Spearman City Council...

To vote on \$1,000,000 certificates

Spearman City Council voted unanimously at the Tues., March 17, meeting to authorize publication of notice of intention to issue certificates of obligation in the amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.

Council will hold a special meeting Tuesday, April 14, to consider an ordinance authorizing the issuance of the certificates.

Kelvin Knauf, city manager, stated in the city lites column that the certificates will be used to pay for the purchasing a fire truck, construction of a transfer station to dispose of garbage and repairs at the sewer plant.

Bids for the depository and custody of city funds and the sealcoat project were opened. Upon the recommendation of both Knauf and George Williford, First Southwest Company vice-president, the First Mational Bank of Spearman was awarded the contract. The bank offered a higher interest rate, lower check charge and higher rates on certificates of deposit.

Ed Garner, alderman, recommended that the sealcoat project be awarded to the low bidder. Lewis Constructions Co., Dumas, was awarded the contract for the amount of \$48,707.04 (47 cents per square vard).

suggested that the city sponsor a logo contest to create a unique and attractive logo for Spearman.

Meeting minutes said that the winning logo will be used on signs at the city's entrances and municipal airport, on the water tower and on city documents. Entries to the contest will be excepted through April 17. Contest rules were set and it was passed unanimously.

Municipal Court Judge Steve Krug informed the council about new laws requiring the municipal court to have a prosecuting attorney available. Many legal questions arise that need to be answered by an attorney, the minutes stated. Motions to dismiss delinquent complaints must be made by a prosecuting attorney, stated Krug, but the final decision would be his.

The council decided to seek more information in the matter and took no action at this meeting.

Chamber of Commerce Director, Cindy Blackman spoke to the council about the big clean-up campaign planned. The campaign will be sponsored by the chamber, but asks for the city's support.

Mike Cudd motioned that the council adopt the amended travel policy proposed by the city admin-Kelvin Knauf, city manager, istration. The policy holds that if a city employee goes out of town on official business it must be approved by either the department head or the city manager. Reimbursement for meals and airfare is also outlined in the policy. A spouses airfare may be reimbursed if they actively take part in the meeting. Expenses the city will not pay for are also outlined in the policy. The policy passed unani-

The council appointed Kathy Beck as presiding judge and judge of absentee ballot board and Pearl Pierce as alternate judge for the May 2 municipal election.

Knaufinformed the council that Spearhead Corporation failed to meet the deadline for tax exempt status and was requesting reimbursement on property tax paid in 1991. It was decided to authorize Hansford County Appraisal District to refund the tax.

He also stated that the city must pay \$765.60 for a water assessment, mandated by the state

Approval was given to February departmental reports and to monthly bills payable in the amount of \$203,066.64.

State sales and use tax reported

Retail business in the third quarter of 1991 was down slightly in Hansford County, as compared with the third quarter of 1990, according to information from the State Comptroller's office.

Hansford County had a total of 81 reporting outlets in the retail trade division of the Comptroller's Third Quarter 1991 State Sales and Use Tax Analysis. In third quarter 1990, there were 85 reporting outlets.

Gross sales by those 81 reporting outlets is listed as totaling \$10,017,989 in third quarter 1991, down 5.6 percent from third quarter 1990's gross sales of \$10,613,386. Use tax purchases for the retail trade division in third quarter 1991 totaled \$5,353, while the amount subject to state sales and use tax totaled \$2,899,303.

down 5.2 percent in third quarter 1991 as compared with third quarter 1990. There were 135 reporting outlets in Hansford County during third quarter 1991, down from 161 reporting outlets during the same period of 1990.

Those business reported gross sales of \$17,365,502 during third quarter 1991, as compared with \$18,324,845 in third quarter 1990. Use tax purchases for all industries in third quarter 1991 totaled \$95,167, while the amount subject to state sales and use tax totaled \$4,546,143 for all industries in that

In the Comptroller's analysis, reporting outlets is defined as the number of individual business locations with a sales and use tax permit who filed a return. Gross sales is defined as the total amount For all industries, business was of all sales, leases and rentals of

tangible personal property and all labor and service charges made during the reporting period.

Use tax purchases is defined as the cost of all taxable items removed from inventory for personal or business use and all purchases on which no Texas sales tax was paid or use tax accrued. Taxable sales are not listed on the report, but an explanation is needed in order to understand the amount subject to state sales and use tax. Taxable sales is the total amount of sales, leases and rentals of taxable personal property and taxable labor and service charges made during the reporting period.

The amount subject to the state sales and use tax is calculated by taking taxable sales and adding

Ochiltree deputy hired as probation officer

A love of kids and the desire to help them led Bill Guinn to apply for the position of Chief Juvenile Probation Officer for Ochiltree and Hansford counties.

He was chosen for that position Monday, March 23 by the Hansford-Ochiltree Juvenile Board.

Guinn, currently employed as a deputy with the Ochiltree County Sheriff's Department, is scheduled to begin his new job Wednesday, April 1, according to Ochiltree County Judge J. Kenny Norris, a member of the juvenile board.

Norris, in announcing Guinn's selection, said, "Twenty-one people applied for the job and we (the juvenile board) felt that Bill was the best qualified. He has the training, experience and temperament to properly handle juveniles.'

Guinn is a 20-year veteran of law enforcement and has been employed as an Ochiltree County deputy sheriff since Dec. 16, 1985. He was formerly Chief of Police at Canadian, Texas.

For 15 years, while on the job, he spent many evening hours attending college courses and studying, attaining a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Wayland Baptist University.

"It was difficult, working and raising a family and studying at night. But my family was very supportive, and that really helped," he said.

Judy and four children. Judy is also employed with the Ochiltree County Sheriff's Department, as communications supervisor. Daughter Holly will graduate from medical technology school at West Texas State University in July, and son Heath is a student at Texas Tech University.

The Guinns also have two students at Perryton High School, Nicole and Hunter. The family attends First United Methodist Church.

Having obtained a degree, Guinn wanted to better utilize his knowledge in his chosen field, law enforcement. When the opening for a juvenile probation officer came to his attention, he decided that would be the perfect job for him.

"I feel I can use my education in this position," he explained. "I feel I have a lot to offer the kids of our community, as far as helping them."

Guinn says he has a good rapport with area youth. As the resident

deputy at Lake Fryer, he interacts with youth regularly when they go to the lake and park area. Many are acquainted with him on a firstname basis.

"I know quite a number of our local youth - having four of my own, I know more of them than not -and I've very rarely had confrontations or bad encounters with kids," he commented.

Guinn said that when he begins his new job, he will probably "just jump in," dealing with each matter as it comes to him. There will be very little time for him to look over case files, he explained, and he feels that this job is one which will require that he deal with each situation on an individual basis.

And, he adds, he has a network of friends and acquaintances in law enforcement throughout the Panhandle, who have offered assistance. He said he plans to take advantage of their help and exper-

He does have an overall plan of action, which will consist of offering youth choices and using positive reinforcement.

He said, "I would like to offer

them choices, cause them to think and make their own decisions. Then, if the choices they make are good, I like to recognize that and give them a pat on the back. Of course, if they make a bad choice, they will know that they must face the consequences of their own ac-

"Our area kids are basically good kids," he added.

With that plan in mind, Guinn said he views his new position as "a challenge that I welcome and look forward to accepting. I feel very fortunate to be given the opportunity to act in this capacity.

"They could search high and low, but they would never find anyone who would try as hard as I will," he concluded.

For the time being, Guinn will be the lone juvenile probation officer in the two-county area, but he may have an assistant in the future. Judge Norris, speaking for the juvenile board, said, "We plan to let him 'get his feet wet' in the position, then look at hiring an assistant juvenile probation officer to be based in Spearman."

Sales tax rebates announced

Spearman received a check for \$11,203.80 in the March disbursement of city sales tax rebates from the State Comptroller's office. Gruver's check was in the amount of \$4,047.62.

The March check received by Spearman reflected a 4.63 percent increase from the \$10,708.35 received in March 1991, while Gruver's city sales tax rebate was up 18.18 percent from the \$3,424.91 received in the same month last

In the first three months of this year, Spearman has received a total of \$46,753.13 in city sales tax rebates, up 10.05 percent from the 1991 year-to-date total of \$42,484.93. So far this year, Gruver has received a total of \$13,089.99, which is 14.40 percent greater than the \$11,442.68 received through March of last year.

Statewide, State Comptroller John Sharp sent checks totaling \$82.1 million to 931 Texas cities, a 12 percent increase over the \$73.3 million received by cities last March.



A city employee will be at the landfill to assist residents during these days and hours.



outside the gate for people who arrive after the landfill has closed. Because of the state and federal

regulations the following items can not be dumped at the landfill: leadacid batteries, used tires, used oil or oil filters, pesticide/herbicide containers and asbestos.

City officials hope that our citizens can adapt and comply with the new policies. If you have any questions concerning this matter. please call City Hall at 659-2524.



Another way to save on the cost of heating water is to keep the heater set between 120° to 140°F. As a final money-saving accessory, consider a timer for the heater so that the heater doesn't cycle on when you're not home.

What you eat is one of the many factors that affect your chances of developing cancer. Certain dietary patterns or ways of eating have been linked with a reduced risk of cancer, while others have been linked with an increased risk.

The dietary recommendations to reduce cancer risk have been made primarily because of research linking foods with a lower risk for cancer - not supplements. But researchers don't have all of the answers. The protective factors in whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables may be due to something other than the fiber, B-carotene (beta-carotene) and vitamin C they contain.

Advice from different organizations varies somewhat, but the chart below outlines the most prominent dietary factors that may reduce cancer risk:

* Maintain your weight and avoid obesity - Eat moderately and exercise regularly to maintain an acceptable weight. Never go to extremes in either dieting or exercise, and see a physician before you begin any strenuous activity.

* Select a variety of foods - The

best way to be sure you are getting a range of protective substances and not getting too much of any one type of substance.

* Select at least three servings of vegetables and two servings of fruits daily - Choose dark green and orange vegetables and fruits carrots, winter squash, sweet potatoes, spinach, broccoli and apricots - because they are high in provitamin A, or B-carotene (betacarotene), and other plant constituents that may inhibit cancer development. Choose foods high in vitamin C such as oranges, grapefruits, cantaloupes, strawberries, fresh sweet peppers, tomatoes and cabbage family vegetables.

Eat foods high in fiber - Again, eat more fruits and vegetables, especially fresh ones, and use whole grains and legumes.

* Avoid fat - Bake, broil, stir-fry, or steam. Don't fry foods or add a lot of fatty extras.

* If you drink alcohol, cut back -Drinking more than two alcoholic drinks per day places you at a greater risk of developing certain types of cancer, especially if you drink and smoke.

HEALTH BRIEFS

Non-Surgical Solution For Arrhythmia - A computerized cardiac mapping system may provide a non-surgical cure for life-threatening irregular heartbeats.

Computerized cardiac mapping, developed at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, is used to pinpoint areas where the rhythm abnormalities originate.

The new system will provide scientists with a more powerful tool to study life-threatening arrhythmia.

"This could lead to treating patients with a catheter threaded into the heart through a vein," said Dr. Antonio Pacifico of Baylor.







Corn & Sorghum Producers **Due Program Payments**

Washington, D.C. - Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan said the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation will make about \$975 million in cash deficiency payments this month to eligible producers of 1991 crop corn and sorghum.

According to Madigan, corn producers will receive about \$895 million in additional deficiency payments including approximately \$70 million under 0\92 provisions. Most corn producers requested advance deficiency payments and were paid about \$1.16 billion at

about \$80 million in additional deficiency payments including \$25

million under the 0\92 provisions,

Madigan said. Sorghum producers who requested advance deficiency payments during the 1991 feed grain program sign-up have already received payments of about \$95 million.

Hansford & County

Deficiency payment rates are the difference between the established target price for the commodity and the higher of the five-month average market price or the basic price support rate for the commodity. Corn and sorghum prices for the first five months of the 1991 marketing year exceeded the basic price support rates of \$1.89 per bushel for corn and \$1.80 per bushel for sorghum.

Deficiency payments are, therefore, required to be made under the 1991 corn and sorghum programs because the national weighted av-Sorghum producers will receive erage corn and sorghum market price received by producers during the first five months of the marketingyear (September through January) were below the target price

The following table shows the calculations used to determine 1991 deficiency payments for corn and sorghum producers:

A. Target Price 2.61-Sorghum 2.75

B. Basic Price Support Level Corn-1.89 1.80-Sorghum C. 1991 5-Month Average Mar-Corn-2.34 ket Price Sorghum

D. Deficiency Payment Rate (A minus C) Corn-0.41

Producers who did not request advance deficiency payments will receive \$0.41 per bushel in corn payments and \$0.37 per bushel in sorghum payments. Corn producers who received advance deficiency payments will receive \$0.178 per bushel. Sorghum producers who received advance deficiency payments will receive \$0.146 per

Under the 0\92 provision of the 1991 feed grain program, participants had the option of underplanting program crop acreage bases while still earning program payments. These producers were guaranteed to receive no less than the projected final deficiency payment rates that were estimated at the time of enrollment in the 1991 feed grain program.

The projected 1991 deficiency payment rates were \$0.58 per bushel for corn and \$0.56 per bushel for sorghum. Since the projected rates were higher than the actual rates, these producers will be paid on the basis of the projected rates. The final payment for producers receiving an advance payment will be reduced by the amount of the advance payment.




