There's a lot of muddy water in the District 31 Texas Senate race, and it's not all from mudslinging candidates.

Teel Bivins' early exit from the Texas Senate, has not only caused a special election but a great deal of confusion among voters.

With the runoff election between Kel Seliger and Kirk Edwards for the Texas Senate, District 31 seat slated for February 17, 2004, a great many voters may think the matter of representation will be set-

But it's not quite that simple. Kim Vera, Hansford County Clerk, explained that the runoff election will decided who will fill the unexpired term of Sen. Teel Bivins until January 2005, but the primary race next month will decide who will be the Republican nominee for the Texas Senate seat in the November 2004 election.

"It's very confusing," Vera said. "A lot of people will be surprised to find three other names on the March primary ballot for the senate seat along with the winner of the February runoff election winner.

One thing is for sure, the

winner of the February ballot inee in the November General will serve District 31 as state Election. senator until January 2005. Whoever wins the race, Seliger or Edwards, will then have to

The Democratic side of things is a bit simpler. Elaine King Miller is the only candidate in the Democratic primary, and she will run against the Republican nominee, that is decided in the March primary.

Run-Off For **Special Election**

Gov. Rick Perry set Tuesday, February 17th as the special election run-off date to fill the vacancy for Senate District 31.

Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo and Kirk Edwards, R-Odessa, will face each other in the runoff because they placed first and second, respectively, in the special election held January 20th.

Anyone registered to vote can participate in the runoff, even those who didn't vote in the January 20th special election.

Applications for ballot by mail shall be mailed to: Kim V. Vera, 15 NW Court, Spearman, TX 79081, and must be received no later than the close of business on February 11th.

Early voting by personal appearance will be conducted each weekday at the Hansford County Clerks Office in Spearman and the branch office at the City Hall in Gruver between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. from February 9th-13th.

The special election will be held on February 17, 2004 at the City Hall in Spearman (Precincts 1, 5 & 6) and the High School Library in Gruver (Precincts 2, 3, 4, 7 & 9), beginning at 7 a.m. and ending at 7 p.m.

FDIC, FBI Issue Warning **Concerning E-Mail**

At approximately 12 noon on January 23, 2004, FDIC Consumer Call Centers in Kansas City, Missouri, and Washington, D.C., began receiving a large number of complaints by consumers who received an email that has the appearance of being sent from the FDIC.

The email informs the recipient that Department of Homeland Security Director Tom Ridge has advised the FDIC to suspend all deposit insurance on the recipient's bank account due to suspected violations of the USA Patriot Act. The email further indicates that deposit insurance will be suspended until personal identity, including bank account information, can be verified.

This email was not sent by the FDIC and is a fraudulent attempt to obtain personal information from consumers. Financial institutions and consumers should NOT access the link provided within the body of the email and should NOT under any circumstances provide any personal information through this media.

The FDIC and the FBI are attempting to identify the source of the emails and disrupt the transmission. Until this is achieved, consumers are asked to report any similar attempts to obtain this information to the FDIC by sending information to alert@fdic.gov.

New Texas Traffic Laws

On September 1, 2003, a number of new Texas laws went into

effect. Among them were two traffic laws.

Texas Transportation Code 545.157: Passing Authorized **Emergency Vehicle.** It is unlawful in Texas, when approaching a stationary authorized emergency vehicle using visual signals (four alternately flashing

red lights - two front/two rear, and emit a light visible for 500 feet in sunlight), to drive in the lane closest to the emergency vehicle while driving on a highway or street with two or more lanes traveling in the direction of the emergency vehicle unless you are directed to do so by a police officer; or if you have to travel in the lane next to the emergency vehicle, you must slow to a speed of 20 miles per hour below the posted speed limit or you must slow to a speed of 5 miles an hour if the posted speed limit is 25 miles per hour or

This new law requires drivers nearing a stopped emergency vehicle that has lights activated, unless otherwise directed by a law enforcement officer to:

1. Vacate the lane closest to the emergency vehicle, if the highway has two or more lanes traveling the direction of the emergency

2. Slow to a speed not more than 20 miles per hour (mph) less than the posted speed limit when the posted speed limit is 25 mph

3. Slow to a speed not more than five mph when the posted speed limit is less than 25 mph.

A violation is a punishable by a maximum fine of \$200. If the violation results in property damage, the maximum fine increases to \$500. If the violation results in bodily injury, the offense is enhanced to a Class B misdemeanor.

Please note the "or" in the law. In other words, on a two lane highway (i.e. Hwy. 207 to Stinnett), you need only lower your speed to 20 mph below the posted speed limit unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

Texas Transportation Code 502.409: Altered or Obscured License Plate.

It is unlawful in Texas to have anything attached to or covering a license plate, even if the covering material is clear. The plate must be plainly visible and can not have an illuminated bracket, sticker, decal, emblem, or insignia that is not authorized by law and that interferes with the readability of the letters or numbers on the plate or the name of the State. Nothing is allowed to obscure the letters or numbers on the plate, the color of the plate or another original design feature of the plate.
