

# Sales tax rebate up

March 1993 sales tax rebates for both Gruver and Spearman are up from those reported in 1992.

According to the release from the Texas State Comptroller, Gruver has received \$5,664.65 in rebates for March 1993, as compared to the \$4,047.62 recorded in 1992. This is an increase of 39.95 percent. Payments received to date in 1993 for Gruver total \$14,616.68, which is a 11.66 percent increase over the \$13,089.99 mailed in 1992. The release reports that

## **Texas State Comptroller John Sharp...** releases third quarter report

Sharp recently released the Third Quarter State Sales and Use Tax Analysis Report for 1992.

According to the report, Hansford County's gross sales for all industries in the quarter totaled \$19,216,277. This is a 10.5 percent increase from the \$17,383,926 recorded for gross sales in 1991.

The reporting outlets for the third quarter in 1992 decreased by

Knowing the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning could save lives: A tornado watch is issued by the Weather Service when the conditions are right for a tornado to form. A tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted. All residents in the area should take cover quickly. Tornadoes can strike at any time

and at any place. National Weather Service bulletins will provide weather information, if it seems threatening. Residents are urged to keep up on developing weather conditions.

· In public buildings, go immediately to designated shelter area, an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor. Do not go to your parked car.

• In open country, look for suitable shelter. If there is no time, leave your car and lie flat in a ditch or depression. Avoid trees, metal poles and other electrical conductors

 Mobile homes and cars should be abandoned immediately. If there is no other shelter nearby, take cover in a ditch or depression.

Do not leave your shelter until the storm threat is past! Being prepared to follow these safety procedures may save your

life.

# Railroad Commission releases report

Hansford County crude oil production averaged 25,985 barrels, and the oil and gas wells produced 3,204,931 Mcf (1,000 cubic feet) in December 1992.

According to the release, Texas preliminary crude oil production averaged 1,618,689 barrels daily in December, down from the 1,680,751 barrels daily average of 1991. The preliminary oil production figure for December is 50, 179, 352 barrels, down from the 52,103,929 barrels reported in 1991.

Texas preliminary crude production for 1992 totaled 612,692,189 barrels, a 2.64 percent decrease compared to the 1991 preliminary total of 629,311,929.

The Texas oil and gas wells produced 463,430,164 Mcf of gas in


preliminary production for December, down 2.09 percent compared to 473,301,280 Mcf produced during the same period in 1991.

For 1992 the Texas gas production totaled 5,436,409,608 Mcf, a 0.77 percent increase compared to the 1991 preliminary gas production total of 5,395,008,249 Mcf.

In December the Texas gas production came from 178,075 oil, and 45,417 gas wells.

The Commission issued a total of 894 drilling permits in February compared to 829 in February 1992.

Operators reported 336 gas, 356 oil and 25 service completions, compared to 175 gas, 358 oil and 42 service completions during the same period of last year.



# Karen's Kozy Korner

Have you have your vegetables today?

The United States Department of Agriculture's Food Guide Pyramid recommends eating three to five servings of vegetables daily. Yet, despite these recommendations, vegetables seem to have disappeared from the daily diets of many people. For some unknown reason, they think vegetables are boring and yucky.

This misperception, and that's exactly what it is, is beginning to change. Vegetables are becoming an important part of a balanced diet. Vegetables come in many colors, shapes, sizes, forms, flavors and textures. They contribute interest and variety to meals in countless ways. They are fun to cook and to eat. Their versatility makes them an asset in most meals.

Vegetables can be eaten in many forms-raw, canned, frozen, or dried. They can be eaten in sandwiches, salads, soups and main dishes. Our enjoyment of vegetables is limited only to our ability to serve them in interesting ways. We can pick up and choose from an endless number of different and unusual vegetables.

Vegetables score very high nutritionally. They contain a variety of vitamins, minerals and fiber. For example, the dark green leafy veg-

etables are a good source of iron and calcium. Minerals such as sodium, magnesium, potassium, iodine, calcium, copper, molybdenum and manganese are also present in varying amounts in many veg-

etables A number of vegetables contain significant amounts of vitamin C. Examples include broccoli, sweet green and red peppers, and green leafy vegetables (like kale and col-

lards) and tomatoes. Others include asparagus tips, Brussels sprouts, raw cabbage, garden cress, kale, kohlrabi, mustard greens, Irish and sweet potatoes (cooked in their jackets), spinach, tomato juice and turnip greens. Since we get vegetables from all over the world, we are almost certain to get the necessary amounts of these minerals if we eat the recommended number of serv-

ings, which is 3-5 per day. Vitamin C is needed for healthy gums and body tissues. Our diet should provide about 60 milligrams of vitamin C per day.

Deep green and deep yellow vegetables are good sources of vitamin A and beta carotene. Examples include broccoli, carrots, chard, collards, cress, kale, pumpkin, spinach, sweet potatoes, winter squash, turnip greens and other dark greens. Vitamin A helps you maintain good vision and is essential for the proper functioning of many body organs

Also, Bob Setliff's mother continues to be plagued with problems. We hope her condition will begin to improve rapidly.





sales tax rebates to 929 cities and 109 counties, an 11.1 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

Another \$164.2 million in payments went to eight of the state's mass transit programs, according to the release.

For March 1993 Texas cities have received \$91.4 million in sales tax payments, an 11.3 percent increase from the \$82.1 million received last March.

March's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on January sales and reported to the Comptroller in February by businesses filing monthly tax returns.





I want to pass along an article from the state Comptroller's Office about the constitutional election on May 1 which will affect school finance. The following is taken word-for-word from the Comptrollers report.

To ensure Texas public schools remain open, the 73rd Legislature, in February, passed the latest in a series of school finance bills aimed at meeting judicial mandates. Texas voters will have a chance to vote on proposed changes May 1 when the three constitutional amendments are on the state ballot.

Early (formerly known as absentee) voting begins on Monday, April 12, 1993, and ends on April 27, 1993. The last day voters may apply for an early ballot by mail is April 23.

One amendment authorizes the Legislature to create and set property tax rates for county education termined what type of system would be used to redistribute property tax revenue and how much state aid each school district would receive if voters approve the constitutional amendments.

The May 1 ballot will provide for voting for or against the proposition

'The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

### **State Mandates**

The second constitutional amendment proposed by the Legislature allows school districts to ignore state mandates passed after December 31, 1993, unless the Legislature fully funds them or enacts the mandates by a two-

With this new authority, the Legislature could then move funds from property-rich school districts to property-poor districts across the state or within counties for a more equitable distribution of public education funds. However, the amendment caps the amount shifted to 2.75 percent of state and local education revenue -- about \$400 million annually. The state's share of the money to be redistributed does not include revenue for free textbooks or retirement system contributions. In addition, the amendment does not affect distributions of the Available School Fund.

Since the amendment would change the Texas Constitution, many assume it will be more likely to satisfy the courts than the Legislature's past attempts to finance the state's public schools equitably. However, at publication time, the Legislature had not de-

# **Tri-State High School Rodeo Finals... Pool wins 2 saddles, 7 buckles**



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PREGNANT WOMEN BE-WARE OF LEAD FROM MUGS A recent report in the FDA Con-

sumer suggests that pregnant women may want to choose glass or plastic mugs rather than ceramic mugs when drinking hot acidic beverages on a daily basis. There is concern that there may be risk to a developing fetus from lead leached from lead-glazed ceramic cups or mugs. Acidic beverages such as coffee or tea cause the greatest leach risk. It should be noted, however, that occasional use of these such ceramic items may not pose such a risk. \*\*\*\*

## **GRILLING MEATS -- CON-**SIDER FOOD SAFETY!

Grilling meats outside is a favorite warm weather activity. Follow safe food handling practices to assure that meat is safely prepared and safe to eat. Cook ground meats to a well-done stage; meats should be brown throughout. Cook chicken until juices run clear; fish until it flakes easily with a fork. Use a clean serving plate and utensil to pick up and serve cooked meat. Never use the same ones that held raw meat or marinade mixture without washing them first. Any item that was in contact with raw meat may carry bacteria that cause illness. Keep everything clean, including containers, utensils, hands, and any surfaces that come in con-

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it is, in fact, baseball that is killed for fear that it will hurt other sports, and that is wrong.

A couple of other problems - the coaching staff and the cost of implementing the baseball program -Coach Frick would need an assistant..

How to make everyone happy? You can't, as Superintendent Barry Haenisch said at the June 9 meeting. But Haenisch proposed an idea how you could come closest. It is not the cheapest way, but it is the best, and it would be worth it. I am saying, as Haenisch proposed, hire another coach - making six football coaches (they gain one), and two baseball coaches (they gain one). This would be a plus for the football people, and a plus for the baseball people. The estimated cost, in total, for start-up and hiring of another coach - about \$25,000. You are the taxpayer and the voter. You must decide if it is worth it. I have already given my views on the potential of scholarships, as the talent is here in Gruver. Barry Haenisch feels it would be wrong, just to look at the scholarship situation. But baseball scholarships would be easier to come by than football scholarships. Carey Kauffman is a prime example. 


The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test results for grades four and eight were re-

# Fathers, to be treated as kings for a day

the time when the man of the house gets unusual attention and is really "King for a Day." This holiday is not so old as others, but it has a worthwhile object--to cherish "the honor and dignity of fatherhood.

Often when such a project as Father's Day starts, in a land as big as ours, more than one person may think of the idea at about the same time. As in the case of Mother's Day, there are conflicting accounts as to who really initiated Father's Day.

No doubt these are all valid claims; however, according to several sources, Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Washington, "was primarily responsible" for furthering this holiday.

As she listened to a Mother's day sermon in Spokane, Washington, in 1909, her thoughts kept turning to her father, William Jackson Smart, known as "Billy Buttons." Now that she was married and had a child of her own, she could appreciate more keenly than ever the sort of courage it took for her father to face the tragic early loss of her mother and shoulder the full responsibility of bringing up his six children--five boys and a girl, single-handed. The more she thought of it, the more she became convinced that fathers, too, should have a day.

After the sermon, Mrs. Dodd spoke to Dr. Rasmus about her idea. He was enthusiastic about it and promised to help her get the project started.

During the year, she discussed the plan with others and it was well received. In the spring of 1910, Mrs. Dodd presented a petition to the Reverend Conrad Bluhm, president of the Spokane Ministerial Association, asking that he suggest to

The third Sunday in June is Father's Day in this country, the members of the association that they select one Sunday in June (the month of her Father's birthday) to remind their parishioners of the appreciation owed to fathers. The ministers agreed to preach on this theme, and the YMCA also helped sponsor the event. The mayor of Spokane issued the first Father's Day proclamation; soon Governor M.E. Hay became interested; and he set the third Sunday in June for the state-wide observance.

> In Spokane, during the week before the celebration, many merchants arranged window displays, calling attention to the day. For instance, John Matthieson showed the portrait of George Washington, the Father of his Country, with the caption, "Remember Father.'

On that first Father's Day (June 19, 1910), when Mrs. Dodd attended the Centenary Presbyterian Church, she was pleased 7 by the tribute Mr. Bluhm paid fathers. He used the topic, "The Knighthood that never retreats." She considered this an ' appropriate text as her father had truly lived by the Golden Rule and had never flinched in his duties.

In 1916 from his desk in the White House, President Wilson pressed a button to begin the observance; this unfurled a flag at a celebration in Spokane. Eight years later, in 1924, Calvin Coolidge recommended that Father's Day be noted in all the states, declaring that such an occasion would bring about a clear relationship between fathers and their children, and also impress upon the former their obligations.

# Dortch and Renfro... to race across the United States

Tom Dortch of Morse and Jack Renfro of Fort Worth will be leaving Wednesday, June 23 for a 13 day road trip across the United States

It will not be a leisurely cruise controlled, air conditioned, comfort drive. Dortch and Renfro will be driving Dortch's 1935 Ford Deluxe Sedan. They will be competing against other drivers, with similarly vehicles, in The 1993 Interstate Batteries Great American Race

Dortch and the other participants will leave Hunting Beach, Calif. at noon on Wednesday, June 27. They will spend the next 12 days driving a pre arranged course across the U.S. On Saturday, July 10 they are scheduled to reach the finish line at Norfolk, Va.

The cross country course is split up into daily segments. At the be-

ginning of each day the drivers are given instructions on what part of the course to drive, and how fast they are to drive it. Along the course are check points that are unknown to the participants. At each check point the time of arrival of the competitor's vehicle is compared to an ideal time the vehicle should arrive if the daily instructions were followed exactly. 
