Muenster Christmas Parade re-scheduled for December 17

The Christmas Parade has been re-scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 17, 1988, at 1 p.m. In the event of another rainout, the parade will be held Tuesday, Dec. 20, at 4:30 p.m.

The parade will be the first official appearance of the royalty of Muenster, Koenig David and Koenigen Juanita Bright. They will ride on the Centennial Float built by the FFA under the direction of Brad Bass. The Koenig and Koenigen will sit on thrones built by the IA Department of Muenster

Public School under the tutelage of Rudy Koesler.

Following the royal couple in the parade will be a red telephone, Bayer's Kolonialwaren und Backerei float (a "confectionary delight"), a herd of Holstein cows, 10-12 MG Classic cars, a Ferris Wheel, Sacred Heart Drill Team, and at least two other surprises. Santa Claus will complete the parade lineup with antique cars, equestrian units and other entries scattered along the route.

Anyone not already entered should contact the Muenster Chamber of Commerce office at 795-2227 for a place in the parade order.

It is requested that the only live Santa Claus be the one on the fire truck at the end of the parade. It is also requested that no articles of any type be thrown from vehicles or floats along the parade route. This causes children to run into the street and could be dangerous for them.

All participants should be in place no later than 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, or if it is held on Tuesday, no later than 4 p.m. so that the judges may see all entrants.

Santa Claus will be visiting and posing for pictures at Ben Franklin Store from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and again following the parade at 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. Everyone will have an opportunity to see and talk with Santa and get a treat. Karen Trubenbach of Memories will offer photos with Santa for those who wish during his visit.

The Chamber of Commerce appreciates your cooperation and is looking forward to a beautiful day and a fantastic parade. Although some entries originally scheduled for the rained-out date cannot now participate, the Chamber is making every effort to allow those who have worked so hard to put on a show for those who love a parade.

Criminal mischief plagues decorations

Muenster Chief of Police Helen Tompkins has reported four separate instances of criminal mischief in destruction of outdoor Christmas decorations during the weekend.

"There is a reward offered for information," she said. "Anyone caught destroying, tearing up or just messing with Christmas decorations will be prosecuted to the fullest extent-jailed and placed under bond of \$1,000." She said she will file criminal mischief charges against any guilty person (a misdemeanor).

Chief Tompkins said,

"Parents! Please speak to your children and explain to them why decorations are put up each year.

"Decorations honor the birth of Jesus," she said. "They aid homeowners in expressing the joy of the season. Decorations enhance the appearance of the entire town. No matter the reason-decorations are the personal property of residents who did the work. No one else has any right to touch them."

Chief Tompkins continued, "If homeowners are forced to retreat behind locked doors and deprive

Jimmy Jack Biffle appointed to Appraisal Review Board

The Cooke County Tax Appraisal District has appointed a new member to the three-man Appraisal Review Board. Jimmy Jack Biffle, of Muenster, will fill the place of Jerry Wimmer who has finished his term of service. Biffle will take office in January 1989 and serve for two years. He joins board member James Jiresk and board chairman Terry Herrman. It is significant that the CCTAD Board maintained representation from western Cooke County. Biffle was chosen from three nominees. The other two were Clyde Woods, nominated by the Gainesville ISD and D.L. Rodgers, nominated by Walnut Bend ISD.

During the Tuesday night meeting, Gainesville ISD Business Manager Earl Husfeld introduced his finding that all Cooke County taxing entities had, in essence, been double-billed for fourth quarter 1988 tax collection services.

CCTAD had been paid for collection services through 1988

when Cooke County took over collection duties for the fourth quarter. Not having that allowance in the tax assessor-collector budget, they also billed all entities for collection services. Husfeld demanded his money back for the double payment. That repayment seemed in question at the time. However, on Wednesday, newly appointed Chief Appraiser Pat Pickett confirmed that the refund was due from the CCTAD and, in fact, had been partially paid in November.

The partial refund was made on the salary section and amounted to \$7,365.31. Pickett said that \$11,035.81 was still due and would be refunded to taxing entities by Dec. 31.

In other action, the board approved including the appraisal of three Cooke County feed mills in the work handled by the accounting firm of Pritchard and Abbott. The firm has handled appraisals of mineral properties for a long time.

Chief Appraiser Pickett said that the move was partly in response to complaints about inequities in feed mill appraisals. "It will also help us do a much better job of appraising a very large and complex business area," she said.

The board rejected proposals to install new window blinds, computer terminals and telephones at the current time.

Museum holds Open House

Cold rainy weather did not cooperate favorably with Open House held by Muenster's Centennial Museum on Thursday, Dec. 8, at 1 p.m.

However, local friends and invited out-of-town guests ignored their discomfort and came to witness the ribbon-cutting of a first time event for this community.

Members of the Museum Centennial Committee presided at the refreshment service of punch and cookies.

"It is a source of great satisfaction to us," said Berth Hamric, Chairman. "We were really amazed at the extent of interest shown. Visitors were equally amazed at the quality and scope of our exhibit.

"Some of our items have sentimental value only; others have great monetary value; some truly have historical value. We owe

special thanks to all who have contributed.

"The praise and comments of some of our guests is truly compensation for long hours spent by our volunteers and committee members. Mrs. H. D. Fields, curator of Stonewall Museum in Saint Jo and Mrs. Yetter of Saint Jo and Margaret Parx Hays of Cooke County Heritage Society were very complimentary."

Mrs. Hamric added, "To tempt the curiosity of some of our future visitors a list of treasures on display includes a coat and hat worn by Alois Hoening and his picture when crossing the ocean in 1893 enroute to a new home in America. Then there is a magnificent carnival glass fruit service; an old typewriter from 1890; a Geo. Gehrig cash register; very old wedding pictures from 1900; a complete place setting of old china; the last bottle of wine sold in Muenster before Prohibition and

bought by Papa Fisher; an unusual high chair that folds into a stroller; a dress made by Marie Hoening Vogel for a 4-H project that won a first prize at the State Fair of Texas in 1926; antique tools, two Victrolas that still play (one is more than a century old); an old German Bible printed in Germany in 1837; and old Latin Church Missal; two fancy mustache cups trimmed with 14C and 22C gold; a 1894 teaspoon holder; an old cast iron waffle iron and many other items too numerous to mention, but equally valuable and treasured". "We are still accepting more items" she said.

"The museum is protected by a good security system. No one has reason to worry," said Mrs. Hamric.

The museum is an outstanding landmark for community heritage and the result of efforts spent by a number of volunteers.

Funeral Services were held for Joseph William Fisher on Monday at 2 p.m. with Rite of Christian Burial and Mass offered by Father Victor Gillespie and concelebrants, Father Denis Soerries and Father Harry Fisher.

Interment followed in Sacred Heart Cemetery, under direction of McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster.

Joe Fisher was a son of Joseph Fisher, Sr. and Emma Pulte Fisher, born on Oct. 9, 1903 in Muenster. He married Gertrude Anna Schmitt on Oct. 14, 1930. She preceded him in death on March 1, 1988. They were parents of four children, two daughters, Theresa Walterscheid and JoAnn Pagel both of Muenster and two sons Neil Fisher of Fredericksburg and James (Jim) Fisher of Arvada Colorado. Other survivors are twelve grandchildren; three sisters, Bertha Pick, Lillian Appel and Lorena Taylor; and four brothers Paul Fisher, Pat Fisher, Earl Fisher all of Muenster, and Rev. Harry Fisher of Seymour.

Muenster's sales tax rebates up for Nov. '88

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last Friday that this year's sales tax payments to Texas cities grew 12.3 percent over 1987's payments, continuing a trend that is expected to last for several years.

"We're projecting that local sales tax allocations will steadily rise through 1991. I'm sure the extra income from sales tax revenues will be welcomed by local governments," Bullock said.

Bullock added that, while the future of oil prices remains rocky, the stronger tax base will bolster state and local revenues, keeping them at a steady increase of about 7 to 8 percent a year through 1991.

Checks totaling \$64.1 million were sent Friday to 885 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one-and-one-half percent.

December's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in

October and reported to the Comptroller's office by Nov. 21.

Cooke County totals have improved both in the comparable period of 1987 and in the total payments for 1988. Sales tax totals are up 9.90 percent so far this year.

Muenster surged ahead of their November 1987 receipt of \$5,365.18. The November 1988 payment from Bullock totaled \$9,433.78, an increase of 63.63 percent. Muenster's total receipts for 1988 are 7.33 percent higher than they were at this time last year. Lindsay and Valley View receipts have fallen 14.55 percent and 10.78 percent respectively. Oak Ridge has not established a pattern yet but their November receipt was \$1,587.44.

This one-percent tax refund to cities indicates taxable sales activity in Muenster of \$943,378.00.

To the Editor,

According to the 50-year Book of Muenster, Texas History, those listed as being dropped at the roadside on this territory of Muenster on Nov. 14, 1889 were the families of John Koll, Derichsweiler, Hesse, John Koesters, H. Kolland M. Finkin.

On Dec. 8, 1889, at the First Mass, those listed in attendance were: Frank, Mary and Elizabeth Hesse; Joseph and Theodore Wiesmann; Gottfried, John and Christine Koll; John, Bernard, Catherine and Elizabeth Derichsweiler; William, Anton, Emil and August Flusche; Anton Eickhoff; John Koester; John Rueschenberg; and John Seiger. Those who sang hymns without organ were: Derichsweiler, Franz Hesse, John Koll, J. Koester and Mrs. Mike Sonntag.

1890 receipt listings of names for Church, School and Rectory were Derichsweiler, Koll, Pulte, Fisher, Herr, Bruhl, Dolls, Schoech, Koesters, Caisner, Flusche, Gunter and Sommerfeld. Some names I recognize from the records of Muenster Parish of May 17, 1891 are: Hesse, Hess, Stoffels, Streng, Sicking, Derichsweiler, Wiesmann, Herr, Pels, Flusche, Felderhoff, Schoech, Kessler, Koll, Seiger, Schmitz, Haverkamp, Schwirezenski, Trachta, Voth, Walterscheid, Luetmer, Wilde, Richter, Fischer, Knauf, Grewing, Schmitt and Pulte.

Not until the year of 1927 was Muenster formally incorporated as a CITY under the laws of the State of Texas. Ben H. Hellman was the first mayor.

It seems to me we have begun the commemoration of our founding incorrectly. We appear to be forgetting those first pioneers. We

also seem to be forgetting it was school and church that came first for these founding fathers. I look at the aforementioned listing of names and I see many of their children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren living here, supporting their church and school. I also see many of them doing a lot of volunteer work and organizational work. They spend their money here. Some even continue in business as their forefathers did. These people (those descendants who are spending a lifetime here carrying on that pioneer spirit) are the ones we should be celebrating and paying tribute to.

Some of you readers may wonder why one Frances Bayer concerns herself to comment on the issue of the Muenster Centennial Celebration. The aforementioned Elizabeth Derichsweiler married August Knabe and was my grandmother. They raised 14 children through many hard times on a farm here in Muenster. I want to salute their memory and also all the others of those first families who stayed and struggled to raise their families here. Their belief in God and this country and their steadfastness and loyalty in what they believed deserve respect and inclusion in this celebration.

Somehow it does not seem right to leave out the guts of our hometown of Muenster at this time. I refer to these pioneer families of 1889 and those of their descendants who try to hold on to a God-loving, caring, Catholic community which puts God, Church and school first.

To me, that's centennial celebration. To me, that's Sacred Heart Parish Community, 100 years.

New scholarship fund set up for Muenster area graduates

The Muenster Kiwanis Club, with a recent gift to the Cooke County College Endowment Foundation (CCCE), is spearheading what its members hope will develop into an ongoing movement among similar civic and service organizations to help fund CCC scholarships for area high school graduates.

Ben Bindel, Muenster Kiwanis president, presented a \$250 check to begin the "Muenster Graduate Scholarship Award" at CCC to Roger Martin, president of the CCCEF board of directors.

According to Gary Fisher, Muenster businessman and CCC alumnus who first approached the club about setting up the fund, the goal is to keep adding to it - with additional gifts from the club, individuals, businesses and other organizations - until it becomes "fully endowed."

"In other words," he explained, "we want to build it to a level where we can leave the corpus of the fund permanently intact and award at least one full scholarship each semester, forever, from its interest proceeds. In fact, what we'd really like to do eventually is have not one but two endowed CCC scholarship funds for Muenster students - one for graduates of Muenster High and another for graduates of Sacred Heart."

CCCEF Board President Martin said the foundation currently considers a scholarship fund to be fully endowed when it reaches \$10,000. So far, two scholarships have been endowed through gifts from individuals, and a third is forthcoming from a Gainesville financial institution. A number of other donors have committed to "sustaining" annual gifts to support scholarships and other needs of the college.

"Over the past two and a half years, the Foundation has been able to award scholarships, some even paying dorm expenses, to an even dozen students," Martin reported, "and we hope to see that number continue to grow every year."

"Personally, I can't think of a better investment in our future than helping a young person get an education - especially one who might not have had that opportunity without some assistance. I'm so grateful to the Muenster Kiwanis Club for its generosity in starting this special fund, and I know that someday it will pay great dividends for deserving Muenster students enrolling at Cooke County College."

Bindel and his fellow Kiwanians in Muenster are encouraging other civic and service organizations, as well as individuals and business firms, in Muenster and the surrounding area to add their names

to the list of contributors to the Muenster Graduate Scholarship Fund at CCC.

"Memorial gifts are an excellent way to add to this new fund or other existing funds or to help the work of the CCC Endowment Foundation in general," said Urban Endres, chairman of the CCC Board of Trustees and also a member of the CCCEF board. "They are truly lasting gifts that can help students make better lives for themselves, as well as become better citizens and neighbors, through education."

"We welcome all such gifts, from small ones given in lieu of flowers, to those which may be given to fully endow a scholarship in the name of a loved one."

Donors may designate a specific use for their gift, or they can give an "unrestricted" gift to be used by the college in the area of most pressing current need. All gifts to the CCC Endowment Foundation are tax-deductible.

DPS urges caution during holidays

AUSTIN ... As many as 66 persons may be killed on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas and New Year's holiday periods, according to Col. Joe E. Milner, director of the Department of Public Safety.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas has been on the decline since 1984, according to DPS records. In 1987, 3,261 persons were killed across the state, a 9 percent decrease from 1986. This year, however, the traffic deaths have been edging upward compared with 1987.

In an effort to minimize the increase in traffic fatalities, the DPS this year, as in years past, will conduct its Operation Holiday program. All available troopers will be patrolling the state's highways during peak holiday traffic times. And the Department will make periodic reports to the public on the number of traffic deaths occurring during the holidays.

"The holidays are meant to be a time of peace and family togetherness, not a time of tragedy," Milner said. "We intend to do everything we can to ensure that our fellow Texans and out-of-state holiday visitors have as safe a holiday as possible this year."

Milner said troopers would particularly be on the lookout for speeding and intoxicated drivers. Troopers will also be keeping an eye out for motorists not wearing their safety belts.

"Each holiday period, there are many traffic deaths that probably would not have occurred if the victims had been wearing their safety belts," Milner said.

To remind motorists of the dangers of drunken driving, Milner said, all DPS black and white patrol cars are sporting red ribbons as part of the Mothers Against Drunk Driving Project Red Ribbon campaign.

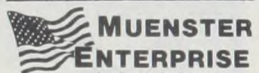

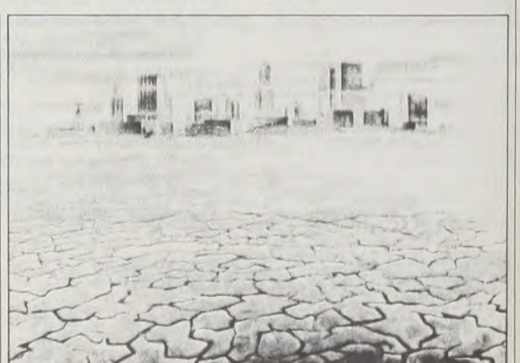

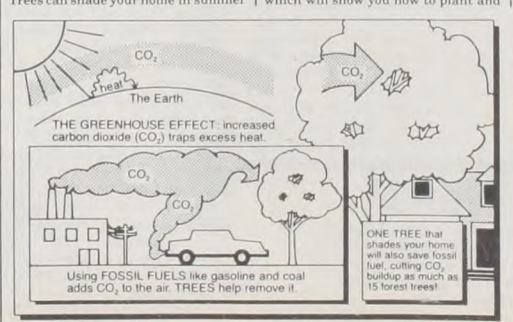

Muenster ISD Board reviews TEAMS test

A 1988 report of the exit-level TEAMS test indicates that 94 percent of this year's Muenster High School juniors mastered both the Math and English sections of the test, Superintendent Charles Coffey said this week.

The state requires that a student must pass the exit level test in order to graduate from high school. Juniors who failed either section of the test the first time will have another chance to be retested for that section in May, and two more chances during their

senior year, Coffey said.
"The test is becoming a little harder each year," Coffey said, as the Texas Education Agency works to improve the standards of the test. Muenster's overall scale score did increase, indicating that the students as a group did a little better this year than last year's juniors. This year's scale score on the Math was 848, compared to 845 last year. The score on Language Arts was 838, a 23-point increase over last year's score of 815. Overall, the district's TEAMS scores remain among the

top 25 percent in the state, Coffey said.
In another matter, the school board during its regular December meeting, approved the purchase of materials and supplies to be used in a federally-funded drug-free program. The district has received \$1,681 in federal funds that must be used for drug education. Muenster Public will work with Sacred Heart in purchasing materials for grades Kindergarten through 12. The one-to-two-week curriculum will be implemented within the health classes, Coffey said.

The school district has received a clean bill of health from its auditor, Bob Tole, CPA, from Irving. The board approved the 1987-88 school district audit which indicated the school was in good shape financially.
The board also approved the school textbook committee for 1989-90, and heard that the district made about \$2,000 more in revenue from football games this year from last year, with about \$1,800 of that coming from the last playoff game held in Mineral Wells.

Bishop Augustine Dangelmayr was born on a farm near Muenster on Dec. 11, 1898 to Joseph and Theresa Muck Dangelmayr, pioneers of the early colony. He was the oldest son and the second of eight children.

He received his early education in the Winterfield School, a one-room country school in the pasture near his home. His earliest teacher was Ernie Huchton, who later became Mrs. C. J. Fette. He later attended Sacred Heart School in Muenster.

He entered Subiaco Academy in Sept. 1912 where he pursued his studies for eight years. He showed great talents in college Band, dramatics and elocution; he was editor of the college paper and received medals in foreign and modern languages.

On Sept. 12, 1918 he registered for the Selective Service Draft. In

June 1919 he received his bachelor's degree from Subiaco College.

He entered Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis in Sept. 1919. In 1922 he was sent to St. Mary's Seminary in LaPorte, Texas to complete theological studies. There he also taught spelling in the commercial department and arithmetic in the prep school.

He was ordained to the priesthood in June, 1922 in Dallas, and celebrated his First Mass in Sacred Heart Church of Muenster. He was associated with Sacred Heart Cathedral in Dallas from July 1, 1922 until his retirement, holding many offices and responsibilities in service to his faith.

On Dec. 18, 1934 he was invested as Private Chamberlain to Pope Pius XI by Bishop Joseph Patrick Lynch of Dallas. In 1937 he was promoted to the rank of Domestic Prelate. In 1939 Msgr. Dangelmayr received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from St. Edwards University of Austin.

In Oct. 1942 Msgr. Dangelmayr received the episcopal consecration as Titular Bishop of Olba and Auxiliary Bishop of the Diocese of Dallas, administered by Archbishop Amleto Cicognani, then Apostolic Delegate to the United States, assisted by Bishop Joseph P. Lynch and Bishop William O'Brien of Chicago.

On Feb. 26, 1954 he was appointed founding pastor of St. Monica Parish in Dallas, where he served until 1962 when he retired and moved back to Muenster. He celebrated his Golden Jubilee of Consecration in 1972. In June, 1982 Bishop Dangelmayr observed his 60th anniversary as a priest and 40th as a bishop. During a Mass in Sacred Heart Church he issued a statement proclaiming his gratitude for a long life, closeness of his family and their assistance to him as an old man, his happiness in his retirement, and his enjoyment of home, life and country.

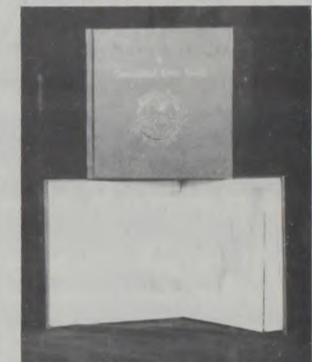

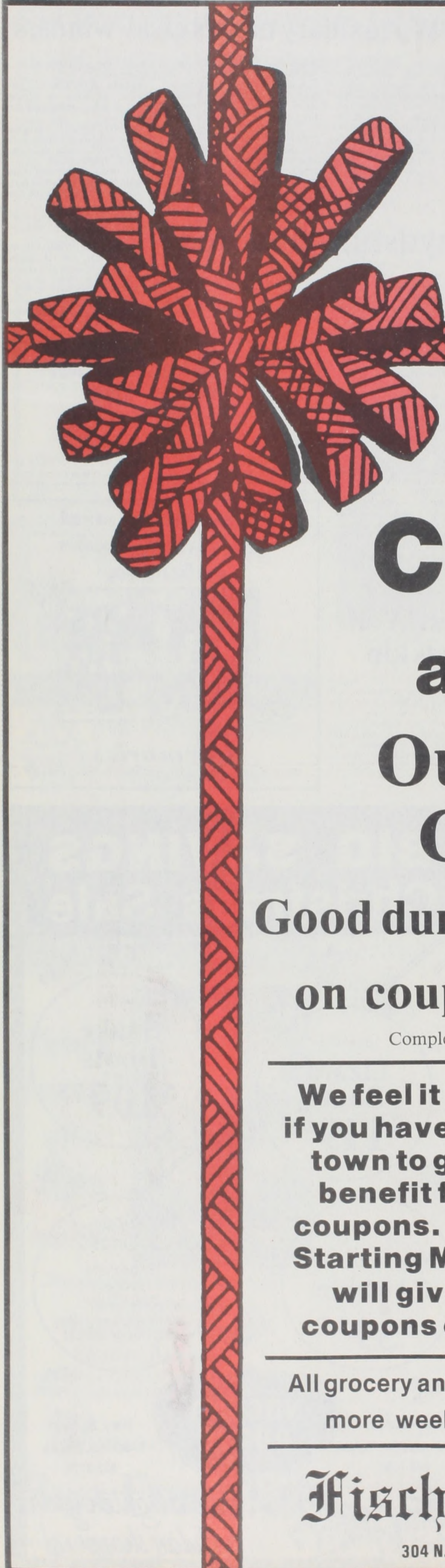

"It's Up To Me" mailout series available

When a child accepts himself for what he is, a successful young person will emerge. Self-contempt is continually learned; a person is not born with a good self-concept.

When children have a low self-concept, they often refuse to take responsibility for things that happen to them; instead they blame others. Low self-concept leads to fault finding and a compulsive need for attention and approval. Children who have low self-esteem are often depressed, withdrawn and selfish. They may be afraid of making mistakes and put up a fake front of self-confidence as they get older. They boast, talk loud, name drop, stretch the truth and often feel sorry for themselves.

The prescription for total self-confidence is not in everyone. Parents can help children develop high self-concept by teaching

them:
- to accept that every person is unique. He looks and acts like only himself and has a special purpose to fulfill in life.

- to set goals and accept rewards for accomplishments.

- to learn from mistakes or failures, rather than be devastated by them.

- to be flexible in thought and willing to change, rather than thinking one is always right without looking at the options.

- to work toward open communications with people of all ages.

Parents and grandparents can do much to build self-confidence in children.

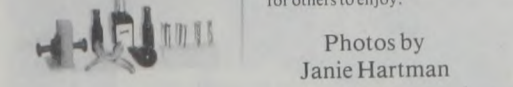

Against Pottsboro... Hornets win overtime thriller

Tuesday night the Muenster Hornets reached deep and tightened their defense to preserve a 44-39 overtime victory against the Pottsboro Cardinals. J. Shane Wimmer paced Muenster with 13 points followed by Mike Pagel and Chris Klement with 9 each, and James Hennigan 4. Brad McDaniel hit 1 and Keith Klement scored 4.

Pagel rose up in the fourth quarter to hit 6 points and put Muenster up 39-37 with less than a minute to play. Cardinal Gary Graley then canned 2 pressure free throws with 32 seconds to tie the game. A Hornet timeout with 17 seconds gave the Big Red the last shot, but Wimmer's 20-footer fell short.

In overtime, a nice Pagel assist to Keith Klement put the Hornets on top. A Hennigan steal and subsequent offensive rebound and tap-in by Wimmer sealed the door shut and Muenster ran their season record to 6-1.

"Our intensity came through when we needed it," said Coach Ted Heers. "The guys wanted to win and got after it at the end. That's the level of play we will need to go for the district title. We've talked about being the first group to win football and basketball championships in the same year."

Preceding the boys' game, the Pottsboro Lady Cardinals used a 24-6 fourth quarter run to beat the Hornets 54-34. The loss ended a 31-game home winning streak. Muenster trailed 30-28 as the four-

th quarter began. "We're playing hard and gaining experience that will help the team," said Heers. We're 5-3 against good competition, but we haven't peaked yet. Sometimes we hit a nice run and play well together and other times our inexperience makes an appearance. We'll get a good look at ourselves Friday when we play either Valley View or Era."

The Lindsay Knights arrived in rain-soaked Vernon last Saturday night with high hopes of continuing their winning streak. The wet, dripping weather dampened the outcome of the game. Though they were handed a 35-0 defeat, they still completed the season as winners.

"We didn't play anything like we have the last games," said Lindsay Coach Grady Roller. "Too many kids were out all week with this sickness and they were very weak, keeping us a step or two behind White Deer all night." All of the Knights' starters, except for Regi Klement, were sick the week of the playoff game, including Coach Roller. "Brad (Neu), Jeff (Arendt), and John (Fangman) were all sick at the game," said Roller. "The team was totally exhausted, but still came out fighting. White Deer has an excellent ball club. I wish we could have played."

There were a few tears and lots of smiles in realizing that this team had accomplished what no Lindsay squad had in the school's history and what many thought they wouldn't do this season - get within one game of the state championship contest.

"We had an excellent season," said the coach. "The positive thing

Lindsay started the second half, but again was unable to pick up a first down. White Deer struck quickly on their first possession. A 52-yard run placed the ball on the 2-

Lindsay's next possession ended short. After punting the ball on 4th and 25, the Bucks added insult to injury when they returned the punt 70 yards for a final slap to extend the lead 35-0.

The Knights got in 10 more offensive plays before turning the ball over to White Deer, who ran out the clock.

Lindsay's defense was led by John Fangman with 16 tackles and 1 quarterback sack. Tracy Huchton had 13, Mike Dieter 11 and Regi Klement and Troy Huchton had 9 tackles each. White Deer lost one fumble, recovered by Curtis Weems.

Lindsay's offense picked up only 61 yards rushing in 41 carries. "We haven't had that bad of yardage all year," commented the Lindsay coach. "White Deer had a good defense which would have held us below 200 yards (if the team played at full strength)."

Mike Dieter scampered for 42 yards, with the help of Craig Neu adding 15 and Ian Woelfel's 12 yards. White Deer tallied up 337 yards in 52 carries.

Lindsay completed only 1 pass out of 3 attempts for 7 yards. White Deer threw 3 incomplete passes. The Knights punted 5 times, averaging 35 yards per boot while their opponent kicked one 22-yarder. The Bucks earned 18 first downs compared to Lindsay's 6 and the Knights had only one 15-yard penalty.

"The seniors are one of the better classes I've coached since coming to Lindsay," said Coach Grady Roller. "They played good together and got the job done -

they're an excellent group of kids."

"The team came through - they faced a lot of obstacles this season," continued Roller. "Quentin Hoening's death, sicknesses, injuries and the loss of Father Cletus - they came a long way."

Coach Roller would like to thank the Knights Booster Club for being "fantastic" and for all their support. And to thank the rest of the district for their good wishes and support in the playoffs.

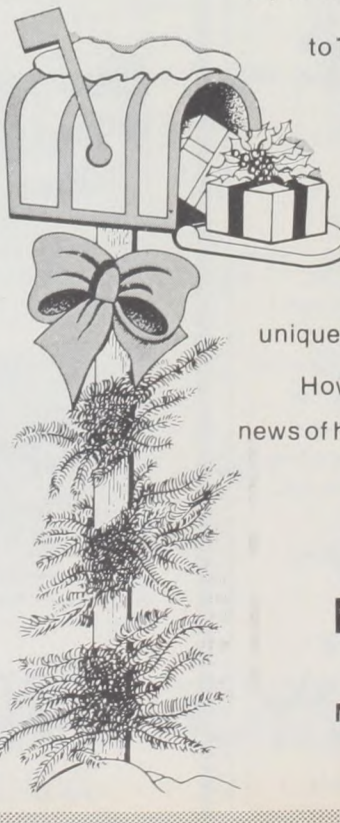

The federal budget: Now what for agriculture?

President-elect George Bush and the 101st Congress will face the same economic dilemma that ballooned under the Reagan administration the past eight years, the budget deficit. Since the election, the financial markets have served notice that rhetoric is no substitute for action in dealing with America's red-inked balance sheets.

Bush has vowed to master the federal and trade deficits without raising existing taxes. He has also said he thinks the dollar, as well as interest rates, can remain stable at current levels. He plans to regain control of the nation's finances by exercising a "flexible freeze" on current program spending and spending cuts in other areas while continued economic growth contributes increased revenues. If public pressure isn't sufficient motivation, the Gramm-Rudman Act requires that the next budget deficit be lowered to \$100 billion.

Farm programs would seem to be in the spotlight for spending cuts.

Indeed, outgoing director of the Office of Management and Budget, Joseph Wright has said that farm program spending is one of the few places where the Bush administration can make cuts. However, farm program spending is already on track for smaller outlays under the provisions of the 1985 Farm Bill, noted Joe Christopher, wheat specialist with Linco Futures, Inc.

"You can look at the prices we reached this year on the Chicago Board of Trade and see that less is going to be spent on deficiency payments. It would be easy to lower the target price a lot more to save," he said. "It's going to be hard to realize savings by adjusting loan and target prices, though, because the 1985 Farm bill already had yearly reductions in loan and target prices written into it." The amount of those reductions is limited in the law. Eventually, Christopher said, the loan rate goal will be at or below the world price for grain with target prices just above.

Christopher feels savings are more likely to be realized by stricter enforcement of provisions in the law such as limits of payments to individual farmers or to farm corporations. "I think we'll see more targeting of farms where the need is," he said. "When a farm is incorporated 10 different ways, USDA is going to look a little harder and say, 'wait a minute.' We may also see a reduction in the maximum allowable payments."

Another place the government may be able to save money in farm programs is the farmer-owned reserve. In this program, farmers are paid storage fees to withhold grain from the market. Release of these stores is controlled by the government. By further reducing reserves, storage payments to farmers can be reduced. "I don't think the government really wants to be in the grain storage business any more," said Christopher.

One feature of the 1985 farm bill that Christopher expects to remain is the Export Enhancement Program (EEP). By subsidizing exports, the USDA has regained much of the international market lost to subsidizing competitors, notably the European Community (EC). EEP has proved an effective weapon in combating EC trade barriers. Because of this, said Christopher, "EEP is a fact of life. It was successful in reducing EC tariffs on soybean oil. There is a cap on EEP spending next year where it had a blank check before, but that will just mean that the government will be more judicious about what countries are targeted for the subsidy."

News Glance

■ The recent increase in prime lending rates to 10 1/2% by major banks forebodes additional upticks in the prime and short-term interest rates in coming months. Analysts also expect the Federal Reserve to tighten credit to slow economic growth, restrain inflation and support the dollar. All of which won't stop the 6-year-old economic expansion any time soon, says The Wall Street Journal.

■ An outside analysis of beef industry developments has been called for by NCA's Beef Industry Concentration/Integration Taskforce. The 15-member group also plans to meet with packing company executives and cattle leaders in its overall review of the direction of the cattle industry.

■ Livestock and poultry producers could see significant cuts in animal drug costs as a result of a bill signed recently by President Reagan. The law would streamline federal approval and marketing of generic animal drugs while creating stronger incentives for new product development.

■ The beef industry of 1988 is not well informed on the most simple of economic issues, says Dr. Wayne Purcell, Virginia Tech ag eco professor. "We (economists) have failed to educate and our failures have come at a significant cost to society," he said. He called for an industry review of annual retail demand to prevent thousands of cattle producers from being forced out of business as in the last 2 decades.

Rural business: 'Homegrown,' not 'imported'

According to a recent TDA survey of rural Texas businesses, the majority of new enterprises are started by local residents, rather than recruited from elsewhere. Fifty-six percent of the respondents said the most critical factor in their decision to open a business was that they saw a demand for their goods or services. Next most important was having relatives in the area, and third was the reputation of the area for having a "healthy business climate."

Factors commonly believed to be key ingredients in attracting rural enterprises such as low wage rates, low utility costs and low sales taxes, ranked far behind in the location decision. In fact, half or more of the respondents said they did not even consider these factors in their decision.

Most of these entrepreneurs already lived in the county where they decided to open their business, although a fifth of them moved from other parts of Texas. Just 7 percent moved from another state or country to open their business. This lends credence to the argument that most rural enterprises are "homegrown," rather than attracted from outside.

TDA, in conjunction with the University of Texas Geography Department, conducted the survey in order to better understand the factors influencing new business development in rural areas. All of the firms started up or changed ownership during the boom years of 1979-84. They survived the twin depression in oil and agriculture and are still operating in 1988. The survey results give insight into the types of firms, their markets and sources of supply, the skills required of employees and the factors influencing their decision to locate in rural Texas.

The Texas Comptroller's Office provided names and addresses of the firms by county. Surveys were sent to nearly 12,000 rural businesses, and 2,792 usable surveys were returned for a response rate of 23 percent.

The first report summarizes the

responses from businesses in seven rural Texas counties which receive at least 20 percent of their net county income and employment from agriculture. The counties are: Archer, Fisher, Lee, Madison, Schleicher, Starr and Throckmorton. A second report, giving the survey results on a total of 49 rural Texas county businesses, will be released soon.
