## Muenster remembers John F. Kennedy

Muenster residents grieved with a nation on Nov. 22, 1963. This week they remember the assassina-tion of President John F. Kennedy

tion of President John F. Kennedy 25 years ago, saying it was a day that changed their lives.

It was the day time stood still. "We were devastated that it happened, and especially that it happened in Texas," said Queenie Walterscheid. She, like almost every other person over the age 32, remembers exactly where she was when the news reached Muenster that the president had been shot by a sniper along the motorcade route in Dallas.

Mrs. Walterscheid remembers that she was taking her mother-in-

Mrs. Walterscheid remembers that she was taking her mother-in-law, Catherine Walterscheid, to meet a train in Gainesville so she could stay in Bartlesville, Okla., with her daughter, who was about to undergo surgery. A train pulled into the station at Gainesville in that early afternoon. It had come from Dallas

from Dallas.
"It was just awful," Mrs.
Walterscheid said. "The train was late, and when it did come, the
people were getting off, and they were all crying

were all crying."

Bernice Mollenkopf was at home in her living room when she heard the news. "I went to work at The Center, and that's all people were talking about," she said. "It was like he was part of the family."

Special services were held.

Special services were held throughout the weekend in Muenster, according to the Nov. 29, 1963, edition of The Muenster 29, 1963, edition of the Muenster Enterprise. A special requiem High Mass waas sung by the school children with Father Alcuin Kubis officiating. Rosaries were prayed for Kennedy almost non-stop by the nuns, children and members of the community, who took turns holding prayer vigils. Mayor Earl Fisher requested that all businesses in the city be closed on Monday, the day Ken-

closed on Monday, the day Ken-

nedy was buried, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., which he designated as a period of prayer and meditation. A basketball game between Muenster High and Sacred Heart was cancelled Friday night.

"It really affected me," said Peggy Grewing, who was in the second grade in 1963. "I was at such an impressionable age," she said. "We all cried, and went to church to pray the Rosary."

Mrs. Grewing said she had a great admiration for Jacqueline Kennedy because of the way she held her composure in what was surely one of the most stressful times of her life. She remembers

the students at Sacred Heart felt the same way, dedicating their an-nual that year to Mrs. Kennedy because of her courage. Muenster Superintendent Charles Coffey was in Vega, Texas, 25 years ago, where he was elementary school principal, his first administrative position. The small Panhandle town was just as shocked as everyone else, he shocked as everyone else, he recalls. The Vega football team, however, decided to play that Friday night against Hart in a playoff game, because they felt the president would have wanted them to

"I will never forget it," Coffey said. "There are certain things that leave an indelible mark."

Coffey said he was the first person in the school to hear of the shooting. He had gone on his mail when he heard the tragic news over his car radio. He rushed home to tell his wife, who was tending to their newborn baby. Their son, Bruce, turned 25 this past August.

I went to the lunchroom and told my superintendent," he remembers. "He said that's not something to joke about."

A longtime history teacher, Coffey feels the public will remember Kennedy as a great president because of his youth and personal charisma. The young president surrounded himself with youthful advisors and touted physical fitness. After so many years of war, the nation wanted to feel young again. "He radiated a personality and a charm," he said. "I think the entire nation respected and admired him."

When historians finally judge Kennedy as a president, however, the verdict may be somewhat different, Coffey said. "As a historian, I think a lot of people will never forget the Bay of Pigs fiasco," he said. Kennedy was also credited with beginning the nation's involvement in the Vietnam conflict, he said. "Had he lived out his term, I think he would be judged as a good president on domestic affairs, but as a failure in foreign affairs," Coffey said.

The memories live on, even

said.
The memories live on, even though the nation has changed. They don't know why, but several said they don't think they would feel such a great sense of personal loss should tragedy befall any future presidents.

Mrs. Grewing said she still reads as much as she can about those

tragic four days. Mrs. Walterscheid said she still cringes every time any world leader comes to Texas. "The assassination was such a slam against Texas," she said. "We're known for being friendly, and I just don't want any of them coming to Texas after what happened."

To a person, however, those interviewed join with a vast majority of Americans in thinking the assassination was the result of a conspiracy, and that another gunman was probably involved. They are all anxious to hear anything that will finally resolve the mystery surrounding the events of Nov. 22, 1963. In the meantime, however, they will continue to however, they will continue to remember.

He was born on June 4, 1913, in Fort Smith, Ark. to the late John J. and Hermina Framel Post. He lived in Altus, Ark. most of his life, attended high school and college at Subiaco, entered the lege at Subiaco, entered the novitiate in 1933; made his profes-sion in 1934 and was ordained on June 3, 1939.

He taught at Subiaco from 1939 to 1947; he was athletic director, teacher and coach at Subiaco from 1947 to 1950. From 1950 to 1953, he was assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Church and coach at Sacred Heart High School in Muenster. Heart Church and coach at Sacred Heart High School in Muenster. In his high school years, he was an outstanding member of the Subiaco Academy Trojan football team that won the Arkansas State

team that won the Arkansas State Championship in 1932. He taught at Laneri (now Nolan High School of Fort Worth) from 1953 to 1955; was appointed pastor of St. Joseph's Church in Paris, Ark. from 1955 to 1962. He served St. Mary's Church of Windthorst from 1962 to 1978 and was pastor of St. Peter's Church in Lindsay from 1978 until his

in Lindsay from 1978 until his death.

He had a special interest in students and athletics. He placed great importance on blessing football teams before games, praying for God's blessing on safety of the players. His last blessing of the Lindsay Knights was before the Lindsay-Valley View game. Team members dedicated the Munday game on Nov. 18 to him, achieving a stunning upset and advancing to the second round of the playoffs. He was a loyal fan of the Arkansas Razorbacks and was the proud recipient of an autographed game ball signed by members of the 1988 Southwest Conference the 1988 Southwest Conference Champions who will be in the Cot-ton Bowl on New Year's Day. Parishioners of St. Mary's

Church in Windthorst credit Father Cletus with being instrumental in building of the new rectory which was completed in 1966; building of the new elementary school; and building of the first Parish Hall. ## **County Agent's** Report by Craig Rosenbaum

\* Unusual. Many gardeners like a "different" tree. Here are some that are suited to Texas although often a bit difficult to find in the

nurseries: Gingko, golden rain-tree, weeping yaupon holly, possumhaw holly, chinese pistachio, tuliptree, white redbud and the native Mexican plum.

Each year about this time we think about planging trees in our landscape. Select a tree that meets landscape. Select a tree that meets your size and budget specifications. Most gardeners have pretty apecific requirements of trees that will fit their landscapes, according to Marty Baker, Extension Horticulturist. Here are 10 of the most common requests along with suitable selections for your consideration:

\* Low maintenance, freedom.

\* Low maintenance, freedom from major problems. Choices would include pecan, magnolia, live oak, red oak, bald cypress, cedar elm, yaupon holly and crape

myrtle.
\* Short (for restricted spots). Consider yaupon holly, golden raintree, crape myrtle, flowering crabapple and the ornamental plums and peaches.

\* Performance and durability.

\* Performance and durability. Trees for longterm investments include live oak and red oak, magnolia, pecan, sweet gum, cedar elm and bald cypress.

\* Attractive winter features, especially bark. Possibilities are cedar elm, native persimmon, crape myrtle and sweet gum.

\* Light shade. Trees that provide shade and still allow grass to grow underneath include bald cypress, golden raintree and the various short and narrow growing types already mentioned.

various short and narrow growing types already mentioned.

\* Color for the landscape. For flowers and fruit, consider yaupon holly, possumhaw holly, magnolia, golden raintree, crape myrtle, flowering crabapple, oramental peaches and plums, callery pear, Texas redbud or Mexican plum.

\* Fast growth. Don't get too

\* Fast growth. Don't get too restrictive from this standpoint. Most durable and dependable trees grow moderately fast with trees grow moderately fast with good care and attention. Generally, it's best to select for permanence and care for the tree properly. But here are some of the so-called "fast growers" that are worthy in the landscape: Arizona ash, sycamore, fruitless mulberry, silver maple, mimosa and willow. Don't plant too many of these or Don't plant too many of these or will create many future

\* Evergreen. Trees that retain their leaves through most all of the year include yaupon holly, magnolia, live oak, Japanese black pine, Elderica pine, deodar cedar, cherry laurel and red tip photinia.

#### Spaying heifers:

## A new reason for an old idea

Spaying heifers may become more common in Texas, since new federal guidelines by the U.S. Dept. of Agricultura (USDA) and state regulations from the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) restrict the movement of executly intert heifers from heads sexually intact heifers from herds quarantined because of brucellosis. Although a number of spaying

Although a number of spaying techniques have been developed during the past 90 years, there are two basic methods for gaining access to the ovaries. Either an incision can be made through the animal's side, or the vaginal wall can be punctured. The cost varies, depending on the veterinarian, location and number of animals spayed, other procedures perspayed. spayed, other procedures per-formed at the same time, and the efficiency of the veterinarian's crew. Risks of infection or damage to internal organs during the spaying procedure are reduced through proper disinfection, restraining animals securely and careful use of instruments.

Spaying through the animal's side, called "flank-spaying," requires 5 to 10 minutes. An incision is made, the ovaries are grasped by hand clipped with surgical. hand, clipped with surgical scissors or a knife, and the incision is closed with one stitch.

The second basic spaying method takes 1½ to 2 minutes and

involves inserting an instrument and puncturing the vaginal wall to reach the ovaries. Two in-struments used are the Willis and the Kimberling-Rupp (or K-R)

Willis instrument is a

stainless steel rod flattened into a spear and hollowed in the middle cination status, heifers that are to encircle an ovary. Ovaries moved from brucellosis-infected moved from brucellosis-infected moved from the conductivity and 15% and the conductivity and spear and hollowed in the middle to encircle an ovary. Ovaries severed with the Willis instrument are dropped into the peritoneal

The K-R instrument has a han-The K-R instrument has a han-dle that allows an operator to pro-ject and retract a point that punc-tures the vaginal wall. It is also equipped with a hollow tube to "catch" the severed ovaries for removal from the heifer's body. Practitioners can inspect the removed ovaries to determine if

removed ovaries to defermine if surrounding tissues were damaged, so repairs, if needed, can be made immediately.

When heifers are spayed at between 400 to 600 pounds, only about five percent of the animals suffer ill effects, evidenced by a "stiff gait" for up to three days. This outweighs making heifers abort at the feedlot when in the middle or advanced stages of pregnancy. This slows growth and weight gain, and places the weight gain, and places the heifer's life in jeopardy.

heifer's life in jeopardy.

When an experienced veterinarian uses the K-R technique properly on a young heifer, the procedure is fast, and minimal care is needed afterward. In comparison, it's less stressful for a heifer to be spayed than for bull calves to be castrated. Spaying heifers is a surgical procedure that, in Texas, requires a veterinary license.

Because of restrictions for mov-

Because of restrictions for mov ing heifers from quarantined herds, spaying may become a popular option. USDA guidelines and TAHC regulations require

herds be branded with an "S" herds be branded with an "S" and have as their only destinations: quarantined feedlots, quarantined pastures, or slaughter. Spayed heifers, like steers, however, will have unrestricted interstate and in-tratstate movement. Spayed heifers should have an acceptable identification, such as an approv-ed metal eartag, prior to interstate ed metal eartag, prior to interstate


