Hounds and Lynx 1995 football All-District selections made

In the middle of the roundball season, it might be considered odd to discuss last year's football season, but not in Hansford County. The Spearman Lynx and the Gruver Greyhounds really had a fabulous season on the gridiron this past fall. Both teams finished with winning records, but neither team made the playoffs, which goes to show how tough this District 1-AA was this year.

The two Hansford County teams were, in a way, denied glory, not by making the playoffs, but by having to wait so long to see who was the best in the district. After a long wait because of West Texas being in the playoffs for so long, the 1995 All-District selections are finally out, and both Spearman and Gruver really have many things to brag about. A total of 26 pigskin players made the elite list, 16 Spearman and 10 Gruver.

The quarterback position is a rough one to handle. It's even harder when only one man can claim the glory of 1st team, 2nd team, and honorable mention. That one was Spearman's Coyt Tigrett. He made the 2nd team for the demanding position.

The big yard gainers, the running backs, most definitely have their work cut out for them. Taking bumps and bruises, getting tired quick, and having a long run called back on a penalty are just a few things that these iron men must go through on the field. However, for Spearman's Brent Collins and Michael Witten and Gruver's Daniel Bort and Travis Ferguson, the job was an everyday struggle. Collins, Bort, and Ferguson all made the 2nd team, while Witten came in with an honorable mention.

In his last year at SHS, Dillon Miller has been nothing but a success story. The big man came through for Spearman and captured the 1st team tight end position.

Miller was one of the few only Hansford County players to make the 1st team.

With the receivers like Gruver's Wylee Maupin and Spearman's Martin Sanders, it's easy to see how Gruver and Spearman did so well last fall. Maupin received one of the few 1st team positions for his well done job, while Sanders brought in the 2nd team bid for his efforts.

A group often forgotten in any football team that is really the big force behind the team is the linemen. Max Frick from Gruverbrakes that mold, however, and many opposing players will remember him for years to come, as he has made the 1st team for his spot on the field. Another unforgettable name will that of Matt Gafford. This towering giant should have his pick of where to play college ball and what to do when he graduates. Gafford was not only a big force in this year's Lynx team, he was also a big leader. Gafford has also captured the honor of 1st team offensive linemen. It's hard to believe that the Lynx could have been so blessed this year, but they were. In addition to Gafford's 1st team honor, another 1st teamer, Jason Holton takes the cake as well. The hard hitting Cody McLeod really should have been a 1st team mention also, but somehow he made it on the second team, which is still an honor. Besides, his specialty is defense. With another year still ahead of him, Eric Varnon's name appeared on the list of greats for the district. Varnon made the honorable mention team, and he will be the driving force in next year's Lynx team.

With all the work that a center has to do, hiking the ball and protecting the quarterback, one might wonder who want such a job. Juan Arreola was that man who had it. Arreola had a fine season with the Hounds, so it's easy to see how he

would make the 2nd team.

Of course, what would a team be like without a strong kicker, and who else could be thought of as a great kicker in the district than Greg Elliott. The funny thing about Elliott is that his kicking job was just one of the many extras he did this year. His efforts well deserved the 1st team kicker spot.

Well, now that all the offensive superstars have been named, it's time to change to the other side of the ball for the defensive players, which some will be repeats of the offensive players.

No matter what is said about the Lynx this past year, nothing can be said without mentioning Gafford again. Yes, his name comes up again as the best defensive linemen for 1995. Andy Morris and Jason Ward, two guys that always seemed to manage to be on every tackle took the 2nd team mentioning for Gruver. The hard hitting Travis Loomis also took the 2nd team spot for Spearman, while the big Tom Kirk took the honorable mention position.

Who makes the most tackles on the field? The linebackers of course, and this past year it really showed. Four Gruver and Spearman players made it, and those four are well deserving. Frick is surely keeping his last name alive, as he brought in the 1st team for his spot. Cody McLeod of Spearman worked his specialty of hard hitting tackles, as he brought in the other 1st team linebacker spot. Another Gruver and Spearman combo made the 2nd team spots. The big tacklers, Sammy Renteria, Gruver, Phillip Sanders, Spearman earned the honors.

The defensive ends is a real important job, and for Martin Sanders, Clay Neff, and Bailey Barkley did the job well. Sanders and Barkley brought in the 2nd team spots, while Neff brought in the honorable mention position.

Of course, any winning coach knows you need excellent secondary people, or you wind up with several losing seasons. That's just what Spearman and Gruver had this year. Most people think of Coyt Tigrett as the man with the golden arm who threw many great passes, but Tigrett was on the other side of the coin as well. He was the only secondary man to make 1st team for the position. Gruver's Wylee Maupin and Tye Womble brought in the 2nd team for this position. All three of the honorable mentions for this category were gobbled up by Hansford County players. Spearman's Elliott and Jeremy Blan, and Gruver's Bort took the honors.

In District 1-AA, it is very difficult to receive a unanimous selection, but Spearman's Collins did just that. He was chosen by every coach in the district as the 1st team punter, not bad for a player who was playing all the way until the end of the season with a hurt shoulder.

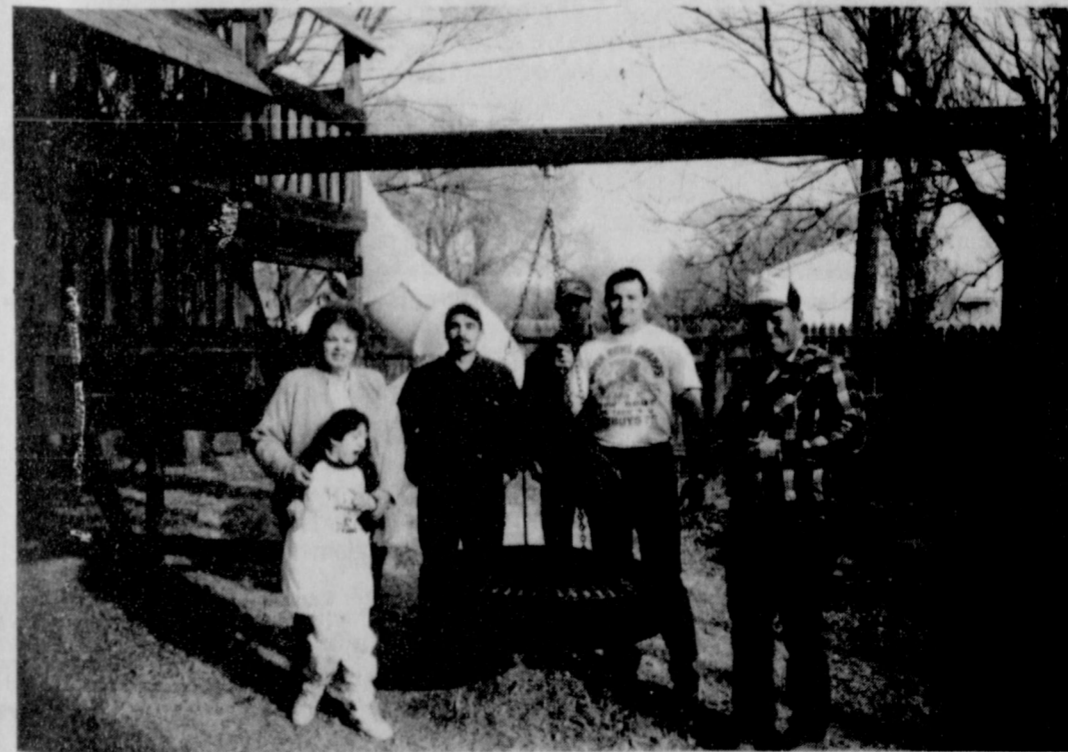

Kitchens' celebrate 50 years of marriage

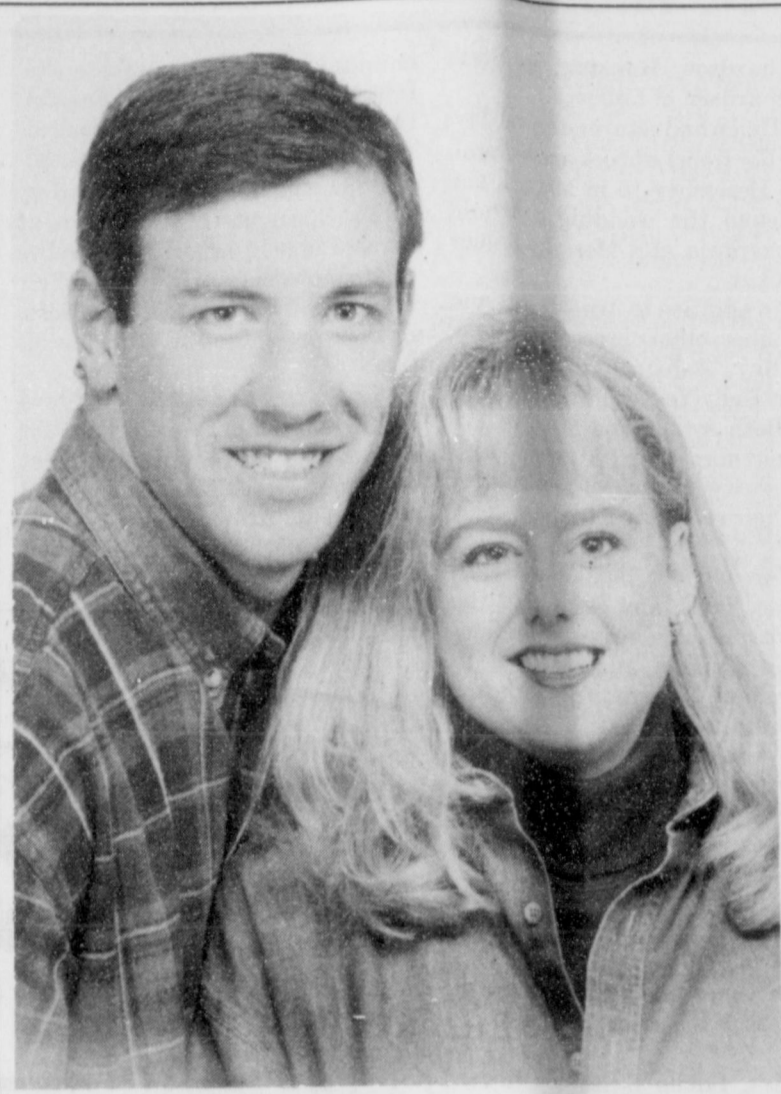

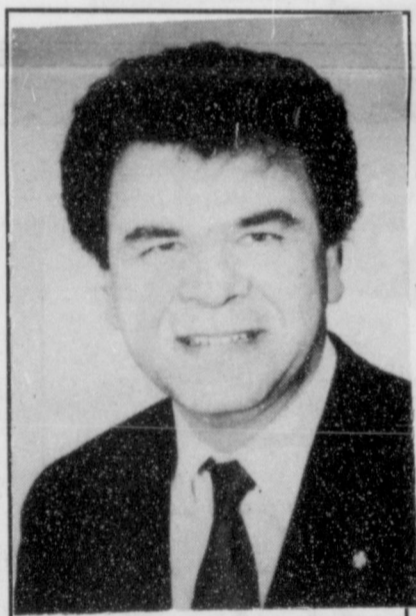

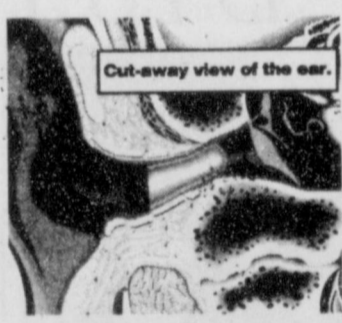


ECK SPAHICH

taken by Jim Derington last week when he happened to look down in a little draw and see 10 deer - two bucks and eight does. Jim and I have been trying to get a report on how the first deer season for Hansford County turned out. The season was only on white tail bucks.

This morning I talked to Danny Swepston, the Texas wild life biologist for Region I. He covers 56 counties and said they did not make an individual report for each county. Although he had seen some nice bucks that were taken in our county, Danny felt, since all the area is in private ownership, that it was hunted very conservatively.

He added that Texas Parks and Wildlife stocked the first white tail deer in Hansford County in 1946. The present herds may or may not

have come from that original stock, but whatever the source, he felt the herd had reached its potential and was ready for a light harvest. In his view the CRP has helped in the expansion.

The deer are being seen in larger herds now. Bobby Mosier has recently seen one herd of nine white-tails.

Cougar tracks have been seen in western Sherman County. They seem to be of a lioness with a kitten.

Raymond Cantu and his brother visited the Lake on Christmas Day and were fortunate to have an "unforgettable moment" when they saw a young bobcat chase and catch a cottontail rabbit near the bridge. Raymond works at the Lake.
