Voters head to polls for General Election May 7

Hansford County voters will be heading to the polls on Saturday, May 7 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to cast their ballot in the General Election.

Individuals voting for the two places on Pringle-Morse CISD school board will cast their ballot at the Pringle-Morse School located at 100 Fifth Street, Morse. Nine individuals took advantage of the early voting period to cast their ballots for school board. Those individuals running for this position are incumbent Ron Womble, Lonnie Clemons, Lovida Giblin, Monty Dickson and Kerry Phillips.

Voters wanting to cast their ballot in the race for the Gruver ISD board need to go to the Gruver Elementary Library, 405 Garrett Street. Ten people voted in the early voting by personal appearance. Incumbent Linda Venneman and Mike Yanke are the two names on the ballot for the two seats.

The Spearman ISD holding their election at 403 East 11th Street. The candidates running for the two three-year terms are Sheri Benton,

incumbent James Schnell and incumbent Kerry Henton. Craig Schumann is running for the one-year unexpired term.

Some city positions are also being elected.

In the City of Spearman there are three positions up for reelection. Those wishing to cast their votes for these positions need to go to the Spearman High School. This is for precincts 1, 5 and 6. Mayor Burl Buchanan and alderman Donald E. Reed and Charles Elliott are all up for reelection. It was reported that four individuals took advantage of the early voting held April 18 through May 3.

At the City of Gruver there is one position up for election. This is the city commissioner's seat. Buster Davis is running for reelection to the position. Those wanting to cast their vote in this election need to report to the Gruver Elementary School Building, 405 Garrett. There were ten people reported to have voted early.

Grand jury indicts nine

The Hansford County grand jury handed down nine indictments on Thursday, April 28.

Karie Lee Sparks was indicted on a theft by appropriation offense. This was said to have occurred around January 20, 1994.

Charles Hubert Smith was indicted on one account of aggravated assault of a peace officer. The incident occurred January 18, 1994, when Smith allegedly threatened an officer.

Shannon Doyle Davis was indicted on a charge of indecency with a child. This incident was to have occurred on November 8, 1993.

Roberto Torres, Jr. was also indicted on a charge of indecency with a child. The alleged incident was to have taken place on April 2, 1994, with an individual under 17 years of age.

Andrew David Cole was indicted on one count of theft by appropriation. In this incident, which occurred on June 7, 1993, it is alleged emus were stolen by Cole.

John Eldon Antalek, Aaron Keith Dickman, Jeremy Douglas and Walter William Porter III (Trey) were indicted on one count of burglary of a building. These individuals allegedly entered an establishment when it was not open to the public on March 1.

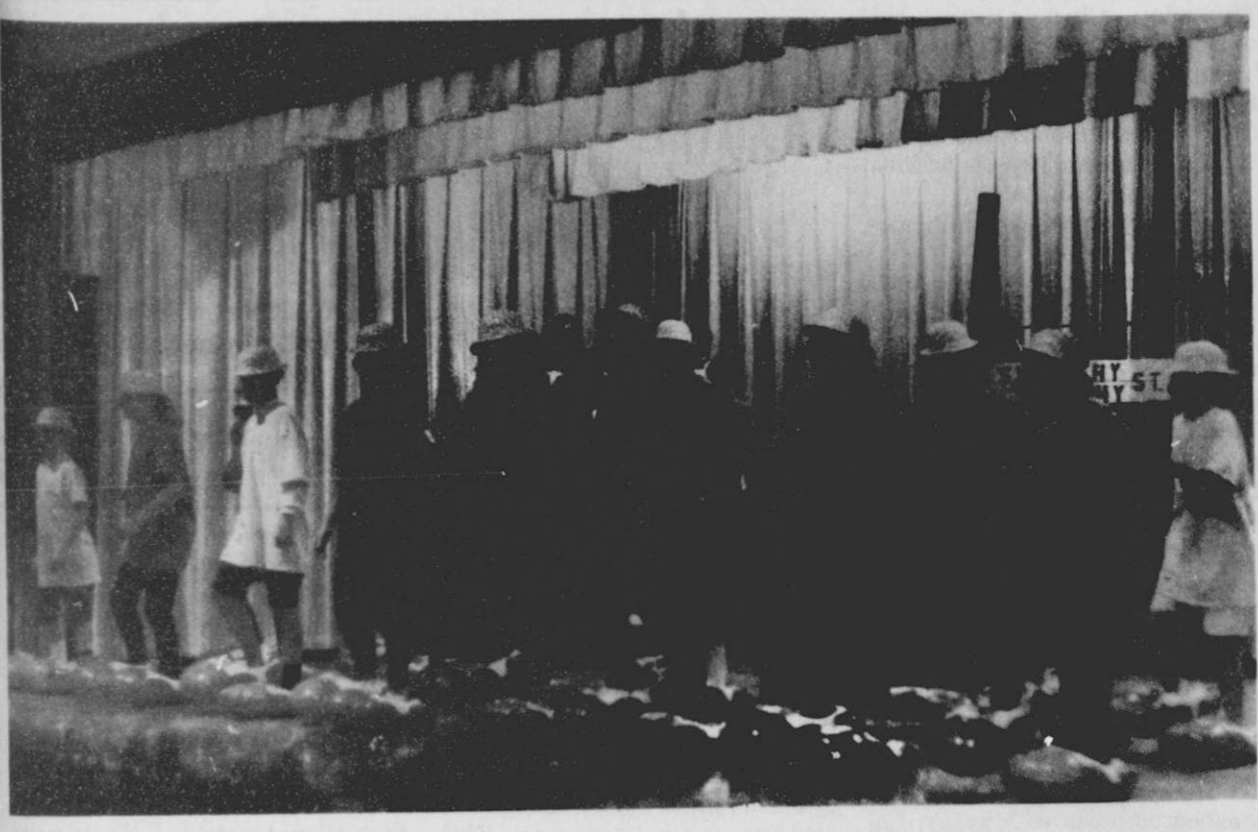
Texas Railroad Commission Releases oil and gas stats

The Texas Railroad Commission has released oil and gas production figures for the month of January 1994 in Hansford County. Total gas production for the month was reported at 3,158,899 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) and crude oil production at 31,856 barrels.

The Commission issued a total of 1,125 drilling permits in March compared to 1,045 in March 1993. The March total included 605 permits to drill new oil and gas tests,

41 to re-enter existing well bores, 38 to deepen existing holes, 205 to plugback existing holes, and 76 for other wells. March amended drilling permits totaled 160.

Total drilling permits issued in 1994 year-to-date in 3,005, an eight percent increase from the 2,761 issued during the same period of 1993. Permits issued in March included 349 oil, 273 gas, 490 oil and gas, three injection, nine disposal, and one other permits.

Cody Cazares

Presents crime and violence program

It is recorded throughout history that the great leaders of our country had vision. This is the same quality held by Gruver Eighth Grader Cody Cazares. He had a vision and acted upon it.

This vision came to light on Thursday, April 21 at 12:30 p.m. in the Gruver High School Auditorium for students in the fifth through the eighth grade. The program was on crime and violence.

It all began in early January. He

was noticing a lot of violence in the news and wanted to prevent that from happening in Gruver. So, he approached the junior high principal, Mrs. Laura Blassingame, about doing a program.

When asked what his inspiration was for the program, Cody replied without hesitation that it was Coach Tim Garland. "He teaches us we learn from each other. So I thought if I did it (the program) they would pay more attention," he stated.

But getting the program organized was not easy. "I had to contact different people for information and to invite them to speak at the program," Cody stated. Speakers for the program were David Rosser, Gruver Police Chief; Richard Murrey, a recovering alcoholic; Nelle Evans, Hansford and Ochiltree County Probation Officer; and Kari King of Channel 10.

"What I wanted to do in the program was let students know what leads to crime and what happens after the crime is committed," Cody stated. Rosser and Evans spoke on their jobs and the juvenile legal system. He added that King touched on the media and how they decide what is newsworthy. She also explained how sometimes incidents get blown out of proportion.

King also read statements from U.S. Representative Bill Sarpaluis

and State Senator Teel Bivins.

So how did this eighth grade student get the idea for the program? He replied, "We learn from each other. Kids need to take a bigger roll. We can be heard and we are the future. It is time we take the responsibility to change things."

Since January Cody has spent every ounce of his spare time working on this project, weekends too. "Every chance I got I'd work on it."

The feedback from the program has really surprised Cody. "They really liked it," he said, "It informed them on the legal system and many stated that they were glad they were informed on the laws."

Not only did Cody follow his vision, he also helped the school take their first step in preventing crime. "We took our first step in preventing crime in the Gruver School District by signing a contract to keep the school gun free," Cody reported, "I was the first to sign, but after the program contracts were passed out for the students to sign."

This step not only involves the students and the principal, it also gets the parents involved. In the contract they acknowledge their responsibility in teaching the teenagers about the danger and consequences of guns and weapons.

What began as a vision has now been made into reality by Cody Cazares.

Pringle-Morse CISD recognized for Outstanding Safety Program

Mr. Beryl Sears, Superintendent of the Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District was recently honored for outstanding employee safety by the North Texas Educational Insurance Association at its annual meeting conducted in Austin. 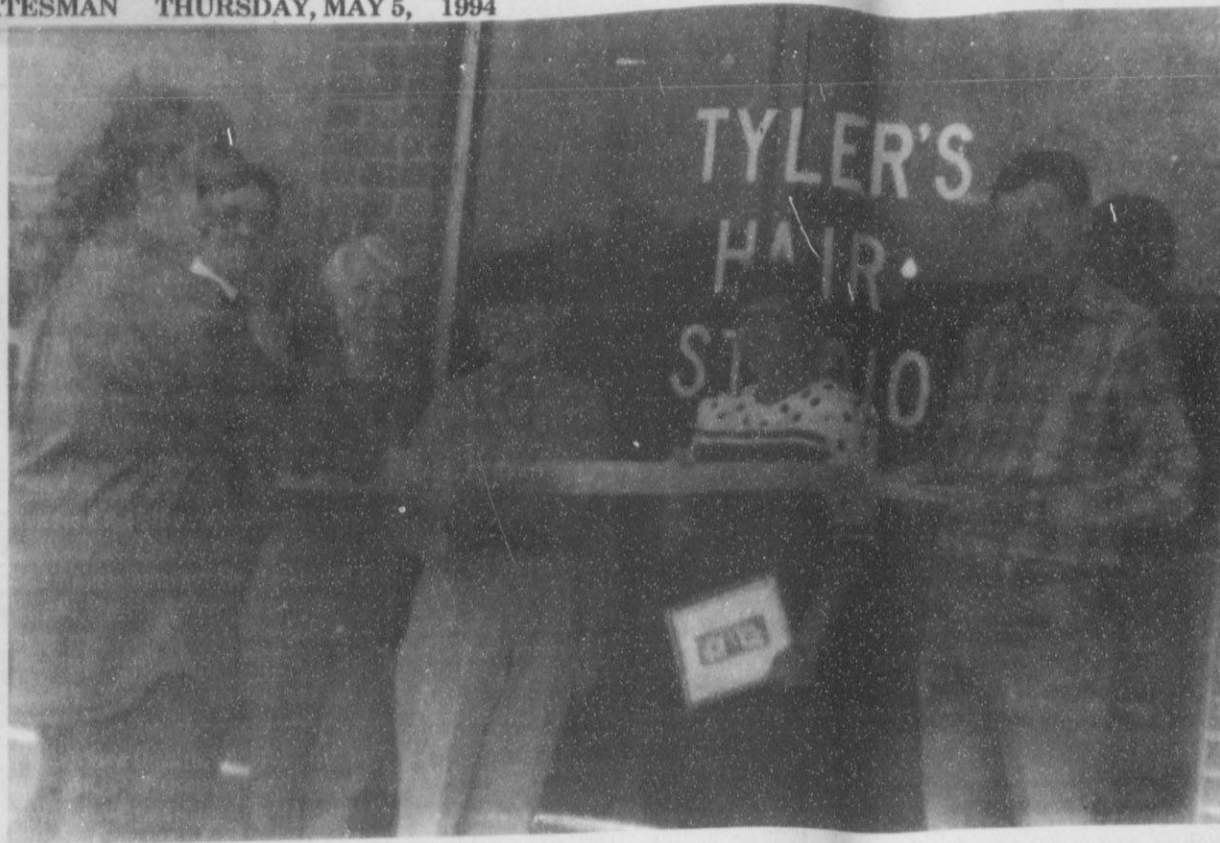

I am writing this letter in response to "A Letter to the Editor" a Ms. Patsy Furno wrote on 4-12-94 week's paper.

First, please let me state that I usually don't do something like this, but Ms. Furno's letter made me see "Red" and I felt I had to write this not only for myself, but for my family and for Spearman, that has been home to us for 16 1/2 years. This letter is for all the wonderful caring people that "do" make up this town. I have chronic, no remission MS, plus I also have chronic Leukemia and have been totally deaf since age of nine years due to the nerves in my ears being totally destroyed due to a drug taken when I was nine. So please believe me, I know first hand all the hardships that go along with a severe and fatal illness! I know the pain of seeing my family hurt and suffer having to see their wife and mother in such pain; I know the terrible physical pain of hurting; and I know the burden of knowing I have caused my family to face the financial situation. But, I and my family have never ever; nor will we, ask for money help or "hand-outs" from anyone. I may have to ask for blood donors for platelet transfusions as I have a very rare type; but never money! Sometimes, Ms. Furno, "money" isn't everything. I have received so many prayer grams I've lost all count - hundreds of them and each one brought tears to my eyes and each person that wrote and writes is very special and gave and gives of themselves. I've had the love of people and that means more to me than any amount of donation. This town is made up of caring people - I could name hundreds; some I do want to especially name are; Mary and J.L. Brock, they are two of the most caring people I have ever known. They have always offered moral support and love. The names could fill this paper! Wayne Cope - she has helped me so much; when I hurt bad I just go to her and lie on her sofa and she is always there for me and just listens. The Days, June and Bill; the Smiths, Rick and Sandee; everyone of my sons classmates and families - all the football boys and their families - my daughter's friends. I'm rich beyond words or money!
 "Yes", I know the medical bills are "unreal"!! But, the utility people

all have been simply wonderful about working with us - all we had to do was tell them the situation.

There were ways you could have gone about "help" without a hand-out and feeling so "bitter" about Spearman and "angry" about it. Anyone here at the medical center would have taken you all for the treatment. I know because so many have offered to drive and take me.

This is a caring town. Sure it's made up of a few that aren't, just like anywhere else - but the big majority are great people. Maybe your "attitude" has a lot to do with "Why". You don't seem to have many friends from the tone of your letter. Friendship is the greatest thing a person can ever offer and have in life - no amount of money can buy friendship. But, to have a friend you have to like people and be a friend. By the way, my mom, like your boyfriend, has face cancer and

has had her face practically cut and burned half off a dozen times - but she's very upbeat about it and never complains.

I sincerely and truly hope your boyfriend will be fine and does OK. I live a day to day basis with MS and Leukemia; but I am so thankful for every single minute I have left with my family and my friends. "Spearman", "Thank You" for caring. I do not even "know" the lady that wrote that letter, but I apologize for it and her. Ms. Furno, if you are so unhappy here - there are plenty of other towns to move to. One last thought: No one is ever "obligated" to help anyone: if they do help that's wonderful - but no person is "obligated". And, by the way, I live at 1006 Evans and am always home. Thank You.

Their call is dove like, usually six to eight notes. Sometimes they make a strong clattering sound. The nests are usually well-hidden sticks either in bushes or low trees. The nests can be seen by careful nature lovers.

Miscellaneous Happenings Around the Town

The swimming pool will open for the season on May 29. The pool employees this year are: Pool Manager - Jerry Bass; Assistant Pool Manager - Michelle Garnett; Lifeguards - Chad Wilkerson, Kara Faries, Chayci Shaver and Carrie Pearson; Part-time Lifeguards - Crystal Boyd and Kara Townsen. The fees for the pool will remain the same as last year. Family passes are available and can be bought either at City Hall or at the swimming pool.

The sewer plant project has been awarded and the contractor will start work on May 9. The contractor estimates that it will take 210 working days to complete the project.

Recent improvements to the city include the construction of Holton Park and Blodgett Park. Holton Park is located at B. Avenue and Endicott Street; Blodgett Park is located across from the high school tennis courts. Other improvements include the placing of soccer goals on city-owned property south of the dog pound. Incidentally, volleyball nets can be checked out from the police department. These nets will fit the volleyball goals at Holton Park and Swimming Pool Park. In

the next few weeks, the City plans to turn the volleyball court at City Hall into a beach volleyball court. The Palo Duro River Authority is giving us the sand for the beach volleyball court.

The cracks in the airport parking apron and runway will be filled as soon as warm weather is here to stay.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission has informed us that we can no longer take any kind of used oil filter in the landfill. C.E.G. Industries in Borger is one location for disposing of used oil filters.

This month, the City Council will be deciding what to do with the old Activity Center building. If you have any ideas, let me know.

Plans are being made for Lakefest '94. Non-Profit organizations and other interested parties will be getting information in the next few weeks.

Finally, the Mayor, the City Manager and the City's attorney will meet with Texas-New Mexico Power Company officials on May 10 to discuss the electric franchise. The meeting will be held in Fort Worth at TNP headquarters.

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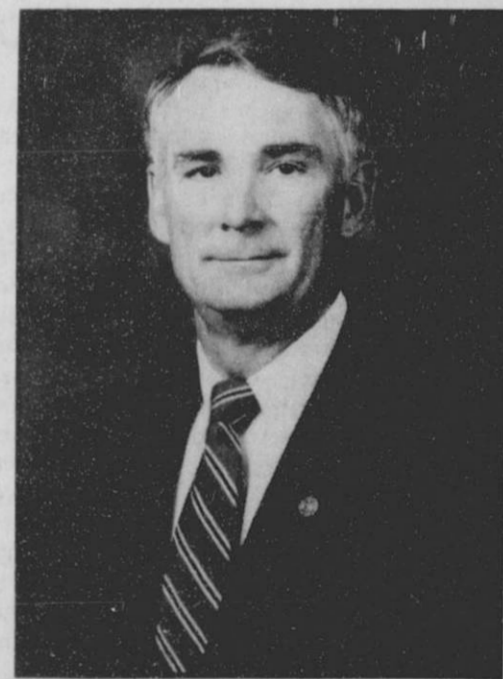

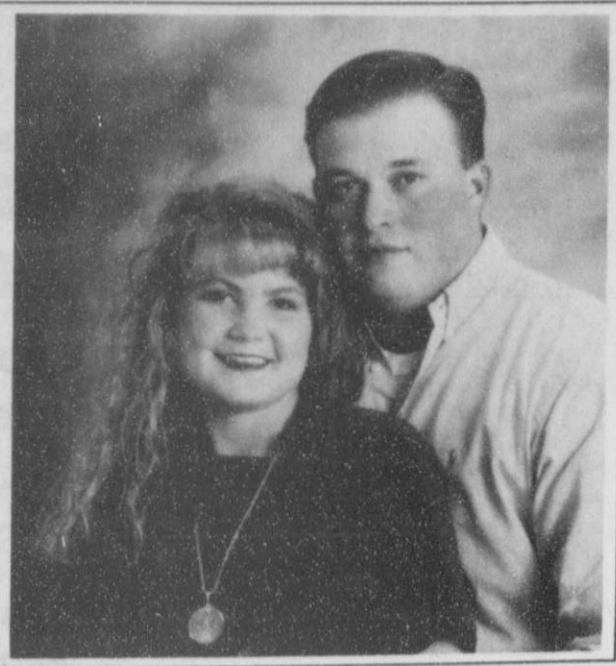

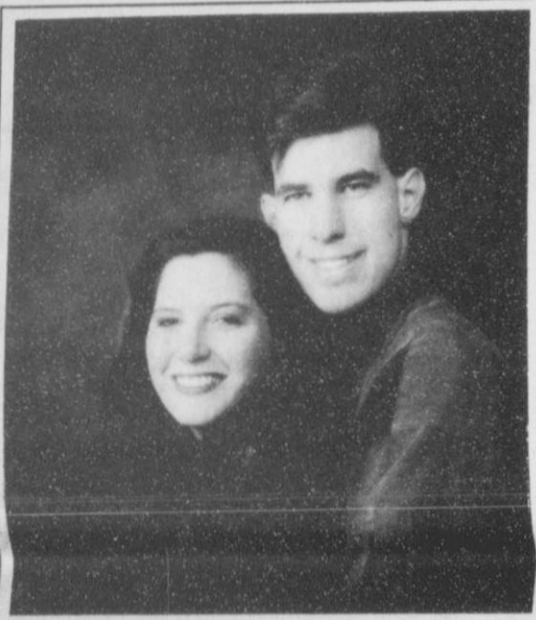

arthritic hand on April 12. It was performed at the Amarillo Surgery Center. She has had arthritis since 1966 and is hopeful that at least the hand will be functional.

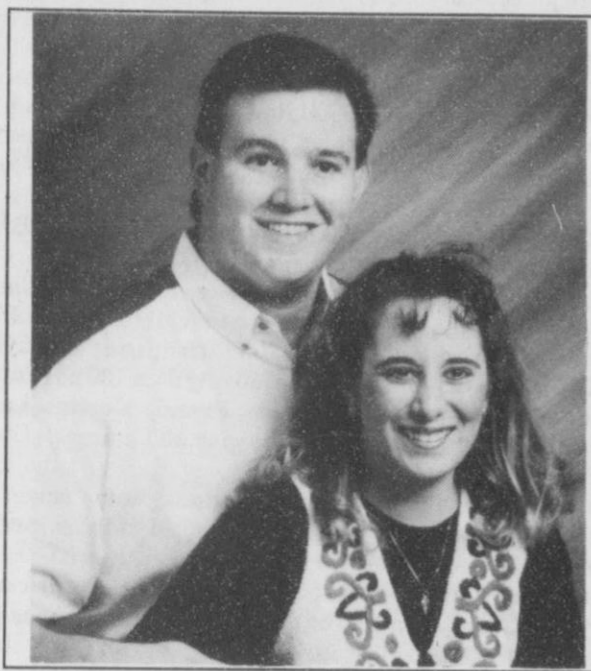

Hansford County 4-H Livestock Judging teams win awards at districts

The Hansford County 4-H Senior Livestock Judging Team has qualified for the state competition in June at College Station. According to Coach Bret Burgin this is the second year in a row and the third time in the last four years that the Hansford County 4-H Senior Judging team has qualified for the competition.

"We'll go down and try to represent the panhandle teams well," Burgin said, "Normally they don't do well and we're going to try to change that."

Both the Senior and Junior teams competed in the District Judging competition held at West Texas A&M in Canyon on Saturday, April 23. Despite the fact that both teams compete at districts, only the senior teams are allowed to compete in the state competition.

In the team competition the Hansford County 4-H Senior Judging team was first overall with 1468 points. They also won the team high in the cattle judging portion of the contest with 530. Second went to Armstrong County with 521. Carson County was third with 515 points. Deaf Smith County was fifth with 509 and Hartley County placed sixth with 490 points.

In the team places for the swine judging, Deaf Smith was first with 528 points. Hansford County fol-

lowed with 526. Carson County was third with 524, Gray County was fourth with 517 and Hartley was fifth with 509.

Hansford County was also second in the team sheep judging competition. They scored 412 points. Deaf Smith was first with 413 points. Hartley placed third with 400. Potter County was fourth with 398 and Dallam County placed fifth with 393 points.

In the team reasons, Hansford County again came away with second place. They were just three points, 402, behind the first place team of Deaf County, 405. Donley County followed in third place with 376 points. Hartley County was fourth with 372 and Armstrong was fifth with 365.

The junior team earned third place overall with 992 points. They received other honors in the team swine and the team sheep competition. Hansford County placed second in the sheep judging, just four points behind the 284 points turned in by the winning team of Gray County. Donley County was third with 278. Collingsworth County was fourth with 274 points and Hartley County was fifth with 272.

In the swine judging the Hansford County Junior Team tied for fourth and fifth with Donley County. They were awarded fifth place after the tie was broken with the overall scores. Potter County won the swine judging with 379

points and Hartley was second with 372. Gray County had a third place finish with 369 points.

The results of the Junior Team Cattle Judging were: 1, Donley County, 377; 2, Potter, 360; 3, Deaf Smith #1, 357; 4, Armstrong, 356; 5, Oldham, 354.

In the individual senior competition, Hansford County earned several honors.

Scott Stedje was first overall with 510 points. Stedje was third high individual in the swine judging with 187 and the cattle judging with 181. He placed second in the sheep judging with 142 points and in reasons with 137 points.

Team mate, Galen Slough was fifth in the overall competition with 487 points. Ga. Slough won the sheep judging with 145 points and was third in the reasons competition with 137 points.

Kathy Slough also placed in the overall competition. She was eighth with 471 points.

In the junior competition, Greg Slough won the overall competition with 349 points. He placed second in the swine judging with 136 points.

Team mate, Brandy Morris was ninth overall with 335 points.

In the individual junior sheep judging competition, Mandy Vernon tied for fourth and fifth with 96 points. She was awarded fifth place after the tie was broken using overall scores.

New reference terms appear on nutrition labels

Daily Values and Percent Daily Values (% Daily Value or % DV) are the new reference terms on the nutrition label. Daily values are set by the government for adults and children age 4 or older and reflect current nutrition recommendations for a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Technically, the term Daily Value is an "umbrella" term for two sets of reference values: Daily Reference Values (DRV) and Reference Daily Intake (RDI). Daily Reference Values are set for total fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, total carbohydrate, dietary fiber, sodium, potassium and protein.

The Percent Daily Value shows how the amount of a nutrient in a serving of food fits into a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Consumers can use % Daily Value to compare food products and determine what a serving of food contains relative to a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Most people probably do not eat a 2,000 calorie reference diet. However, the % Daily Value information on the nutrition label can still be used to see if a diet meets nutrition recommendations for a given nutrient. Personalized nutrient amounts based on a person's individual caloric intake can also be calculated.

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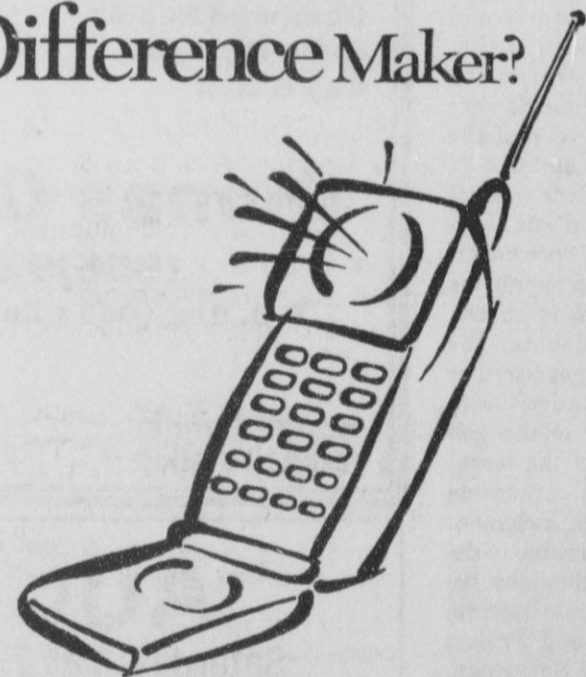
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Spearman athletes compete in regional meet

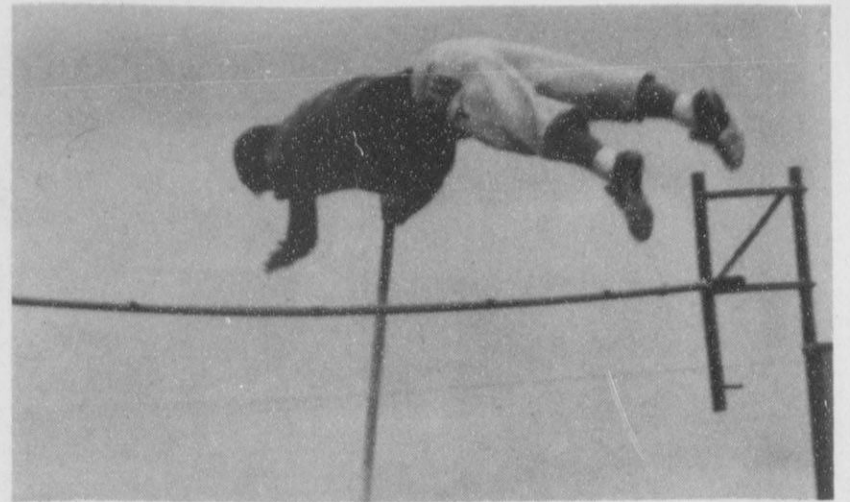

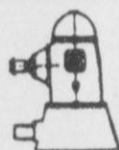


Dee Mayfield pole vaulted to fifth place in the Regional Meet in Abilene. His vault was 12'0".

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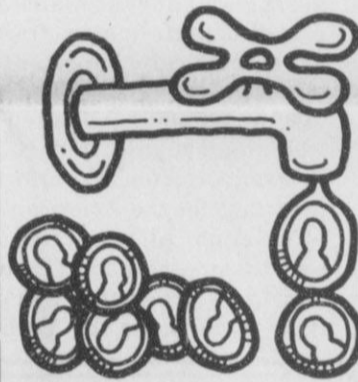

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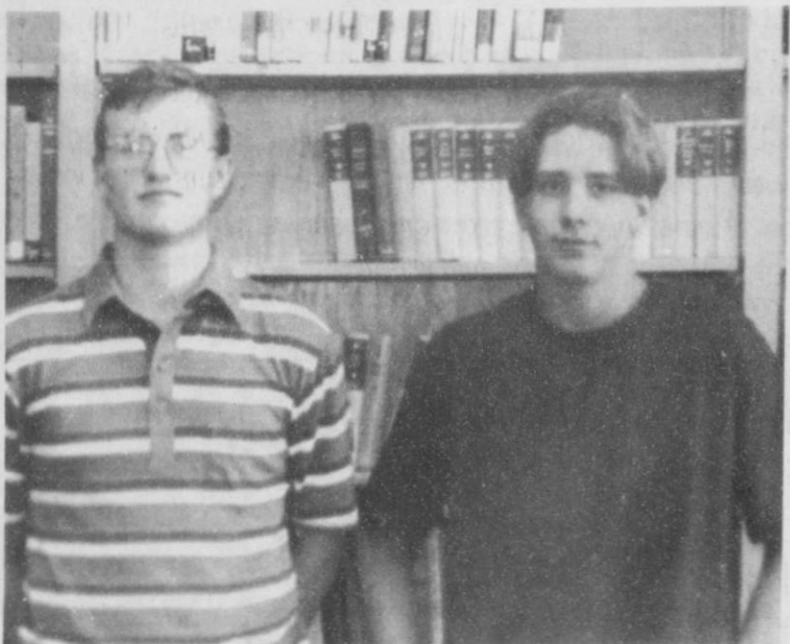

Wayne Madden, 58, died April 22 in Hobbs, N.M.

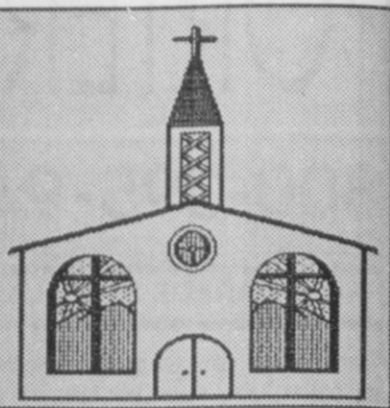
