
## Flag Day

The Stationmaster's House Museum is pleased to announce R.L. (Roy Lee) McClellan as the Museum's 2008 Heritage Day King. R.L. will be riding in the parade in a vintage military WWII vehicle owned and driven by Joel Lee Lackey.

Upon graduating from Spearman High School in 1938, R.L. later attended Texas Technological College and U.S. Naval Midshipman School (Res.). He enlisted in World War II in July 1942, and attended Boot Camp in San Diego, CA, Radio School at Texas A&M, was in the Solomons Island Campaign in an Argus II, served in a shore based radar duty, and ended as a Communications Officer of the LCS(L)(3)-124

After Naval Service, R.L. married Barbara Jean Daily, daughter of long-time dentist Spearman. Barbara Jean passed away several years ago, but was actively involved in a number of city, county and church organizations.

Their children include David Arthur, MD, "Hansford County is great!"

William (Bill) Richard, D.V.M., Rebecca Sue Madison and Jean Ann Holston, plus grandchildren who are now graduating from college.

A friendly and quiet citizen of Hansford County, R.L. has served as an officer and member of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce, the Rodeo Association, and two terms on the Spearman ISD Board of Directors. He also served on the Board of Stewards and the Administration Board at the First United Methodist Church in Spearman. He has also served as Red Cross Chairman, Lions Club, Hansford Masonic Lodge 1040 AF&AM, spent thirty years selling Allis Krause farm machinery and J.I. Case farm machinery.



## Words from Faith & Grace

Having learned this past week that God desires "mercy" and not "sacrifice", we now study Genesis 18:1-15, Psalm 116:1-7, 12-19, Romans 5:1-8, and Matthew 9:35-10:8, Twenty-four years after God has promised Abraham a son, Abraham is sitting at the entrance of his tent at the heat of the day. He sees three strangers and immediately offers them hospitality (as would any true Bedouin). After the ritual greeting and providing of food and drink, Abraham recognizes that one of the strangers is the Lord! He tells Abraham that he will have a son born of Sarah in one year. Sarah who has been listening while providing for the strangers, laughs. Now laughter/humor can result from an incongruity coupled with surprise. Abraham who is 99 and Sarah who is 89 are going to conceive a child together. Sarah laughs, at 89 is she going to have a sex life? At 89 is she going to suckle a child? An incongruous and surprising thought! Yet, the stranger says, "Is anything too wonderful for the Lord?" In Genesis 21: 1-7, we shall see that what the Lord said, the Lord does. Note that the name "Abram" means "exalted father" and then the Lord changes that name to "Abraham" which means "father of many". Note loo, that "Sarai" and "Sarah" mean "princess", she becomes the mother of kings.

The Psalmist sings a song of thanksgiving, thanking the ord for a "re-orientation" of his life. Note that the Psalmist shares this thanksgiving with others so that they may know the power of the Lord. We as Christians notice the language, "I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord", and we see an echo of the Eucharist, where Paul calls the cup, the cup of blessing (salvation). Think about it.

Paul reminds the Romans that we are justified by faith. While we were still sinners, Christ died for us, the ungodly Christ did not die for St. Cecil or for St. (insert your name here); Christ died for a miserable sinner called Cecil and for you when we were not "lovable". Paul then states that we can boast in our hope of sharing the Glory of God through Jesus Christ and we can boast in our suffering. He tells us that suffering produces endurance, endurance produces character, and character produces hope which does not disappoint us. When we are justified by faith, God works on molding us over time, on preparing us to be His. Just as he prepared Abraham and Sarah for twenty-four years prior to fulfilling his promise.

Matthew tells us about the ministry of Jesus, a ministry of healing the sick, feeding the hungry, aiding he widow and orphan, and proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom of God. Jesus then charges his disciples to go forth and do likewise for the rest of Israel. Jesus re-orients their lives.

Dear Christian, our salvation is the gift of God; it is not deserved, it is not earned, it is not purchased by us. By God's grace the Holy Spirit guides us to faith in Jesus Christ, we are baptized, we are forgiven and we in thanksgiving share with others what we have been given. May the Holy Spirit prepare you to be His.







#### **Food Manager Training** Course Offered June 24-25

Texas restaurants are required by law to have certified food managers. To train these service professionals, Texas AgriLife Extension of Hansford County will offer a manager certification course called "Food Safety: It's Our Business" on June 24-25.

The event will be at the Fellowship Hall of Spearman Church of Christ, 121 S. Haney in Spearman. The deadline for registration is June 10.

"This hands-on learning experience equips participants with the latest food safety principles and practices to prepare for the examination," said Peggy Winegarner, Extension Agent Family and Consumer Science in Spearman.

The course fee of \$89 includes training, materials and the state food manager certification examination. A test-only option is available but recommended only for those with a strong food safety background. Cost for the test without the training is \$50. New food manager certificates are valid for six years.

On average, one in four Americans become sick each year from a food borne illness. One in 1,000 people are hospitalized and 5,000 die due to a food borne illness.

Food service managers will learn about identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling, and preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food. Other topics will include teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees, complying with government regulations, maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings, and controlling pests.





#### **USDA** Announces CRP Permitted Use for Livestock Feed Needs

Eligible CRP Acres Allowed to Hay and Graze; \$1.2 Billion Forage Made Available

Rick Hargrove, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Hansford County today announced that USDA has authorized certain acreage enrolled under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) to be available for hay and forage after the primary nesting season ends for grass-nesting birds.

This action will provide much needed feed and forage while maintaining the conservation benefits from the nation's premier conservaprogram," Hargrove. "Eligible farmers and ranchers will be able to plan for harvest of forage after the end of the primary nesting season this sum-

Prices for most field crops have advanced to record or near record levels in recent months, reflecting strong demand, tight supplies and competition for acres. The increased demand for commodities and resulting higher prices has impacted the livestock industry in particu-

More than 24 million acres of land enrolled in CRP will be eligible for this critical feed use program. USDA estimates that this program will make available up to 18 million tons of forage worth \$1.2 billion.

"In authorizing this critical use of CRP acres for forage, USDA is also taking strong measures to preserve CRP's environmental benefits," said Hargrove.

Eligible land may not be hayed or grazed until after the end of the primary nest-

Also, some of the eligible land or forage of the land must be reserved for wildlife and any land that is used under this authority must have a conservation plan. In many instances, the removal of some of the grass cover will increase the diversity of

Signup for interested CRP participants began June 2, 2008, at local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices. This modification for critical feed use is only for 2008. All forage use must be completed no later than November 10,

Under CRP, farmers and ranchers enroll eligible land in 10- to 15-year contracts with USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). FSA administers CRP on behalf of CCC. Participants plant appropriate cover such as grasses and trees in crop fields and along streams. These plantings help prevent soil and nutrients from running into regional waterways and affecting water quality. The long-term vegetative cover also improves wildlife habitat and soil quality.

The LIP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred the death of livestock because of a natural disaster. The LCP provides payments to eligible live-stock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed costs because of a natural

disaster.

#### Newly Hired Ag **Engineer to Boost** Panhandle

Irrigation Program Nich Kenny has been on the job for a month finding out just how the water flows in the Texas Panhandle; irrigation water, that is.

Kenny, a Texas AgriLife Extension Service agriculture engineer, joined Leon New in the Amarillo District office in April to learn how the AgriLife Extension system works with county agents and clientele.

"My goal is to become very familiar with all the irrigation systems here so I can provide expertise as farmer's needs arise," Kenny said. "Leon is my mentor in the process, with his 40-plus years of experience in this area.'

New is the AgriLife Extension irrigation specialist in the Panhandle, and has coordinated crop-watering programs ranging from row-water irrigation to center pivot and drip irrigation.

"Nich is eager to learn the irrigation systems and crop

production practices and get out into the field to work with producers, especially in the area of irrigation power and fuel requirements and pumping costs," New said. "This is where I think he will excel and be a special resource to farmers during this fuel price crisis."

Kenny, a native of Yuma, Ariz., earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Arizona in Tucson, and most recently served as president and owner of NPK Inc., an engineering and agricultural applications consulting company.

In that position, he said he oversaw projects in Arizona concerning effluent reuse facilities, landfill and waste handling operations, wildlife habitats and a variety of irrigation methods, including flood, drip and sprinkler.

"Engineering principles are universal, but the implementation is dependent on the local practices and parameters," Kenny said.

Soil and weather conditions, crop timing and scale of operations are all different here, as well as water quality and quantity, he said. Another difference is the wide variance between progressive and traditional producers, with the challenge being to meet each operation's unique needs.

"Nich has an excellent ag engineering background and has some excellent practical knowledge of irrigation systems, so I am excited about him joining the AgriLife team in Amarillo," said Dr. Galen Chandler, AgriLife Extension district administrator.
