## Library Celebrates 70th Anniversary

### Hansford County Extension Agency To Honor Veterans

Ross Renner will be the keynote speaker at the Veterans Day Program scheduled for Monday, November 11, from 10:00 - 11:00 a.m. in the Spearman Varsity Gym.

The program, sponsored by the Extension Education Clubs of Hansford County, will feature "The National Anthem" played by the Spearman High School Band and a rendition of patriotic selections presented by the Spearman school choirs and bands.

Renner joined the United States Marine Corps following his graduation in 1987 from Gruver High School. His time of active duty was spent stationed in Washington, D.C., where he was one of four Marines selected to serve at the West Wing of the White House in 1992.

Renner is also a graduate of Abilene Christian University, with an agricultural degree in Range Science and Agronomy, and the Amarillo Police Academy. He served as a police officer in Amarillo from 1996 until 1999, when he was hired by the Secret Service. He was stationed in the Dallas field office of the Secret Service for two years. He is currently active in the US Marine Corps Reserve.

All veterans are invited and encouraged to attend this program being presented in their honor.

Approximately sixty-five people attended the 70th anniversary celebration held Sunday, November 3, 2002 at the Hansford County Library. The event was hosted by the Twentieth Century Club and the Library Board and staff. The Twentieth Century Club members served delicious refreshments and helped the Board members and staff greet all of the attendees.

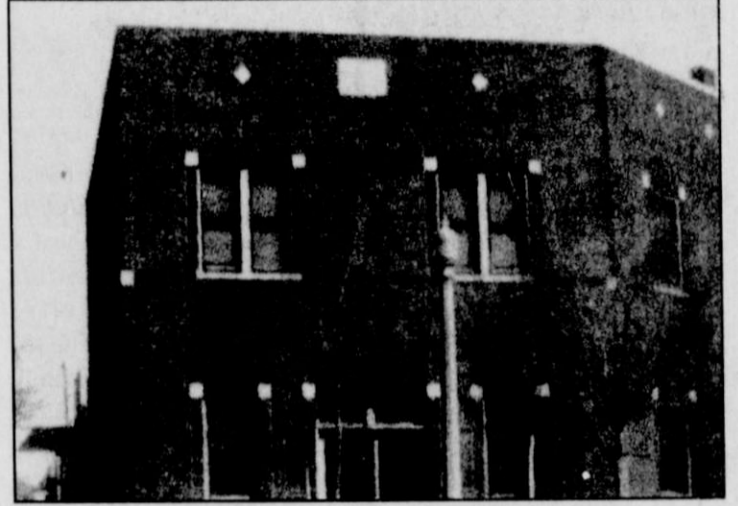

### Emergency Farm Loans Being Accepted

On October 21, 2002, the Secretary of Agriculture designated 122 counties in Texas as a primary natural disaster area. This action is due to losses caused by drought and excessive temperatures that occurred from January 1, 2002, and continuing.

This designation makes family sized farm operators in both the primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA). FSA will consider each loan application by taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability, and other eligibility requirements.

Farmers may be eligible for loans for 100 percent of their actual losses (minus other compensation) or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less (maximum amount \$500,000). The farmers must be unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders to be eligible for the emergency loans. The interest rate on the actual loss loan is 3.75%.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until October 1, 2003. Applications may be obtained at the local FSA office.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibits discrimination in its programs on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, and marital or familial status (not all prohibited bases apply to all programs). ### Sheriff's Department, Police Department Join Forces

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department has joined forces with the Spearman Police Department to protect the citizens of Hansford County. This partnership was formed in an effort to create a cohesive unit more capable of addressing illegal drug operations in Hansford County than was possible through the unilateral efforts of any single law enforcement agency.

"I have been Sheriff for over 30 years, and with the Sheriff's Department for over 35 years and this is the first organized cooperative effort between the city and the county," stated Sheriff R.L. McFarlin. "We are getting results, and will continue to work together from here on."

This statement follows the arrest of Grady Patrick Cline and Gavin Qua Crum on October 9, 2002 for "manufacturing a controlled substance" and the arrest on October 27th of Tommy Brown for "theft of anhydrous ammonia for use in the production of methamphetamines and manufacturing a controlled substance" and Adriane Watts for "possession of a controlled substance."

The Spearman Police Department, the Hansford County Sheriff's Department and the State Narcotic Task Force investigated the cases. Both cases will be presented to a Hansford County Grand Jury for indictments.

"Our goal is to better the community - county and city," commented Police Chief Jarrett Wilde. "We will only be able to do that by working together. We will do whatever it takes to protect the citizens and children of Spearman and Hansford County."

"I couldn't ask for a better working relationship with the Sheriff's Department," continued Chief Wilde. "It's the best I've ever been involved with."

City Manager Robert Patrick stated, "When we hired Jarrett Wilde as police chief, one of our priorities was cooperation between the Sheriff's Department and the Police Department."

"The Sheriff's Department has been highly cooperative, and we have been able to be more effective together than we were separately," continued Patrick.

William D. Smith, Judge of the 84th Judicial District, raised bail for Cline from \$60,000 to \$250,000 in a hearing held on October 31, 2002. Judge Smith conditioned the bail upon Cline remaining within the confines of Hutchinson, Hansford and Ochiltree Counties, and submitting to random drug testing. Crum remains in jail on the initial \$60,000 bail. Brown's bail was set at \$100,000 on the theft charge and \$25,000 on the manufacturing charge. Watts' bail was set at \$3,000.

According to Hansford County Judge Jim Brown, "On several occasions the Police and Sheriff's Department have known about drug transactions, but have had a hard time proving it and making an arrest. Since working together three arrests have been made. You can see what happens with cooperation."

This joint effort follows the successful collaboration of the Hansford County Sheriff's Department, Spearman Police Department and Gruver Police Department to form the Hansford Central Dispatch in June of 1999. Located at the Sheriff's Department, the dispatch office handles all dispatches for police, EMS and fire for Hansford County. In doing so, it has saved the taxpayers money and precious time in cases of emergency.

### Local Airport Awarded Improvement Funds

The City of Gruver's Municipal Airport has received \$244,000 in funding for improvements from the Texas Transportation Commission. The commission approved the award at its monthly meeting in Austin this week.

The plans call for improving lighting and signs at the airport to upgrade safety and service standards.

The money comes from state appropriations with 90 percent of the planned improvement costs coming from the TxDOT Aviation Facilities Grant Program. The Grant Program preserves and improves the state's general aviation system. The other 10 percent of project funding will be supplied by the City of Gruver.

# Cazares Appointed To Bush Library Advisory Board

Cody J. Cazares, former aide to President George W. Bush and a current student at Baylor University, has been appointed to the George W. Bush Presidential Library Advisory Board by Baylor President Robert B. Sloan.

The advisory board at Baylor University was formed shortly after then Governor Bush was announced the winner of the 2000 presidential election, but was only recently formalized after Baylor announced its intentions to win the contest of being the future home of the George W. Bush Presidential Center.

Cazares was the first Baylor student chosen to serve on the board due to his close ties to the Bush White House. Cazares has served on occasion as an intermediary between Baylor officials and key White House staff such as Karl Rove, Senior Advisor to the President.

"It is such an honor to serve on this board and to be able to give an insight as to what the President and

his staff might like to see be a part of his library. As a former staffer it is a great opportunity to continue to serve the President while I'm at school," said Cazares.

In fact, Cazares continues to serve the President in many ways. Any time the President visits his Texas Ranch, Cazares is often called upon to help staff the President's trip, which sometimes has included various heads of state. Russian President Vladimir Putin visited the Bush Ranch last November, Britain's Prime Minister Tony Blair visited last April, and most recently China's President Jiang Zemin.

There are various reasons why Baylor believes it can be the best home for the Bush Library. After all, the Western White House in Crawford is just down the road and has already served as a great venue for some of the President's initiatives. Baylor recently was a host to the President's Economic Forum in August, which not only included the President, but also the Vice

President, 8 cabinet secretaries, and countless CEOs from around the country. The White House Press Corps uses Baylor's Student Life Center as a makeshift press briefing room and Secret Service agents and Air Force One and Marine One officers are known to use the work-out facilities and the softball field during their down time. All of these are great opportunities for Baylor to show the President and his staff what they have to offer.

"I have already seen several different proposals for the library, most of which are not yet public, but I can say that they are all very impressive. Some even include a little league field on the library grounds and I know the President is going to love that since he used to be part-owner of the Texas Rangers ball club," said Cazares.

The library, regardless of where the President chooses to put it, will have a serious tone to it as well, not only because it will house countless personal mementos from Bush's entire life, but it will also house thousands of official documents from his years in the White House, including highly sensitive documents dealing with the war on terrorism and the September 11th attacks.

"This will be a state-of-the-art facility where the visitor will not

only be able to celebrate the accomplishments of George W. Bush, but it will also act as a great research facility for people of all ages to learn about the historical period that was Bush's presidency," said Cazares.

Although Texas A&M, Southern Methodist University, and Texas Tech University have all expressed interest in housing Bush's library, Cazares is confident that Bush will choose Baylor.

"Ever since I started working for the President he has invested a lot of time in his ranch down the road from here and the great ideals of faith, community service, family, and leadership that are Baylor University are George W. Bush through and through. I'm a little biased, so I think it's a no-brainer," Cazares said with a smile.

The deer have been coming up to the office and home yards for the green grass. They have discovered the bird feeders and sample the water put out for the birds. One herd of 8 mule deer included a 10 point buck.

One of the fishermen pointed out to Jim a small porcupine in one of the dead trees out in the Lake. It seems strange to think of a young porcupine swimming that far.

A Mr. Taylor helped with both the first and second part of the Turkey Track house, but on the more imposing later addition, he was assisted by Gus McKay's father-in-law, Samuel Pierson. In 1886 Samuel, his wife Anna, and six children, Lizzie, Allie, Mary, Carrie, Tom and Lon, came out from Connerville, Indiana by covered wagon. After a stop in Harper, Kansas, they came on to Farwell where Mr. Pierson, a master carpenter, built most of the town.

He built a restaurant where his wife did the cooking and the older girls helped where needed.

In his letter to Gwenfred Lackey Don McKay said his Grandpa Pierson was an extra good carpenter and a pretty good stone mason. Evidently Stanley Cushing Tyler felt that they were a good team, as he hired them at the finish of the McKay addition to build the 10 room, two story house for his family, using stone from the same quarry. At this time Wallace McKay was riding for the Tylers.

In 1895, when the Tyler house was finished, the Samuel Pierson family moved over on the Beaver and lived in a half dugout while he built his own rock house out of native sandstone from the Beaver Breaks. It was just four miles north of Hardesty. In later years when the house was torn down, the stone was used to build a house on the Hitch ranch for Joyce and John Gray.

## Texas Farm Bureau News

The Texas Farm Bureau filed a "Friend of the Court" brief on Tuesday in the Third District Court of Appeals in Austin in support of South Texas landowners who are resisting Central Power and Light's plans to construct a 52-mile power grid across their properties from Coletto Creek, in Goliad County, to a substation at Pawnee, in Karnes County.

In the brief, TFB urged the appellate court to reverse a district court decision affirming the Public Utility Commission's final order allowing CP&L to enter cultivated farmland.

The brief argues that the PUC acted outside the scope of its power by failing to properly consider factors prescribed by statute

and in violation of the Due Process and Due Course protections of the U.S. and Texas Constitutions.

The brief also argued that PUC failed to adhere to the Legislature's standards for the exercise of delegated power. TFB Attorney Jo Campbell said the Commission had improper ex parte communications with ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas, the independent entity responsible for managing the state's electrical grid), which means the appellants had no notice or opportunity to participate, as required by law.

A coalition of landowners challenged CPL, during the permitting process, to show the need for taking new land rather than using a nearby, existing right-of-way

which already dissects their properties.

"Decisions by the PUC have the effect of allowing companies seeking to build transmission lines to exercise the power of eminent domain," said Donald Patman, President of the Texas Farm Bureau. "The PUC should not authorize the use of this power to take agricultural land without establishing that there is an urgent and overriding need for the land that is more important than future agricultural production."

Patman said the PUC should require that utilities place transmission lines along existing rights-of-way and seek alternatives before resorting to eminent domain to take cultivated land.

The soggy, cold winter did have a silver lining - a magnificent wheat crop in the summer of '73 and a large kindergarten class in the fall of '78.

A \$200,000 budget shortfall was not welcome news for the Groom Independent School District last year as school officials were forced to reach difficult decisions to make ends meet, primarily cuts in the band and agriculture departments.

Budget problems are especially troubling for a small school, which is often the lifeblood of a community.

But as is the case in much of the Panhandle, faith and dedication make the difference when things get tough - and GISD is a perfect example.

Despite budget difficulties, GISD still got the job done where it matters most - in the classroom.

GISD was one of only four

school districts in the state to almost run the table on the Texas Education Agency's Gold Performances Acknowledgement system. The program uses seven standards to rate district performance, of which GISD earned six, the most in the Panhandle area.

The program measures several criteria, including district attendance rates, test results, advanced placement results and SAT and ACT scores.

To put GISD's performance in perspective, only .4 percent of school districts in the state received five GPAs. Groom earned a half-dozen.

In the Panhandle area, the McLean, Nazareth and Spearman Independent School Districts also

led the way, earning impressive recognition with four GPAs.

GISD superintendent Kevin Noack gave credit to the district teachers.

Indeed, Credit also goes to school administrators and staff for continuing to meet their commitment to education while the district faced serious budget problems that could have resulted in low morale in the classroom.

We congratulate the GISD teachers who realize the importance of education and for meeting a standard of excellence under trying circumstances.

Whether a district's budget is colored black or red, in the long run, the community will benefit.

## Commissioners Schedule Vote on Wind Energy Abatement

The development of a wind turbine energy field in northern Hansford County could take a big step closer to reality when Hansford County Commissioners meet on Tuesday, November 12, 2002.

In an open meeting, Hansford Commissioners will vote on possibly designating a reinvestment zone in the northern part of the county where California-based Great Plains Wind power, LLC has taken 50 year leases in hopes of constructing wind turbines capable of producing 240 megawatts of energy.

"An order designating an area as a reinvestment zone is valid for five years from the date of designation," Hansford County Judge Jim D. Brown said.

The designation can be extended an additional five years if the Commissioners desire.

It is also possible that a tax abatement will also be determined at the meeting. The abatement agreement discussed by Hansford County Commissioners was determined not to exceed seven years with a 100% abatement possible for those seven years.

Judge Brown encourages interested members of the county to attend the meeting and ask questions or provide input.

A future meeting has not been set up between the Gruver ISD and Great Plains Windpower at this time.

Terry Sherrill and Randy Reid, representing Gruver ISD have attended each of the commissioners meeting with the wind energy

group, and along with Interim Superintendent Joel Lynch have done extensive research and study on how the wind energy proposal would impact the Gruver School District.

Both Great Plains Wind power and the Gruver ISD have expressed their willingness to work together but are finding Texas School Finance laws and provisions of House Bill 1200

enacted in January 2002 complicate the possible financial outcomes on abatements that might be offered.

Both Sherrill and Lynch have stated the importance of moving carefully on abatement to protect future funding of Gruver schools.

"We've got to know where we're at," Sherrill said.

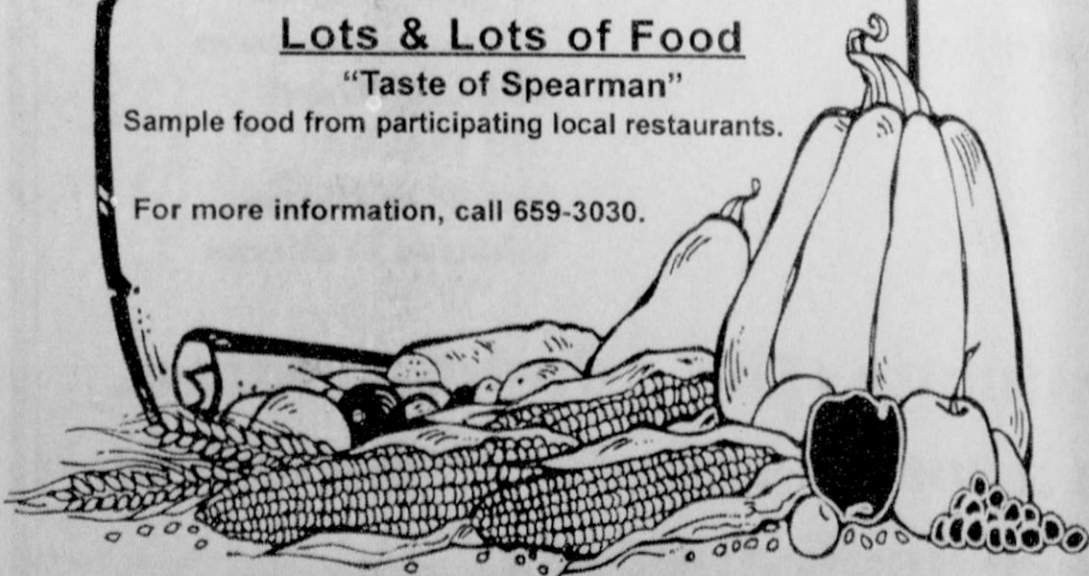

#### "Honoring Our Veterans"

Our country will observe Veterans Day this November 11th. The millions of men and women who have proudly served in our military deserve our respect and appreciation. As we remember those who have sacrificed so much for this country this Veterans Day, we also will be honoring those who are currently defending our country by serving overseas or protecting us here at home.

Armistice Day, which is the 11th day of the 11th month each year, signifying the end of World War I on November 11, 1918, was changed to Veterans Day by an act of Congress in 1954. Veterans Day is set aside to honor American veterans of all wars. Just more than one year ago, our country faced a challenge unlike any in our nation's history. Since the attacks of September 11, 2001, our military men and women have helped fight battles throughout the world to ensure the security of our homeland. Since the terrorist attacks against our country, Congress also has taken steps to help ensure that our country can present a strong defense against this new threat.

Congress significantly boosted the Department of Defense budget for the current fiscal year to ensure that our nation's military is not hamstrung in its ability to do its job. Congress also has passed leg-

islation to provide meaningful improvements for the lives of our nation's veterans, and I continue to support efforts in Congress to ensure that our veterans receive the benefits they deserve.

The House of Representatives passed the Veterans' Compensation Rate Amendments Act of 2001, which provides a cost-of-living adjustment for disabled veterans receiving disability compensation. This bill, which President Bush has signed into law, provides \$2.5 billion in additional benefits for disabled veterans over the next five years. I also supported a bill that adds \$100 million in new health care benefits for surviving spouses of veterans and extends life insurance coverage to spouses and children of service men and women.

I believe that the federal government also should help our veterans succeed after completing their service to our country. I have supported several bills passed by the House of Representatives that will help those in the armed services after completing their duty to our military. I supported the Jobs for Veterans Act, which reforms veterans job training and placement programs in the Department of Labor, and the Homeless Veterans Comprehensive Assistance Act, which includes \$1 billion to aid homeless veterans and to boost

programs to help prevent veterans from becoming homeless. President Bush has signed the Homeless Veterans Comprehensive Assistance Act into law. The president also has signed into law a bill which I supported that provides for significant spending increases for health programs for veterans and significantly lowers out-of-pocket hospitalization expenses for lower-income veterans.

Many Americans have dutifully served our country and have risked their lives, some of whom suffered serious injuries, to ensure that our country remains strong and that our citizens remain safe. The U.S. Census Bureau reports that about one in every eight civilians older than 18 are veterans. Many of us have relatives who have served in our nation's military and who have risked their lives to preserve our freedoms. We cannot afford for their sacrifices to go unrecognized. As we face the prospects of war with Iraq and continued attacks from terrorists, it is most important that we fulfill our obligations to those who have gallantly protected our freedoms.

Every Veterans Day Americans publicly acknowledge the sacrifices of our veterans and thank them for preserving our nation's legacy of liberty.

The men and women who serve in our military today follow a long line of brave Americans who answered the call to defend our freedoms. Each swore an oath to live by a common code and a cherished set of values. That bond links veterans of every generation, from those who served in World War I to those who fought in Desert Storm. These veterans have inspired a new generation - many of whom have joined the fight against terrorism and are serving in Operation Enduring Freedom today.

Since November 11, 1918, when Armistice Day was set aside to

honor those who fought in World War I, until 1954 when President Dwight D. Eisenhower proclaimed November 11 as Veterans Day to honor all veterans, Americans have commemorated the legacy of service of our Armed Forces.

America's commitment to the finest training, equipment, education, and quality of life for our military make the U.S. Armed Forces the envy of nations around the globe. Our soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines go to battle with the respect and admiration of our country.

Our sons and daughters stand guard so the rest of us may live freely. And that freedom comes with a price. Thousands who answered the call to duty during America's history never lived to be called veterans. But none served in vain.

The Lone Star State has a rich tradition of military leadership. Our young men and women have signed up to serve their nation and are stationed here and in all corners of the globe. More Marines join the Corps from Texas per capita than any other state. And we are home to more Army and Air Force bases than any state.

I have been privileged to visit Texas troops at many foreign

posts, from Guantanamo Bay, Cuba to Saudi Arabia to Macedonia. One of the highlights of my overseas trips was my visit to spend Easter 2000 with the members of the Texas Army National Guard's 49th Armored Division commanding the military mission in Bosnia. I observed first-hand the crucial role the Guard played in maintaining the fragile stability in Europe, the first such mission in the Guard's history. For the troopers of the Lone Star Division, it was their finest hour.

National Guardsmen and reservists have become increasingly vital to our nation's overall military might. Their expanding role in our national security efforts must not be overlooked.

It is not only overseas where our veterans answer the call to arms. On September 11, 2001, three F-16 pilots from the Texas Air National Guard were sent on a mission so secret that their commander could not brief them on the details until they were airborne. Three officers from the 147th Fighter Wing in Houston were not told who they were protecting until they were in sight of Air Force One. They guarded the President during those tumultuous hours after the terror attacks.

On this Veterans Day, we express our heartfelt gratitude to our nation's veterans for a debt we can never repay. We remember those who have gone before and honor tomorrow's veterans who serve our country today.

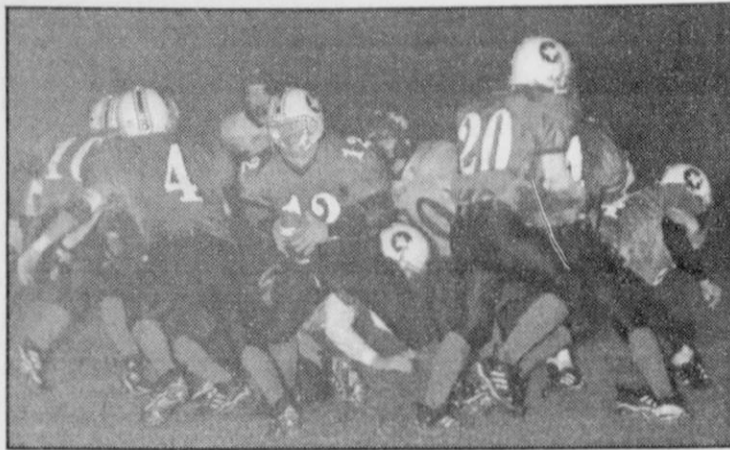
