## Hansford County's College Athletes

A college freshman, with muscles sore and stiff, wearily rises at 6 a.m. to prepare for another three-a day football

On a noisy, crowded bus, a basketball player tries to complete a complex calculus assignment while on a four-day road trip.

As he makes his way at dusk to his dorm room to study, a tired and sweaty athlete is greeted by a group of his friends leaving for a evening of fun.

These incidents are actual behind-the-scene glimpses into the world of college athletics. It's a far less glamorous side than is seen on the basketball courts, golf greens, football fields, and tracks where these athletes compete; but it is very much a part of the life of a college athlete.

While statistics show that less than five percent of those who participate in high school sports will ever play in college, Hansford County has eight students involved in college athletics who have been willing to share their experiences in the tough and competitive programs of their universities.

The athletes providing information on their collegiate sport are Aaron Frick, track, Sam Houston State University; Toby Thompson, golf, McMurry University; Kara Townsen, basketball, West Texas A&M University; Max Frick, football, West Texas A&M University; KiKi Carthel, cross country and basketball, McMurry University; Ryon Atwood, football, formerly Oklahoma Panhandle State University and currently Midwestern State University; Scott Jarvis, rugby, Texas A&M; and Coyt Tigrett, football, West Texas A&M University.

"It's a job." Whether scholarship or non-scholarship, the Hansford athletes consider their participation in college sports much the same as a job with scheduled hours of work and established levels of job performance required. The work week for these students, depending on their sport and season, can amount to 40 hours per week. The basketball players, Townsen and Carthel, reported the longest times of 30-40 hours required for workouts, weight lifting, travel, games (usually two per week), and study hall hours. Surprisingly, even this much time spent in athletics does not satisfy physical education requirement of any of the seven students who must also take two semesters of P.E.

The job of sports, like any occupation, is under the supervision of a superior. Although the Hansford eight reported vast differences in the personalities and temperament of their bosses, (their coaches), two adjectives were used repeatedly to describe them-demanding and knowledgeable. Thompson stated, "They want more out of you. they're also stricter than high school coaches."

Several of the athletes emphasized the intensity of their coaches concerning workouts. "Practice is not over until every drill is done with no mistake,"

Townsen states.

While most of the athletes had only one coach for their sport in high school, many of them now have several coaches, each working in their own specialty area. This seems to be an aspect the seven like. A Frick says he has learned much by working with a coach who was himself a successful discus and shot competitor. Townsen appreciates working with a shooting coach and a post coach.

There are also fellow workers, teammates, in the job of college athletics. All respondents praised the abilities and dedication of the fellow athletes who comprise their teams. The teammates were described as being quite different from those encountered in high school. On a high school team, various athletic abilities and commitment levels exist. There are still differences among college teammates, but all players possess talent, good work ethics, dedication, and higher ambitions. Carthel reflects, "It's so different from high school, everyone is so physically and mentally talented in the sport. New plays, drills, and defenses are learned very quickly."

While competition is great, Hansford athletes related that college teammates are more helpful and more encouraging. As one stated, "They've all had their ups and downs, their highs and lows, in the sport and understand what you're going through." The Hansford athletes did have differing opinions on their personal relationships with their comrades. While several stated that their teammates were their best friends, due to the fact they shared common interests and were together so much, others stated that their teammates were so vastly different in backgrounds and life styles that, except for a few friends, they seldom saw their teammates outside the sports arena.

Like any occupation, sports as a job has its disadvantages. Unanimously cited by the Hansford group as the biggest drawback was the time factor. Every athlete agreed that time was a precious commodity and that free time was nearly nonexistent during the season of their sport. The only difference of opinion among the athletes was in the area in which lack of time was a detrimental factor. Thompson, A. Frick, and Jarvis did not believe their studies were affected to any extent by their sports participation while several others including M. Frick, Carthel, Townsen, and Atwood said it greatly affected their time available for study, especially during the season of their sport.

Many of the athletes thought their family time suffered due to sports. Most cited their inability to make visits home during playing season. Three also stated they missed the regular attendance of their family they had enjoyed in high school at their events.

Lack of social time or time spent with friends was also a negative





Jim Derington reports a good meeting in Austin at the Texas Water Conservation annual meeting, but the Legislature was still working at their water bills and hadn't finalized them.

Cousins of mine, the Archie Nelsons and AnnaBeth Wood, drove out to the Lake Sunday afternoon and enjoyed the beauty of the spot, but they were disappointed that there were no geese or eagles. Jim and Joan Hawkins spotted a bald eagle Monday morning, so some are still around or going through.

Last week's column inferred that Gunder and Joel Stavlo were trapping bald eagles for their tail feathers. They were trapping other animals and using rabbit for bait. Sometimes the eagles would spot the rabbit and swoop in for a free meal. When one was caught, the Stavlo brothers were too frugal not to take advantage of selling the tail feathers. Joel said they learned to hide all but a tiny morset of the rabbit, and after that not many eagles were accidentally trapped.

If any of you are interested in the 101 Ranch, there is a room in the Ponca City Cultural Center that contains a lot of history of the Miller Brothers Ranch and their Wild West Show. You might even find out what they did with all of those prairie dog hides that the Stavlo Brothers sold them.

There seem to be several foxes that live south and west of Gruver on the edge of town. I find people who call them red foxes and people who call them swift foxes. It could even be correct that we have both.

One rancher said he had seen a fox this morning. As he and his brother had run coyotes with their hounds, he was familiar with the little swift foxes they would sometimes chase. He said the hounds could overtake the foxes easily, but the swifts were so fast that they could turn back and go through the hounds before the dogs could get turned around. They had never killed one.

Danny Swepston of the Texas Parks and Wildlife told me that in the winter the swifts are a tan color, but in the summer some of them are reddish

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
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
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

"I'm glad I have the chance to play basketball at the college level. We work hard, but we're a young team with great things to come. (Carthel)


