Bill Bomar Collection

The Bill Bomar Collection of crosses is now being displayed at the Museum of the Plains. This exhibit will be at the Museum from June 1 1997 to July 12, 1997. Bill Bomar began collecting crosses in 1939 and by the time of his death, in 1991, had amassed over 300 of them. The crosses in the collection are world wide in origin and date from the early Christian period to the present day. There is some emphasis however, on those made in Mexico and Northern New Mexico. The crosses, also range in size from minuscule (one-half inch) to impressive dimensions (over five feet high) and are made from such varied materials as wood, stone, iron, straw, thread, cloth, silver, brass, ivory, crystal, clay, turquoise, coral, and lapis lazuli. In addition, paintings that incorporate crosses as subject matter are part of this collection. Museum hours are Monday - Friday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday and Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

College Tuition Assistance

The U.S. Commission for Scholastic Assistance 0- College bound is such an organization and supplies the public with over 700 different private scholarships sources. The scholarship list include the scholarship names, addresses, application deadlines, summaries about the scholarships and the amount the scholarship will pay your child. Many scholarships pay the entire tuition; others can be applied towards tuition, living expenses, and/or other fees. Most scholarships can be used at junior colleges, career and vocational schools, 4 year colleges, graduate schools, medical and law schools. Library Receives New Equipment

The Hansford County Library has a new piece of equipment designed to aid people with low vision. It's called a Magni-Cam, and has been donated to the library by the family of D.W. "Junior" Dunnihoo. When used with a video display device like a television set, this can magnify printed materials including newspapers, books, food packages, medicine containers and photographs. Magni-Cam displays all images including those of multicolored materials on the TV screen in black, white and shades of gray. A contrast enhancement control is provided to help clarify poor images such as from telephone books or multicolored materials.

This device helps us provide an additional service to any in our community that might have vision problems. We have this available for checkout or use in the library. We would like to thank the Dunnihoo family for donating this piece of equipment and a TV to use it with to our library. Their generosity will help others in the service area who might not be able to afford this type of equipment in their home.

The library also has available for checkout or in-house use a personal reader which can magnify print for those with a vision problem. This device is not as sophisticated as the Magni-Cam, but would help with many print materials.





Focus On The Family

Let us replenish the seed of faith through...

QUESTION: Our two teenage daughters excel in different areas: one is very academic, and the other is a social butterfly. Often they exchange sharp words laced with jealousy. How can we minimize the antagonism that exists between them?

DR. DOBSON: The first step is to avoid circumstances that compare your daughters unfavorably with each other. In addition, each child systematically measures himself against his peers. Accordingly, parents should guard against comparative statements.

Children are extremely sensitive about the matter of physical attractiveness and body characteristics. Suppose, for example, that Kelly hears this casual remark about her sister: "Lisa is sure going to be a gorgeous girl." The very fact that Kelly was not mentioned will probably establish the two girls as rivals. If there is a significant difference in beauty between the two, you can be assured that Kelly has already concluded, Yeah, I'm the ugly one. When her fears are confirmed by her parents, resentment and jealousy are generated.

The matter of intelligence is another sensitive nerve to be handled with care. It is not uncommon to hear parents say in front of their children, "I think the younger is actually brighter than his brother." Adults find it difficult to comprehend how powerful that kind of assessment can be in a child's mind.

Children (especially boys) . are extremely competitive with regard to athletic abilities. Those who are slower, weaker and less coordinated than their brothers are rarely able to accept "second best" with grace and dignity.



There was a time when women did not want the sun to hit their skin. They used bonnets to protect their faces, a much cheaper way than using sunscreen for continued use.

The bonnet we have at the museum can also be converted to an apron. The apron has three pockets that are stiff; this is the original brim of the bonnet. These pockets are used to hold clothespins to hand out clothes, another "almost past."

The waistband of the apron has drawstrings in it to convert it back to a bonnet. With the help of two buttons and buttonholes, you then have a bonnet.

I drew this pattern off, if anyone is interested in making one of their own. It's a very rough pattern, but any seamstress can make it work. I'll loan you my pattern and you can trace it off.

The bonnet/apron that we have at the museum belongs to Helen Boyd, chairman of the Museum Board. She had seen one that a lady had, liked it, and the lady made her one.

I asked Helen how you could keep the sun off your face and hang out clothes at the same time. Only kidding, Helen!

We now have a notebook with Spearman Family Newsletters in it. Wilma Francis, whose maiden name was Spearman, donated it to us. In the past, we have had people come to visit the museum whose last name was Spearman. This will be a great benefit for their research. Thanks Wilma!

If anyone has anything they would like to contribute to such a display, we would love to have it. Oslo and its' people are very important to Hansford County.
