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## Hansford County has heavy turnout, 79% cast ballots

A total of 2,404 Hansford County residents cast their ballots during the 1992 presidential election, according to the unofficial results released by the county clerk's office. 1,975 of these voters showed up to cast their ballot at the polls on Tuesday. The remaining 429 voters took advantage of absentee voting held in October 14 - 30. According to the clerk's office there were 3,036 people registered to vote. This gave Hansford County a 79 percent voter turnout, which is up from the 75 percent reported in 1988.

Hansford County had two locally contested races.

In the Precinct 1 race for County Commissioner Worley Smith (R) defeated Cathy Patterson (D) with a 375 to 184 ballot cast.

The unofficial results of the Precinct 3 race were a lot closer. Kent Guthrie (R) squeezed by incumbent B.J. Renner (D) to win the Precinct 3 County Commissioner's seat. Guthrie received 333 votes while Renner got 301.

In the district there was one contested race. It was the Justice, 7th Court of Appeals District. In this race Hansford County cast 1070 votes for Republican Jairl

Dowell and 657 for Democrat Carlton Dodson.

In the three man Presidential race, Hansford County cast 1,660 ballots for the George Bush/Dan Quayle Republican ticket, 398 ballots for the Ross Perot/James Stockdale Independent ticket and 345 ballots for the Bill Clinton/Al Gore Democratic ticket. One vote was cast for Libertarian ticket of Andre Marrou/Nancy Lord.

Although Hansford County favored Bush and Quayle, the next President of the United States will be Bill Clinton. The Vice-President will be Al Gore.

## Gruver CC girls... to try for State qualification

The Gruver Lady Hounds cross country team will try for a 4th consecutive state qualification this year when they compete at the Region I-AA cross country meet at Lubbock this Saturday, Nov. 7. Gruver has finished 3rd, 1st, and 2nd at the class A state meet at Georgetown

these past three years, and according to Head Coach Steve Myatt, nothing short of a state championship will satisfy them this year.

"The top teams there will be Stratford, Gruver and Sundown, and three teams go to the state meet, so you can say we should go," stated Coach Myatt. "But," he

added, "As inconsistently as we've run this year, it is in the realm of possibility that we could have a bad outing and not go to state. But we should finish at least 2nd, and maybe 1st."

Coach Myatt added some more about the meet. "Gruver has a history of running well at Lubbock. The state meet is our goal. Anything short would be a disappointment, but this is a young team and you never know."

Running for Gruver will be seniors Cora Meyer and Kasey Davis; sophomores Julie Meyer, Tisha Ralston and Wendy Rodriguez; and freshmen Joni Hart and Myrium Alvarez. The top five finishers will make up the team score, with their placings added up to equal their final score.

A note should be added about the Gruver boys cross country team, which also qualified for regionals by finishing 2nd at district at Boys Ranch. They will not be competing, as they have a Friday night football

## Grand Jury indites six

All six of the cases brought before the Hansford County Grand Jury on Thursday, Oct. 29, were indited, according to Hansford County Chief Deputy Gary Evans.

Three of the cases involved burglary. These three cases are The State of Texas versus Richard Diaz, The State of Texas versus Harold Sheppard and The State of Texas versus Bradley Irvin. Diaz and Sheppard are both currently being held, according to Evans.

Sheppard was also indited on a

forgery charge that came before the grand jury.

Other cases indited were The State of Texas versus Julia Hernandez and The State of Texas versus Gloria Renteria.

Hernandez was indited on a charge of interference with child custody.

Renteria was charged with credit card abuse.

According to Evans these cases are scheduled for arraignment on Thursday, Nov. 19.

## Hansford County Historical Commission... logging county cemeteries

The Hansford County Historical Commission often has many irons in the fire. This year is no exception. In addition to obtaining the "little school house" and construction of the Zulu Stockade, the commission has been working on a log book for the cemeteries in Hansford County.

Sylvia Robertson of the Hansford County Historical Commission said that the State Historical Commission suggested the project. "It is a state wide project that should have been completed two years ago," she added.

She explained that there was no records of the Hansford Cemetery

so it had to be walked. Every name and date the headstones in the cemetery had to be recorded. She said with a smile that Holly and Kim Venneman of Gruver had volunteered and walked the cemetery obtaining the information. She added that Kaley Davis had also helped.

After completing the Hansford Cemetery only one cemetery remains to be logged according to Robertson. "All we lack is Gruver Cemetery," she said, "and Melba Rasor is in charge of obtaining this information."

Other cemeteries in the area that are to be included in the log are Lieb Cemetery in Morse, Holt Cemetery south of Spearman, Oslo Cem-

etry and Mulloch Cemetery. Robertson said that Lieb Cemetery had all of its records computerized.

The Hansford County Historical Commission encourages anyone in the county that knows of other burial plots in the county to contact them. They would like to know about them.

In a letter sent to the historical commission it is stated that cemeteries "can provide valuable information on individuals, events, customs, art, ethnicity, architecture, settlement patterns and many other aspects of our heritage."

If you have any information or are interested in the project please contact the historical commission.

## State Comptroller releases stats...

## Texas oil and gas production down

The Texas Railroad Commission recently released the July Texas monthly oil and gas statistics.

According to the release, Hansford County crude oil production was 28,002 barrels, while the total gas production was 3,417,787 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) in July.

Also in the release was the September permits to drill. The commission issued a total of 1,200 drilling permits in September, while in September of 1991 they issued only 951.

The September 1992 total included 825 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 33 to re-enter existing well bores, 24 to deepen existing holes, 136 to plugback existing

holes and 64 for other wells. The amended drilling permits for September totaled 138.

9,289 permits to drill have been issued in 1992 to-date. This is an 11 percent decrease from the 10,462 issued for the same time span in 1991.

Permits issued in September were 539 oil, 246 gas, 401 oil and gas, 17 injection, seven disposal and 10 other permits.

In September operators reported 213 gas, 419 oil and 34 service completions, compared to 174 gas, 432 oil and 47 service completions during the same period of last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1992 year-to-date is

5,836, a 22 percent decrease from the 7,464 recorded in 1991 year-to-date.

Operators reported 930 holes plugged and 167 dry holes in September, compared to 1,252 holes plugged and 79 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

Texas preliminary July crude oil production averaged 1,628,958 barrels daily, down from the 1,722,795 barrels average of July 1991.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for July is 50,497,691 barrels, down from the 53,424,548 barrels reported in July, 1991.

Texas oil and gas well produced 488,591,185 Mcf of gas in July, up

## Hansford County's October sales tax rebate checks up

The State Comptroller's office recently released the October sales tax rebates figures. According to the release Hansford County has received \$14,484.67 in rebates for October 1992. This figure is an increase of 7.59 percent from the \$13,463.01 received in October

1991. Hansford County has received a total of \$175,875 in rebates to-date for 1992. This is a 5.68 percent increase from the \$166,416.73 received to-date in 1991.

The sales tax rebate checks for Gruver totaled \$3,506.65 for October 1992, as compared to the \$3,268.54 received in 1991. This is a 7.28 percent increase for the year.

Gruver's year-to-date figures for 1992 are \$39,323.35, which is a 7.55 percent increase from the \$36,563.53 received in 1991.

In Spearman, merchants have received October 1992 sales tax rebates checks in the amount of \$10,978.02, as compared to the

\$10,194.47 in 1991. This is a 7.69 percent increase.

The 1992 year-to-date rebates for Spearman are up by 5.16 percent. Thus far Spearman has received \$136,551.65 in rebate checks, as compared to the \$129,853.20 received for the same time period in 1991.

According to the release, State Comptroller John Sharp sent a total of \$102.9 million in October sales tax rebates to 956 Texas cities and 105 counties, a 3.3 percent increase over their payments of one year ago.

Texas cities received \$92.1 mil-

### Spearman Police Report

During the reporting period running from Monday, Oct. 26, to Sunday, Nov. 1, the Spearman Police Department received a total of 38 calls.

## Clinic offers vaccines

The Texas Department of Health is offering an immunization clinic in Spearman at 720 S. Archer on November 5 from 9-12 a.m. and 1-4:30 p.m.

This immunization clinic is offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases such as Polio, Diphtheria, Lock Jaw (Tetanus), Whooping Cough (Pertussis), Measles, Rubella, Mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

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Jeff's old friends in Spearman are hoping to see some TV coverage of this unusual event.

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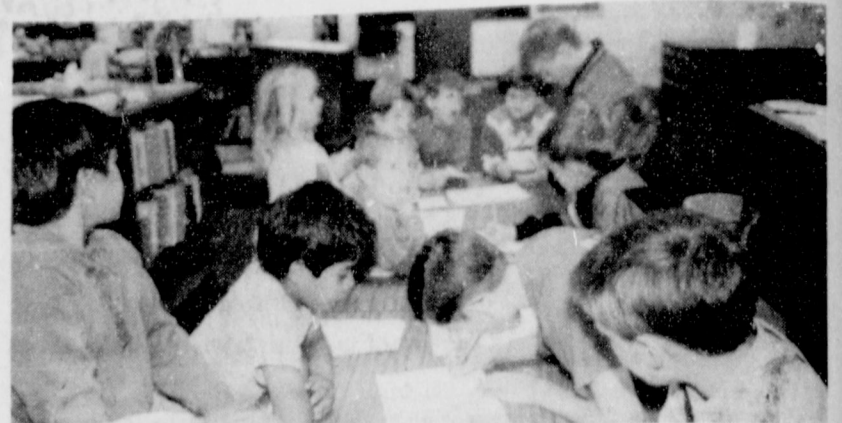

## Tips to banish brown bag bacteria

Washington — Brown bagging it is popular these days, but food safety should be taken seriously—especially during this time of year. Here's a lesson on food safety for everyone to follow when packing lunches for the little ones... or the big ones.

1. Lesson #1: There's no substitute for CLEAN. Make sure all lunch boxes and thermoses have been thoroughly cleaned with soap and warm water. Start with a new lunch bag everyday. It's not a good idea to reuse bags. And remember to wash your hands before making lunches.

2. Lesson #2: HOT FOODS MUST BE KEPT HOT AND COLD FOODS MUST BE KEPT COLD. Bacteria love room temperature. At temperatures between 40° F and 140° F bacteria can double every 20 minutes.

TO KEEP FOOD COLD...TRY FREEZING YOUR SANDWICH the night before. Coarse textured breads freeze best. Items like lettuce and tomatoes should be packed separately. Even foods like fruit, cookies, and pretzel bags can be packed in the refrigerator the night before so that everything starts

out cold. Include a freezer gel-pack with the lunch. Enclose the gel-pack in a plastic bag to prevent moisture from wetting other items in the lunch bag or box. Check the gel-pack after each use to make sure that it is not leaking. You can also use a frozen juice box as a cold source. The juice will thaw but will still be cold at lunchtime. And remember not to place lunches on warm window sills or radiators.

TO KEEP FOOD HOT...USE A WELL-INSULATED THERMOS. Fill the thermos with hot water first and let it stand for several

## Tips to banish brown bag bacteria

Washington — Brown bagging it is popular these days, but food safety should be taken seriously—especially during this time of year. Here's a lesson on food safety for everyone to follow when packing lunches for the little ones ... or the big ones.

1. Lesson # 1: There's no substitute for CLEAN. Make sure all lunch boxes and thermoses have been thoroughly cleaned with soap and warm water. Start with a new lunch bag everyday. It's not a good idea to reuse bags. And remember to wash your hands before making lunches.

2. Lesson #2: HOT FOODS MUST BE KEPT HOT AND COLD FOODS MUST BE KEPT COLD. Bacteria love room temperature. At temperatures between 40° F and 140° F bacteria can double every 20 minutes.

TO KEEP FOOD COLD...TRY FREEZING YOUR SANDWICH the night before. Coarse textured breads freeze best. Items like lettuce and tomatoes should be packed separately. Even foods like fruit, cookies, and pretzel bags can be packed in the refrigerator the night before so that everything starts

out cold. Include a freezer gel-pack with the lunch. Enclose the gel-pack in a plastic bag to prevent moisture from wetting other items in the lunch bag or box. Check the gel-pack after each use to make sure that it is not leaking. You can also use a frozen juice box as a cold source. The juice will thaw but will still be cold at lunchtime. And remember not to place lunches on warm window sills or radiators.

TO KEEP FOOD HOT...USE A WELL-INSULATED THERMOS. Fill the thermos with hot water first and let it stand for several

minutes. Then empty the thermos and fill it right away with hot food that has been brought to a boil. If the food is still hot to the touch, it will be safe to eat. Be sure to discard leftovers.

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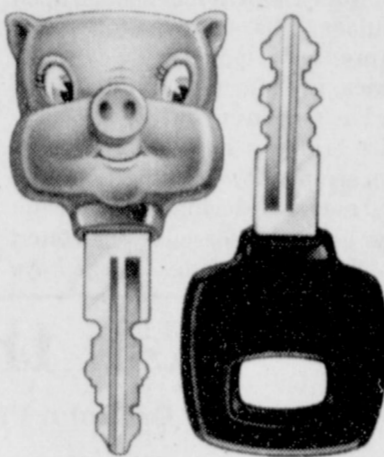

## New drivers license requirements announced

AUSTIN—Beginning November 1, Texans applying for a driver's license and persons renewing their license or seeking a duplicate will need to show their Social Security card, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for Commercial Driver's Licenses, which the DPS began issuing in September 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license," explained DPS Driver's License Inspector John Hall. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it much more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards is-

sued by the federal Social Security Administration will be accepted, Hall said.

"I realize almost everyone knows his Social Security number by heart, but we need to see the actual card issued by the U.S. government, not a commercially-produced metal or 'flea market' card," the inspector said. "If you do not have the government-issued card, income tax documents, W-2 forms, payroll or other employer records may be presented."

Applicants for DPS Identification Cards also will be asked for a Social Security card, but is not a requirement for the ID card, Hall said.

The Inspector said Social Security numbers would not be printed on driver's licenses and were for DPS internal use only.

Signs explaining the new policy will be posted in DPS Driver's License offices across the state, he added.

## Tips offered to prevent freezing pipes

WASHINGTON, D.C.—"Freezing pipes are a common problem during the winter months, and damage caused by frozen pipes that break can be costly to repair," warns William Griswold, vice president of the Property Insurance Center at Government Employees Insurance Company (GEICO).

To prevent breakage and flooding, Griswold offers the following advice.

\* Insulate pipes. Easy to install insulation is available in most hardware stores.

\* Drain all outside spigots before the first freeze. Pipes connected to spigots are highly susceptible to

freezing since they run through walls to the outside. To drain, cut off water at the valve inside the house that feeds the spigot. Then open the spigot itself to allow water remaining in the pipe to drain out completely.

\* When the temperature drops below freezing, keep an eye on pipes in unheated areas of your home — basement crawl spaces, exterior walls and the laundry room. These are the ones most likely to freeze.

\* On particularly cold days, allow inside faucets to drip slowly and open cabinets underneath sinks to allow heat to reach the pipes.

\* When you leave your house during cold weather, don't turn off the heat or set the thermostat too low.

"Methods for preventing freezing pipes are relatively easy and inexpensive," Griswold said. Such precautions are well worth the time and money to prevent the headaches and expensive damage that neglect could cause on a cold winter's day."

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



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
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
