Founded in 1902, 4-H is now the largest youth organization in the world. Nationwide, 4-H has 9 million members, including 880,000 in Texas

The Texas 4-H program started in 1908 in Jacksboro when some local youths formed a corn club The organization quickly spread to include agriculture, horticulture, and livestock.

Today, 4-H is about much more than corn, tomatoes, and cows. I covers just about every area of interest, from barnyard animals to city pets and from gardening to the performing arts of drams and comedy. While agriculture horticulture and livestock remain some of the largest projects in 4-H. new interests, such as energy conservation, computer science and engineering, are now includ

# **Gutierrez Found Guilty**

#### Sentenced to Life in Prison for Murder of Evelina Luna

A Hansford County Jury sentenced Gabino charged was not consistent with the trajectory of the Anguiano Gutierrez, 55, formerly of Spearman, to life in prison on September 18, 2002. The sentence came down hours after finding him guilty of the murder of Evelina Rojas Luna, 52, on July 18, 2001, in Spearman.

Gutierrez and Luna shared a home in Spearman at the time of the murder.

The State presented a theory that on the night of July 17th, Gutierrez and Luna had a verbal and physical fight. Then, after the fight, Luna went to bed and went to sleep. Gutierrez, still angry about the fight, went into the bedroom Luna was in, and shot her in the

The Defense presented a theory that although Gutierrez did shoot Luna, that it was an accident. In Gutierrez's video statement to the police, which the jury saw, Gutierrez stated that he was simply moving the gun from the living room to a night stand in the bedroom when he tripped and the gun discharged,

The State had Tom Bevel, an expert crime scene reconstructionist, testify. Bevel concluded that, based on the blood patterns on the bed, Luna was moved after the shooting. He further concluded that Gutierrez's claim of where and when the gun dis-

bullet through Luna's head.

Pathologist Jerry Spencer testified that since gun powder flakes were found on Luna's ear, the gun was no more than 18 inches from Luna's head when it was fired. Gutierrez claimed he was at the foot of the bed when the gun discharged.

Other testimony revealed that Luna told persons before her death that she was afraid that Gutierrez would some day shoot her. On one occasion she removed a gun from the home and gave it to some family members, stating she was afraid of Gutierrez.

Mark Snider, Assistant District Attorney, and C.H. Price, Criminal Investigator, assisted District Attorney Clay Ballman in the prosecution of Gutierrez. Curtis Hinshaw of Borger was Gutierrez's defense attorney. Judge William D. Smith was the presiding judge. The Police Department of Spearman and the Hansford County Sheriff's Office investigated the case.

"I was very pleased in the Jury's verdict," commented Ballman. "The State had to rely upon circumstantial evidence to prove the shooting was intentional. This was nothing more than cold blooded, vengeful murder of a person who was merely sleeping."

Hansford County Library has a new computer system! We are sill in the learning process (and have yet to decide if this is a good thing or not). Seriously, we are sure that it will be a great thing once we all get comfortable with the change and get all of the problems worked

The entire Harrington Library Consortium began to upgrade it's computer network earlier this year. This upgrade involved a change in software companies and, therefore, quite a change in procedures. Our revious system was more of a DOS-based system, and our new system is more of a windows environment. We are sure that once we become accustomed to the new system, it will help us to provide better service to our patrons. (We do ask your patience while we are learning, because we are somewhat slower on the new system than we were on our old one!)

One of the problems with the new system right now involves overdue notices. We hope this will be resolved quickly, but there are no overdue notices available at the present time. If you have books or tapes checked out of the library, please be aware that you will not

(for right now, anyway). This does not mean that items are fine exempt, it just means that you won't get a "friendly reminder" in

the mail when you are overdue. Items may still be rechecked by phone. We have an answering machine available to take your calls when we are not open, so you may call to recheck items anytime, day or night. If you leave a message on the machine, please be certain to tell us on which card the items are checked out and leave a number where we may reach you if we have a question.

When we migrated from our old system to our new one, all of our user holds were lost. We have since done our best to recover and restore all requests that were placed prior to the change in systems. If you had a request in for a book, you might want to check with us to make certain that we have that request back in our system. We don't want anyone to miss out on a book that they really want to read because of a systems prob-

Any change that we make within the library is done with the idea of offering better service to our patrons. Sometimes, there is a peri-



# Lynx Stun Elk With 20-12 Victory

Football fans were treated to an offensive showcase at Sam Bass Stadium last Friday night, watching the Spearman Lynx grind out a 20-12 victory over the pass-happy Stratford Elks.

Spearman, coming off a 28-6 win in their home opener against White Deer, racked up over 376 yards of offense against the Elks. The majority came on the ground by way of runningbacks Colton Miller and Lance Baker.

Miller put the Lynx on the board first, breaking loose for a 57-yard touchdown at the 7:43 mark in the opening quarter of play. The senior tailback led the Spearman ground attack with 118 yards on the night.

The Elks responded quickly- just 57 seconds later- with a 63-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Josh King to Denton Crabtree. However, Spearman held on to a 7-6 lead when Paul Bynum blocked the Elk point after attempt.

Spearman completed their second scoring drive of the night, with only 43 seconds left until halftime. Facing 4th down and nine yards to go and deep in Elk territory, senior signal caller Kevin Beedy hooked up with Jeremy Vera for a 33-yard touchdown.

The Lynx took to the air again, midway through the third quarter, when Beedy hooked up with Baker on a 24-yard pass then a 13-yard touchdown strike. Sophomore Clete Vanderberg added his third extra point of the night to give Spearman a 21-6 advantage.

Stratford, ranked fourth in the Class 1A Harris poll, put together an 80-yard scoring drive late in the final quarter of play, culminating with a King to Cass Melton connection for a touchdown. Their two-point conversion attempt


The win gave the Lynx (3-0) their second victory over a ranked team

in three weeks. Spearman defeated the Sunray Bobcats, who were ranked fourth in Class 1A at the time, 14-12 in the season opener

added 22 yards rushing. Baker added 98 yards rushing along with his touchdown grab.

declare the office of constable domnant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared domnant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the einstatement of the office."
