LUBRICITY NOT THE CULPRIT IN DIESEL ENGINE PROBLEMS

PERRYTON, Texas - The lubricity of premium diesel fuels does not appear to be the cause of most of the recently-reported diesel engine malfunctions, according to Farmland Industries petroleum laboratory technicians.

Marc Siebert, manager of Farmland's technical services laboratory in Kansas City, said the reduced aromatic content of some of the new lower-sulfur diesel fuels may instead be the main culprit.

Since the introduction of lowersulfer diesel, truck operators have encountered numerous leaks of diesl fuel from the engine injection pump. Mechanical inspections have found that the throttle shaft o-rings shrank after contact with the new fuel.

"We think that most of the oring failures on throttle shafts are being caused by the slightly lower aromatic content of some of the low-sulfur diesel fuels, not by lower-levels of lubricity," said

Lubricity, or slipperiness, is a natural quality of diesel fuel, and it helps protect injector pumps and parts from wear and deterioration. Aromatics are an inherent hydrocarbon chemical component of diesel fuels.

Both of these components of diesel were reduced this fall when refiners started manufacturing low-sulfur diesel fuels to comply with the federal Clean Air Act.

O-rings were originally designed to swell after contact with the traditional higher sulfur die-

sel to provide a complete seal.

Jim Turner, sales manager at Perryton Equity, the local Farmland co-op said Farmland's lowsulfur Ruby Premium Diesel has a special lubricity additive which provides protection against metalto-metal wear.

"Ruby Premium Diesel provides an adequate amount of lubricity protection for injector pumps," Turner said. "However, the entire refining industry is hustling to determine a solution to the problem of shrinking o-rings.'

Siebert said one solution may be to replace the older o-rings with newer rings.

'Most of the complaints we've heard have occured in trucks with over 300,000 miles," he said. "This leads us to believe that newer o-rings, even if made from the same material, are not so susceptible to shrinkage and deterioriation.'

Fuel marketers first heard of the leaking o-ring problem soon after refiners began delivering the new low-sulfur diesel fuels shortly before the October 1st deadline for meeting the standards of the Clean Air Act.

The Act, originally passed in 1990, mandated a 90 percent reduction in the sulfur content of diesel fuels to be used in on-highway travel. Off-highway applications such as trains, tractors, and irrigation pumps may use either the traditional higher-sulfur fuel or the new low-sulfur

PPRA expresses concerns on declining oil prices

Royalty Owners Association is convinced that the continuing decline in crude oil prices is dangerous to the Texas Panhandle oil and gas industry. It also threatens the financial base of the communities supported by oil and gas revenues. Over the last month, crude prices have not risen above the \$17 level, making it hard to justify new explo-

Left unchecked, the continuing slide in prices could mean massive premature abandonment of lowvolume 'stripper' oil wells throughout the region. A typical 'stripper' well produces less than 10 barrels of crude a day. There are approximately 10,000 such wells in the Panhandle.

The longer the low prices hold out, the more danger there is of having to abandon many of those wells. Once they're taken off line, it's doubtful they'll ever be reopened. It just doesn't make good economic

All wells, regardless of their daily yield, cost an average of \$500,000 to drill. The majority of the drilling operations result in dry holes. As a result, oil and gas exploration is the globe.

tures in our economy.

The key to the decline in the domestic industry is cheap foreign oil. Over 40 percent of the crude oil we use comes from outside the U.S.; mostly from the Middle East. The superabundance of oil in that region is the reason we're paying so little for gasoline here in the U.S. Many wells in the Persian Gulf produce thousands of barrels a day. It's almost impossible for domestic producers to compete on that scale.

One reason we can't compete is because we and our fellow motorists are subsidizing our competitors, the Saudis and the Kuwaitis. The American consumer guarantees Middle East production and export by providing free security services from the U.S. Navy, Army and Air Force. If the costs of maintaining those forces is factored into the per-barrel cost, then we are really paying about \$80 a barrel.

The PPROA urges Citizens of the Panhandle to carefully examine these issues as they continue to enjoy the cheapest gasoline in the world, imported from one of the most politically unstable spots on

Survivors include a daughter, Freddie Largent of Spearman; a sister, Mammie Williams of Irving; two granddaughters; and six greatgrandchildren.

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
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
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
