Spearman shows pride with cleanup project

The Spearman Volunteer Fire Department, Sheriff's Department, Spearman Chamber of Commerce and the City of Spearman initiated a cleanup Spearman campaign. On Thursday evening inmates from the Hansford County Sheriff's Department and volunteer firemen put this plan to action by cleaning up Main Street.

Inmates pulled weeds from the side walks and the curbs, then a team of volunteer firemen, along with the new fire dog, would wash the weeds and trash into the street. The finishing touch to the cleanup was performed by the City of Spearman. According to City Manager Kelvin Knauf, the city ran the street sweeper Friday morning.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reported that Chamber Director Cindy Blackman and himself had gotten together and discussed the clean

up project before they put it into action.

He added that the sheriff's department still has an inmate working on the old vacant lot between Gordon's Drug and Interstate Savings & Loan.

"It seems like we have let the trash and weeds get out of hand this summer," Blackman exclaimed. "We need to make a good impression on people driving through town and those people who have come to Spearman to shop."

Knauf agreed that there has been a problem with the weed control this year. He stated that the city will be sending out letters on the subject next week. "We've had a lot of comments about high weeds. We need to get after the weeds," he concluded.

Blackman urges, "Let's all make a special effort to clean up and make Spearman someplace special again."

City of Spearman requests additional fees approval from TML

During the regular meeting held Wednesday, Aug. 18, the City of Spearman adopted resolution #5-93 which asks the Texas Municipal League (TML) to allow the city to add a fee up to \$2 to the utility bills.

According to City Manager Kelvin Knauf the fee would be used to pay for public improvement such as city parks, support the library or fund economic development. He added that the resolution, which proposes a constitutional amendment to allow cities to add the fee, will be discussed at the TML Annual Conference in November.

Another resolution, #4-93, was also adopted by the council. According to Knauf, This resolution urges TML to ask the legislature to rebate at least one percent of the sales of Lottery Tickets to cities to provide economic development funds. He explained that currently

cities are not benefiting directly from the sale of Lottery Tickets.

In other business, the council heard a request from Mr. Claude and Jonelle Sheets, and Mr. Ed Haner to change the commercial sewer charges, especially for churches. These sewer rates are charged depending upon the amount of water used.

C. Sheets explained that the Church of Christ does not have a meter specifically for watering, thus when the church waters the lawn their sewer charges increase. It was added that the installation of a separate meter for yard would be expensive since the line runs under a cement driveway.

Haner also stated that the First Christian Church does not have a separate meter either. He agreed that the rate should be changed.

Citizens were appointed to the Charitable Solicitation Board and Housing Board. Kyle Henderson was appointed to replace a one-

year unexpired term on the Charitable Solicitation Board, while Anne Snow was appointed to a two-year term on the Housing Board.

The city approved the agreements with Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree Counties for fire protection and rescue services from October 1, 1993 through September 30, 1994. Knauf stated that the agreements with the counties were the same as last year.

The Hansford County Appraisal District's 1993-94 Budget was tabled until the next meeting.

In regular business, the council approved the minutes from the regular and special meetings, the monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports for July, and the revenue and expense report for July.

Payment of monthly bills in the amount of \$152,096.76 and the current cash position were also approved by the council.

Hansford County Commissioner's Court adopts budget, sets tax rate

The Hansford County Commissioner's Court adopted the 1993-94 budget and set the tax rate during their regular meeting held Monday, Aug. 23.

According to County Judge Jim Brown, the budget was approved for \$2,213,890. He reported that this budget increased by approximately \$83,000 from the 1992-93 budget.

For the tax rate, the commissioners approved setting the rate at .3906 for 1993-94, Judge Brown said. He added that this was an increase of .0086 from the .382 tax rate set for 1992-93.

In other business, the commissioners approved paying state mileage rates for out-of-county travel. Brown explained that Hansford County's mileage rate will correspond with that set by the state. The states current mileage rate is 27.5¢ a mile, Brown said.

The court then excepted a declaration of dedication in Precinct #3, Kent Guthrie's precinct. According to Brown, the legal description the dedication was as follows: "The west 33 ft. of the north half of section 250, Block 2 GH&HRR Co. Hansford County, TX." Brown explained that it means that there was a dedication of a county road 1/2 mile long and 33 feet wide.

A road easement for Alford Bayless was approved in Precinct #4, Val Winger's precinct. The road easement for Southwest Bell Telephone Co. in Precinct #4 was tabled. More information was requested, Brown said. He added that it will be heard at the September 13 meeting.

In regular business, the commissioners approved the minutes from the previous meeting, the treasurer's report and investments, and the payment of bills for the period.

Brown reported that the court held the 1994 Budget Hearing, but no citizens were present.

Amending the 1992-93 budget was also tabled until the September 13 meeting.

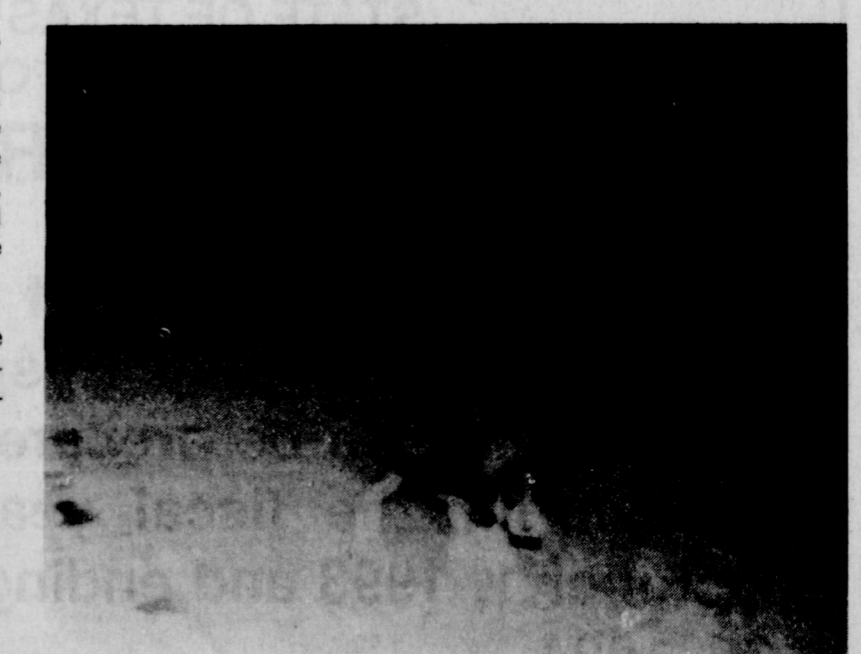

Voters in the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. are being ask to cast their ballots approving the board's decision to send approximately \$354,000 to Gruver I.S.D. and Spearman I.S.D. in compliance with Senate Bill 7, according to Superintendent Beryl Sears.

from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 11, at the Pringle-Morse School, 100 Fifth Street, Morse, Texas.

Applications for ballots by mail must be mailed to Paige Speck, Box 109, Morse, Texas 79062. These applications must be received no later than the close of business on Friday, Sept. 3.

Sears explained that the state has deemed Pringle-Morse as one of Texas' property wealthy school districts. Therefore, the district has been required by the state to meet the new finance requirements of Senate Bill 7.

Senate Bill 7 gives the district five options to reduce the district's wealth. These options are to con-

solidate with a poor district, detach commercial property to another district, purchase attendance credits from the state, contract with another district or consolidate tax bases with other districts.

According to Sears, "Senate Bill 7 requires school districts with property wealth above \$280,000 per weighted average daily attendance (WADA) to reduce the district's wealth. Pringle-Morse's property wealth per WADA is \$492,249."

He concluded by saying, "The members of the Pringle-Morse community expressed their desire to distribute the district's excess wealth to the schools in Hansford County. The plan proposed by Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. accomplishes this goal."

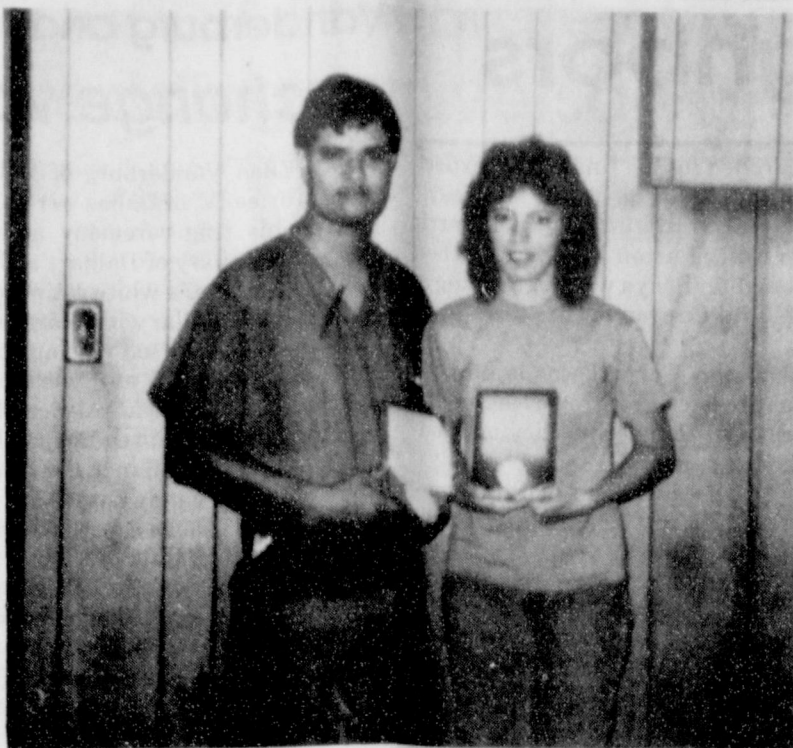

Farmers Home Administration reviews portfolio of borrowers

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) continues to review its portfolio for possible graduation of borrowers to private credit. FmHA credit programs are administered in a manner that will assure that they will not supplant or compete with credit available to entities from other reliable credit sources.

Nationwide, and on an annual basis, FmHA reviews its loan portfolio to determine those borrowers who have progressed to the point that they no longer need government assistance to obtain credit. These reviews are currently being conducted by the local FmHA offices.

Some of the considerations taken during these reviews are the borrower's present and potential income to meet the rates, terms loan fees and conditions of other credit, as well as the impact graduation would have on typical user costs.

FmHA borrowers may be contacted to furnish information and to also contact area lenders to ascertain their ability to move their loan to private credit. Borrowers are encouraged to work closely with FmHA personnel during the graduation review process in order to comply with this requirement.

SELECTING THE BEST NUTRITION WHEN EATING OUT

It is estimated that Americans will spend \$236.5 billion while eating out this year, but how will they know which meals are more nutritious?

The average American eats out 3.8 meals per week or 198 meals per year, according to 1993 National Restaurant Association Foodservice Industry Forecast figures. Also, Americans are purchasing more take-out foods to eat off premises of the restaurant.

So, knowledge of factors such as ingredients and preparation methods are still essential in making healthier choices. Also, if you are on a special diet such as a diabetes diet or just want to eat healthfully, knowledge about serving size from each of the six food groups--breads, vegetables, fruits, meat, milk and fats--is essential.

Many of the restaurants are offering heart-healthy choices designated by a heart on the menu. These foods are low in fat, saturated fatty acids, cholesterol, sugar and sodium. Some of the fast-food

restaurants are offering information about the nutritive value, including carbohydrate, protein, fat, calories, sodium and cholesterol content of the food items on the menus. Many restaurants are even providing nutrition education bulletins on topics such as the dietary guidelines, healthy eating tips as well as selection of healthier food choices just to attract customers.

Skills and strategies for teaching clients to eat away from home are listed below:

- Develop healthful mind set and a can-do attitude.
- Determine frequency of eating out--how often, where, when and what's ordered.
- Balance higher-calorie restaurant food with lower-calorie choices the rest of day and exercise.
- Preplan for what you will eat before eating out.
- Ask the server about preparation methods, ingredients used and added fat.

- Ask about portion size.
- Make special requests such as a luncheon portion for a dinner meal. Or, ask for a doggie bag to take extra food not eaten home.
- Enjoy the non-food pleasantries of restaurant dining.
- Remember, alcohol provides extra calories, plus increases your appetite. So, if you are trying to control your caloric intake, then select either tea, coffee, water, skim milk or juice.

RICHMOND, Va.--Mr. and Mrs. Wirt E. Davis Jr. were among 45 people named missionaries by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board Aug. 17 at Liberty Baptist Church in Hampton, Va.

The Davises will live in Panama, where he will start and develop churches and they will be involved in a variety of outreach ministries.

They attend Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, and he is pastor of Southcrest Baptist Mission, sponsored by Gambrell Street Baptist Church in Fort Worth, where they are members. He also is the computer service desk coordinator for Halliburton Co. in Arlington.

Although Davis was born in Borger and grew up in Dial and Stinnett; he considers Gruver his hometown and the First Baptist Church there his home church. He is the son of Pearl Davis of Mineral Wells and the late Wirt Davis. Ken Caryl Baptist Church in Littleton, Colo., also was influential in his Christian growth.

He received the bachelor of arts degree from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, and the master of divinity degree from Southwestern seminary. He is working toward the doctor of philosophy degree at Southwestern seminary.

He has been the owner and operator of Davis and Davis Petroleum Co. in Spearman, and regional manager for Halliburton Co. in Denver, Colo. He made mission trips to Costa Rica and Brazil.

Mrs. Davis, the former Linda Gillispie, was also born in Borger.

For The Sshort Of It

A couple of notes for you trivia fans. Over the last 40 years, the Gruver Greyhounds are 26-14 in season openers. That is a percentage of .650. The Hounds have won their past two season openers, last year under Doug Frick 22-14 at Wheeler, and in 1991 under Barry Haenisch 24-0 at Texhoma. In 1990 under Dave Steele they lost their season opener here in Gruver to Texhoma 7-6, as they scored a "Hail Mary" pass on the last play of the game, went for two and were unsuccessful.

The Hounds overall record over those 40 years is 195-193-7 .503.

Their all-time leading coach, in winning percentage, is Bill Mayfield, 1966-69, 30-12-1 .709. He led the Hounds to two district championships in four years. Second is Leon "Corky" Chapman, 1956-65, 63-38-1 .623. He led the Hounds to three district championships in 10 years.

If you're wondering which team the Hounds have beat up on the most, with a minimum of 10 games played - well, that is the Claude Mustangs. In 13 games against Claude, they are 10-3 .769. In 19 games against Booker's Kiowas, they are 14-4-1 .750. Against Clarendon, they are also .750, 9-3-0. Their worst records are against the White Deer Bucks, 10-20 .333; the Canadian Wildcats 6-11-2 .361; and West Texas Comanches, formerly the Stinnett Raiders, 11-19-1 .361. They play White Deer and West Texas this year.

Their biggest victories were over Claude, 66-0, in 1965; over Lefors, 58-0, in 1984; over Follett, 57-0, in 1969; over Panhandle, 63-8, in 1965; over Amarillo Alamo Catholic, 54-0, in 1967; over Amarillo Alamo Catholic, 50-0, in 1986; and over Boise City, 50-0, in 1992. Their worst defeats were to Canadian in 1973, 74-0; to West Texas in 1987, 71-0; and to White Deer in 1971, 62-0.

And what were the greatest seasons in GHS football history? Glad you asked. This is subjective, so if you don't agree with me...tough!

1. 1946. The Hounds finished with a perfect 10-0-0 record in Class C Six Man football. They went as far as they could go, beating Farwell 37-18 for the regional championship, at Farwell. There were three unbeaten teams in the state, but they didn't play each other. Lawrence Brotherton was the coach. Team members were Billy L. McClellan (who lives north of

Sunray now) - QB, Gordon Gross-HB, Raymond Wallin-C, Billy Ed Vernon-FB, "Hootie" Cline-DB, Elmo Dahl-FB, H.M. Frazier-E, Eldon Bayless-E, Donnie Fletcher-backfield, and Bob Cluck-E. That is 10 - Here are some others: Buddy Lowe - Jr.; C.A. Davis - sophomore center, and B.J. Renner, another soph; and freshmen F.W. Thomas, Don Williams, Marvin Andrews, and Alvin Kauffman. That makes 17. Readers: be sure and let me know if someone has been omitted. My thanks to Billy McClellan and Elmo Dahl for their memories.

2. 1961. The Hounds started the season 11-0-0 in district 1-A, before losing to Kress in the regional game, in an especially tough loss, 22-19. Corky Chapman was the coach. The quarterback and one of three captains was Roger Vernon, with Ronnie Riley at fullback. Others - D.A. Cator-T, also a captain; Curtis Harris-E, also a captain; Francis "Pete" Shapley-HB, Doyle Sturman-HB, Tony Shapley-C, Tommy Lowry-T (He broke his leg late in the season), Tom Hale-T, Ronnie Ward-G, Wes Eddleman-SE, and Gary Winkler-G. Also a member of this fine team was "Spunky" Smith, Peggy Frick's brother, who played halfback, and filled in often. That's 13, and should include the starters. An added couple of notes - two players, Frank Pittman and Larry Kelly moved to Gruver from Morse their senior year, and were ineligible to play. They were the team managers. Also, three members of the team are deceased at rather young ages - Ronnie Riley, Pete Shapley and Spunky Smith - my sincere apologies to anyone who is left out. Let me know. My thanks to D.A. Cator and Tony Shapley for their memories.

3. 1984. The Hounds finished 9-4-0 in district 1-A, and won two playoff games, over Sundown 21-0 and Archer City 17-14, before losing to Munday in the quarter finals. The coach was Barry Haenisch. The big reason this team is number 3, is that it had been 16 years, since 1968, that the Hounds had failed to make the playoffs. Also, they were such a surprise, that they end up number three. Number three and number four were close. Team members were Chad Logsdon-QB, Rod Been-HB, Greg Haight-FB, Jack Rodman-TB (they ran the Wishbone), Trevor Williams-C, Cliff Barkley-Line, Jeff Bonham-Line, Brad Hobbs-Line, Justin Finney-Line, Steven Fry-TE,

Scott Tout-WR, and Craig Cooper-WR. That is 12. Please let me know if there are omissions to this first team. My thanks to Chad Logsdon for his memories.

4. 1968. The Hounds, under Bill Mayfield in district 1-A, were the bi-district champs, beating Wheeler 20-7. They finished the season 9-3-0, and were finally beaten by Sudan, 20-14 in a tough loss. Ken Jones was the QB, and Mike McLain was the all-state tackle. Others - Chuck Clawson-HB, Tommy Henson-FB, Dean Bayless-HB, Mike Riley-G, Mack Blankenship-LG/G, Alfred Ralston-NG, Kim Cluck-E, Jerry Bayless-TE, Danny Henson-DB, Tommy Salzman-T, Gary Gumfory-T, Larry Gumfory-WR, Tommy Boone-DE, Mike Byrd-DB, Norman Butts-C, and Dwight Gillispie-SE. That is 18. A couple of notes - Sonora beat Sudan for the state championship, and the Sudan coach told Bill Mayfield that Gruver could have beaten Sonora. Also, on the punt return that beat Gruver for Sudan, the referee had his hand on the flag for a clip, but didn't throw it. My thanks to Ken Jones and to Mike McLain for their memories. My sincere apologies if someone has been overlooked, let me know.

5. 1953. The Hounds only winless season, as they finished 0-10-0 under Joe Ogden.

So much for the trivia.

A noteworthy item. Two former Gruverites competed against the Hounds this past week at Canadian. Quarterback Steven Flowers and running back Kevin Flowers now reside with their family (Their dad is coach David Flowers) in Canadian, and coach Doug Frick of the Hounds commented, "Kevin and Steven Flowers had a good scrimmage against us. I look for Canadian to fight it out with Clarendon for the district 2-2A title."

The Hounds would be that much better if the Flowers family had not gone back to Canadian...

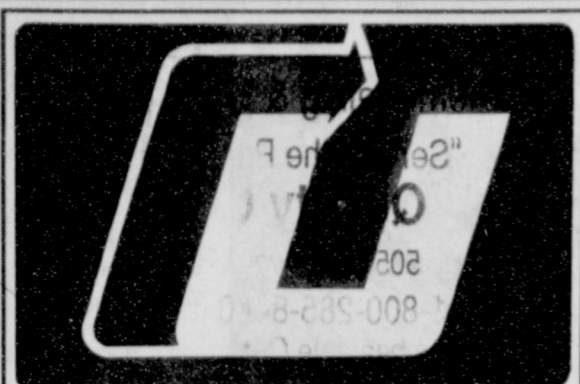

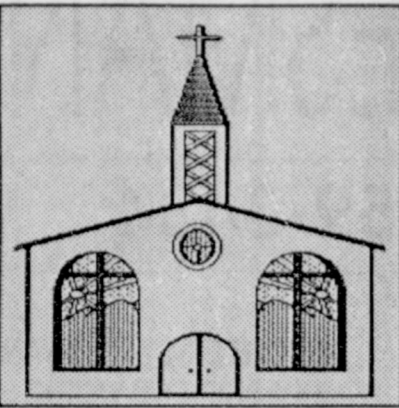
