Gruver CC second at state meet

Running on what Steve Myatt, Gruver coach, described as "a muddy, sloppy course," Cora Meyer led the Gruver Lady Hounds cross country team to a second place finish in the 1A State Finals race.

Meyer finished ninth overall in the race, and with that top-10 finish earned All State laurels for the second year in a row. Meyer will have another chance next year to add one more All State patch to her jacket, as she is only a junior.

The second Gruver runner to finish was junior Kasey Davis, who finished 16th overall.

Freshman Tisha Ralston was the third Gruver runner to finish. Myatt was particularly pleased with her finish because she has had a sore knee the last two weeks. "I am especially proud of Tisha," said Myatt. "With her hurt knee, she hasn't practiced in two weeks. She showed a lot of character." She finished 29th overall.

Monica Ward, junior, finished in the fourth spot for the Gruver team. Her overall finish was 39th. Following Ward was another junior, Brendi Brown, who finished 40th overall.

Freshman Julie Meyer finished as the sixth Gruver runner and was

42nd overall. Following her was junior, Holly Venneman, who finished 75th overall. Going as an alternate but not running was Traci Crawford. "I am real proud of this bunch," said Myatt. "A silver medal at state

is a great accomplishment." He went on to say that the girls' times were actually better than last year, when they won the State race. "The competition is just so much better," said Myatt.

Sales tax rebates received

Spearman received a check for \$16,787.30 and Gruver received a check for \$4,502.02 in the November disbursement of city sales tax rebates from the State Comptroller's office.

The rebate check to Spearman reflects a 7.23 percent decrease from the \$18,074.58 which was received in November 1990, while Gruver's check shows a 16.84 percent increase from the \$3,852.99 received in the same month last year.

Year-to-date receipts by Spearman total \$146,620.50, which is down 8.12 percent from the total of \$159,569.70

which was received through November 1990. Gruver's total city sales tax rebates for this year are \$41,065.55, down 1.51 percent from the \$41,696.24 which was received in the first 11 months of last year.

Statewide, State Comptroller John Sharp said that local sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties are running \$123 million or 10.6 percent ahead of total payments this time last year.

This month's rebates to 1,065 Texas cities totaled \$137.2 million for a year-to-date total of \$1.2 billion, compared to 1990's year-to-date total of \$1.1

billion, or a 10 percent increase.

This month's payments include

taxes collected on September sales and reported in October by businesses filing monthly returns. November's rebates also include taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in July, August and September.

Shoppers pay the local sales taxes of up to 2 percent along with the state's 6¼ percent state sales tax when they make a taxable purchase. Merchants then send in the taxes to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its share and returns to cities, counties and other taxing entities their local portion of the sales tax.

Area voters must approve all local sales taxes at the polls. Most local governments use the money raised for services such as fire fighting, road maintenance and law enforcement. City sales taxes may also be used for local economic development and property tax reduction.

Since 1974...

Lynx get first playoff victory

Tough play by the Spearman Lynx on defense, and an opportunistic offense, allowed the Lynx to win their first playoff game since 1974. They defeated the Panhandle Panthers 14-10 last Friday night in Borger.

The Lynx defense served notice on the Panthers that it was not going to be easy to score. They kept the Panthers from scoring when the Lynx offense turned the ball over on their first play from scrimmage.

The Panthers got possession of the ball on the Lynx 23 yard line. Five plays and a penalty later, the Lynx offense took over again on their own 18 yard line.

The Lynx were unable to move the ball and had to punt. This gave the Panthers the ball on the Lynx 46 yard line. The Panthers were not able to gain ground with the running game, so they went to the air and completed three passes in eight plays and moved the ball to the Lynx 23 yard line. From there they could only gain three more yards and had to settle for a field goal. The quarter ended with the score 3-0 in favor of the Panthers.

In the second quarter, the Lynx offense had one scoring opportunity while the Lynx defense shut down the Panthers. The Lynx offense failed to score when, at the end of a 73-yard drive, the Lynx had a first-and-10 on the Panthers' 17 yard line. The Lynx turned the ball over on downs, on the Panthers' 12 yard line.

Both teams' offenses ground to a halt for the rest of the half. Chris

Strawn closed off a Panther drive by recovering a Panther fumble on the Panhandle 31. A second Panhandle drive was slowed when pressure from the Lynx rushers caused the Panther quarterback to miss a screen pass and cost Panhandle 10 yards on what was ruled a fumbled lateral.

The half ended with the score still 0-3 in favor of Panhandle. The coaches on the sideline at the end of the first half all said the same thing - "We need to score."

In the third quarter, offensive fireworks flared quickly. Panhandle started it when they forced the Lynx to turn the ball over on downs on the Lynx 34 yard line.

The Panther offense drove the ball the remaining 34 yards to the goal and scored with 2:25 left in the quarter. The extra point kick was good to make the score 10-3 in favor of the Panthers.

With the way the game had been going to this point, it looked like it might come to an end with the score remaining the same. But Lynx running back Brian Beck put an end to that idea in a hurry.

He took the Panther kickoff on the Lynx 16 yard line and started toward the left sideline. When he met the Panther line of would-be tacklers on the 22, he, he broke one tackler and cut back toward the middle of the field to avoid another. From then on, it was a foot race to the Panther end zone. Beck won the 84-yard race and

scored the Lynx' first TD of the night. The 2-point PAT attempt failed, to leave the score 6-10.

The score remained until the final few minutes of the game, when the Lynx defense gave the offense a scoring opportunity. Panhandle fumbled the ball and Brian Kidder recovered the fumble on the Panhandle 28 yard line.

From there the Lynx running back tandem, Tim Dooley and Beck, took over. On the first play Dooley ran for 11 yards. On the second play Beck dashed off 16 yards. On the third play Dooley crossed the goal line on a two-yard run.

The Lynx took the lead for the first time with 2:27 left in the game. To try and prevent Panhandle from tying the score with a field goal, the Lynx went for a 2-point PAT.

Lynx quarterback Khris Kelp found tight end Strawn in the end zone and completed the pass, putting the Lynx ahead 14-10.

The Lynx defense went to work and snuffed out Panhandle's last drive by causing the Panhandle quarterback to fumble, then recovering the fumble. Tim Kizziar hit the quarterback as his arm was going back, and Kidder got his second fumble recovery when he managed to corral the ball and hang on to it.

The Lynx offense ran the ball three times until the clock ran out, and Spearman had beaten Panhandle for its first playoff win since 1974.

Repair plans to be drawn up

Plans for repairs at Gruver's wastewater treatment plant will be drawn up, following authorization by the Gruver City Commission at its Nov. 13 meeting.

According to A.J. Ratliff, Gruver city manager, air lines at the wastewater treatment plant need to be replaced to bring the plant into compliance with its permit requirements. The commission authorized Dwight Brandt, city engineer, to draw up plans for plant

repairs. The plans will be submitted to the Texas Water Commission for approval, said Ratliff.

In other business, the city commission approved reappointment of members to the Gruver Library Board for two-year terms. Board members include Mrs. Archie Nelson, Mrs. Robert Myers, Mrs. Ralph Bort, Mrs. Sam Cluck, Mrs. Gene Duncan, Mrs. Aubrey Rasor, Mrs. Bill Thiele, Mrs. Jerry Williams and Mr. Mack Hoel.

Delbert Williams was appointed to a two-year term on the Gruver Air-

port Board, said Ratliff.

Commission members passed a proclamation declaring November to be Hospice Month, and giving recognition to Hansford Hospice. The proclamation was signed by Gruver Mayor Keith Gibson and was entered into the minutes of the meeting. (Note: The proclamation appears on page 5 of this week's Reporter-Statesman.)

Commission members voted to authorize the letting of bids for a new truck for the sanitation department, said Ratliff.

PDRA prepares for excavation

Another archaeological dig must be performed at the Palo Duro Dam site, and as a result the Palo Duro River Authority Board of Directors had to consider a budget increase for consultant work at its Nov. 12 meeting.

According to Johnnie Lee, PDRA general manager, the additional archaeological work will cost approximately \$25,000 in consulting fees to Freese and Nichols, engineers for the dam project. Lee said that any artifacts found at the new dig site,

along with historical finds already located, will be placed in permanent storage at the Panhandle Plains Museum at Canyon.

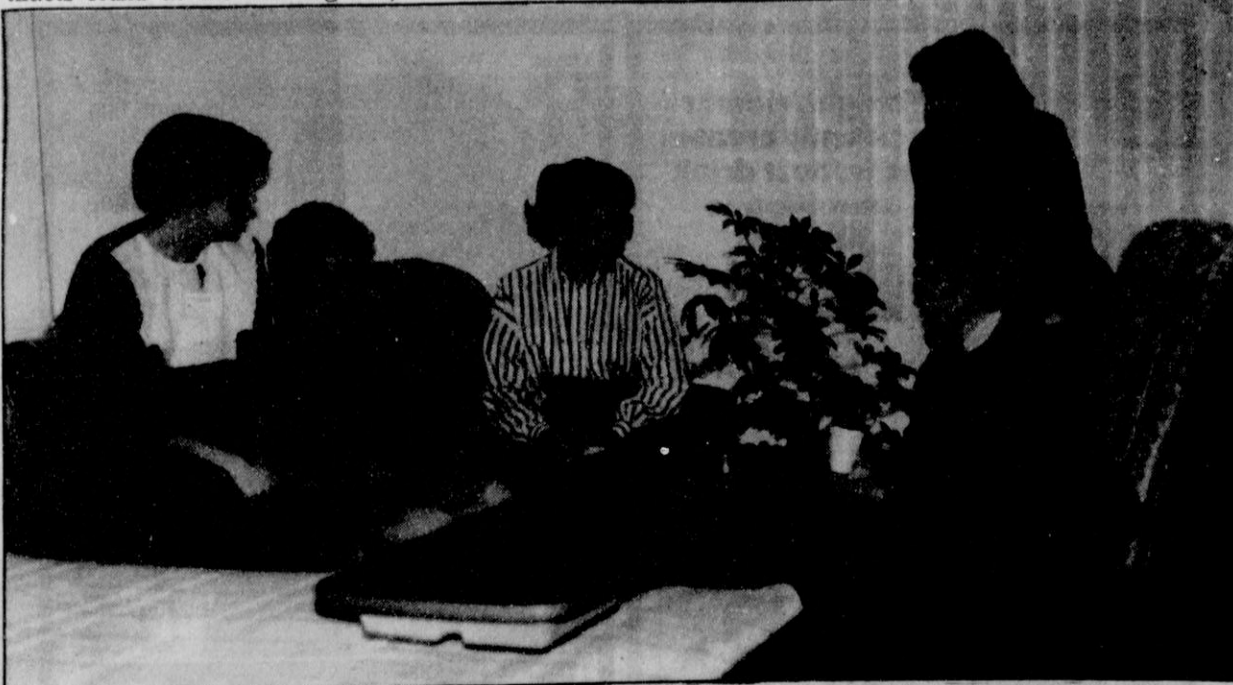
Other business discussed at the PDRA meeting included possible refinancing of bonds, which were issued for construction of the dam and lake area. Lee said that the board is studying the possibility of refinancing the bonds, which could bring down the interest rate on the bonds from 7.6 percent to 6.55 percent. He said refinancing the bonds could save up to \$1 million in interest

charges.

PDRA board members discussed water wells at Palo Duro Lake, noting that three wells are needed to obtain drinking water. Lee explained that the wells must meet Health Department standards for quality, and the PDRA hired an engineer for the project. He said signs have been placed on the wells that are already located in the area, which warn that the water from the wells is not potable and should not be drunk.

The board authorized the purchase

Letter to the editor

Dear Editor:

I recently became a Peace Corps volunteer, and I will live in Eger, Hungary, for the next two years. Eger is a small city of about 65,000 located approximately 60 miles south of Czechoslovakia and 120 miles west of the Ukraine Republic in the Soviet Union. I teach English as a foreign language at a local primary school. I teach one class of third graders, two classes of seventh graders, two classes of eighth graders, and one class for teachers at my school.

The Peace Corps' slogan, "The toughest job you'll ever love," is an excellent description of my life in Hungary. Some things are tough while other things are loveable. Now, I would like to tell you a couple of the joys.

First, I must discuss the rewards I get from teaching. Just two and a half months ago, I walked into a supposedly advanced class (The students have studied English for four years), and I asked a girl what her name was. After a couple of giggles, she looked up at me and said, "Yes?" However, now I am happy to report that all my students can now answer all the basic questions asked by most cultures in the world.

I also feel proud knowing I'm doing something which can't be done by anyone else at my school. The Hungarian English teachers may be able to teach the skills of reading, writing, and listening, but only a native speaker can really teach the skill of speaking. I get to see improvement in the speaking of English

daily - and not only by the students but also by other teachers at my school and the other places I visit "officially" on a regular basis.

When I was offered the opportunity to come to Hungary, I was very enthusiastic because I think this area of the world is one of the most interesting during these times when democracy is becoming the government rule. This past October 23 was a holiday for independence. I felt as if I were a part of history on that day because it was the third year since this date has become a holiday. On October 23, 1989, Hungary officially became a democracy, so I was here for the same kind of celebration that our ancestors in the States had on July 4, 1776. It was definitely a memorable day.

Although I do miss many of the luxuries and conveniences I had in America, I do feel lucky to be in Hungary now. I get to learn so much every day, like how fortunate I am to be an American and have the right to choose what I do and when I do it. This right is not everywhere in the world.

Last, I would like to ask a favor. I appreciate the notes and everything I have received, and I hope they continue. If I could ask, I would enjoy getting picture postcards. This way I could take them into the classroom and show my Hungarian students what Spearman, or Texas, or anywhere in the United States of America looks like.

To Hansford County Citizens:

This letter will be an effort to dispel the many rumors and stories as to what the future plans of your hospital district are in the upcoming months. You may have heard we are going to build a 65-bed hospital. **TOTALLY UNTRUE.** If we had all the patients in Perryton, Spearman, Canadian and Berger, we still would not fill a 65-bed hospital.

After many months of planning, a market survey and reviewing the recommendation of the strategic planning committee, the Board has elected to assess the feasibility of what could be done with our present facilities and land available to the hospital district. Our present needs are not the same as they were 10 years ago because of government regulations which have changed hospitals' emphasis from inpatient care to outpatient care. We need fewer inpatient rooms and more space for outpatient services.

The demand for long-term care beds continues to increase, both from within the county and from other areas.

The District has met with the architects, members of the planning committee, county commission and hospital district employees for input as to feasibility and our current needs.

Please remember that the current hospital was built to meet the needs of the 1960 era, it also does not meet current Life Safety codes for new building; and is currently running on a waiver. Regardless of what we do, the hospital must have major renovation to the heating, plumbing, electricity, and air conditioning systems. Preliminary estimates on these needs are \$900,000 - \$1,000,000.

At the November 14, 1991 Board meeting, the architectural firm of Cox/Croslin was commissioned to

present plans for the building of a new and more efficient 16-bed hospital with specific plans for more outpatient services space; specifically for a larger physical therapy area, cardiac re-hab, hospice area, and home health, increasing the area for our outpatient chemotherapy, and retail pharmacy, and ultrasound in-house instead of through a mobile service. These plans also would call for expanding our respiratory therapy to offer more outpatient services. The current hospital would be renovated to increase our long-term beds and to offer a new personal care area for people who can't live at home but don't currently need to be placed in a long-term care setting. Adult day care would be a new service offered in this area.

The Board also feels that with these plans in the process, it would be easier to recruit a third physician to Hansford County.

Cost is the unknown at this point. Within 6 to 8 weeks, Cox/Croslin will present a plan and reliable cost estimates to the Board. The preliminary estimate also shows that if the project is approved by the voters of Hansford County, when finished, there would be a need for 30-50 additional district employees. This would allow more young people to stay in the county instead of moving away for jobs.

Regardless of the above, you, as the taxpayer of Hansford County Hospital District, would have the last say. Before any project could be started, it would have to be presented for a county-wide vote, and only with a majority vote in favor of selling bonds and starting the project, could the project move forward.

This is a plan for the future, and your future needs are our greatest concern.

As plans are developed and information is available, this information will be passed on to you.

At the movies . . .

Showing at the Lyric Theatre in Spearman from Friday, Nov. 22 through Tuesday, Nov. 26 will be "Paradise" on Screen 1 at 7:30 p.m., and "Frankie and Johnny" on Screen 2 at 7:15 p.m.

"Paradise" stars Melanie Griffith, Don Johnson and Elijah Wood. The film is a look at how the human species deals with pain and tragedy. It is a touching, heart-tugging film featuring a decent ensemble cast that makes the most of the story's emotive possibilities.

"Paradise" is based on the French film "Le Grand Chemin" ("The Big Highway"), which dealt with a young boy sent to the country and separated from his mother - a life-affirming, purely sweet story. But in "Paradise" the emphasis is shifted away from the young boy and onto the couple who have agreed to watch him while his mother has a baby. Ben and Lily Reed (Johnson and Griffith) are at their relationship's end: they've suffered the loss of their young son and their marriage has been unable to withstand the strain. Ben has turned bitter and sardonic;

Lily has become cold and distanced.

But little Willard Young (Wood), in his two-week stay with the Reeds, revitalizes their marriage and re-inspires them with the joys of parenting. He's cute as a button, and even the harsh, ironic Ben soon forms a bond with him. The friendship young Willard forms with Billie Pike (Thora Birch), a spunky tomboy who has never known her father or had any close friends, makes for scenes with a genuine warmth.

"Paradise" is rated PG-13 for brief nudity and adult situations.

Al Pacino and Michelle Pfeiffer star in "Frankie and Johnny," an adaptation of Terrence McNally's play about a short order cook and waitress who fall in love.

Director Garry Marshall, credited with sanitizing the once downbeat script to "Pretty Woman," has cast gorgeous Pfeiffer in a role that was played on stage by the less-than-glamorous Kathy Bates.

"Frankie and Johnny" is rated R.

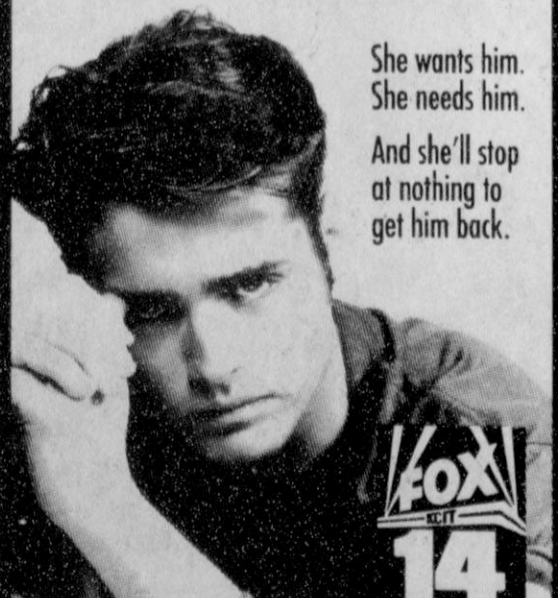

"Couples should plan the holidays together so that no one feels overwhelmed or left out," said Dr. Nancy J. Warren, clinical associate professor of psychiatry and director of the Family Transition Program at Baylor.

Women traditionally coordinate the family festivities during Thanksgiving and Christmas, while husbands often stay in the background and wait to be called upon. This apparent lack of interest can cause marital tension.

Between their careers, making the gift list, buying the gifts, addressing and mailing cards, baking goodies and decorating the house, wives usually have little time left over for their husbands. This too can put a

strain on a marriage. Warren suggests that couples make a list of what needs to be done, but set priorities. Determine who will do what and equally share the chores, even those that may be unpleasant. Time management and a firm budget are especially important to get through Thanksgiving preparations and hectic shopping days.

Stress levels differ from family to family. To limit stress, Warren advises developing realistic holiday expectations.

"For example, many families anticipate a closeness during the holidays that they do not have during the year and become disappointed when it does not happen," Warren said.

Families that recently experienced a loss through death or divorce may want to create new holiday traditions if the old ones do not feel "right" anymore.

The basic strategies for coping

with stress are: eat and drink moderately, exercise, manage time and make certain that you find time for yourself and if necessary, find a support group.

of a communication system for use by park personnel, said Lee. He explained that the PDRA board discussed the purchase of radios for three PDRA vehicles in addition to two walkie-talkies for patrol and maintenance personnel. He estimated the cost for the radios to be approximately \$2,400.

Construction of 1,200 feet of barricade fencing was authorized by the board. Lee explained the fencing, 6 feet tall with a wire guard around the top, will be put up around buildings in the dam area.

The board engaged Brown, Graham & Co. to perform the PDRA's audit for the 1991-92 fiscal year.

American Grazing

"Grazing" or snacking on mini-meals is fast becoming the American way of eating. Our fast-paced lifestyles leave little time for families to sit down to three meals a day. Nutrients and calories lost through incomplete or skipped meals can be replaced by snacking. Done wisely, grazing is not only good for you, but can be fun when you find creative, low-fat ways to enrich your diet.

The best grazing strategy is to make sure that the foods you choose are nutritious. They should provide not only calories but vitamins, minerals, fiber, protein and other essential nutrients. Don't think of grazing foods as extras but as important components of your diet. Throughout the day distribute the appropriate amount of food for your size, age and activity level.

There are several benefits associated with grazing. The flexibility of mini-meals allows you to get nutrition and energy when you need it. Recent studies suggest that light, frequent snacks may be even better for your body than eating three regular meals. Researchers have studied people eating exactly the same food, but distributing it dif-

ferently throughout the day. The snackers tended to have lower blood cholesterol levels and healthier levels of some hormones. While this research is still new, it does indicate that a snacking meal pattern might be a nutritious, sensible alternative to larger meals.

As positive as grazing on mini-meals can be, it is wise to remain aware of possible problem areas. If you eat more between meals without adjusting the size of regular meals you could take in excess calories resulting in a weight gain. Many snack foods have a poor nutritional content and are high in fat, sugar and sodium. Care must be taken to avoid substituting nutritionally incomplete snacks for regular meals.

Following these tips will help you develop good snacking habits that can add to your nutritional well-being:

- Keep snack portions small.
- Serve your snacks on a plate or dish to control the amount you consume.
- If you are having difficulty finding nutritious snacks, save food from each meal to snack on later.
- Keep wholesome, ready-to-eat snack foods at hand for when the snack attack strikes. Eliminate those snacks high in fat, sugar and sodium from your house.

When you crave something salty, try air popped or microwave light popcorn, baked taco chips with salsa, bread sticks or low-salt pretzels. If you crave something sweet, try fresh or dried fruit, rolls or muffins with low-sugar preserves and skim-milk puddings or custards. The world is full of wholesome, interesting snacks that can be prepared and eaten in a variety of ways. Your creative imagination can supply you with many more low-fat, nourishing snacks to make your mini-meals healthy and enjoyable.

Keep Buffet Foods Safe
Keep holiday buffets safe and

avoid later foodborne illness. Serve hot food from chafing dishes or warming trays that maintain the food temperature at 140 degrees Fahrenheit or above. For cold foods, nestle the serving dish into a bed of crushed ice. Don't leave any perishable food out for more than two hours. Also, fresh food should not be added to a serving dish or platter containing foods that have already been out for serving. Replenish serving dishes as needed directly from the refrigerator or stove.

Handle Party Trays with Care
Try these safe food handling tips when serving deli trays of meats and cheeses for party meals:

- Ask the deli manager for several small platters instead of a large one. Take these perishable foods straight from the market to the refrigerator.
- For the party, keep trays refrigerated until needed.
- Never leave a tray at room temperature for more than two hours. The same goes for sandwich trays.

Pumpkins and Vitamins
Pumpkin is a favorite vegetable for fall and winter meals. The fruit of the pumpkin is an excellent source of vitamin A and a good source of vitamin C. Pumpkin seeds are an excellent source of vitamin A and also contain thiamin and niacin. They can be washed, dried and roasted for high fiber snacking.

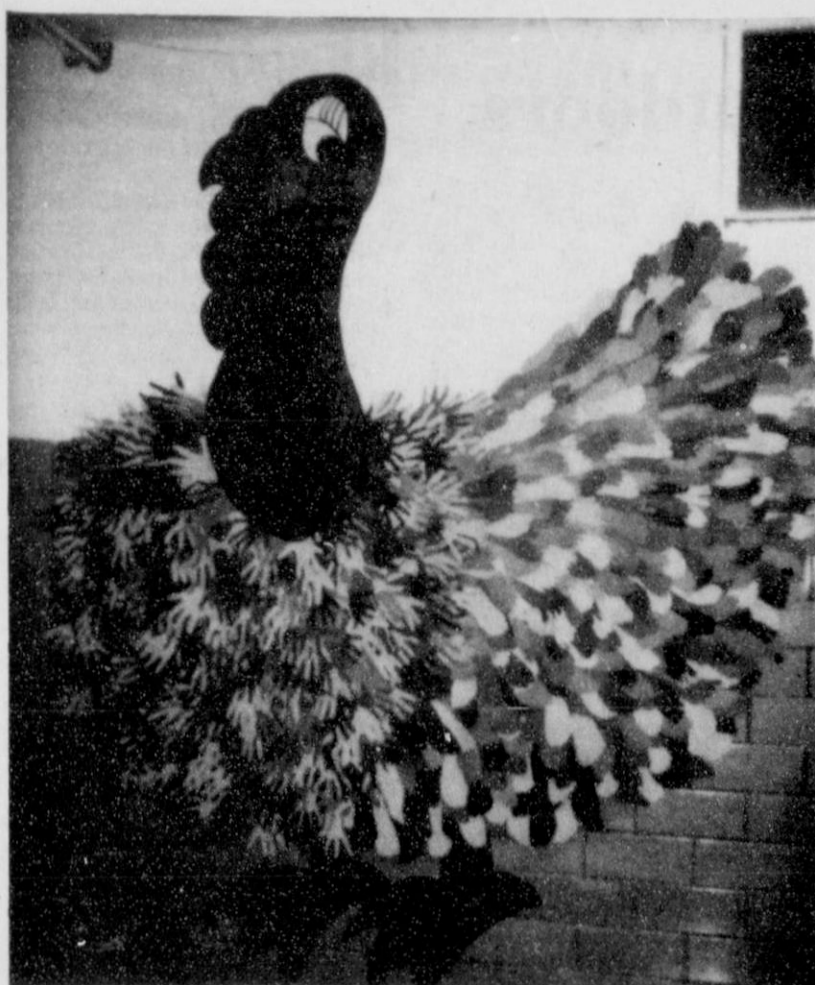

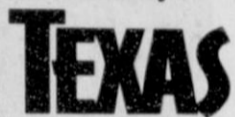

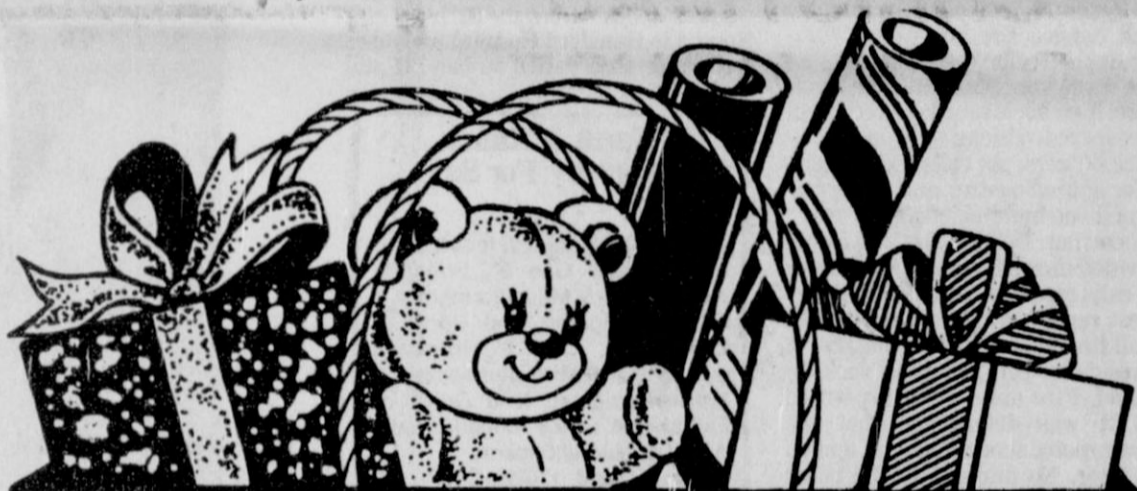

How does a bird hunter practice without going to the gun range? Try this new idea from hunting expert Wayne Pearson. Align and attach (with tape or thick rubber bands) a mini flashlight to the barrel of your shotgun. Get someone (a spouse, son/daughter, or even an insurance salesman if you wear ear plugs) to use another flashlight. Their job is to arc their light across a wall imitating the flight path of a quail, dove, or duck.

The goal is to develop the eye-hand coordination to quickly shoulder and aim the light on your gun so that it matches and "leads" the target light. Darken a room and practice. The smaller the flashlight beams, the better the practice.

This is a great excuse to turn off the television and spend some quality time with the family. Any time the TV set is turned off, every member of the family will know that something important is happening.

A trip to the gun range is still the best way to build shooting confidence, and I strongly recommend it for every hunter. After all, Arnold Palmer still goes to the driving range.

Ever wish you knew what the bot-

tom of a lake really looked like? Now is a perfect time to visit the site of the newest lake in Texas. Lake Alan Henry, named in honor of a former mayor of Lubbock, is located 17 miles south of Post on U.S. 84 between Lubbock and Snyder. Scheduled to be completed in 1993, Lake Henry will supplement water from Lake Meredith to meet the demands of the city of Lubbock.

With a surface area of 2,880 acres, Lake Henry will be a narrow winding reservoir, similar in appearance but not in size to Possum Kingdom. The many points, coves, cuts, humps, and feeding flats will protect anglers from the gentle breezes that occasionally blow in west Texas.

As you can tell, I am excited about the fishing potential of Lake Henry, and my video camera has already recorded some likely honey holes that will become invisible after this lake fills.

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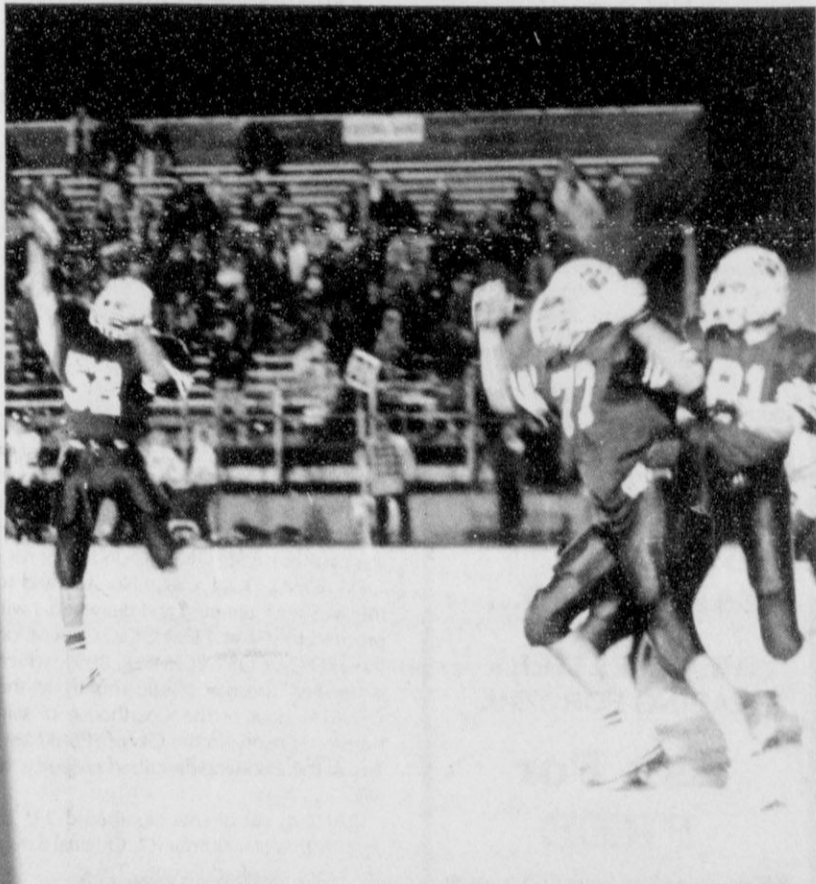
