Food Manager Training Offered Sept. 20-21

Texas restaurants are required by law to have certified food managers. To train these service professionals, Texas Cooperative Extension of Hansford and Ochiltree counties will offer a manager certification course called "Food Safety" It's Our Business" on September 20-21.

The event will be at the Fellowship Hall of Spearman Church of Christ, 121 S. Haney in Spearman. The deadline for registration is September 8th.

"This hands-on learning experience equips participants with the latest food safety principles and practices to prepare for the examination," said Peggy Winegarner, Extension agent family and consumer sciences in Spearman.

The course fee of \$79 includes training, materials and the state food manager certification examination. A test-only option is available, but recommended only for those with a strong food safety background. Cost for the test without the training is \$35. New food manager certificates are valid for five years.

On average, one in four Americans become sick each year from a food borne illness. One in 1,000 people are hospitalized and 5,000 die from ingesting unsafe food.

Course instructors will teach ways to identify potential hazardous foods, prevent common errors in food handling, and methods preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food. Other topics will include personal hygiene for employees, compliance with governmental regulations, clean work area, utensil and equipment maintenance in addition to safe pest control methods.


Many items about Horned Lizards Unique Reptiles of Western North America by Wade C. Sherbrooke were fascinating, but the female's nesting and egg laying were such a surprise, I will use his story on that.

Of the thirteen species of horned lizards, only one gives birth to live babies. This species lives in mountainous areas where the soils do not warm enough to hatch buried eggs, so

this species adapted by having live births. The others, including our Texas horned lizards, dig a nest and lay their eggs in

After the female has selected a site for her nest, she digs a slanted tunnel semicircular in cross-section. Below the 6 to 8 inch tunnel, she makes a small chamber where she carefully deposits the eggs, usually tightly packed in 2 or 3 layers. In our species this may be from 13 to 45 eggs. Her next step is to carefully refill the tunnel and then disturb the ground around the area, so a predator can not tell where the nest is. She may rest on the area overnight, but at this point her maternal duties are


The eggs may take from 5 to 9 weeks to hatch. The babies have a pointed egg tooth to help them get out of the shell. When they have worked there way to the surface of the ground, they can be seen to head bob to one another and begin to chase and eat small ants and other insects.

"I was very proud of the effort the boys gave," Coach Felderhoff said. "I was very pleased with the win, but we also made mistakes that need to be corrected."


The Hounds will be on the road again this week for a 7:30 p.m. clash with the formidable Texhoma Red Devils.
