





(Austin) The Senate this week approved a new accountability plan for public schools, one that puts college readiness as the main factor in gauging a school's success. Bill author and Education Committee Chair Senator Florence Shapiro said preparing students for life after high-school should be the goal of every educator. "The passing standards on the [current] assessments lack any link to success after graduation," she said. "The world today requires sound preparation. All students must be prepared for post-secondary education." The bill, SB 3, would determine success based on math and reading preparation for students entering college. It would also look at end-of-course exams in four core subjects: science, social studies, math and Eng-

The bill is more flexible in judging school districts, said Shapiro. School assessments would be based on three-year

rolling averages, rather than just a single year. Schools could also win recognition in a variety of areas, from academic achievement and student growth to excellence in fine arts and second-language education, and would permit students to take eight elective courses in high school. The bill now heads to the House.

The Senate also passed reforms this week to the state's windstorm insurance system. The Texas Windstorm Insurance Association (TWIA), intended to be the insurer of last resort for coastal residents and businesses, is now virtually the only insurer in that area. Coupled with a catastrophic fund that is completely empty the state could be responsible for up to \$68 billion in damage claims should another major hurricane hit the Texas coast, said Horseshoe Bay Senator Troy Fraser. Words from Faith & Grace



by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister In the fifth week of the Season of Easter, we reflect on the cross, on the empty tomb, and continue to gain understanding of the depth of God's love for us, as we study Acts 8: 26-40. Psalm 22: 25-31, 1 John 4: 7-21, and John 15: 1-8. After the stoning of Stephen, the Greek-speaking Jewish Christians were driven from Jerusalem. Philip, a deacon, goes to Samaria and starts to spread the good news. While in Samaria, Philip responds to an angel of the Lord by going down to the road from Jerusalem through Hebron and Gaza to Egypt, and there he sees a man reading scriptures in a chariot. The passenger in the chariot is an Ethiopian, the treasurer of the Candace, queen

The eunuch is a 'God-fearer', one who has attended synagogue and studied the scriptures. However, as an eunuch one could not enter the Temple in Jerusalem. The eunuch is reading Isaiah 53 and Philip explains the scriptures relating to the Messiah to him. Hearing the good news, the eunuch asks to be baptized. After he is baptized, the eunuch continues toward Ethiopia rejoicing. Tradition tells us that this eunuch evangelized the country of Ethiopia. The Spirit is causing the gospel to be spread.

Psalm 22 is a lament. It is read in its entirety on Good Friday as the first lines are the scripture Christ quoted on the cross. However, we study only the praise part of the Psalm in verses 25-31. From this we can see that being depressed is not the sign of a lack of faith or of un-believing; rather, depression is a condition which can strike all of us. The Psalmist finds assurance that the poor will eat and be satisfied, and that those who seek God shall praise him.

In his first epistle, John shows us that love has its origin in God. It is only by knowing God that we can love, but it is only by loving that we can learn to know God. This love is a gift of God's grace. Christ demonstrates God's love, a love that does not hold back; a love that is given but undeserved. John tells us that when loves comes, fear goes. We fear because we expect punishment or harm. Yet we shall be bold in the judgment because of God's love for us.

Since God is love, this explains creation. God must have an object for his love. God's love explains free will. To love God we must be free to respond to him. God's love explains redemption. Our Good Shepherd must seek and redeem the lost. God's love explains eternal life. We are by nature shortlived, but by the grace of God, we shall worship him forever.

In John's gospel, we are shown the vine which was a symbol for Israel. However, in the Old Testament, this vine symbol was always deteriorating. When Jesus uses the vine symbol, he refers to himself as the "true vine". A grape vine produces non-productive branches and productive branches. The unproductive branches are broken off and used for fuel. Thus uselessness invites disaster. Jesus is abiding in God, if we abide in Jesus, then we are drawing upon the strength of God and we will bear fruit.

May the Holy Spirit enable you to abide in Christ Jesus now and forever.




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

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Taxpayers Pay in, NPEC Pays out Generation and Transmission Capital Credits

"Owned by those we serve" is a fact that was confirmed by the capital credit checks that were mailed on April 15 to members of North Plains Electric Cooperative who received electric service during 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2003. The total authorized for return by the Board of Directors was \$710,974.46. This return represents accumulated generation and transmission capital credits from Golden Spread Electric Cooperative (GSEC) for those years.

Capital credits are an extension of the cooperative philosophy and are in concert with the spirit in which your Cooperative was formed. Article I and Article IX of the Cooperative By-laws discuss capital credits.

A large percent of North Plains electric rates go to

bring in enough money to pay operating costs of delivering and generating power though our power supplier Golden Spread Electric Cooperative. As a cooperative just like NPEC, at the end of each calendar year, GSEC subtracts operating expenses from the total amount of money collected from individual cooperatives that it supplies power to during the year. The balance is it's "margin."

Each year, when GSEC has a margin, each member's individual share of that year's margin is credited or allocated to each individual capital credit account based on power purchases though North Plains. The most recent allocation of this margin was for the calendar year 2007. A total margin allocation of \$1,791,069.75 for GSEC was

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

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tion displayed courage, grace and skill to help Amy Baucom when she fell from her horse and broke her neck. The Herdsmen also were there to support her through surgery;












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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

cerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the market or appraised value of your property · the unequal appraisal of your property
- · the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
 the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
 the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects

Informal Review

If you wish to have an informal review of your property with our staff, please come to our office in Spearman, M-F, 8:30 a.m.-5 -. m. (except holidays).

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday, Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions consubmitted an independent appraisal to the ARB before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

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USDA Announces: Soybean Producers Can Request A Referendum

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that soybean producers have the opportunity to request a referendum on the Soybean Promotion and Research Order (Order), as authorized under the Sovbean Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Act (Act).

The act requires the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a Request for Referendum every 5 years after the initial referendum, which was conducted in 1994. The last Request for Referendum was conducted in 2004. Soybean producers who are interested in having a referendum to determine whether to continue the soybean check off program are invited to participate.

The Request for Referendum will be conducted at USDA's county Farm Service Agency offices. To be eligible

to participate, producers must certify and provide documentation that shows that they produced soybeans and paid an assessment on the soybeans during the period of Jan. 1, 2007, through Dec. 31,

Beginning May 4, 2009, and continuing through May 29, 2009, producers may obtain a form by mail, fax, or in person from the Farm Service Agency county offices. Forms may also be obtained the internet http://www.ams.usda.gov/lsmarketingprograms during the same time period. Individual producers and other producer entities may request a referendum at the county FSA office where their administrative farm records are maintained. Completed forms and supporting documentation must be returned to the appropriate county FSA office by fax or in person no later than close of business May 29, 2009; or if returned by mail, must be postmarked by midnight May 29, 2009, and received in the county FSA office by close of business on June 5, 2009.

USDA will conduct a referendum if at least 10 percent of the nation's 589,182 soybean producers support a referendum. Not more than one-fifth of the producers who support having a referendum can be from any one

The soybean check off program is administered by a 68member producer board and is designed to expand uses of soybeans and soybean products in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory assessment of one-half of 1 percent of the net market price of soybeans.






