forwarded to the Highway Department Wednesday under Muenster Chamber of Commerce cover. Included were supporting resolutions from the City of Muenster, City of Saint Jo and Saint Jo Lions Club. There were over 1,200 names on the petitions from Cooke County and Saint Jo added over 200 on short notice. Highway Department officials commended Muenster and Saint Jo on their quick, competent and positive action.

The meeting with the commissioners also revealed that if connecting roads to the bridge are designated Farm to Market, the county would pay for any rights of way and utility adjustments. It is hoped that possible donations of right of way will hold the cost down.

Residents from Oklahoma were present and reported that a study has been made and funds are available. They want a bridge, on a site that best serves all the people of the area, built with peaceful cooperation. Cantrell of the Texas Highway Dept. said, "We're just studying feasibility at this time. There will certainly be more coordination with Oklahoma if the Highway Commission agrees." The January meeting in Austin is only to gather information to determine whether a bridge is to be built.

Representatives from Nocona, now supporting a bridge site near Spanish Fort, were at the meeting but made no comment. Nocona has previously argued that a Bulcher site would do them no good even though the distances - Nocona to Bulcher and Muenster to Bulcher -

are approximately equal.

Muenster and Saint Jo have taken, and will continue to take, a positive position concerning the possible bridge, promoting the economical, agricultural and social needs and the appropriateness of the northwest Cooke County location for all population centers.

Cantrell estimated that the bridge could become reality in two or three years if everything goes well.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Rosalee Bayer made the motion to draft a resolution supporting Highway Department study and requesting that the bridge be built.

A large number of area officials is expected to make the January trip to Austin. A bus may be chartered. Contact the Muenster Chamber of Commerce office soon if you wish to attend.

## Centennial promoted at Chamber meeting Tuesday

The Muenster Centennial year-long event for 1989 is gaining momentum. Committee member Janie Monday reported to the Chamber of Commerce lunch meeting Tuesday on various projects, both in action and proposed. The history book and Muenster video are currently in progress. Ideas in the proposal stage include a temporary museum, New Year's Eve Centennial Ball, Miss Muenster pageant, schutzen-feste, parade and a Centennial Mass in memory of the first Mass celebrated in Muenster upon its founding. Other ideas are a giant birthday party with cake for local

residents, Muenster King and Queen contests, and a stage show.

In addition to the book and video, centennial souvenirs are being designed and a local folk dance group is being organized.

Monday emphasized that everyone should make their 1989 plans with the centennial in mind and make it known statewide.

In other business, members issued reminders that Thursday is late evening shopping night featuring storytelling and a sing-along in the Kiwanis Park on Dec. 17, starting at 6:30 p.m. Most Muenster retailers will stay open

The project to install decorative street lamps on Highway 82 and Main Street in Muenster moved one step closer to reality in the City Council meeting Monday night. The councilmen agreed to match the \$500.00 per year pledged by the Chamber of Commerce toward maintenance of the lights. Project director Gary Fisher will continue to seek commitments for installation and power, then apply to the state for funds to purchase the lamps.

Discussion continued next on the City Hall telephone system. City Manager Joe Fenton said problems continue to plague the system, especially with calls lost when put on hold. He blamed the old equipment and admitted that the telephone company, after repeated attempts to fix it, blamed the problems on user errors. Fenton has studied bids to replace the system with new phones from

either Muenster Telephone Corp., AT&T by Clifford Sicking or a system offered by Lehnis Perkins. Mayor Ted Henscheid questioned whether a new system was really needed and should be afforded. After further discussion, a motion was passed to purchase the current phone system from the Telephone Corp. and arrange for independent repair and servicing. Under the current offer from Muenster Telephone Corp., the system can be had for about \$120.00. The council felt that it was worth a try at

that price. They will save considerably on lease and maintenance agreement costs.

In other old business, the council approved renewing the lease on the ambulance station buildings and property for \$240.00 annually, commenting on the low price and possibility of future use.

New business concentrated on how to pay the balance still needed on the new fire truck. The contracted builder has surprisingly finished the truck very early and it should be delivered by Dec. 15. The

council discussed using the remaining Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to balance the cost. \$78,412.00 is still owed on the truck. \$48,432.82 is in the Revenue Sharing Fund. Various monies raised for the truck locally amount to about \$30,000.00, so the sharing fund could finish it. Council finally decided to use one-half of the fund or about \$24,000.00 on the truck and borrow the rest so as to retain some money in the treasury for emergency.

In other action, the council: - Adopted an ordinance levying assessments against persons and their property for the payment of \$1,001.00 in cost for improving and curbing a portion of Fifth Street intersecting with Hickory Street.

- Appointed Paula Reiter and Janette Hess to the Library Board.

- Held discussion concerning increasing the fee for liquor licenses.

- Accepted the resignation of Wayne Tate from city employee as of Dec. 15. Tate is a 14-year employee.

A front page article contained in *The Muenster Enterprise* last week on the tower is not the understanding we had of the negotiations. We had sent the city a letter requesting time to study the tower situation. We had indicated that we would not seek further action if, after two years, the council still wanted the tower removed. This was on the contention that we would be able to use the tower during this period. The city would not agree to the use of the tower, nullifying the whole proposal. At that point, the alternatives were to return the matter to the courts or agree to leave the matter status quo for the present time. The city agreed not to demand removal of the tower, and the telephone company agreed not to use the tower, leaving everything as it was before. We retained the right to return to court in two years if we so desire.

It is a great disappointment to us that our subscribers are denied the use of the tower while we resolve the problem peacefully.

We plan to make every effort to find a satisfactory solution to this community problem.

*A Day To Remember*

When I was a small boy living on my father's farm, my daily task was to take the cows to pasture.

The pasture was across the highway about a mile from home but closer to town. A small stream flowed through this pasture, and I fished for young catfish that hid under the small rocks in the shallow water.

I sometimes became so engrossed in my fishing that I forgot all about the cows, and they would wander onto the MKT Railroad track that was nearby.

When I couldn't find anymore fish, I would sit and wait for a freight train to come by. The trains always had steam engines, and I liked to watch the black smoke swirl above the engine.

One day as the train came to a stop, two young men jumped from the train and hid in the trees that lined the bank of the stream. They were hobos, and they carried the few belongings they had in a paper box. I carefully hid myself in a bush that was nearby and listened to their conversation. They were saying that they couldn't afford to miss the freight when it pulled out.

They noticed the cows, and one of them said that he surely would like to have some fresh milk for a change. The other said, "Yeah, let's milk one of those cows."

At this moment I jumped from the bush and warned them that I would tell my father. I also told them to get off my father's land, and I started throwing rocks at them. They began to chase me and to throw rocks back at me. I ran

down into the stream and tried to get out on the other side. But I couldn't climb the steep bank. The two tramps were closing in on me. Each one had a stick, and I knew that they were going to beat me. I picked up a stick, but how could a nine-year-old boy fight two grown men?

But then I heard the train whistle. One of the men immediately turned and ran for the train, but the other kept coming. I don't know why, but he dropped his stick and threw a rock at me and then ran for the freight. I was relieved at seeing him throw the rock because I could dodge it. I felt the rock touch my hair as it went by.

As the noise from the train became dimmer and dimmer, I crept from the stream and took the cows back home. I didn't tell my father what had happened because I was afraid that he would punish me.

I revisited the stream when I was 21, but I didn't see any tramps.

"For those who are still uncertain or who need more information, attending this workshop could be an important first step toward that better life."

For those students who are still in the starting stage, the workshop will also provide information about CCC's special "early admission" or concurrent enrollment program for students who have not yet graduated from high school.

Under this program, certain high school seniors and even some juniors may enroll in college-level classes while still attending high school. Written approval from the student's high school principal is required.

Also at the workshop will be

representatives of CCC's popular programs in nursing and paramedicine. Because the admission process for these programs is somewhat more involved than for others offered at CCC, interested persons are urged to inquire about admissions as soon as possible.

"We'll have college catalogs, spring class schedules and all the other materials and information anyone will need for enrolling in classes in January," says Leander. "Now is the perfect time to start planning to attend classes, and this

workshop can really help get a student off on the right foot..."

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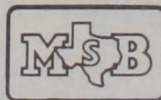

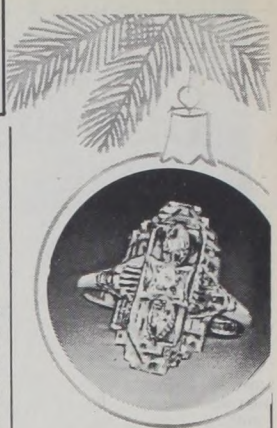

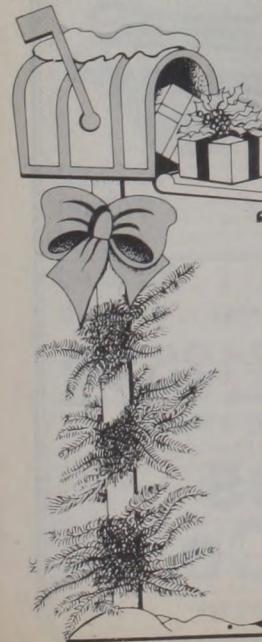

Sacred Heart survived a tough game in the opening round and strolled home with the championship in Lindsay's annual tournament last weekend, but no without a loss.

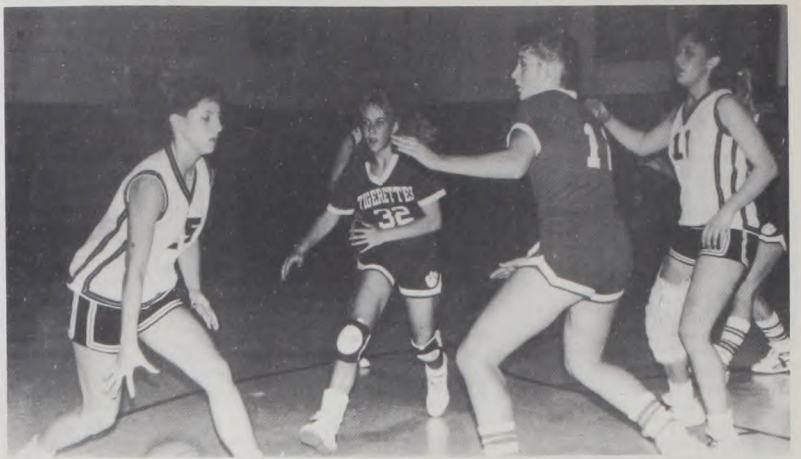

In a low scoring game for third place, the Cubettes were again defeated, this time by a slow moving team from Terral, Oklahoma.

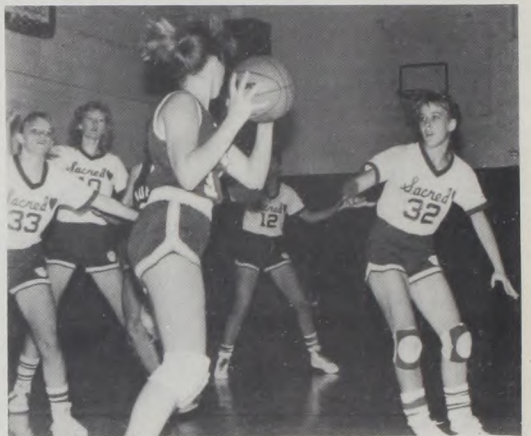

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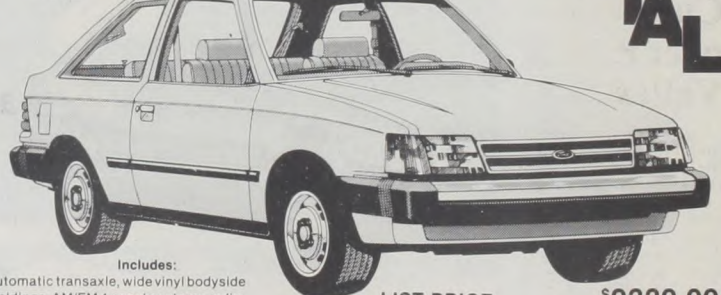
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# Hornets win Lindsay tourney

## County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Soil testing should be one of the first steps in planning your 1988 crop production program, and now is the time to collect soil samples from fields to be planted to spring crops.

The cost of a soil test is a minor investment to make for the peace of mind it brings when faced with making fertilizer decisions.

If a soil test indicates that fertilizer is needed to attain a desired yield goal, then its use is strongly recommended. Not fertilizing or reducing fertilizer rates may result in yield levels which will not generate enough income to cover basic production costs.

On the other hand, direct savings can result when a soil test indicates that there are already adequate or near adequate levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or other nutrients to attain a desired yield.

In either case, following soil test recommendations can effectively reduce the per unit cost of producing a commodity and increase the chances of making a profit.

Of course, a good fertility program can only insure optimum yields when other conditions affecting crop yields are favorable. A good plant stand, adequate moisture, good physical condition of the soil, and insect, disease and weed control are all important in obtaining profitable returns from money invested in fertilizer.


Crop producers who have not yet

made a final decision about which crop to plant on which field should submit soil samples now and request fertilizer recommendations for several cropping alternatives per soil sample. This information can be helpful in making final cropping decisions.
