Over 60 county girls to participate in AAU basketball tournament

More than 60 young ladies from Hansford County are coaching or playing on basketball teams scheduled to compete in the AAU state qualifying tournament, to be held in Amarillo this weekend.

Marcia Shieldknight is the coach of three of the teams. She is assisted in her coaching duties by willing parents of her players. Her three teams are the West Texas Flyers, the Jr. Aggies and the Hansford Hustlers.

The West Texas Flyers is a panhandle-wide all star team. They have an 11-0 record and have already won tournaments in Clovis, N.M., Altus, Okla., and Lubbock. They will start their bid for a fourth tournament win on Thursday at 9 p.m. in

the Houston Junior High boys gym in Amarillo.

Team members include two girls from Spearman and one from Gruver. The Spearman girls are Carrie Pearson and Ashly Shieldknight. The Gruver girl is Anissa Ryan.

The Jr. Aggies and the Hansford Hustlers are both 12-and-under teams and made up of girls from Hansford County only. Their first games in the Amarillo tournament are at 9 a.m. and 12:45 p.m., respectively. Both teams will play their opening games at the Houston Junior High boys gym.

The Aggies have four girls from Gruver and three girls from Spearman. The Gruver girls are Molly McLain, Hailey Lamb, Kaysha Cluck

and Amber Murrell. The Spearman girls are Lacie Baker, Macy Shieldknight and Samantha Beasley.

The Hustlers have five Spearman girls and one each from Morse and Gruver. From Spearman are Tara Butt, Melinda Tigrett, Shari Smith, Shayla Barber and Shanna Poole. Sahala McCloy is the Morse girl and Cori Lowe is from Gruver.

Also playing in the 14-and-under division of the Amarillo tournament are two teams coordinated by Becky Baker. Baker said the coaches of the teams are Bonnie Thompson, Laura Pearson, Cindy Melton and Bill Mires of Stratford.

Baker's two teams are both panhandle all star teams named the Panhandle Twisters and the Texas

Dribblers. Both teams play on Thursday at the Houston Junior High boys gym. The Twisters' game starts at 6:30 and Dribblers' game starts at 7:45 p.m.

There are three girls from Spearman on each of these teams. On the Twisters are Kiki Kelp, Cortney Henton and Mandi Lair. On the Dribblers are Molly Blackman, Sandy Rich and Tommi Latta.

Another all star team competing in the Amarillo tournament, coached by a Spearman girl and having three players from Spearman, is the 16-and-under team coached by Krista Kirkland. The three Spearman players are Laura Pearson, Michelle Garnett and Jill Lusby. Their first game is Thursday at 1:30 p.m. at

Austin Junior High School.

Susan Davis is coaching two panhandle all star teams who have players from Hansford County. On her 16-and-under team Kimbre Townsen, Spearman, and Holly Veneman, Gruver, play for her. There are three Spearman girls on her 18-and-under team. They are Bonnie Thompson, Melody Schumann and Mendy Lasater.

Davis' 16-and-under team's first game of the Amarillo tournament will be on Thursday at 3 p.m. at Austin Junior High School. Her 18-and-under team plays at 11:30 a.m. at Austin Junior High School.

The last Spearman girl to be playing in the Amarillo AAU tournament is Tamri Townsen. According to

Townsen, she is playing on an 18-and-under all star team coached by Don Johnson of Channing. She said this team had won the Clovis Tournament the week before and had won the state AAU Tournament the previous year. She said she is not sure when her team will play its first game in Amarillo, but she thinks it will probably be on Thursday.

The final group of girls playing AAU basketball this summer is an 11-and-under team coached by Sheila Watley. They will not play in Amarillo because the tournament does not have a competition in their age bracket. In Clovis last weekend the team lost three games but, according to Watley, played well.

City manager goes to Borger

Jim Murray, Spearman city manager, announced last week he will resign his position in July to accept the job of Assistant City Manager of Borger.

Murray said his last day as Spearman City Manager will be Friday, July 12.

Members of the city council expressed sorrow at Murray's leaving, but said it was too good a career opportunity for him to pass up.

"I hate it for the city of Spearman. He is the most qualified city manager in the Panhandle," said Alderman Mike Cudd. He went on to say that Spearman has been lucky to

keep Murray as long as it has.

Murray has been involved with Spearman city management since August 1979. At that time he was hired as an administrative assistant to the city manager. In April of 1980 he was appointed to the position of Spearman City Manager.

When asked about his accomplishments as city manager, he replied that any accomplishments were the result of a cooperative effort between the city employees and the city council. "The employees and the council have served the city well," he said.

Murray said he will miss his home

and neighborhood the most when he leaves, and his co-workers second.

Murray will not have much of a break between jobs. He said he will start the Borger job on July 15, the Monday following his last Friday in the Spearman job.

Before he leaves, Murray hopes to have a candidate for the assistant manager's position to recommend to the council. Mayor Burl Buchanan added that he would like to see the assistant manager's position filled as soon as possible, giving Murray a chance to train that person. The assistant manager could then help the new city manager settle in.

Cargill to operate Speartex

AMARILLO - Cargill's Commodity Marketing Division (CMD) has concluded a lease agreement to operate the Speartex Grain Company in Spearman, a company official announced.

The Speartex elevator purchases grain by truck from farmers in Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree counties in the Texas panhandle for sale to the area's feedyard market and for rail shipment to export ports at the Gulf of Mexico. When market conditions warrant, the elevator also can serve West Coast domestic markets.

"We are extremely pleased to have entered this agreement," said Bran-

non Darnell, CMD area manager in Amarillo. "It will provide us with a valuable new facility in our network of country elevators. But I also think it's good news for area farmers."

"We will continue to provide a ready market opportunity for producers, connecting them with not just local markets but also helping provide access to markets around the world through Cargill's worldwide grain-merchandising activities. In today's market environment, I believe those strengths help serve farmers' best economic interests particularly well," Darnell said.

The Speartex elevator has a storage capacity of approximately 7 million bushels and also provides

retail fertilizer sales to area producers.

Darnell said that Jim Williams, manager of CMD's Elkhart, Kan., elevator, will transfer to Spearman to become manager of the facility. He added that Cargill will begin immediate operation of the elevator to assure uninterrupted service to farmers.

CMD's Amarillo area office also oversees elevator operations and farm input sales in Elkhart, Liberal and Woods, Kan.; Hooker, Okla.; and Amarillo, Plainview and Hart, Texas. Caprock Industries, a Cargill subsidiary, also operates feedlots in nearby Gruver and Dalhart.

Women landowners' seminars set

Women involved in managing farms and ranches may wish to attend one of three educational seminars scheduled across the state in June by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Wayne Hayenga of College Station, Extension Service economist and attorney, said the seminars are designed to help women explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches.

Dates and locations for the meetings are: June 13-14 - Holiday Inn Airport, Corpus Christi; June 24-25 - Sheraton Inn, Wichita Falls and June 27-28 - Fifth Seasons East,

Amarillo.

Hayenga said discussions will center on income taxes, leases, business organization and estate planning.

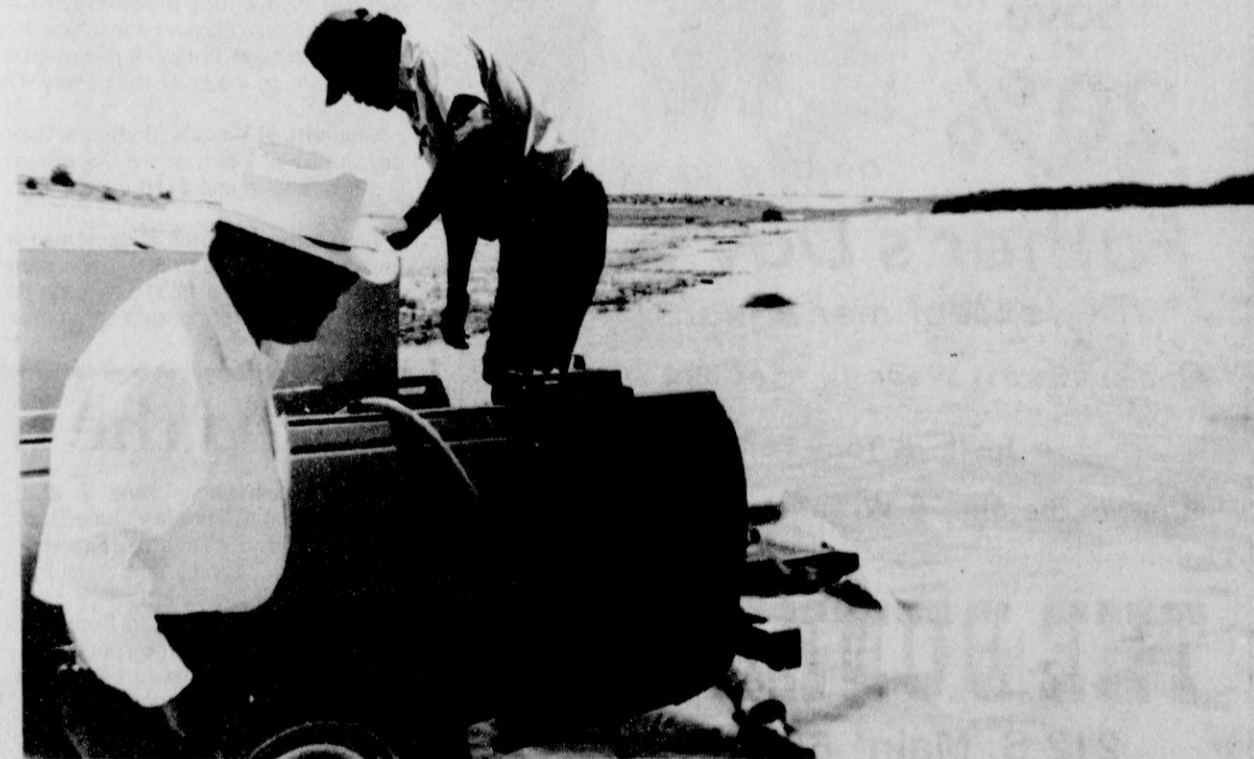
"Farm leases and operating agreements take many forms," Hayenga said. "Many of these will be discussed, including benefits and restrictions to both land owners and tenants."

Concerning income tax planning, participants will study tax-saving opportunities for business growth, land sales, retirement income and assisting children and grandchildren. Hayenga said a session on estate

planning will deal with wills, trusts, estate tax deferrals, gifts and property titles.

In regard to estate planning tools, discussions will include use of corporations and partnerships, selling part of a business, installment sales, oil and gas interests, special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payments, life insurance and discounted estate taxes.

County's sales up 5.7 percent

The State Comptroller's office has released a report of state sales and use tax for fourth quarter 1990 in Hansford County.

For all industries in Hansford County, gross sales in fourth quarter 1990 totaled \$28,478,404, as compared with \$26,949,349 in fourth quarter 1989.

That represents an increase of 5.7 percent.

The number of reporting outlets decreased from 1989 to 1990, however, with 252 listed in the final quarter of 1989 and 236 listed in fourth quarter 1990.

For the retail trade division, gross sales in Hansford County was down 32.7 percent from fourth quarter 1989 to fourth quarter 1990. Gross retail

sales in the last three months of 1989 totaled \$16,062,137, while in the same period of 1990 gross sales totaled \$10,828,453.

There were 134 reporting retail outlets in fourth quarter 1989. That number also decreased in fourth quarter 1990, with 130 reporting outlets listed by the comptroller's office.

Jeff Burress . . .

Like father like son

Like father, like son? That is the question posed to Brother Jeff Burress, Union Church's new pastor.

Burress spent some of his "formative years" in Spearman when his father, Archie Burress, pastored the Union Church in the mid-1970s. Jeff, a 1975 Spearman High School graduate, married his classmate Rhonda Nelson and went to work for Northern Natural Gas after he got out of school.

Archie and Patsy Burress moved on in 1980, returning to the Bentonville, Ark. church where Archie had first begun his ministry. Jeff and Rhonda remained in Spearman, where he moved up from a clerk's position at the gas company to the maintenance crew. "I ended up as a production controller in Liberal, Kan.," he says.

For Jeff, who says he first heard the call to ministry at a church youth camp when he was 12 years old, becoming a pastor was put on temporary hold during his first years with the gas company. By the time

he was in his early 20s, however, he was taking correspondence courses through the Berean School of the Bible of Springfield, Mo.

By 1982, he was studying fulltime at Panhandle State University toward a B.S. in psychology. "This was all with the idea of becoming a pastor," he reports today.

It wasn't always easy, as Jeff is the first to admit, because he had a young family. (Amanda is now a 14-year-old and Randy a 10-year-old.) "We had put back savings during our six years at Northern, so that was what we lived on while I went to school," he says.

In 1984, he served as youth and choir director at Union Church under Brother Steve Rogers. He organized and directed a presentation of "The Last Supper," in which the men of the church portrayed, in full costume, Jesus' disciples.

His first pulpit position was at Gruver's Community Bible Church, from October of 1975 to June of 1988. From there the Burress family moved to Evansville, Ind. until Jeff took the pastorate at Union Church this past February.

So are the two Burresses, father and son, alike? Jeff seems to think so, as does his wife Rhonda.

"We both returned to churches where we started out," he remarks with a grin. "We're both music lovers, too."

And their theology? "About as close as you can get," he admits, explaining that both he and his dad were taught by Assembly of God professors at the Berean School of the Bible.

Jeff is enjoying his pastorate at Union Church. "It's a real positive thing when you can go back to a board that has some of the same people who saw you grow up," he says. "It's a great honor to be back!"

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Malea

Family takes each day as it comes

Editor's note: Information for the following story was provided by Melyn Johnson and by Sharon Wilson.

Sharon Wilson of Gruver says her granddaughter Malea has been at home in Guymon for about a week and has been feeling well, following her most recent doctor's visit.

Malea is the 2 year old daughter of Lisa and Chad Wilson. Chad is the son of Sharon and Leon Wilson.

Malea was recently found to have an inoperable tumor, located at the base of her brain. Many trips to doctors in both Texas and Oklahoma, plus a two-week stay at Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City, has placed a tremendous strain on the family's finances.

In an effort to relieve some of the financial burden, a fund has been established at City National Bank and Trust Co. in Guymon for Malea's benefit. Contributions to Malea's fund can be sent to the bank, located at 601 N. Main in Guymon. More information can be obtained by contacting the bank at (406) 338-6561.

Malea's tumor was diagnosed in April through the use of magnetic resonance imaging, a test performed by an Oklahoma City neurologist. A biopsy was also performed, which Mrs. Wilson says was risky in itself. According to Malea's mother, Lisa, the biopsy was done through an incision at the top of Malea's head, where a needle was inserted to extract tissue.

Doctors told Lisa that because of Malea's age, chemotherapy is the only possible treatment now. However, the chances for a cure are very small and the risk to Malea is very great. Sharon Wilson explained that the chemotherapy treatment requires catheterization, which could result in a coma.

Weighing the positive aspects of chemotherapy against the negative, Lisa and Chad decided against chemotherapy and opted instead for a better quality of life for the youngster. She is currently receiving steroids, which are helping to relieve some of the swelling of tissues surrounding the tumor and reducing pressure on her brain stem.

Malea had lost the ability to walk and had lost the use of her right arm, but with the reduction of pressure on her brain she is able to walk on her own and has regained partial use of her right arm.

Because of Malea's age, radiation therapy is not a viable option. She must be at least 3 years old before she can receive radiation therapy.

The family now is taking each day as it comes, trying to come to terms with their situation and not knowing what to expect.

"There's really nothing that can be done at this point," said Sharon Wilson. "What they need is support from friends and the community. All the churches here in Gruver have been notified and have been praying for them. That's really all anyone can do."

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Too often when anglers talk about fishing they are talking about trying to catch fish, but now is the time to head to your favorite lake if you prefer catchin' over fishin'. The crappie, catfish, bass, and walleye are in the shallow water and eager to feed.

The challenge is to find fish at shallow water spots that have access to deep water. The importance of nearby deep water will become more important as the heat of summer drives the fish to a deeper comfort range. Fishing pressure can cause the fish to stop biting, so finding backup spots is important.

Tip of the week—I have discovered an intriguing new topwater bait. It is a top-water gitzit, invented by Ubaldo Benevides Jr. of Zia Bait Co. in Silver City, N.M. Mickey Trousdale, who has qualified for the 1991 B.A.S.S. Classic, uses this secret bait to catch bass that have been exposed to heavy fishing pressure. If you are looking for a topwater bait that catches fish when others cannot, give Ubaldo a call at 505 388-1263.

Think about it. When was the last time that you listened to a kid? Get some worms, because both the bluegills and the kids are waiting for you.

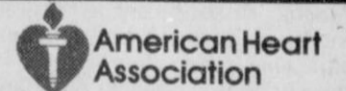

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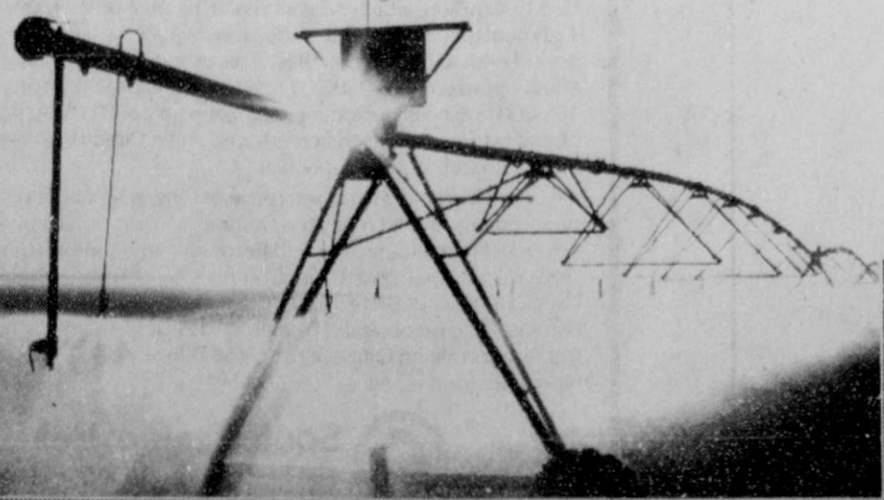

**Southwestern Bell's application proposes to obsolete residence Speed Calling 30 except for existing customers at their existing locations.

Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.
