Weekly Update
Texas, November 4 - Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 7.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.23/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 5.6 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.51/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 1.4 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 26.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 28.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 7.0 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Even with Hurricane Sandy causing havoc on refineries and infrastructure in the Northeast, gasoline prices nationally have continued to trend lower," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "It goes to show how much more significant the Gulf Coast is to this nation's energy backbone when such a massive storm causes no major rise in the national average. The good news is that average prices will likely continue to decline, perhaps to \$3.35/gal nationally by Thanksgiving. For those in Sandy's wake, fuel availability remains difficult, and is the reason GasBuddy has implemented an emergency fuel availability service," DeHaan said. Obama Gets Four More Years



President Barack Obama

Barack Obama won Ohio and four other swing states to surpass 270 electoral votes and clinch another term as president, CNN projected as of 11:30 p.m. (central time) on Tuesday, November 6, 2012.

In Texas Mitt Romney/Paul Ryan received 58.30% (4,284,686) of the votes and Barack Obama/Joe Biden received 40.34% (2,964,724). Gary Johnson/Jim Gray (LIB) received 76,147 votes, Jill

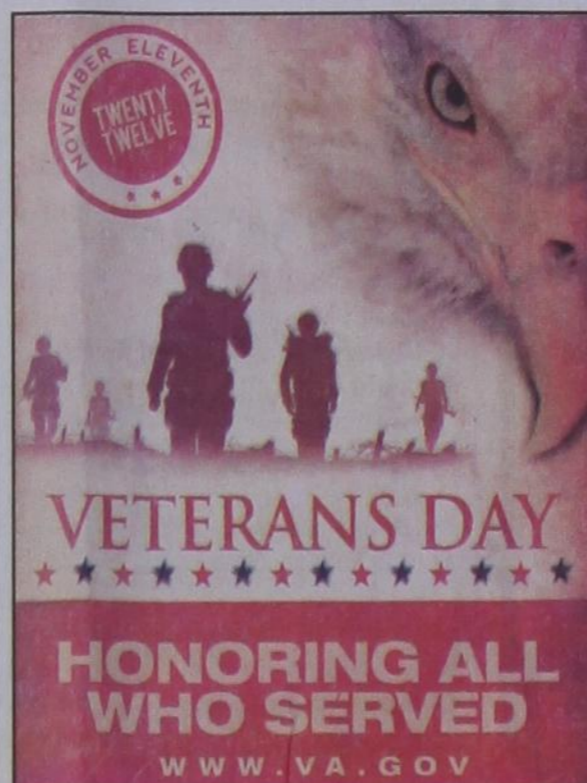

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors for November 6, 2012: For most of the week, the region had above-average temperatures, with colder weather by the weekend. Soil-moisture levels mostly were short. The warm weather and light winds were perfect for harvesting crops. Early planted wheat that was pre-watered looked good, and some was already being grazed. Without rain, much wheat continued to need irrigation. Dryland wheat needed moisture badly. Rangeland and pastures were mostly in very poor to poor condition. Cattle remained in good condition with supplemental feeding.



Keep Texas Notified

An informed citizen is the ultimate source of power in a democratic government, which is why Texas' governmental entities are required to print notices of their plans for actions ranging from annexation to zoning, and from large expenditures to tax hikes.

For several years, lobbying efforts have been underway to eliminate this essential element of government transparency, which bodes ill for an informed electorate. Some state agencies and some associations representing local governments are pressuring legislators to eliminate printed public notices in newspapers, saying they should be allowed to "publish" notices solely on their government-owned, government-controlled and government-operated websites.

Ever since Texas declared its independence, notices of governmental intent have been printed in newspapers to get the word out efficiently to as many citizens as possible through a non-governmental medium. Newspapers — not obscure

pages in the maze of a difficult-to-navigate government website — are still the best way to do this.

Most citizens who are vigilant about government activities also happen to be avid newspaper readers. They are well served by the fact that most of the state's 500 or so newspapers print public notices — and print them at their lowest classified advertising rate, as required by law.

Newspapers also post legal notices on their websites, for the convenience of those who choose to read the paper electronically. And for commercial enterprises that do business with governments outside of their home county, the Texas Press Association maintains a free statewide compilation of legal notices from all over the state.

There is some cost involved to print a newspaper notice, of course. The expenses of paper, ink, personnel and delivery are very real, and like any other business, newspapers must charge for what they provide or close their doors. There's no difference between a local government paying a newspaper for a printed legal notice and paying an automobile

dealer for police cars...except for price.

When it comes to printed public notice, that price is minuscule. In 2011 Texas counties spent an average of 0.00533 percent of their budgets on legal notices regarding procurement. To put that in perspective, imagine that the height of the Empire State Building represents the total budget of a Texas county. Now visualize the height of a thumbtack, and consider this: 0.00533 percent of the height of the Empire State Building would be the height of the thumbtack.

It's ironic that the associations lobbying to kill printed notice are funded primarily by dues paid by local governments — governments that get their money by taxing the very citizens who'd find it hard to keep an eye on city hall if legal notices were no longer printed.

Legislators considering this issue should consider the Empire State Building and the thumbtack. And citizens should remind lawmakers that a thumbtack serves a useful purpose and never causes a problem...unless you happen to sit on it.



Officials say women's health program is ready

AUSTIN — Dr. Kyle Janek, chief of the state Health and Human Services agency, and Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 31 announced a new state-funded Texas Women's Health Program is ready to step in and deliver services to low-income women "if Washington cuts off funding to the Medicaid program."

"We've got the state program ready to stand up at any time, and that transition would be seamless for patients and their doctors," Janek said.

Since 2007, the program has been funded primarily with federal Medicaid dollars. The state plans to reject billions in Medicaid dollars in order to cut off funding to organizations affiliated with abortion providers in accordance with a state law passed in 2011.

Perry said that any lawsuit filed to challenge the state's version of the women's health program would "kill the program, and would be responsible for denying these important health services to the low-income women of Texas."

Meanwhile, a temporary injunction put in effect by an Austin state district court on Oct. 26 prevents the state from following through on its "affiliate ban rule" until Nov. 8, when oral arguments in a case brought by Planned Parenthood would be heard.

Planned Parenthood called the injunction "a small victory for the approximately 50,000 Texas women who rely on Planned Parenthood for care through the Women's Health Program, which includes lifesaving breast and cervical cancer screenings, birth control, and testing for sexually transmitted infections."

Windstorm concerns aired

Hurricane Sandy's recent ravage of the eastern seaboard reminds Texans of Hurricanes Rita, Katrina, Dolly, Ike, Alicia and others. Before and after mayhem hits, questions over who pays and who is responsible for what inevitably arise.

On Nov. 1, the Joint Committee on Oversight Board of Windstorm Insurance met at the Capitol, hearing testimony from the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association ("TWIA"), the Texas Public Finance Au-

thority, the Texas Department of Insurance and the State Auditor's Office.

A few of many topics addressed were TWIA's reserve fund, high administration costs, book-keeping issues, the danger storms pose to coastal counties, slowness and other problems with recovery efforts, and how some coastal property owners struggle to pay high premiums.

TWIA was established by legislative mandate to provide wind and hail insurance for Texas Gulf Coast property owners in the event of catastrophic loss. "We provide 'basic' coverage unavailable in traditional markets for consumers who might otherwise be left uninsured," TWIA's literature states.

Drought proclamation continues

Gov. Perry on Nov. 2 renewed his July 5, 2011, proclamation certifying that exceptional drought conditions pose a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas.

The renewed proclamation, good for 30 days, applies to 121 of the state's 254 counties.

Disaster relief to counties with population under 200,000 and cities under 50,000 that have suffered from severe drought and wildfire may come in the form of federal aid through the Community Development Block Grant Program.

For example, on Oct. 31, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples announced the award of \$1.4 million in federal disaster relief grants to governmental bodies that applied and met the criteria: Bastrop County and the cities of Florence, Llano and Seymour.

Manufacturing panel

House Speaker Joe Straus on Oct. 22 created the Interim Committee on Manufacturing, a panel of 15 state House members tasked with recommending ways the Legislature can strengthen the manufacturing sector in Texas.

Straus said manufacturing is a \$192 billion industry in Texas, accounting for 15 percent of the gross state product, adding that more than 800,000 Texans work in manufacturing.

Straus appointed Rep. Jim Murphy, R-Houston, as chair of the committee and Rep. Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin, as vice chair.

TEA calls for applicants

Texas Education Agency last week posted notice that it is seeking qualified attorneys to act as independent hearing examiners in local school district employment hearings.

Examiners preside over hearings involving nonrenewal or termination of educator employment contracts and issue recommendations for a school district's board of trustees to consider. Deadline for filing application is 5 p.m. Dec. 3.

Perry welcomes F1 racing

On Nov. 1, the governor participated in a public relations event to promote Formula 1 Grand Prix automobile racing at the Circuit of the Americas track near Austin, where racing events will take place Nov. 16-18.

"The U.S. Grand Prix will bring 1.2 million visitors to Central Texas," Perry said, "and is an opportunity to demonstrate to people from around the world everything we have to offer in the Lone Star State as a tourism destination, and as a place to live and work."

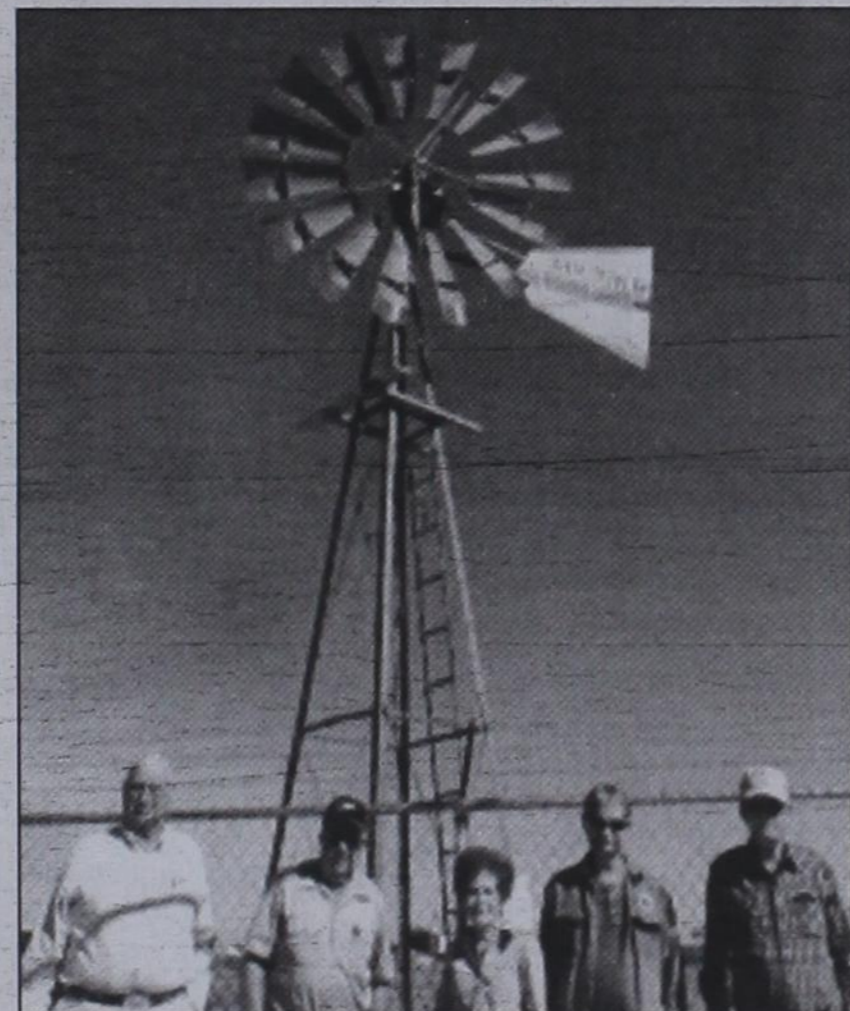

Words from Faith & Grace

In the twenty-fourth week of the Season of Pentecost we learn something about giving. We study 1 Kings 17: 8-16, Psalm 146, Hebrews 9: 24-28, and Mark 12: 38-44.

Elijah, the prophet of gloom and doom to the leaders of Israel, is called by God to go to Zarephath, in Jezebel's homeland, to live for a time with a gentile widow and her son. The widow is about to prepare her last meal, literally, when the prophet calls to her and asks her for some water and bread. She protests her lack of food. The prophet says, "Do not be afraid." Elijah declares that the Lord God of Israel will provide and her jar of meal and jug of oil will not fail until rain comes on the land. And it is so. Note that the widow commits the little that she has to the prophet and God provides for her and her son.

The Psalmist sings a song of praise to God. He declares that he will praise God for as long as he lives and he calls upon the people to join him. He warns, "Do not put your trust in princes, in mortals, in whom there is no help." Rather we should praise God who executes justice for the oppressed; who gives food to the hungry, who sets the prisoners free; who opens the eyes of the blind; who lifts up those who are bowed down. The Lord reigns forever! In this heated election year of overblown promises and perhaps outright deceptions, we need to be reminded that our faith is in God, our help is in the Lord. God's arm is not too short; God's love is steadfast and eternal.

The writer of Hebrews continues to speak of Jesus as our perfect high priest. This may seem repetitive, but consider that the book of Hebrews is actually a sermon; the repetition emphasizes the point. Our worship, whatever our style, is only a pale copy of the true worship in heaven. Through Jesus' sacrifice the need for other offerings is gone; Jesus gives us salvation now and forever. Our Christian faith is an intimate fellowship with God; our disciple life is enabled by Jesus The Christ. If we have Jesus, we have no other need.

Jesus takes the scribes to task. As a class, the scribes love the show of being 'religious'. The scribes love to be called 'rabbi'; they love the prominent places at dinners and in the synagogues. The scribes, although legally required to have jobs, make their living off of gullible women. While watching the worshippers at the temple giving their offerings, Jesus praises a poor widow who gave two small coins. The widow has given more than any of the rich scribes for the scribes gave out of their abundance, whereas the widow gave all that she had to live on. Real giving calls for sacrifice and can be viewed by some as 'reckless'. Dear Christian consider how we are willing to donate to buy new air conditioning for our 'temples', to buy new ice-makers for our feasts, or to buy other things for which we can get a plaque announcing our donation. Is this truly giving to God or to ourselves? Should we not be more concerned with the widow and orphan, with victims of disaster, with the operation of food pantries for the poor, with shelters for the home-less? Think about it.

May the Holy Spirit enable you to perceive the richness of the gifts that God has showered upon you and enable you to give that which is needed for the gospel's sake.

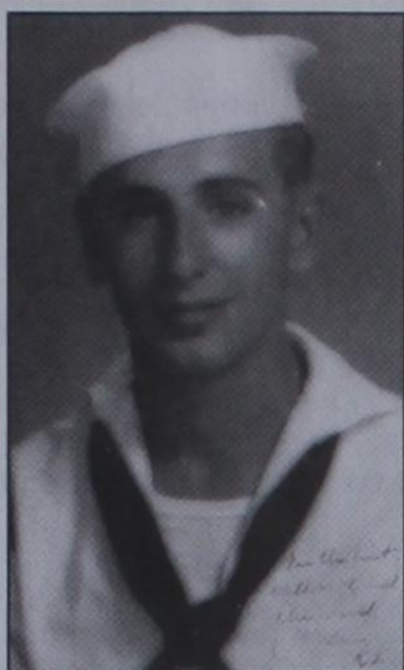

I was born June 17, 1921 to Randolph Lee and Vera (Wilson) McClellan in Amarillo, Texas. I grew up in Spearman, Texas and graduated from high school there in 1938. My next move was to attend Texas Technological College to become an engineer. Later I switched to the Business School.

Some time in early July, 1942, as I was walking down Main Street in Spearman toward the Hansford Abstract Office, Mr. P. A. Lyon, Sr., (better known as Pal Lyon) approached me and said, "R. L., if you want to do something, you'd better be doing it." He was a member of the Draft Board and was giving me warning that I was about to be called for duty. Jimmie Hicks (who was courting my sister Vera Beth) was one week older than I, and the two of us decided to go to Amarillo and get signed up for service in the Army Air Force. Jimmie was accepted as an enlistee. I thought that I wanted to be a flyer, but was turned down because of a potential

inguinal hernia. So I decided I would try the Navy. The Navy turned me down for the same reason plus they said I was a couple of pounds underweight.

But--the Navy recruiter told me that I could enlist, go to boot camp, get my hernia repaired while there, and then the Navy would send me on to Aviation Radio School while recuperating. After that they would send me to Flying School. That sounded like a great idea to me, so I signed up. I still had to get the weight up a bit so I ate bananas and anything else I believed was fattening for a day or so and passed the weight test. I thought I was really on my way to becoming a Navy aviator. I boarded the Ft. Worth & Denver railroad passenger train on July 21 for a trip to Dallas to be sworn in. On July 22, in a large room full of enlistees the swearing-in ceremony took place. Alton May, a Spearman area farmer, saw me in that mob and we became better acquainted during our stay in boot camp. He was one of the older men sworn in at that time. We were immediately marched to the Southern Pacific Railroad Station, boarded ancient, unairconditioned Pullman cars, and headed west to that great destination--boot camp in San Diego, California. Some three days later we arrived, dirty, probably stinky from sweating for three days across the July hot desert country without a bath. I remember that the white shirt I was wearing was a dirty gray and the inside collar was black from the coal-fired engine's sooty smoke that came in through the open windows of our berths. It was too hot to keep them shut.

Upon entering the gate of

boot camp, the sailors cleaning the grounds nearby began to ask, "Where you from, Mac?" How on earth did they know me--Mac--as I was often called? It took me a little while to understand that every unknown sailor was a Mac!!

We were stationed in a large building that had been built for the San Diego World's Fair earlier in the century. There must have been 5 square miles of pavement that we did close order drill on. Next to the beach, it was painted in a way to camouflage it. It was so hot that many men passed out when standing at attention during inspections. One of the exercises I remember was learning how to wear and use a gas mask. We were shown how to don them and then sent through a gas chamber containing tear gas. Another exercise was to pass a 25-yard swimming test. I barely managed to dog-paddle across, but they passed me. I would have drowned if I had been dumped in the drink without a lifejacket.

During this time we were given a General Classification Test. I made a 60+ score out of 70. One of the tests was a series of dots and dashes sounds. I must have scored high on that because I was sent to Texas A&M at College Station, upon completing my boot camp days, to Radio Operators School. But I did not get the hernia operation I thought had been promised to me.

Radio School was easy for me. We learned to type and to read and send Morse code by key. We also learned navy radio procedure. Since I had typing in high school, it was rather easy for me to get to the 45 words per minute required.

At the end of the school, I was made a Radioman 3rd Class, and that upped my pay from 50 to 75 dollars a month. Third Class Petty Officer was the same pay rank as sergeant in the Army/Marines.

On one October weekend, I took the train to Dallas and met Mother and Dad, Wilson, Vera Beth and Jimmie at Aunt Orene McClellan's home in Dallas. (VB & Jimmie had married on July 23, the day after I left Dallas for boot camp. Jimmie was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base, Wichita Falls.) That was the last time I got to see family before I returned from my service in the Solomon Islands about 15 or 16 months later.

I was transferred from the Naval Training Station, College Station on December 27, 1942 to Naval Advanced Base Depot, Port Hueneme (pronounced Y-Ne-Me), and was assigned to Argus/Acorn 7, April 20, 1943. We were a group of 28 officers and 98 enlisted men.

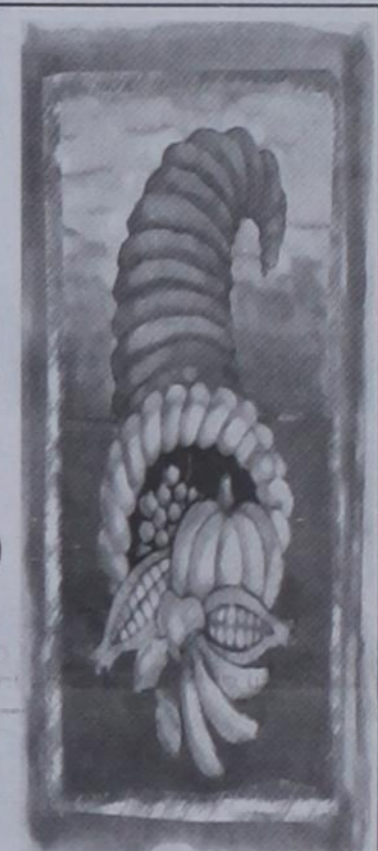

Nov. 15 Deadline Looms for Range Insurance

Livestock and hay producers have the ability to buy insurance through the new Pasture, Range and Forage Insurance risk policy offered in the High Plains region, said DeDe Jones, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service risk management specialist.

The 2013 sign-up and acreage reporting deadline for this program is Nov. 15, and premiums are due by July 1, Jones said.

"In the face of continued dry conditions, insurance becomes a critical component in producers' risk management portfolios," she said.

Payment is not determined by individual damages, but rather area losses based on a grid system, Jones explained. Producers can select any portion of acres to insure, but they must also choose a minimum of two two-month intervals, or a maximum of six two-month intervals per year.

Coverage levels between 70 and 90 percent are available, she said. Once coverage is selected, the producer chooses a productivity factor between 60 percent and 150 percent. Productivity factor is a percentage of the established county base value for forage.

The base value is a standard rate published by the Risk Management Agency for each county. It is calculated based on the estimated per-acre cost of grazing, Jones said. For example, Hansford County's value is \$8.11.

She said Texas uses a rainfall index to determine the insurance coverage. The rainfall index utilizes National Oceanic and Atmospheric Climate Prediction Center data and a 12-by-12 mile grid system.

"Indemnities are calculated based on the deviation from normal precipitation within an area for a specific period selected," Jones said.

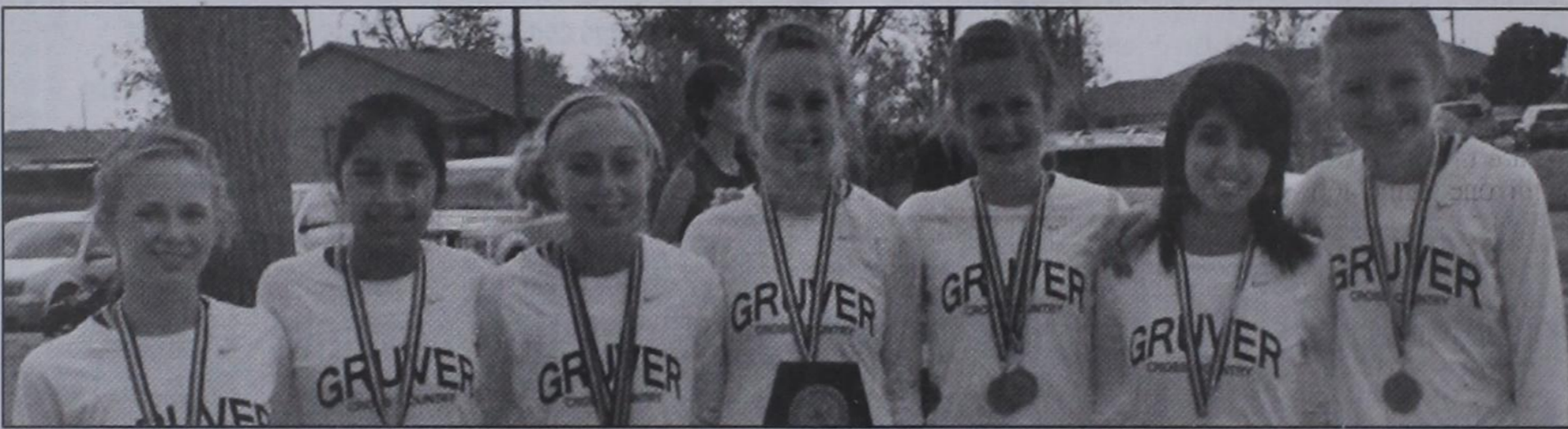
