Land claim goes to court

Two Gruver area farmers take land claims to court.

On August 26th a jury of four women and eight men had a tough decision to make in the case between George K. Lamb versus L. Mike McLain, wife Diane McLain and Damon D. Gregg, wife Chalsea B. Gregg.

Back on September 7, 1991

George K. Lamb sold land to L. Mike McLain with closing date to be pending until clear title to the land could be obtained. Due to a divorce on the side of George K. Lamb and other delays the closing could not take place until September 7, 1992 at which time George K. Lamb had his attorney, Gene Steed, contact L. Mike McLain to say he was ready to close on the land as soon as L. Mike McLain paid the percentage owed to George K. Lamb

from the crops that had been raised on the land, according to the contract between Lamb and McLain as Lamb read it.

L. Mike McLain read the contract in a different way and refused to pay what George K. Lamb thought was owed to him. McLain had also subleased the land to Damon D. Gregg and wife Chalsea B. Gregg without the consent of George K. Lamb this all resulted in Lamb suing L. Mike McLain and

Damon D. Gregg for Breach Of Contract. In return L. Mike McLain and Damon D. Gregg counter sued because they did not feel Lamb was entitled to profit from their labor, they also did not feel they had breached the contract.

After hearing testimony from both sides the jury came back with a verdict for George K. Lamb, there is a judgment pending, it is also unknown if it will be appealed by L. Mike McLain and Damon D. Gregg.

Rabies force lawmen to start program

Rabies has become a large threat to the health and safety of citizen in Hansford County.

Pet owners in Spearman need to be aware that the Spearman Police Department will be intensifying control and enforcement efforts beginning September 5, 1994.

The City of Spearman is experi-

encing an ever increasing problem with stray or at large animals who have not been vaccinated for rabies or other diseases. These animals (cats and dogs), represent a significant threat to the health and safety of the citizens in our community.

Compounding this problem is the unusually large numbers of wild

animals, such as skunks, raccoons, foxes, and other animals that have infested the city in recent months. Many of these animals are known to carry the rabies virus for many months before showing symptoms of the disease.

Treatment for rabies and related procedures is very expensive. Rabies, if not treated in time, is almost always fatal to human beings.

In view of this problem, the Spearman Police Department in

cooperation with local veterinarians will begin a program to deal with this serious problem that faces our community.

We propose the following step program to begin immediately:

Phase I--- Public Awareness Education-Opportunity for voluntary compliance for neuter, spayed, and Vaccination program.

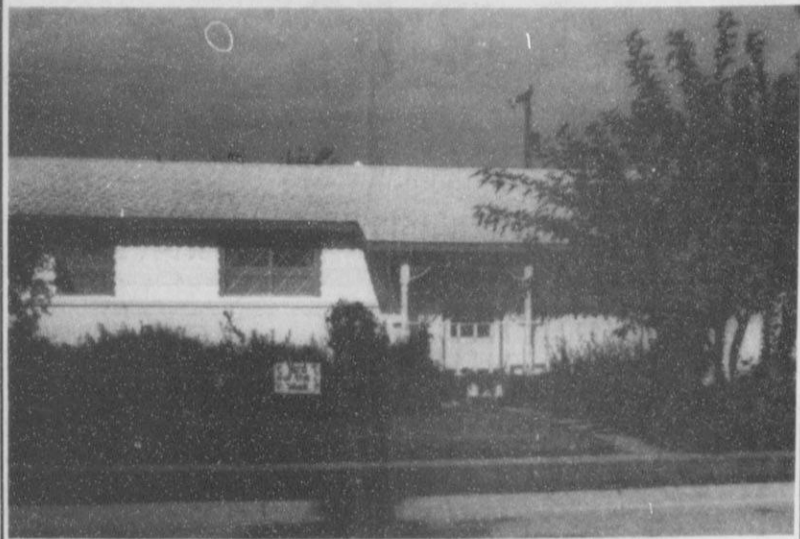

However this is not to ignore the trauma, often bitter, of the person who must leave familiar surrounding and routines, lose personal privacy, lose decision making, even simple decisions, nor is it to ignore the equal trauma of the family member forced to be part of the hurtful transition. 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Local Rotary Club welcomes Spain exchange student

Rotary youth exchange tries to make young people living around the world open-minded and peace-loving. The best way to reach this goal is to ring young people of different nationalities together. So it is important that the exchange student attends school regularly and meets other students of their own age.

The Spearman Rotary Club, like many across the nation are hosting an exchange student here. Recently club members and their spouses, along with honored guests, welcomed Nira Pena from the Canary Islands in Spain to Spearman.

Pena will be living here in Spearman throughout the 1994-95 school year. The first semester she will reside at the home of Rick and Cheryl Sanders, and then in the second semester she will move in with Larry and Susie Morris.

Some guidelines concerning the exchange student's school attendance are given to those people who have the most contact with the student, to the student himself, and also to his host family, school, and Rotary Club. These guidelines are not complete, of course, and they will not necessarily be suitable in all circumstances exactly as they are. Hopefully, however, they will be helpful.

The main responsibility for the student, in addition to his own responsibility for himself, belongs to the local Rotary club. The club has to share this responsibility with the host family and the school. In order to succeed, all parties have to cooperate intensively.

The youth exchange counselor represents the Rotary club in all matters concerning the student. At school there should be a contact person appointed for this purpose. In this way cooperation between the host family, the school, and the club will have every chance of success.

The exchange program, in order to be successful, needs mutual understanding between the school and the club. Each party must know what to expect from each other.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

When the student left his/her country for this exchange program, they promised to attend school regularly. They are to be treated as any other student in your school. Good attendance increases the opportunities of meeting more people in the host school, which in turn offers more opportunities of learning the English language.

There will be times when the exchange student should be excused from school to attend various events such as: Rotary meetings (no more than twice a month), speaking engagements, District Rotary Conference, and events that have been approved by the local Rotary Club. These events should be cleared through the appropriate school officials as soon as they are known about. (School officials will find it helpful to schedule their exchange students in classes during the lunch time that are easily made up).

SUBJECTS

Most exchange students will range in age from 16 (sixteen) to 18 (eighteen) and should be placed with students of their own age. The school will find it helpful to offer a larger choice of subjects regardless of whether they are compulsory or optional subjects. Students should be counselled into which subject areas that interest them and fit their understanding of the English language. As language skills improve, subjects may begin to be changed offering a more challenging curriculum. English, math, science, and history are core subjects that allow flexibility as to the level of: academic competence, grade level, age level, and language competency. Electives could include: foreign language, business, computers, or home economics. Rotary exchange students are eligible for U.I.L. activities if they meet all other requirements.

GRADUATION

If a school receives an exchange student that is classified as an eighteen (18) year old and a senior, it needs a policy on graduation. The

exchange program does not care whether the exchange student goes through graduation exercises or not, but does care to know what the policy is from the beginning. The policy towards graduation should be discussed and covered during the registration process.

TEACHERS

Teachers are the key in making an exchange student blend into the school setting. Care must be given by school officials into the selections of teachers that receive exchange students. These teachers need to be able to adapt, willing to incorporate new knowledge from a foreign land, and accept differing views. For the best possible working relationship between the student and the sponsoring Rotary club, the school needs to select a contact person. This person could be a teacher, counselor, or administrator. They in turn should be introduced to the Rotary exchange counselor whose job it will be to help the student during their stay in the United States. Teachers should set a high standard of achievement for the exchange student.

ACTIVITIES AT SCHOOL

Most foreign countries do not have the amount of clubs, organizations, or team activities that the United States has to offer. This list should be presented to the exchange student with encouragement to join as many a possible. The exchange students need to be active in other things such as: dances, picnics, school fairs, proms, and any other activity available to the general student.

HELPFUL HINTS

A contact person at the high school is a must. This person may be a teacher, counselor, or administrator. The biggest difficulties will be with the language barrier. If there is one person that the student can turn to, it will help solve many problems. These problems are not impossible to overcome. However, if people are willing to work together, they can be solved.

CLASS SCHEDULE

Language classes (English and other foreign languages) help to decrease the adjustment problems. Classes should be arranged so that the exchange student is in classes where the students are approximately the same age. If at all possible the lunch time class should be one that is easy to make-up because of the amount of time that is missed during that time frame. As the school year goes along, it will become clear as to the level of difficulty in each class that the exchange student can deal with. Adjustments are to be expected.

MISCELLANEOUS

Exchange students provide an excellent way to enrich the curriculum of many classes. They are prepared to present an overview of their county by presenting printed

and visual materials to organizations, clubs, and classes.

The school contact person and the youth exchange counselor must have a clear line of communication. Problems are going to occur and should be solved immediately or they will continue to get worse. The contact person should be aware of the following: explaining customs of the school, guide in the selection of classes, and be available for the exchange student ask advice. The exchange counselor should: check with the school about the placement of an exchange student, make all arrangements with the school, help the student in the selection of classes keep in regular contact with the school in general and the contact person specifically, and to be available to the school for conferences when needed.

Out at the Lake

The lake level was 23.5 on Monday morning.

The hot, dry weather has limited the use of the lake and facilities the past week. However some families and fisherman relaxed there during the week-end.

Further history of the lake shows that John and Adeline (Smith) O'Bright, natives of Minnesota, came to the Texas Panhandle with the belief they had bought prime farmland from Joe Woods in 1906. The 1907 tax assessment showed a farming operation rather than ranching. The enumeration showed seven horses or mules, one cow, 20 hogs, and \$100 worth of machinery. The machinery consisted of a hay rack, a McCormick binder, a corn planter, a Deering mower, corn sled, one-horse cultivator, two walking plows, a one-row binder and a gang disc plow.

The O'Brights lived on what became known as the Gibner place for only one year before he died, leaving a widow and five children ranging in age from newborn to 7 years. He was buried in row 14 of the original part of Hansford cemetery. His stone has weathered and is hard to read, but seems to show that he was born in 1870 and died February 11, 1908. However the probate proceeding show that he died May 28, 1907. At that time Section 66 was appraised at \$6.00 per acre and Section 64 at \$12.00 per acre, indicating that O'Bright may have enlarged the small adobe room already on the site by the addition of a large adobe room on the east.

After her husband's death, Mrs. O'Bright made some attempt to carry on, leasing the land to John O'Loughlin in 1908 and renting out the improvements to tenants. She had asked Ace Powers to act as executor to the estate, but "he told me he had more than he could do to tend to his own business, and Mr. Atkins (a neighbor) talks like he can't so I gave up asking the neighbors". This according to a letter she

wrote. With no options left, Adeline O'Bright and her five little children returned to Minnesota where she married her deceased husband's brother Andrew O'Bright. Mrs. O'Bright died in 1968 in Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

Her absence from the County may have accounted for the extended period of time in settling her husband's estate. While renters William B. and Lizzie Cline

occupied the house in 1910, the court ordered the administrator and county sheriff, R.E. Martin, to sell Sections 64 and 65, but Martin was killed in 1911. It was July, 1913 before Addie O'Bright waived her homestead rights to the land and sold it to Palo Duro rancher, J.E. Steele. Total consideration for the two sections was \$7,680 and Steele's agreement to pay the state the balance due from John O'Bright's purchase in 1906.

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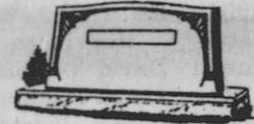

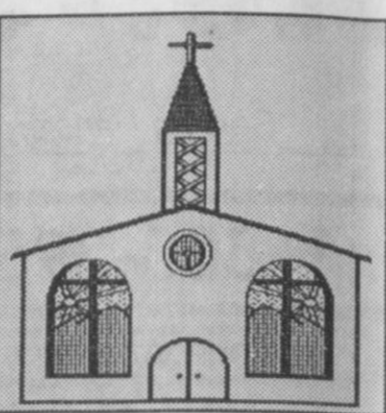

PTA history outlined

The National PTA is the oldest and largest volunteer association working exclusively on behalf of all children and youth. It began on February 17, 1897, when 2,000 women and a handful of men met in Washington, D.C., at the invitation of Alice McLellan Birney, a former journalist and wife of a prominent Washington lawyer, and her ally, Phobe Apperson Hearst, widow of a wealthy California Senator, mother of William Randolph Hearst, and a founder and supporter of kindergartens in many areas of the nation.

During that time the plight of many American children clouded the future. Three-fourths of them dropped out of school before reaching the 5th grade; many were forced to work in mines or factories under dangerous conditions; and vast numbers of children and youth, ill-housed, hungry and poorly educated, were barely able to read or write. Disease, mal-nutrition, and accidents also took a heavy toll on too many of the nation's youth.

Those attending that first meeting, among them Mrs. Adlai Stevenson, wife of the Vice-President of the United States, and the wives of several Cabinet Members and the Postmaster General, feared that the country's children were at risk and that as a consequence, the country was at risk. They believed that if the next generation were to be able to assume a constructive role in society in the new century, parents needed to be helped to understand the importance of their role and to develop skills in rearing their children. They also believed that to ensure the nation's future, all caring adults needed to mobilize to act on behalf of all children.

The founders established the organization as a nationwide movement and called it the National Congress of Mothers, but almost immediately recognized the need to reach out to everyone if its goals were to be achieved. Theodore Roosevelt was one of the many men to join, serving on the Advisory Committee for 19 years before, during and after his presidency. After a series of name changes that reflect the widening composition of its membership, the name National Congress of Parents and Teachers was officially adopted in 1924.

Since its founding, the National PTA and its state branches, districts, councils, and local PTA units, which constitute its constituent organizations, have played an important, often leading role in such efforts as:

Providing parents education for generations of American parents.

Increasing parent involvement in education and in their children's schooling.

Establishing child labor laws and the juvenile justice system.

Supporting compulsory public education, including kindergartens.

Creating a National Public Health Service.

Developing health, safety and nutrition programs for children, such as hot lunch programs and alcohol and other drugs use prevention programs.

Promoting education for children with disabilities and other special needs.

Demanding adequate and equitable funding for public education.

Assuring that public funds are used only for public schools that are accountable to the taxpayers.

Since 1909, National PTA has been represented in every White House Conference dealing with the various problems faced by children and youth. It was one of only three educational organizations to be consulted to the U.S. Delegation that helped create the United Nations and assisted in framing the first Hoover Report, leading to the creation of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. National PTA was singled out for its "unprecedented participation in the development of preventive measures against paralytic polio and its leadership in achieving record acceptance of the salk vaccine."

The National PTA and its constituent organizations have shown remarkable foresight in health and safety areas such as campaigning to reduce infant mortality, encouraging traffic safety education, conducting the first national conference on alcohol and other drug use among minors and in establishing nationwide projects on smoking and health, seat belt and child restraints, and AIDS education, among many accomplishments.

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
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
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Hansford County Library Book Notes

chance to explore the West in a natural setting.



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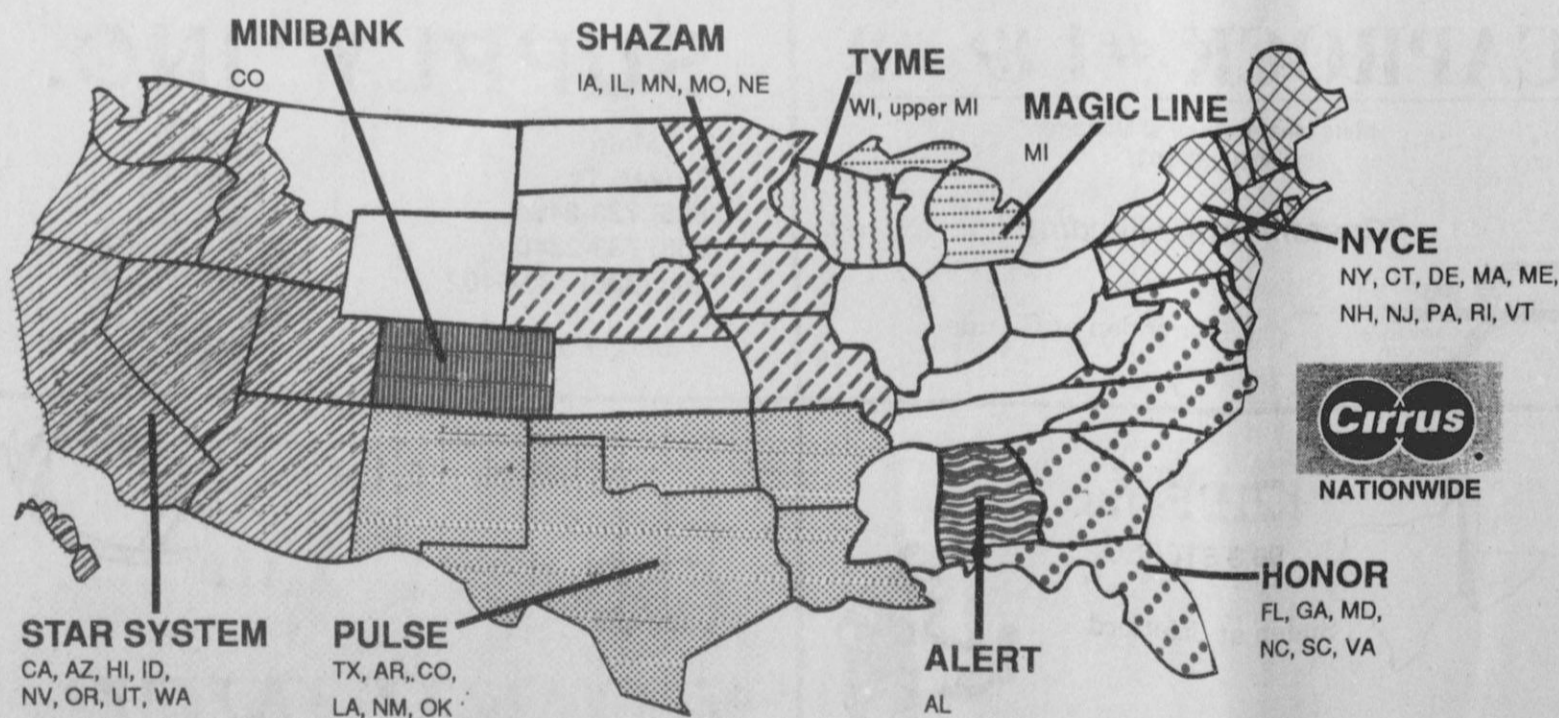


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
