Muenster and Lindsay advance in state playoffs

Defense keys shutout of Paducah

Knights win over state-ranked Moguls

Capitalizing on five Paducah turnovers and demonstrating the tough team defense that got them here, the Muenster Hornets racked up a 31-0 Area Championship at Iowa Park last Friday night, earning their 10th victory against one loss. The win gives them a berth in the sweet sixteen, the Quarterfinals of the Class A division against the Rotan Hammers. Paducah finished 5-6.

The Hornets raced to a 24-0 halftime lead, and to the delight of the large Big Red crowd, Muenster came out in the second half and preserved the shutout. They finished the game with their JV team driving for another score, a familiar site in the last three contests.

Senior J. Shane Wimmer set up the first score of the night when he recovered a fumble at the Hornet 37-yard line. A 63-yard drive stalled and Bobby Don Thornhill was good on a 27-yard field goal with 5:12 left in the opening quarter. Two minutes later, Muenster was knocking on the door again after Donnie Boydston recovered a fumble at the Paducah 17 caused by a blitz from linebacker Weldon Hermes.

Senior Keith Klement, coming through for the Red with perhaps his finest game, scored the first of two TDs on an 11-yard run. Thornhill kicked the PAT. Klement would finish with a season-high 88 yards on 11 carries.

Coach Bill Jump noted the contributions. "Not only Keith, but please see HORNETS, Page 9

"The boys played excellent," said Lindsay Coach Grady Roller. "Our hard-hitting defense caused the turnovers. We shut them down with the exception of three plays, which amounted to over 100 yards."

Lindsay scored first after Regi Klement blocked a punt, caught by John Fangman who ran the ball in for a touchdown. The PAT by Bob Fleitman was good and the Knights led 7-0 with 1:51 left in the first quarter.

Munday returned the favor within three plays, hitting pay dirt with 55 seconds on the clock. The PAT run counted and the Moguls took an 8-7 lead.

Lindsay's next score was again set up by the defense. Jeff Arendt intercepted a pass, giving the Knights possession at midfield. A 28-yard run by Mike Dieter five plays later gave Lindsay a 13-8 lead after a 2-point conversion failed.

Lindsay's defense struck once again with 7 seconds remaining in the half when Kevin Parsons picked off a jumbled Mogul pass.

The Knights controlled the ball during the third quarter, allowing Munday's offense only five plays the entire 12 minutes. Skeeter Cason recovered two fumbles, the second caused by John Fangman, setting up Lindsay's final score.

Early in the fourth quarter, Bobby Fleitman kicked a 38-yard field goal to stretch their lead to 16-8.

Participating in the funeral liturgy were: Abbot De Salvo who gave the eulogy; and Rudy Dieter with Readings, and Mr. and Mrs. Julius Hermes, Jr. who presented Offertory gifts.

Liturgical music was presented by Martha and Laura Fuhrmann, Deanna Nortman and Kenny Bezner with their own guitar and accordion accompaniment. They sang "I Am the Resurrection and the Life," and "Wherever You Go" at the Offertory. Emily Klement led "I Am the Bread of Life" and "Amazing Grace" and the solos of "Hail Mary, Gentle Woman" and "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling," accompanied by Ruth Felderhoff, organist. Sunday at 7 p.m. Mass of Christian Burial was offered in St. Benedict's Church at Subiaco on Monday at 10 a.m., with Abbot Raphael De Salvo and monks of the Abbey and visiting priests concelebrating.

Father Stephen Eckart delivered the homily and the Subiaco monks' choir sang for the liturgy. The choir sang Responses and the Ordinary of the Requiem Mass in Latin and a Latin Hymn at the Offertory.

In the funeral rite, after the Abbot sprinkled the coffin with Holy Water, assistants spread a white pall over the coffin, which rested there during the Mass. At the conclusion of the Mass, the choir sang: "In Paradisum" in Latin, and the white pall was lifted, for the procession to the cemetery to begin in silence.

At the cemetery, the monks sang the traditional hymn for the burial rite, the "Benedictus" in four-part harmony.

At the conclusion of prayers, all sang "The Lord's Prayer" and the Abbot intoned: "May he rest in peace and rise in glory. Amen."

Burial was in the Subiaco Abbey Cemetery, with monks as pallbearers, and White Funeral Home directing.

Father Cletus Post died Thursday, Nov. 17, 1988 in Gainesville Memorial Hospital at age 75.

Co-chairmen Carol Henscheid and Carolyn Bayer of the committee to conduct the selection of the King and Queen (Koenig und Koenigen) of the Muenster Centennial have requested interviews with the five couples, before the final stages of the contest.

They specified that interviews are to be held alphabetically, to avoid favoritism. Candidates for the royal honor to represent the community during the Centennial Year are expected to tell about their family background, record of community involvement, and reasons or hopes for aspiring to act as spokespersons for Muenster.

Ray and Mattie Swirczynski have made the following statement:

Ray Swirczynski is a native of Muenster. His grandparents moved to Muenster in 1890. Joseph, his father, was seven years old when he moved here with his parents. Ray's mother was Margaret Yosten Swirczynski. Ray was born in 1913 and lived all his life in Muenster, except for two years when he worked in the oil fields in Illinois, and the three

years he spent in the service in World War II. He was a baker with Gen. MacArthur's staff in the Southwest Pacific.

After returning to Muenster in 1945, he got into the trucking business, hauling oil field equipment. Later, in partnership with two others, they opened The Center Restaurant. Two years later, he built Ray's Convenience

Store.

He is the father of six children. Carolyn is married to Charles Bayer, and they own and operate "Bayer's Kolonialwaren," formerly Ray's Drive-In. Carolyn and Charles have four children.

Donnie lives in Gainesville and works for Gilbreath Tank Trucking Service. He has two children.

Tom is married to the former Paulette Endres and they have two children. Tom works for the U.S. Postal Service and Paulette works for the Muenster Telephone Corp.

Ken works for Mobil Oil Co. and is now stationed in Stavanger, Norway.

Cindy is married to Dean McMahon and lives in Lewisville, and they have two children. Dean works for Xerox in Dallas and Cindy works for W.A. Tayloe Co. in Dallas.

Jeanne lives in Irving and works for Sun Belt Travel Agency in Las Colinas, Dallas.

Ray Swirczynski has always been active. He served on the Muenster Public School Board for two terms and is an active member of the Knights of Columbus and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post in Muenster. For hobbies, he still likes to cook, play golf and walk; and volunteers for everything Mattie needs help with.

Mattie was born in Nazareth, Texas and married Leonard Endres in 1935. "After seeing his deep sense of loyalty to his hometown, Muenster soon became my hometown. So for 53 years, it's been that for me. And since Leonard started Germanfest, it would be a thrill for me to represent Muenster," Mattie stated.

Rodney achieves Eagle Rank

Rodney Knabe received the prestigious Eagle Rank in a formal Boy Scouts of America ceremony following the 7 p.m. Mass in Sacred Heart Church on Saturday, Nov. 19, 1988. He is the son of Pat and Shirley Knabe.

Rodney's scouting career began in 1980 when he became a member of Cub Scout Pack 664. As a Cub Scout, he earned the Bobcat, Wolf, Bear and Webelos ranks along with the Arrow of Light award. As a Cub Scout, he also earned the Parvuli De religious emblem.

In May of 1983, Rodney became a member of Boy Scout Troop 664 with Waylen Poole as scoutmaster. As a Scout, Rodney has held several leadership positions within the troop including

Patrol Leader, Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, Quartermaster, Bugler, and most recently as Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and has earned 36 merit badges.

In July 1985, Rodney attended the National Scout Jamboree at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia, as a member of Troop 735 Texoma Valley Council. Muenster remembers John F. Kennedy

Muenster residents grieved with a nation on Nov. 22, 1963. This week they remember the assassination of President John F. Kennedy 25 years ago, saying it was a day that changed their lives.

"It was the day time stood still. We were devastated that it happened, and especially that it happened in Texas," said Queenie Walterscheid. She, like almost every other person over the age 32, remembers exactly where she was when the news reached Muenster that the president had been shot by a sniper along the motorcade route in Dallas.

Mrs. Walterscheid remembers that she was taking her mother-in-law, Catherine Walterscheid, to meet a train in Gainesville so she could stay in Bartlesville, Okla., with her daughter, who was about to undergo surgery. A train pulled into the station at Gainesville in that early afternoon. It had come from Dallas.

"It was just awful," Mrs. Walterscheid said. "The train was late, and when it did come, the people were getting off, and they were all crying."

Bernice Mollenkopf was at home in her living room when she heard the news. "I went to work at the Center, and that's all people were talking about," she said. "It was like he was part of the family."

Special services were held throughout the weekend in Muenster, according to the Nov. 29, 1963, edition of *The Muenster Enterprise*. A special requiem High Mass was sung by the school children with Father Alcuin Kubis officiating. Rosaries were prayed for Kennedy almost non-stop by the nuns, children and members of the community, who took turns holding prayer vigils.

Mayor Earl Fisher requested that all businesses in the city be closed on Monday, the day Ken-

neddy was buried, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., which he designated as a period of prayer and meditation. A basketball game between Muenster High and Sacred Heart was cancelled Friday night.

"It really affected me," said Peggy Grewing, who was in the second grade in 1963. "I was at such an impressionable age," she said. "We all cried, and went to church to pray the Rosary."

As some young children do when they don't fully understand a tragic event that touches their lives, Mrs. Grewing said she

remembers feeling a sense of personal guilt. "I remember him giving talks on television, and I was always wishing that I could turn the channel to something I really wanted to watch," she said. "I felt guilty for all those times I could have sat and watched him on TV."

Mrs. Grewing said she had a great admiration for Jacqueline Kennedy because of the way she held her composure in what was surely one of the most stressful times of her life. She remembers

the students at Sacred Heart felt the same way, dedicating their annual that year to Mrs. Kennedy because of her courage.

Muenster Superintendent Charles Coffey was in Vega, Texas, 25 years ago, where he was elementary school principal, his first administrative position. The small Panhandle town was just as shocked as everyone else, he recalls. The Vega football team, however, decided to play that Friday night against Hart in a playoff game, because they felt the president would have wanted them to

get on with their lives, he said. "I will never forget it," Coffey said. "There are certain things that leave an indelible mark."

Coffey said he was the first person in the school to hear of the shooting. He had gone on his lunch break, and was getting his mail when he heard the tragic news over his car radio. He rushed home to tell his wife, who was tending to their newborn baby. Their son, Bruce, turned 25 this past August.

"I went to the lunchroom and told my superintendent," he remembers. "He said that's not something to joke about."

A longtime history teacher, Coffey feels the public will remember Kennedy as a great president because of his youth and personal charisma. The young president surrounded himself with youthful advisors and touted physical fitness. After so many years of war, the nation wanted to feel young again. "He radiated a personality and a charm," he said. "I think the entire nation respected and admired him."

When historians finally judge Kennedy as a president, however, the verdict may be somewhat different, Coffey said. "As a historian, I think a lot of people will never forget the Bay of Pigs fiasco," he said. Kennedy was also credited with beginning the nation's involvement in the Vietnam conflict, he said. "Had he lived out his term, I think he would be judged as a good president on domestic affairs, but as a failure in foreign affairs," Coffey said.

The memories live on, even though the nation has changed. They don't know why, but several said they don't think they would feel such a great sense of personal loss should tragedy befall any future presidents.

Mrs. Grewing said she still reads as much as she can about those

tragic four days. Mrs. Walterscheid said she still cringes every time any world leader comes to Texas. "The assassination was such a slam against Texas," she said. "We're known for being friendly, and I just don't want any of them coming to Texas after what happened."

To a person, however, those interviewed join with a vast majority of Americans in thinking the assassination was the result of a conspiracy, and that another gunman was probably involved. They are all anxious to hear anything that will finally resolve the mystery surrounding the events of Nov. 22, 1963. In the meantime, however, they will continue to remember.

Royal coronation approaches

The official opening ceremony for Muenster's one hundredth birthday is nearing, and preparations for the memorable event are approaching completion in anticipation of the Dec. 3 Centennial banquet, coronation and ball.

The Royal Ball officially begins the year-long celebration of the one hundredth year. The Ball and the Centennial are sponsored by the City of Muenster. City sponsorship includes such aspects as the Centennial Museum, the 100 Year History of Muenster, and other publications, official memorabilia, and certain other events throughout the year. Regular yearly events such as Germanfest are handled by their normal sponsoring organizations and coordinated with the City's appointed committee.

Deadline to make reservations for the Ball is Tuesday, Nov. 29. A firm attendance figure must be known by then.

Only 200 couples tickets will be sold plus single tickets, at \$30.00 per couple or \$15.00 for singles, to avoid over-crowding. Those planning to attend will find it

necessary to purchase tickets early for this "once in a lifetime event", said the general chairman Carol Henscheid. Tickets are now available for purchase from any committee members.

The ticket or "invitation" must be presented at the door and holders will receive a ballot, one if for single or two if for couple. The ballots will subsequently be used for election of the Koenig and Koeningen.

This fabulous evening will include a five-course dinner, interviews with royal candidates, election, by secret ballot to name a couple to represent Muenster throughout the centennial year, and a royal ball with dance music provided by "Bandana Roze."

General Chairman Carol Henscheid explained that "after-5 attire" indicates business suit or jacket and tie, and "dressy" dress.

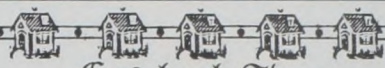
The group then proceeded to the Veterans plot where District I Auxiliary President Doris Gleason and Muenster Auxiliary President

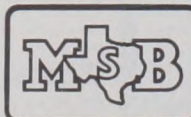

came home to St. Peter's on Nov. 2 to convalesce. He was stricken with pneumonia and was admitted to Gainesville Memorial Hospital, where he died on Nov. 17.

He was born on June 4, 1913, in Fort Smith, Ark. to the late John J. and Hermina Framel Post. He lived in Altus, Ark. most of his life, attended high school and college at Subiaco, entered the novitiate in 1933; made his profession in 1934 and was ordained on June 3, 1939.

He taught at Subiaco from 1939 to 1947; he was athletic director, teacher and coach at Subiaco from 1947 to 1950. From 1950 to 1953, he was assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Church and coach at Sacred Heart High School in Muenster. In his high school years, he was an outstanding member of the Subiaco Academy Trojan football team that won the Arkansas State Championship in 1932.

He taught at Laneri (now Nolan High School of Fort Worth) from 1953 to 1955; was appointed pastor of St. Joseph's Church in Paris, Ark. from 1955 to 1962. He served St. Mary's Church of Windthorst from 1962 to 1978 and was pastor of St. Peter's Church in Lindsay from 1978 until his death.

He had a special interest in students and athletics. He placed great importance on blessing football teams before games, praying for God's blessing on safety of the players. His last blessing of the Lindsay Knights was before the Lindsay-Valley View game. Team members dedicated the Munday game on Nov. 18 to him, achieving a stunning upset and advancing to the second round of the playoffs. He was a loyal fan of the Arkansas Razorbacks and was the proud recipient of an autographed game ball signed by members of the 1988 Southwest Conference Champions who will be in the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day. Parishioners of St. Mary's

Church in Windthorst credit Father Cletus with being instrumental in building of the new rectory which was completed in 1966; building of the new elementary school; and building of the first Parish Hall. In 1964, he started the Windthorst Federal Credit Union, with the help of the St. Joseph Society. He was a charter officer of the Credit Union - and it was all locally owned and managed by people of Windthorst. He was also instrumental in developing the Windthorst Water Supply Corp.

In St. Peter's Parish, he led the restoration and redecoration of the church, a major project that marks St. Peter's as an outstanding historical monument. Shortly after, the grotto was completely restored and improved. Father Cletus was there also to plan and oversee the remodeling of the Lindsay rectory.

At St. Peter's, Father Cletus introduced the Mother of Perpetual

Help Devotion that is a regular church service every Wednesday evening. He also established the Marian Year Devotions. Restoration of the grotto coincided with the Marian Year.

Survivors include two brothers, Louis Post of Fort Smith, Ark., and George Post of Memphis, Tenn.; and eight sisters, Martha Hoyle and Fronie Evans, both of Ozark, Ark., Rita Evans of Tenly Park, Ill., Bertha Meyers and Gertrude Vaught, both of Altus, Ark., Lucille Johnson of Wichita, Kansas, Hermania Falck of Aurora, Iowa, and Trenna Kremers of Clarksville, Ark.; and nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents; two brothers, Alfred and Norbert Post; and by his stepmother, Sophie Sax Post, who reared him.

The family has requested memorials be made to the Father Cletus Post Scholarship Fund at New Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas 72865.

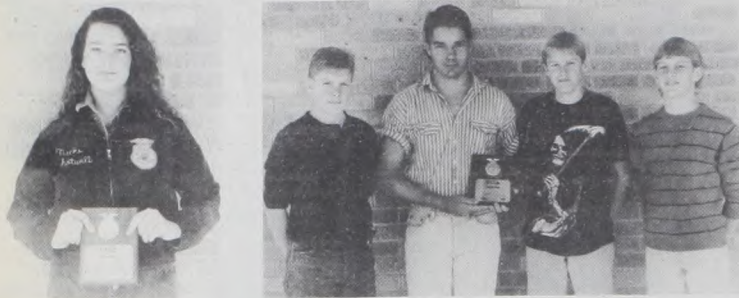

Spaying heifers:
A new reason for an old idea

Spaying heifers may become more common in Texas, since new federal guidelines by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) and state regulations from the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) restrict the movement of sexually intact heifers from herds quarantined because of brucellosis.

Although a number of spaying techniques have been developed during the past 90 years, there are two basic methods for gaining access to the ovaries. Either an incision can be made through the animal's side, or the vaginal wall can be punctured. The cost varies, depending on the veterinarian, location and number of animals spayed, other procedures performed at the same time, and the efficiency of the veterinarian's crew. Risks of infection or damage to internal organs during the spaying procedure are reduced through proper disinfection, restraining animals securely and careful use of instruments.

Spaying through the animal's side, called "flank-spaying," requires 5 to 10 minutes. An incision is made, the ovaries are grasped by hand, clipped with surgical scissors or a knife, and the incision is closed with one stitch.

The second basic spaying method takes 1½ to 2 minutes and involves inserting an instrument and puncturing the vaginal wall to reach the ovaries. Two instruments used are the Willis and the Kimberling-Rupp (or K-R) spay instruments.

The Willis instrument is a

stainless steel rod flattened into a spear and hollowed in the middle to encircle an ovary. Ovaries severed with the Willis instrument are dropped into the peritoneal cavity.

The K-R instrument has a handle that allows an operator to project and retract a point that punctures the vaginal wall. It is also equipped with a hollow tube to "catch" the severed ovaries for removal from the heifer's body. Practitioners can inspect the removed ovaries to determine if surrounding tissues were damaged, so repairs, if needed, can be made immediately.

When heifers are spayed at between 400 to 600 pounds, only about five percent of the animals suffer ill effects, evidenced by a "stiff gait" for up to three days. This outweighs making heifers abort at the feedlot when in the middle or advanced stages of pregnancy. This slows growth and weight gain, and places the heifer's life in jeopardy.

When an experienced veterinarian uses the K-R technique properly on a young heifer, the procedure is fast, and minimal care is needed afterward. In comparison, it's less stressful for a heifer to be spayed than for bull calves to be castrated. Spaying heifers is a surgical procedure that, in Texas, requires a veterinary license.

Because of restrictions for moving heifers from quarantined herds, spaying may become a popular option. USDA guidelines and TAHC regulations require

that regardless of their age or vaccination status, heifers that are moved from brucellosis-infected herds be branded with an "S" and have as their only destinations: quarantined feedlots, quarantined pastures, or slaughter. Spayed heifers, like steers, however, will have unrestricted interstate and intrastate movement. Spayed heifers should have an acceptable identification, such as an approved metal ear tag, prior to interstate shipment.

County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Each year about this time we think about planging trees in our landscape. Select a tree that meets your size and budget specifications. Most gardeners have pretty specific requirements of trees that will fit their landscapes, according to Marty Baker, Extension Horticulturist. Here are 10 of the most common requests along with suitable selections for your consideration:

- * Low maintenance, freedom from major problems. Choices would include pecan, magnolia, live oak, red oak, bald cypress, cedar elm, yaupon holly and crape myrtle.

- * Short (for restricted spots). Consider yaupon holly, golden raintree, crape myrtle, flowering crabapple and the ornamental plums and peaches.

- * Performance and durability. Trees for longterm investments include live oak and red oak, magnolia, pecan, sweet gum, cedar elm and bald cypress.

- * Attractive winter features, especially bark. Possibilities are cedar elm, native persimmon, crape myrtle and sweet gum.

- * Light shade. Trees that provide shade and still allow grass to grow underneath include bald cypress, golden raintree and the various short and narrow growing types already mentioned.

- * Color for the landscape. For flowers and fruit, consider yaupon holly, possumhaw holly, magnolia, golden raintree, crape myrtle, flowering crabapple, ornamental peaches and plums, callery pear, Texas redbud or Mexican plum.

- * Fast growth. Don't get too restrictive from this standpoint. Most durable and dependable trees grow moderately fast with good care and attention. Generally, it's best to select for permanence and care for the tree properly. But here are some of the so-called "fast growers" that are worthy in the landscape: Arizona ash, sycamore, fruitless mulberry, silver maple, mimosa and willow. Don't plant too many of these or you will create many future problems.

- * Evergreen. Trees that retain their leaves through most all of the year include yaupon holly, magnolia, live oak, Japanese black pine, Elderica pine, deodar cedar, cherry laurel and red tip photinia.

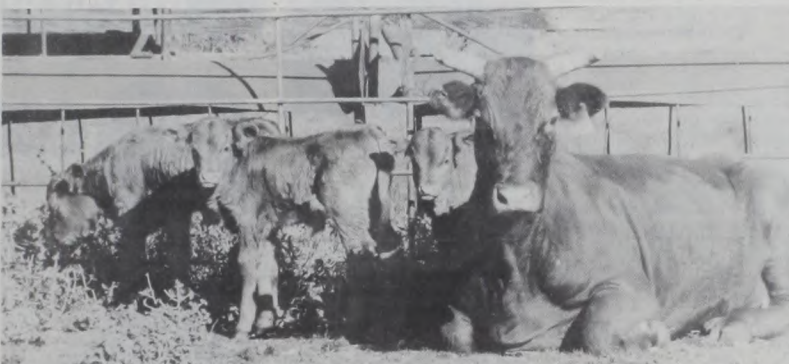
Christmas program set

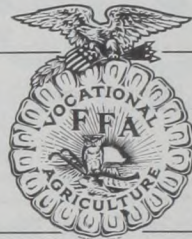

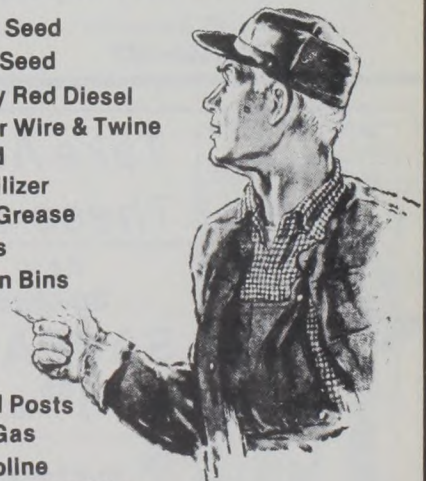
