Spearman Police Department and Sheriff's Department make rounds

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department and the Spearman Police Department were more than busy again this past two or three weeks. Both departments had their hands full, as they tried to keep out city streets clean.

It is Grand Jury time for Spearman, and for the Sheriff's Office, that means work time. Every six months, around September and March, a Grand Jury is selected to serve for cases of the previous months.

An amazing 34 indictments has been given to the jury, who is supposed to go to work on December 4. According to local Deputy, Gary Evans, most of the indictments will not go to court, and in fact, the 16 years that Deputy Evans has served in Spearman, only 2 have actually gone to trial.

Of the current 34 indictments, 7 are still "sealed", or in other words, the people involved in the crime have not yet been arrested. As for the other ones, Rex Michael Allen, Timothy Edward Ivan Gray, and Jerry Alan Stewart hit the list of those who were indicted six times. This group of people are the ones who were arrested for the series of burglaries that occurred on main street some time ago. All four men, whose bonds were all set at \$5,000 for each building, have already pleaded guilty to the Burglary of a Building charge and are now currently serving time in Oklahoma.

There will also be five Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle charges up for trial. Two of the five, Carlos Pineda, Jr. and Israel Vasquez Jr., bonds were set at \$7,500. Two of the others, Tammy Sue Castillo and Roger Castillo, were set at \$5,000 each. Homer Lee Hughes, the other count of the same charge, was set at \$10,000. Hughes has also been charged with Retaliation, which was a death threat to the Sheriff and it too carries a \$10,000 bond.

A \$3,000 bond was issued to Raelene Marie Hamaker and Randel Deen Hill for Forgery. Hamaker was charged with Forgery by Passing, while Hill was charged with Forgery by Making.

For the final indictment, Michael Eugene Lucas was charged with Theft by Appropriation, which came with a \$10,000 bond.

The Police Department is still very much on the ball also. Over the past couple of weeks, the station has answered many calls, including eight very important ones.

A 73 year old man, Cleburne Cortez Hilt, Jr. was arrested for "bootlegging" and Public Intoxication. His passenger, Ebelina Rojas Luna, 44, was also arrested for Public Intoxication. The two were pulled over on the 400 Block of Hwy. 207. Apparently, the two some was carrying way over the legal limit, as they were in possession of 3- 18 oz. packs of Coors Light, 1-24 pack of 12 oz. Budweiser, 3 cases of 12 oz. bottles of Michelob, 1- tropical 8 oz. marguerite freeze, 1- Pint of Walker's Deluxe Whiskey, and a 12 pack of 12 oz. Coors Light.

Jammie Dean Pierce, 33, was also arrested for Public Intox and Disorderly Conduct. Evidently, Pierce had passed on the roadway in the 900 block of Archer. When she was noticed by a resident in the neighborhood, the Spearman EMT service and the department was called in to help her. After their arrival, Pierce became violent and began fighting with those who were trying to help.

Marie Leicht, 36, called in on a complaint that Lee Daniel Sheets, 30, had broken into her house and assaulted her. Sheets was charged with Criminal Trespass and Assault, but Leicht later dropped the charges.

On August 8th, the PD was called in to handle a somewhat tragic matter. Eight year old Edgar Fraire was severely injured, when his go-cart was over-turned. Apparently, the youngster was driving in the alley between Archer and Coble Streets. The cart ran over his right leg scrapping his right leg and leaving a large hole on the knee. He was quickly transported to St. Anthony's Hospital.

Gorge David Schick, 37, who has just been recently released from the hospital for a broken back, was arrested for assault of bodily injury. Evidently, Schick beat his 36 year old wife, Robin Marie Lambert Schick at their home in the 200 block of South James.

Another domestic abuse case was called in on the 6th of August. John Lynn Adams, 24, was charged with Class A Assault on Tina Lazono. The fight started at the Moose, and was then carried to the residence on the 400 block of South Haney.

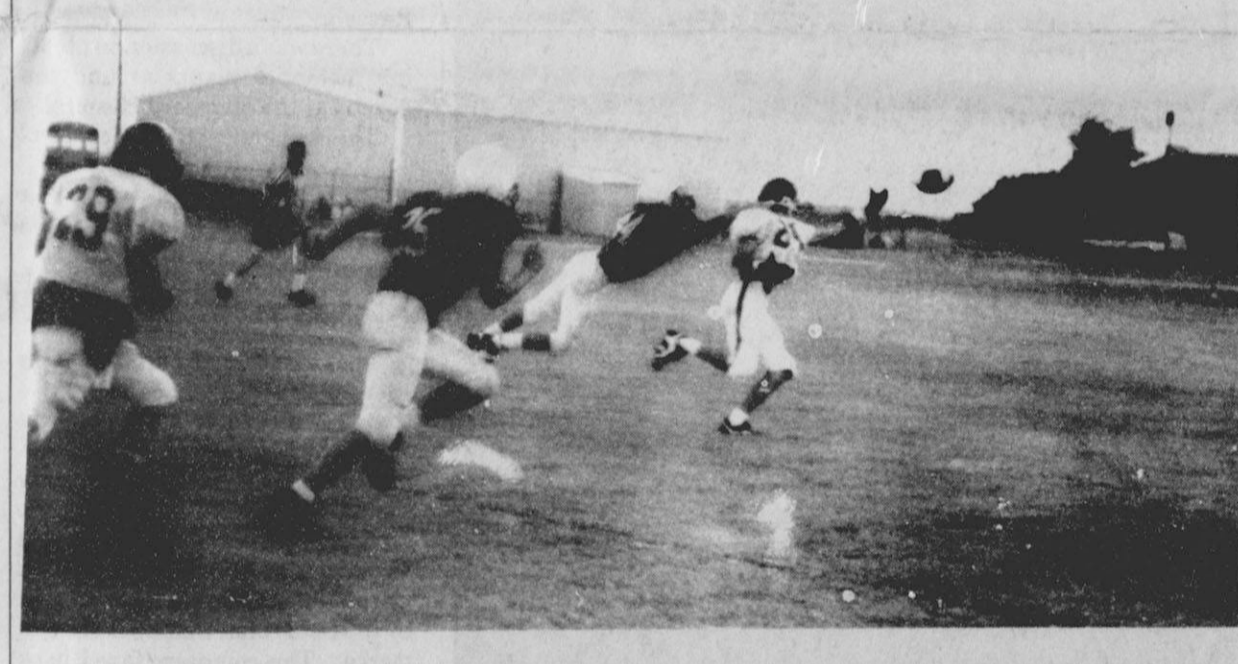
The new registration stickers that are supposed to be anti-theft were proven to not be this past week. Jose Gregorio Baca reported that James Knight Hick's, 74, April Registration sticker was stolen off his '89 White Ford 150 at the 500 block of East 2nd. Evidently, the person or persons who stole the sticker used a freon like substance to loosen the glue that holds the sticker onto the window. No one has yet been arrested for the crime.

Finally, Jose Jesus Garcia, 20, was arrested for two outside warrants from the Borger Police Department. Garcia was pulled over on the 300 block of South Archer in his 1982 white Chevy Blazer. The reason for the warrants was not posted.

The March term for the Grand Jury will begin with arraignment hearings on September 5, with a pre-trial on October 10th, and the jury trial, if any are needed on December 4.

"Jump Start" program kicks off

The Hansford County Library has joined libraries around the country in a national program that encourages parents to give their children a "Jump Start" at the library. The program, sponsored by The Prudential and Friends of Libraries U.S.A. (FOLUSA), is designed to promote library card sign-up and use among first, second, and third graders. The Jump Start newsletter, distributed in September (National Library Card Sign-up Month) offers parents practical information and ideas on reading and learning-and a chance to win a \$50,000 college grant in Prudential's Jump Start Sweepstakes.

"We are reaching out to parents of first, second, and third graders in our area through Jump Start to remind them that helping their children to develop good reading skills is one of the most important contributions they can make to their educational future," said Sheri Benton, Librarian. "Studies show that children who learn to love reading early really do have a jump start on success in school and in life."

A special insert in the Jump Start newsletter encourages parents to bring their child into the library to get an official library card in the child's name. "Just getting a card

with his or her own name on it means a lot to a child at this age. It brings a new excitement to the library experience-children sense that the library and all those books are really theirs to explore," added Benton. The insert carries the sweepstakes entry form that parents turn in when they bring their children into the library anytime from September through the end of October. In addition to the college prizes include Macintosh Performa computers, *World Book Encyclopedia* sets, and *Childcraft* sets. Public and school libraries have opportunities to win cash awards as well as *World Book* or *Childcraft* sets.

Libraries initiated the Jump Start process by contacting schools. Those schools that joined in the program with the library will distribute the newsletters, customized by grade, to parents. When students bring their official library cards to class, they get to "sign in" on "I Got a Jump Start at the Library!" posters and receive Jump Start stickers.

"Our mission is to bring community resources together in ways that expand the positive impact of libraries," said Sandy Dolnick, executive director of FOLUSA. "With Prudential's support, we are able to get the Jump Start message out to millions of parents and children.

It's a wonderful example of business, libraries, schools, and local Friends chapters working together on behalf of children."

Richard Barron, vice president of advertising and sales support at Prudential Insurance, agrees. "As employers, members of the business community have a stake in the education of our children and the vitality of our public libraries. On a more personal note, as a father of school-aged children, I know that making books available and taking time to read with children has a tremendous positive impact," he said.

The Spearman Elementary School is participating with the library in the Jump Start program. On a nation wide basis, Jump Start is expected to reach more than two million children and their parents.

Finally, the Board approved the new Employee Leave Policy guidelines for 1995-96.

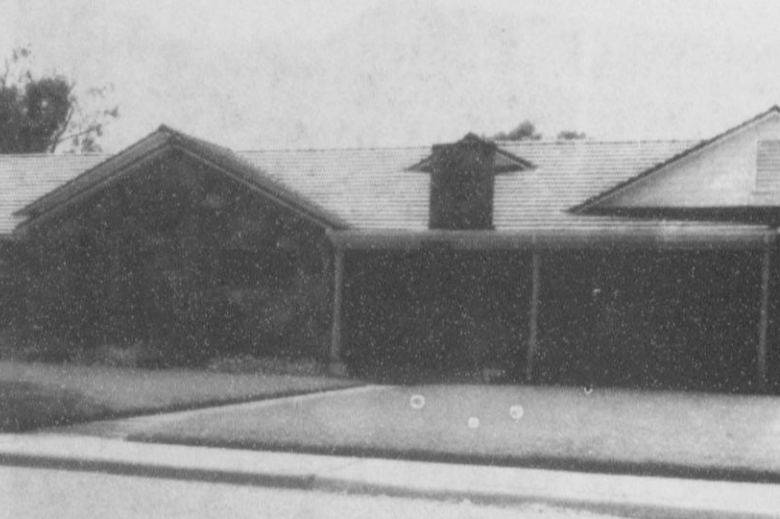

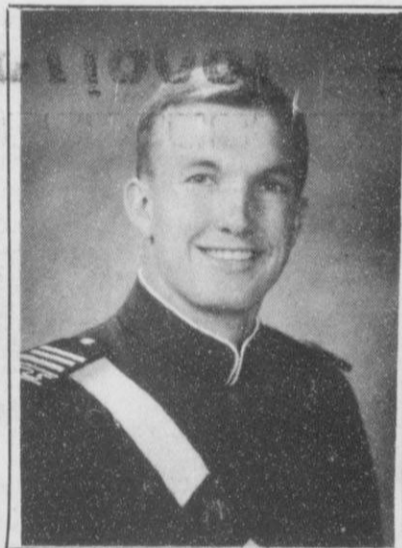

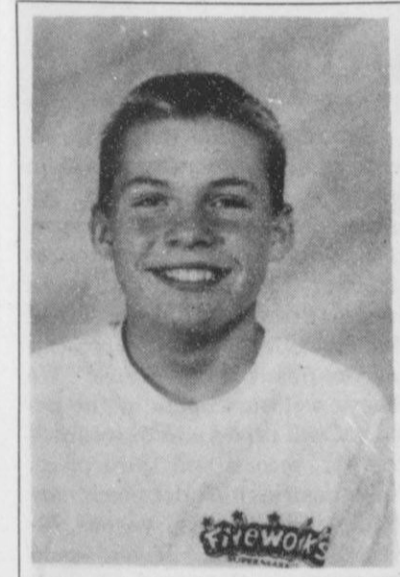
The driver of the van, Alayne Jackson Baker, 33, apparently did not see Henning coming, and by the time she hit her brakes, it was too late.

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Extension News

Is 100% fruit juice more nutritious than fruit drinks fortified with Vitamin C?

Generally speaking, yes. The body can't distinguish the natural vitamin C found in may fortified fruit "drinks", cocktails, and "punches." But the nutritional merits of these juice look-alikes end there. An eight-ounce glass of orange juice provides vitamin C as well as impressive amounts of potassium and folic acid.

Other pure fruit juices, such as 100% apple or 100% grape juice, contain very little vitamin C unless it has been added during processing. But they do contain trace amounts of important minerals, including zinc, copper and manganese.

An eight-ounce glass of tomato or vegetable juice offers up to 50% of the daily value for iron, as well as a bonus of three grams of fiber.

Besides vitamins and minerals, there are a host of other compounds present in fruits and vegetables and their juices that seem to protect against cancer and heart disease.

THE BOTTOM LINE - If vitamin C is all you're after, then you can settle for what tastes good and provides the most vitamin C. But if you care about total nutrition and strive for the recommended five servings of fruits and vegetables a day, go for the real thing. You'll get not only a multitude of vitamins and minerals, but the many disease-preventing compounds juices contain.

Recycling Words

Last week was National Newspaper Recycling Week. A cause for great celebration at our house as I'm sure you can imagine. Actually it is my favorite "National Week" to celebrate right after National Eat Out Every Night and National Husband's Do the Laundry Week. (Call me for the dates on these).

The Amarillo Globe News got into the spirit of celebration by printing an entire section so that we could have more to recycle that week. The section tells us that the newspaper recovery rate has nearly doubled in the last ten years and the demand for old newspaper has never been greater.

Why recycle newspaper? I love trees as much as the next person but in truth we actually are planting more trees today than we are harvesting. We recycle newspaper to conserve space in the very expensive landfills we are building. Permitting alone for Pampa's new landfill costs \$800,000. With that kind of price tag you want to fill it slowly and make it last.

We recycle newsprint because it is a valuable raw material that can be used to create anything from a new sheet of newspaper to a cereal box to tissue to insulation for a home. We actually export some of our old paper. Why toss out some-

thing that still has a valuable life? My grandmother would be ashamed.

We recycle newsprint because it creates jobs and business in our area. We didn't have much employment for the Paul Bunyan types in our Great Forest of the Texas Panhandle but there are jobs in recycling.

Nothing could be easier to recycle than a newspaper. Your toughest chore is to remember that the sack you put your newspaper in is not for old tissues.

Recycle your newspaper and all the sections that come with it in the same bin. Even the colored sections are recyclable in the newsprint bin. Most of the ads can be recycled with the newsprint, but pull the coupons and recycle them with the magazines.

Don't recycle papers that are older than 6 months or that are wet.

Remove the rubber bands and old tissues and don't bundle them in anything but a paper sack.

Spearman has recycled about 34 tons of newsprint since March. Keep up the good work and look for the Hansford County Reporter Statesman in your next box of Fruity Pebbles.

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Out at the Lake

This summer our grandchildren that live on the Palo Duro Creek on the north part of the Old Tyler Ranch have enjoyed watching the beavers at play early in the mornings. The favorite thing to see them do is to go head-first down the mud slides they build along the steep banks. The worst thing is to see where they have cut down another tree.

Having somewhat of a historian's mind, this made me curious about the advent of the beaver on the Palo Duro. People I talked to were Joel

and John Mark Stavlo, Reba Hunter, Joel Lee Lackey, Nick Holt, Bill Smith, Wilson Buchanan of Dumas, and Julia McManus of Gage, OK.

My family (Haden Hart) lived on the Palo Duro Creek from 1919 to 1930. I have no memories or family stories of beavers on the creek in that period. Wilson Buchanan bached in the Tyler house in 1927 before we moved there in 1927. He doesn't think there were any of the little engineers at that time.

Bill Smith, a grandson of James Hamilton Cator, tells of trapping on the creek as a boy without seeing beavers. In the mid thirties he came back to visit from California, where he was living at the time. He

was on the creek with his Uncle Jimmy Cator, when he spotted some trees that had been cut down and were left near the pointed stumps. He asked his Uncle why he had cut those trees in that fashion, as he thought they had been cut with an axe. Jim Cator laughed and told him it was the work of beavers.

In 1942 or 1943 Wilson

Buchanan remembered beavers on the Steele Ranch. Since in our country these animals generally make their burrows in the sides of the creek banks, he said they learned not to ride their horses very close to the edge of the banks, as some of the banks had caved under riders.

I'll leave you till next week in "SAM's" Corner.

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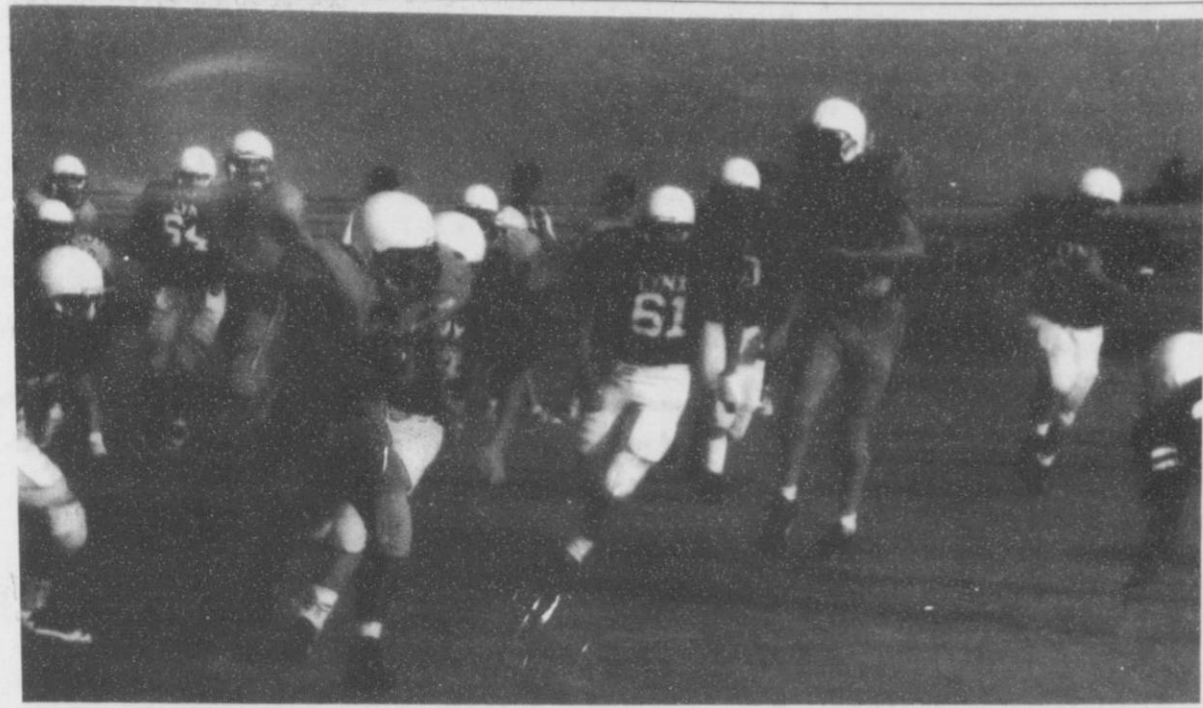

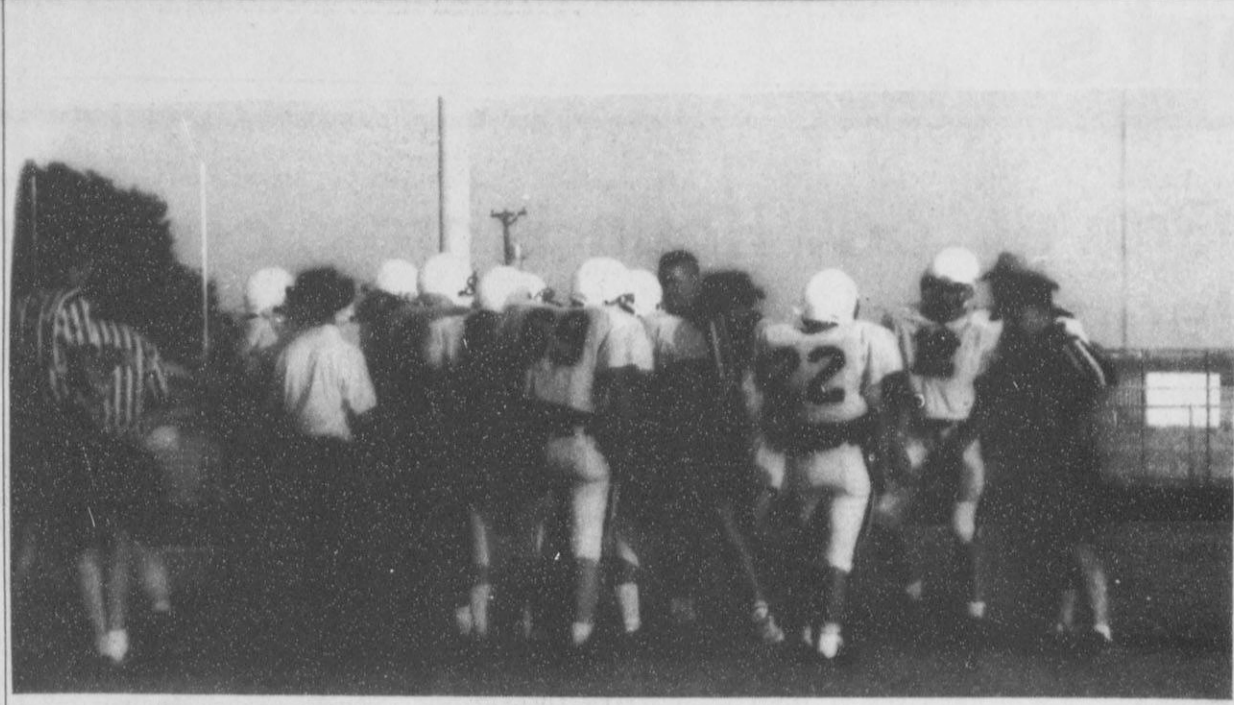

Gruver Greyhound football season to open September 8th

The 1995 football season is set to open Friday, September 8, at 7:30 p.m. at Greyhound Stadium in Gruver, with the Gruver Greyhounds hosting the Wheeler Mustangs. It will be the opening to a season which could very well be a pivotal season in Hounds' history, a season in which the Hounds could return to the playoffs for the first time in eleven years. That could produce a succession of playoff-calibre teams for the next several years to come.

The Hounds' opponent, the Wheeler Mustangs, are ranked in the state's top ten schools in class A football competition. However, the Mustangs will have their hands full in district 1-A competition, as they are picked to fight it out with the Shamrock Irish for the district championship. Gruver finished third in district 1-AA last year, though they had an outstanding won-lost record of 6-3. Unfortunately, they lost to both Stratford and West Texas, the district's two representatives in the playoffs. This year the Hounds do not mince words, their aim is to make the playoffs, and possibly win the district championship outright. It would be their first district championship since 1968 - 27 long years.

The Mustangs will certainly be formidable opponents. For one thing, they return two quarterbacks

with starting experience, in addition to returning two more starters in their backfield. They put a tremendous amount of points on the board their last eight games of last year, before being stymied by Wink in the playoffs.

In last year's opener, the Hounds held Wheeler to one score in a 14-7 Hounds victory at Wheeler. But Wheeler started slow, before really turning on the afterburners, and closing the season very strong.

The action gets under way at 7:30 P.M. It should be a very entertaining and closely-contested ball game.

The Hounds junior varsity team gets an early jump on the season, as they open play at 6:00 P.M. next Thursday, September 7, at Greyhound Stadium in Gruver against the Boys Ranch Roughriders junior varsity. The two junior high teams do not open play for a couple of weeks yet.

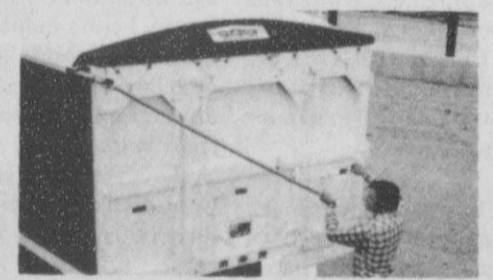

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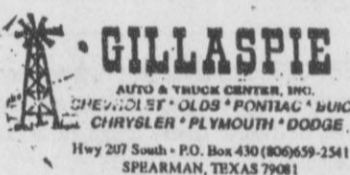
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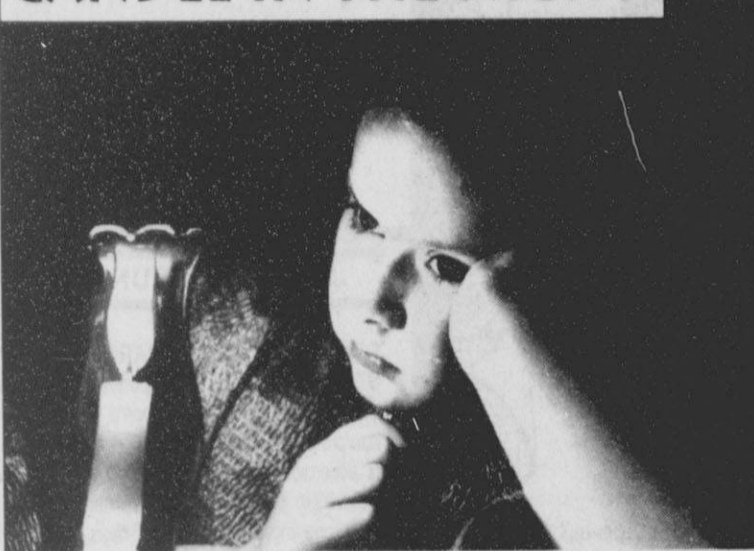
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CANDLE IN THE NIGHT
