Commissioners buy car

Copy editor The Hansford County Commissioners' Court accepted a bid on a new car for the sheriff's department at its Monday, Nov. 26 meeting.

Commissioners voted to accept the vehicle bid on a new Chevrolet, which was submitted by Gillaspie Auto & Truck Center of Spearman. Cost of the new car is \$12,709 with the trade-in of a 1987 Ford four-door, according to Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan. The dealership has the car in stock and the sheriff's department will take delivery of the vehicle soon, he

In other business, the commissioners' court reappointed two members to the Palo Duro River Authority for two-year terms. Robert Novak and Kenneth Evans were reappointed to the PDRA. Bonding of county officers was

also discussed by the commissioners. According to McClellan, Hansford County may be able to obtain higher bond coverage for county officers for the same fee which is currently being paid. The commissioners' court is investigating legalities which may be involved, he said, and is considering the possibility of increased bond

Official county holidays for calendar year 1991 were set by the commissioners' court. They include Jan. 1, New Year's Day; March 29, Easter (Good Friday); May 27, Memorial Day; July 4, In-dependence Day; Sept. 2, Labor Day; Nov. 11, Veterans' Day; Nov. 28 and 29, Thanksgiving; and Dec. 24 and 25, Christmas.

Regular business for the commissioners included reading and approval of minutes of the previous meeting, approval of the treasurer's report and payment of bills.

NPEC members receive refunds

Members of North Plains Electric Cooperative will receive smaller bills this month as a result of efforts made by Golden Spread Electric Cooperative to lower its wholesale power rates from Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

North Plains Electric manager Pat McAlister reports that beginn-ing with the October billing (mailed Nov. 1), a 10 percent reduction in wholesale power costs was applied to the members' bills.

This month (bills mailed Dec. 1), refunds in the amount of \$787,904.77 plus interest accrued, less administrative costs, will be refunded to the members of North Plains Electric Cooperative. The refund will be shown on the member's bill as a Power Cost Credit (Power Cost Cr.) In some instances, the credit amount will be larger than the amount of this month's bill and a credit balance will result.

SPS filed for wholesale power rate increases in 1984 and 1985 with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC); and subsequently, Golden Spread filed rate intervention procedures with FERC against SPS, charging that

excessive. As a result of the intervention procedures, SPS and Golden Spread have reached a settlement agreement resulting in the lower wholesale rate and refunds on power purchased by Golden Spread since Jan. 1, 1990.

The agreement also extends the contract between Golden Spread and SPS to Dec. 31, 2004, and permits Golden Spread to obtain a portion of its wholesale power supply from other sources beginning Jan.

McAlister commented that the Board of Directors of North Plains Electric are very pleased to be able to refund these amounts to the members. The 10 percent reduction in wholesale power costs is welcome at a time when other costs of living and doing business continue to rise.

Oil, gas production up

October's jobless rate down

Natural gas and crude oil production figures for the month of August in Hansford County were recently released by the Texas Railroad **Commission**

RRC figures show August natural gas production in Hansford County totaled 3,023,371 mcf (thousand cubic feet). Hansford County's crude oil production in August was reported to be 30,519 barrels.

Statewide, Texas crude oil production averaged 1,719,795 barrels daily in August, according to preliminary figures released by RRC Chairman Kent Hance.

This figure compares with preliminary July production of 1,699,325 barrels daily. August 1989 preliminary production was 1,755,463 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for August is 53,313,628 barrels, up from 447,945,688 barrels in July. August 1989 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 54,419,363 barrels. Hance said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary August production were: Andrews, 3,760,204 barrels; Gaines, 3,268,584 barrels; Yoakum, 3,054,562 barrels; Hockley, 2,655,475 barrels; Ector, 2,442,016 barrels; Crane, 1,712,862 barrels; Scurry, 1,108,512 barrels; and Kent, 1,054,338 barrels.

Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 448,113,163 mcf of gas in August, compared to the July gas production total of 447,945,688 mcf. August production was down three percent compared to August 1989 production of

August production were: Pecos, 26,362,993 mcf; Zapata, 19,739,955 mcf; Panola, 15,632,909 mcf; Hidalgo, 15,125,665 mcf; Crane, 12,234,172 mcf; Crockett, 10,210,450 mcf; Yoakum, 9,948,864 mcf; Hemphill, 8,630,626 mcf; and Ector, 8,255,570 mcf.

Hanstord County's October unemployment rate was 2.5 percent, according to figures announced by the Texas Employment Commission.

The TEC said Hansford County had a total civilian labor force of 3,985 persons in October. Of that number 3,887 persons were employed and 98 were jobless. Statewide, "The state of Texas had 80,000 fewer unemployed people seeking work in October," Com-missioner Mary Scott Nabers said. That fact caused a significant drop in the state's unemployment rate and we are looking at 5.3 percent for October - the lowest level we've been able to boast in several years," she said. "While the jobless statistic looks good, there are other economic indicators that are not too encouraging.'

"We would feel better," Nabers

said, "if there had been a corresponding increase in total employment but that did not occur." TEC analysts say there is a possibility that the current rate may understate actual unemployment. It is also probable that many jobseekers simply withdrew from the labor force.

The elections are over and the winners have been declared. The scene is set for the next round of battles in the state legislature. In my opinion the battle of Armageddon is about to begin. Two events give me reason to believe as I do.

First, the state's plan for financing public education has again been declared "unconstitutional" - on the grounds that some school districts have access to more resources than do others.

The other event is a study re-quired by the last legislature. Last month school districts across the state were required to send maps, written descriptions of their boundaries, and voting precincts to the Texas Education Agency. In a meeting with area superintendents, also last month, I asked Commissioner of Education, Dr. W.N. Kirby, the reason for the study. His answer was at first evasive: "It was ordered by the legislature."

"And why do you suppose they want the study?" I asked.

"Oh, I am sure they are going to run computer models to see how districts can be consolidated," was his reply.

My prediction is that to satisfy the court the legislature will try various ways to consolidate districts or districts' tax bases. Also, legislation will be introduced to limit how much a school district can spend on each child's education. Should such actions prevail, the net result will be the leveling down of quality of education in this state. This is to say that schools with enriched programs will have to eliminate them because they will



not be allowed to spend the money necessary to run them. All because other school districts do not have the same resources to have the same enriched programs. We will have "equality" at the expense of quality.

There will also be fewer school districts because many can not run their districts on the spending limits set by the state. It is possible that a county with several school districts will become one school district. The new district will have a reduced program. All this for the sake of "equity."

Power is being consolidated at the state level. An organization has been created by the legislature to control education. Its title is the "Legislative Education Board," known as the L.E.B. The L.E.B. is made up of the Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House, chairpersons of the House and Senate Education Committees, and their appointees. This board has oversight authority to approve the actions of the Com-missioner of Education and the State Board of Education. You may remember a few years back when the legislature wanted to appoint the State Board and the voters of the state said "No." Well, since the voters turned them down, the legislative leadership connived this plan and stripped the State Board of Education of most of its power. They did it in Senate Bill 1.

Unless the people of this state rise up in angry protest, education will be governed under a "take from the rich and give to the poor' policy; or as Karl Marx said, "From each according to his abili-






