Gruver Police Department

Warns against minors driving

In recent months we have had an apparent increase in the number of unlicensed drivers in Gruver. A somewhat more serious aspect of this problem is that these drivers appear to be getting younger and younger, much too young to be given the tremendous responsibility of operating a motor vehicle upon the streets and highways.

The Police Department and Municipal Court receives numerous complaints and sharp criticism from citizens because the city is "letting people drive without a driver's license." The fact is that the city is not letting anyone drive without a driver's license.

In the future, those persons found

to be operating a motor vehicle upon a street or highway within the corporate limits of Gruver without having a driver's license will be stopped. Those persons 14 years of age and older will be issued a citation. Those persons will be detained until the owner of the vehicle or parent arrives to pick up the vehicle, at that time the owner or parent will be issued a citation for allowing an unlicensed operator to drive.

Those persons under 14 years of age will be detained until the owner of the vehicle or parent arrives to pick up the vehicle, at that time the owner or parent will be issued a citation for allowing an unlicensed operator to drive.

In the event that the owner cannot be contacted, the vehicle will be impounded by the Police Department and placed in a secure place until the owner claims the vehicle, and the driver will be furnished transportation home.

Those parents that feel an obligation to show their children how to drive should do so when the child has attended a driver's education course and obtained a Restriction "B" driver's license, which allows the operator the opportunity to drive as long as a licensed driver, 18 years or older, is in the front seat of the motor vehicle with him or her.

To ensure compliance with the law, periodic checkpoints will be set up to check for driver's licenses, proof of financial responsibility, inspection and registration. Those found in violation will be handled as previously stated.

It is, and has always been, the policy of this police department to enforce the law fairly and non-selectively. We strive to keep the public informed of policy changes that might effect them. It is with this in mind that we are giving you this warning to ensure your cooperation with us in seeing that the law is obeyed, in the best interest of all concerned





Hospital Dirstrict to purchase equipment

The Hansford County Hospital District Board of Directors approved a proposal to purchase equipment in the amount of \$4,615 during the regular meeting held Thursday, Jan. 13.

Manor D.O.N. Sandy Blackman explained the advantages of using a Sara Lift to lift residents. She stated that it is very safe and comfortable for the residents, while minimizing the risk of injuries to the staff.

In other business, the board approved revisions to the vacation, sick and holiday benefits. It was reported that these revisions will simplify accrual of vacation and require doctors orders to return to work following an illness and enable long term employees to accrue additional sick days to be used in case of a major illness. This revision also eliminates a floating holiday and annual wellness day for employees who have used no sick days. According to the report, these have been replaced by wellness days that can be earned every four months if no sick days are used.

The board reviewed an application for a reduced nursing home rate for a resident of the Manor. It was voted that the administrator should approve the application if no further sources of funds could be

Administrator Anne Snow updated the board on the activities of

the Community Advisory Committee. The committee is meeting again on January 27. This committee hears presentations from law enforcement people regarding crime and health related issues.

No action was taken on a managed care contract with Amarillo Health Plan, Inc.

The board reviewed a sample contract for physician recruitment and reviewed the qualifications of one physician who may be interested in relocating to Hansford County.

A meeting of the long range planning subcommittee of the board was set for February 3, at 7 p.m.

Snow advised the board that the Manor now has 79 residents and has four beds available. She also reported, Home Health is currently serving 18 people and there are no patients in Hospice at the time of the meeting.

Russell Altmiller, of the accounting firm Altmiller, Lukert and Associates, was present. He reviewed the audited financial statements for the fiscal year 1992-93 and advised the board that it was a clean audit. He added that there was little change from the previous year in the district's revenues and expenses, aside from a large special reimbursement from Medicare for the 89-90 fiscal year. The board accepted the audit.

Gruver schools prepare for the future-

The beginning of a new year provides the perfect opportunity for individuals to reflect on past accomplishments and look ahead to the future. Just as individuals grow by taking this approach, so too can school districts.

In the Gruver Independent School District we began this school year with only one objective, and that was to provide each child in our schools the opportunity to grow. Our faculty and staff pledged to work together to help students reach their full potential during the year.

To help us judge our success, these goals were stated: first, the number of students meeting or exceeding Commissioner Meno's standards for achievement as reflected on the district's "report card" from the state will increase on each campus; second, all subgroups in our district (Anglo, Hispanic, and economically

disadvantaged) will score better on this year's Texas Assessment of Academic Skills than they did last year; third, the number of students passing each six weeks will increase when compared to last year; and fourth, more parents will be involved in their children's education.

Teachers and administrators in our district realize that summer will arrive before a complete evaluation can be completed, but several academic programs were added to our curriculum this year to help us accomplish our goals. All indications are that these programs have been successful.

A new program in the high school is a new approach to Algebra I. This approach will help some students master the course information by taking two years to look at algebra from a real-world perspective. Students see how algebra is used in every day, practical situations. Similarly, our Mathmasters program, which is new for some elementary and

junior high students, takes the same approach in helping younger mathematicians. Some junior high and elementary reading students have been introduced to the HOTS program (Higher Order Thinking Skills). This computer based curriculum asks students to try unique or creative approaches to solving problems. Finally, secondary students in English As A Second Language have benefited from personal, small group instructions as they tackle the challenge of acquiring and mastering a new language.

Each of these new programs has created excitement in students for learning. Our teachers are confident that they will help the district succeed in our mission to prepare adults who are ready to tackle the world of the twenty-first century, and to prosper and thrive in it.

Spearhead Corporation recaps 1993

The Spearhead Corporation Board of Directors and the community of Spearman began 1993 anxiously waiting for an answer from The Meadows Foundation in Dallas on the corporation's pending grant application for \$200,000 toward the construction of the community center. The Board also faced the need to raise an additional \$75,000 to complete the funding for the building as proposed.

In February, to help with the anticipated need for operational funds, Dr. Tom Latta helped coordinate the first cattle project involving area ranchers. Over one hundred head of cattle were purchased by the corporation.



Goals achieved for 1993; new goals set for 1994

There were many great accomplishments for the Palo Duro River Authority in 1993. This year saw many improvements around the lake and changes in management.

The lake was officially open to fishing on July 10, 1993. Area anglers gladly took advantage of this and caught some nice bass and channel cat. Palo Duro Lake went on record as the only lake in Texas to stock the yellow perch. The month of July proved to have good fishing until the August heat slowed things down.

Park improvements that were completed last year include the completion of the R.V. park, restrooms, boat ramps, nature trails and general park improvements. The R.V. park now will accommodate 26 R.V.'s, with full hook-ups, behind the dam. Restrooms have been completed near the R.V. park and on the south side of the lake. Two boat ramps have been completed on each side of the lake and will be ready for use when the lake fills up.

There have been many hours put into researching and plotting a nature trail. This trail identifies many kinds of grasses, flowers, and trees, near and around the lake, that are native to the Texas Panhandle. Students from Hansford County schools have been to the lake on field trips to study the different wildlife and plant life.

Various kinds of trees have been planted and a new drip system was installed to water some of these trees. Additional picnic tables, some with a shelter, have also been added. The large group shelter is available to be rented and it is well lighted, has electricity available, and a large bar-b-que grill available for use. A recreational park with playground equipment is nearby for children.

Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District implements new programs, adds staff, improves facilities

With parent and community support, outstanding students, and a dedicated staff, 1993 proved to be an outstanding year for Pringle-Morse as the District continued to prepare for the 21st century. Implementing new programs, adding staff, and improving facilities were all areas addressed by the District for enhancement.

The 1993 year began with concerns over school finance for the District as the 73rd Texas Legislature began meeting in regular session. The County Education Districts were ruled unconstitutional to be abolished August 31, 1993. A special legislature session failed to resolve the crisis. Identified as a district with above average per pupil wealth, Pringle-Morse was certain to face some type of financial recapture from the state.

Senate Bill 7 passed the Legislature prior to adjournment of the regular session requiring immediate implementation. The Bill prohibited school districts in Texas any access to taxable wealth in the district above \$280,000 per weighted pupil. Since Pringle-Morse is one of only 100 districts above that limit and receiving no state aid, the Board of Trustees had too considered five options mandated by Senate Bill 7 to reduce the District's wealth.

The Pringle-Morse Board developed a plan to reduce the District's wealth by implementing Option Four of Senate Bill 7. The plan involved Spearman, Gruver, Sunray, and Borger Independent School Districts. Those districts agreed to allow Pringle-Morse to count students transferring from those districts into Pringle-Morse as local resident students. In addition, Pringle-Morse agreed to substitute state aid paid to Gruver and Spearman with Pringle-Morse funds.

The plan benefits both Gruver and Spearman schools with those districts receiving more funds than they would have through state aid. Saving the Pringle-Morse School money that it would have to pay the state, the plan keeps the money in Hansford County and allows the Pringleand the contract of the contra

Morse District to keep the tax rate at \$1.23 per hundred dollar valuation of taxable property.

Since the plan called for sending locally collected money out of the District, a special election was called to allow voters to approve the option. Option four passed with 89 votes in favor and 3 opposed.

Students at Pringle-Morse scored well on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test. All 4th and 8th graders passed the writing parts of the exams, and 83 percent of the 8th grade passed the math and reading. In the 4th grade, 89 percent passed the math part and 67 percent passed the reading. These results are well above the averages.

Because of outstanding student performance, Texas Commissioner of Education Lionel "Skip" Meno honored Pringle-Morse at the Texas Successful Schools Awards Ceremony in Austin during July. The Texas Successful Schools Award identified Pringle-Morse and other schools in Texas for high academic performance. Pringle-Morse received a \$30,000 award for its high degree of student performance.

The Texas Legislature created the Texas Successful Schools Award System to identify and reward schools that demonstrate progress or success in achieving the educational goals of the state. Over \$20 million in awards was given to schools in Texas. Pringle-Morse is using its award money to create a new student computer lab.

In May, Charlie Kiser was elected as a new trustee to the Pringle-Morse Board. He replaced Nathan Sargent, who did not seek re-election.

During the summer of 1993, a new bus was delivered, the existing parking areas were resurfaced, and a new parking lot was built. New concrete work was done, and the gym was completely repainted.

To continue to promote high health standards, Pringle-Morse was declared as a Smoke-Free Campus. Smoking is prohibited in all school buildings and on all school properties by staff.

Several personnel changes were made during the summer of

1993. Jean Ann Behney was hired to teach middle school language arts and reading. She replaced Tracy Bevill, who went to Gruver High School, Martha Davis became a full-time certified librarian for the District. She had been employed with Pringle-Morse as a library aide.

Robert Goodwin joined the staff as maintenance director, and Robin Goodwin was employed as cafeteria assistant. They replaced Grant and Liz Farmer. Debra Schumann became a full-time bus driver.

The District received a waiver from the Texas Education Agency to use two instructional days for staff development days. The first staff development day was August 12. Pringle-Morse joined with Gruver and P-S-P Schools to bring Dr. Harry Wong to Stinnett for a day long program on effective teaching strategies. The second staff development day was October 15 when programs on effective school discipline and campus improvement were pre-

Life Management Skills and Career Investigations were two new classes added to the curriculum for 7th grade. LionsQuest was adopted as the curriculum for the Life Management Skills class. LionsQuest is from Lions International and is designed to build self-esteem, self-confidence, responsibility, decision making skills, and addresses drug educa-

Academic Teaming is a new approach to monitoring students with needs that began with the

new school year. Staff members refer students that might have a problem or special need to the Academic Team Committee. The Committee then meets with the student as an intervention to see if there is a problem, and what can be done to solve it.

Pringle-Morse joined the War on Drugs by holding Red Ribbon Week. Many activities were held during the week for drug education. The highlight of the week was the "War on Drugs" Carnival. Students pledging to be drug-free were given tickets to the carnival.

Enrichment Time, or "ET," is a new program for elementary students. Each Tuesday and Thursday students attend nontraditional classes to learn extra skills in such areas as Spanish, rodeo, computer programming, and art.

Pringle-Morse Middle School joined the Texas Middle School Association Network. The network is composed of middle schools across Texas that have accepted the challenge of restructuring as called for in the Report of the Texas Task Force on Middle School Education. The network also serves as a home base for assisting schools in the network to both share and learn about successful programs.

With the successful, rewarding 1993 year behind Pringle-Morse, plans are being developed to attain even higher goals in 1994. Because of the commitment for quality education of all involved, Pringle-Morse will definitely be prepared to be a leader in a new era of progressive educa-



City of Gruver announces personnel changes in 1993

The year 1993 was a good year for the City of Gruver. The city lowered property taxes and noticed a six percent increase in sales tax receipts. During 1993 the city lost their long time Police Chief. The city also lost a utility worker and gained a new one. The citizens of Gruver elected themselves a new Mayor and one new City Commissioner.

The winter weather was hard on the city streets. They spent about \$62,000 repairing and seal coating the streets during the summer of 1993. This was an unexpected cost for the city.

The city had the City Swimming Pool re-painted and purchased two new diving boards for the pool. The Gruver School Board purchased new playground equipment for the elementary school and gave the city the old merry-go-round which had been on the school grounds for a number of years. The city moved the merry-go-round to the City Park.

The city continues to improve the water and gas systems. The

two were purchased by the city in 1982. The final debt payment on the purchase of the utilities will be in 1997. In 1993 the city paved about a block of streets which made each home in Gruver face a paved street.

1994 City of Gruver

The City of Gruver has big plans for 1994. The city has purchased a brush chipper to take care of the tree limb problem. The city is looking into a Solid Waste Recycling Station. The city is purchasing a new pickup truck for the utility department. The city has obtained a grant to plant 30 trees in City Park.

The city is applying for a grant to drill a third water well for the cities water supply. The city will seal coat about \$20,000 worth of streets during the summer.

The city has received \$108,000 grant from the Texas Department of Transportation to re-pave a portion of the Municipal Airport.

Two persons are training to become paramedics for the Emergency Medical Service. A police officer left and a new officer was hired. He is also a paramedic. We appreciate you Hansford County for working together toward

Spearman Volunteer Fire Department

New equipment purchased

Nineteen ninety three was one of the most exciting years in the history of the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department (SVFD). The department, which has been in service since 1919, responded to 80 calls in 1993. These calls included 14 structure fires, 23 grass fires, 15 rescue calls, eight vehicle fires, eight refuse fires and 10 service calls including good intent calls, hazardous condition calls and service calls. Damage for 1993 was limited to \$60,165.

The department added two new pieces of equipment in 1993. The first addition was unit 57, a first response county pumper to be used for county structure, vehicle, and grass fires as well as rescue calls. Unit 57 was conceived and designed entirely by members of the SVFD who analyzed fire records and decided what type of truck was needed. The second addition was unit 58, a city pumper capable of pumping 1250 gallons per minute. Unit 58 will be used for city fire responses. Unit 58 meets all new specifications for city fire protection set up by the National Fire Protection Association. Meeting these specs helps to keep insurance rates in Spearman affordable.

Drills and special training also help to keep Spearman and Hansford county a safer place. The SVFD logged over 2000 man hours in inter-department training drills for fire and rescue skills. In addition 31 fire fighters attended special schools such as the Canyon and Dumas area fire schools and annual Fire School held at Texas A&M. These fire fighters logged 330 hours in topics such as fire prevention, basic and special fire fighting skills, pump operations, rescue skills, and instructional techniques for training other fire fighters.

Other accomplishments in 1993 included an open house for national fire prevention week that included a parade and fire prevention education to 50 area children. The department also became incorporated with the state of Texas so they can apply for certain grants and have a non-profit organization status.

SVFD goals for 1994 include continued training efforts with the eventual goal of certification of all Spearman fire fighters as state certified "Basic Fire fighter". The department also plans to finish equipping units 57 and 58 with special tools and equipment as funds become available. The SVFD hopes to add five to 10 new members to maintain a full staff of fire fighters and establish a larger reserve unit for large scale fires and disasters. City of Spearman accomplishments for 1993

For the City of Spearman, 1993 was a very challenging year. Last winter we were kept busy with the Texas Legislature, the landfill crisis, the severe winter weather as well as making many positive improvements for the

The 73rd Texas Legislature met from January to the end of May. The Texas Senators and Representatives filed thousands of bills and many of these bills concerned Texas cities. The Mayor and the city council supported those bills that helped Texas cities and opposed those bills that were bad for our cities.

One of the bad bills was House Bill 421. This bill would have continued the Public Utility Commission (PUC) and given a big financial boost to the stockholders of privately-owned electric and telephone companies. The PUC regulates the rates that electric and telephone companies can charge their customers. House Bill 421 would let electric and telephone companies collect "phantom taxes" from customers. Phantom taxes are taxes that theutilities never pay but want to charge the customers for anyway. Mayor Buchanan spent several weeks in Austin lobbying against letting utilities collect phantom taxes. When he first went to Austin, it looked like Mayor Buchanan had a slim chance of succeeding. However, due to his hard work and persuasive ability, Mayor Buchanan convinced the legislators that the phantom tax deal was bad for Texas rate payers. The end result is that the utilities did not get their phantom taxes. The Legislature formed a committee to study how telephone and electric companies should be regulated and how the PUC should be improved. The committee will make their recommendations to the Legislature when the Legislature meets again in 1995. The City of Spearman will actively watch the debates and recommendations of this committee.

In other business before the Texas Legislature, the City of Spearman supported a bill which provides a penalty for people who

fail to clean up their property, mow their weeds or other similar violations; we supported easing the laws on city employees who apply pesticides and herbicides; we opposed the deregulation of the telephone industry; we supported looking at new ways to make it easier for Spearman to get parks grants; we opposed legislation making it harder for cities to repeal civil service for police officers and fire fighters; we supported relaxing regulations on the trucking industry; we supported legislation preventing the Texas Water Commission from regulating the Ogalalla Aquifer; and, we opposed a bill preventing cities from appealing the decisions of the Public Utility Commission. Keeping track of these bills took a great deal of time and effort but we were successful in protecting Spearman's interests.

Another challenge we faced in 1993 was the landfill crisis. This crisis was brought on by the unfunded mandates for landfills passed by the EPA in 1989. For most of 1993, it looked like we were going to have to close the landfill for good on October 9, 1993. Fortunately, the national administration gave small cities a two-year extension on meeting the landfill mandates. Also, the county commissioners were kind enough to dig another pit at the landfill.

Last year, the city spent a great deal of time talking with surrounding cities about a regional approach to the landfill crisis. The cities explored building a regional transfer station in case we had to close the landfill

The year 1993 will be remembered as the year of the big snowstorms. The city crews spent more than 900 hours removing snow from our streets and airport.

Some of our streets were damaged because of all the snow and cold last winter. This damage resulted in the city having to spend \$10,000 more than was budgeted to fix the most severely damaged streets.

Many positive events happened in 1993. We bought a new fire truck to make sure our fire fighters have the equipment they need. We bought a new police car to replace a worn-out patrol car, the temporary sewer treatment plant was installed, we seal coated

96,580 square yards of streets, which had been damaged because of the severe winter weather. New signs were installed at the entrances to the city and at the airport. The city exchanged land with the Spearhead Corporation, clearing the way for construction of the new community center. A basketball/volleyball court was built next to city hall. Additional parks were created. Volleyball

tournaments were held at Lakefest and during Labor Day weekend. A community Economic Development Committee was formed to explore ways to improve the business climate in Spearman.

All in all, 1993 was a good year for the City of Spearman. Hopefully, 1994 will bring better economic times and prosperity to the community

United to serve: The Spearman Ministerial Alliance

There is much in the Bible that speaks either directly, or by way of historical narrative, to the profitability of unity of mind and effort among people -- especially God's people. As a group of clergy, the Spearman Ministerial Alliance has worked and planned for unity. In efforts to minister to the needs of Spearman and Hansford County residents, the Alliance has cooperated with the Spearman Welfare Association, administered through Judge Jim Brown's office. That Association exists to meet the practical physical needs of many people through food distribution, Christmas meals and gifts, prescription purchases and utility payments.

A significant portion of the money distributed through the Spearman Welfare Association comes from funds donated by the Ministerial Alliance. Each fall the churches of Spearman sponsor, and one church hosts a Commu-

nity Thanksgiving Service the Sunday evening before Thanksgiving. One hundred percent of the offering received at that service is turned over to Judge Brown's office for community welfare use. Additionally, for the past two years, the Alliance has coordinated a CROP Walk to collect money for the needs of the hungry around the world. Twenty-five percent of the total income from that walk is likewise turned over to the Spearman Welfare Associa-

All of these fund-raising, community-minded projects will continue in the future. But for the Ministerial Alliance, there is something more exciting and nearer to our hearts: the proclamation of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, as the ultimate answer to every person's deepest need - the

need to know and relate to God.

In September 1993, the Alliance hosted five nights of meetings at the high school gym. During those nights we heard excellent singers from several denominational and

non-denominational backgrounds exalt the Name of Jesus Christ.
Each night a speaker from a different Christian denomination preached a message from the Bible. Simultaneously, a ministry was provided for children four to 12 years of age. Everyone who attended was greatly encouraged and blessed.

In a similar vein, February 20-23, 1994, will find the ministerial Alliance hosting Strike Force International. Strike Force is an

organization of bodybuilders and weightlifters who do phenomenal feats of strength in school assemblies and public evening rallies. They do such things as breaking concrete bricks, blowing up hot water bottles, breaking handcuffs,

These men will be in the Spearman, Perryton and Gruver schools using their talents to present programs to teenagers encouraging them to avoid drug and alcohol use, premarital sex and suicide. They will also encourage the building of self-

esteem through the making of good, moral choices.



Spearman Volunteer Ambulance Service Sponsors EMT course, purchases equipment

The Spearman Volunteer
Ambulance Service has one
paramedic, one intermediate, four
full time EMTs and four part time
EMTs

We ran on 187 calls in 1993. Forty percent of those calls were transfers. Advance life support was used on 30 percent of those calls. There was an EMT class sponsored by the Spearman Volunteer Ambulance Service. Ten Spearman and Gruver citizens successfully completed the course, and hopefully will serve our areas in 1994.

The Ambulance Service obtained its 501C status. This makes the volunteer service a charitable organization, and any donations made to the organization are tax deductible. This 501C also allows the ambulance service

to write and obtain grants.

In 1993 we wrote and were awarded a Texas Department of Health Grant. We were able to purchase and replace CPR manikins, training films and training material. These will help in ongoing projects; such as, CPR, first aid classes, and training new EMTs and maintaining our skills training.

The Boy Scouts donated a new first aid and CPR film for training and public awareness.

With some of the money that has been donated to the Spearman Volunteer Ambulance Service we have been able to buy some very important life saving equipment. We purchased a Univent, which is a respirator device that is used with critical patients to help assist their breathing. We also traded in a old heart monitor and purchased a new one with some important features such as a pacemaker.

In 1994 we hope to continue the programs that we have established such as the CPR training. To continue our education and have more people with advance training is one of our goals. We always want to continue our training and maintain good quality care.

We are looking forward in 1994 to replacing the 20-year-old radios in our ambulances. These radios were bought back in the 70's with PRPC Grants. We also hope to purchase a Pulse Oximeter. This will help to monitor oxygen levels, temperature, blood pressure. This equipment will help us better meet our patients needs and assure a higher level of care in the back of the ambulance.

As soon as the Gruver and Mulock cemeteries can be completed, there is a possibility of a cemetery book being printed. This book would be very helpful to visitors who come to Hansford County trying to locate the exact burial place of their relatives.

Hansford Hospital District

Reports many transitions in 1993

For Hansford County Hospital District, 1993 was a year of transition. A new administration, a renovation project in the works, and continuing growth in outpatient services are among the changes we faced. The Board of directors articulated a broader mission for the Hospital District. President Les Barkley said it best: "The true goal of a community hospital should be to have a healthy population." This means that the Hospital District should

take a leadership role in enhancing public health and coordinate with other health care organizations in addressing the community's health

To that end, the Board established a Community Advisory
Committee. Meeting monthly since August, the committee has had presentations from various community representatives and will soon be summarizing its findings regarding the needs of the county for not only health care, but for health promotion and disease prevention. Their recommendations will serve as a basis

for long range planning for the District.

Financially, the Hospital District saw no real growth in revenue, while expenses increased four percent. Hansford Hospital Pharmacy, Hansford Home Care, and Home Oxygen services continue to be areas of growth for the District, however. With \$4.6 million in expenses overall, the District's payroll was almost \$2.2 million, employing 123 people. This makes the Hospital District the second-largest employer in the county

Over the past six years, the District has accumulated enough reserves to allow for a conversion of some unused space to a new Physical Therapy suite and centralized purchasing area, to better serve patients' needs and to cut down on supplies expenses. This renovation was made possible by the closing of the District's operating room. Reluctantly, the Board decided to close the O.R. after three unsuccessful years of effort to recruit a surgeon, coupled with

the retirement of the local anesthetist.

However, the District's continuum of care continues to put the District on the cutting edge among small rural hospitals. Complemented by a growing, effective home health agency, a Hospice program that receives outstanding support from the community, an excellent, full service pharmacy and home oxygen service, and the best long term care facility in Texas, Hansford Hospital can continue to provide most of the medical services needed by our community, from an emergency and hospitalization to recovery from surgery, to care of a chronic disease, to elder care.

We are proud to be a part of this wonderful community. While we face continuing challenges in 1994, we are optimistic that we are on the right path. As always, the support and involvement of local people is what makes this Hospital District a quality, progressive institution.
