portation Public Information Officer Paul Braun, between May 18th and May 31st, including the Memorial Day holiday weekend, state troopers, police officers and sheriff's deputies will be on Texas streets and highways to enforce the state's safety belt laws. In order to do this, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, TxDOT and the Texas Department of Public Safety are joining forces to launch this year's statewide Click It or Ticket effort. During this time, law enforcement officers will be working overtime, ticketing drivers and passengers who are not wearing safety belts. The effort, however, is about more than just writing traffic tickets; it's about keeping Texans safe on the road. "Local surveys show that 83 percent of residents in the Amarillo area are buckling up. We are happy about that, but we're pulling out the stops to reach pickup drivers and passengers, teen drivers and other hold-outs who haven't gotten into the habit of using their safety belts," said Howard Holland, TxDOT's Amarillo District Engineer. "By always buckling up, teen and adult drivers greatly increase their chances of surviving a crash, and staying alive to see the beauty that surrounds us in our majestic state." Buckling up, he said, is the single, easiest thing motorists can do to protect themselves from death or serious injury if they are ever involved in a crash. According to TxDOT, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for Texans between the ages of one and 34. Likewise, of all passengers killed in traffic crashes in Texas last year, nearly half weren't buckled up. NHTSA said that for every percent increase in safety belt use, 25 percent fewer Texans will be killed in traffic crashes, and another 586 will escape serious injury. That could add up to 51 lives saved and 1,178 injuries prevented. Wearing a safety belt can increase a passenger's odds of surviving a serious crash by up to 50 percent, and the numderstorms. Highs around 80. South- ber increases greatly for those riding in a pickup truck. More than that, however, wearing a safety belt is the law. Drivers and front seat passengers can be ticketed for not wearing their safety belts, as well as drivers who do not buckle up their children. Also, children younger than 17 years old must be secured with a safety belt or in a child safety seat, whether in the front seat or back seat; and all children younger than five years old, and less than 36 inches tall, must ride in a child safety seat. Safety belt violations can result in fines up to \$200, plus court costs, Braun said. Also, not buckling up can be even more costly for someone involved in a crash. According to the National Safety Council, lost wages, medical expenses, car repairs, taxes, increases in insurance premiums, travel delays and lost quality of life resulting from a crash can add up to and thunderstorms. 

Texas would expand its renewable energy portfolio under a bill approved by the Senate Tuesday. SB 541 by Senator Kirk Watson of Austin seeks to add other renewable energy generation in addition to wind over the next decades. The measure would require 1500 additional megawatts of renewable capacity in solar, geothermal and biomass generation by 2020. "Texas has the sun, the wind, the people and the demand," said Watson. "This is where [the renewable energy industry] wants to be if there is a long term commitment."

Voters would get to choose whether or not to limit the ability of the government to exercise eminent domain if a

measure passed by the Senate Monday becomes law. Under SJR 42, by Lubbock Senator Robert Duncan, a constitutional amendment would be put before the voters in the November election, one that would prohibit the taking of private land for economic development or tax revenue purposes. That bill now heads to the House.

Two measures that could affect many Texas drivers and their passengers passed the Senate this week. The first, SB 1317 by Senator Jeff Wentworth would require first time driver's license applicants aged 18-20 to take a driver's education course before they could be licensed. Current law requires a written and a driving test, but Went-worth says that people who haven't taken an education course are among the riskiest

drivers. He added the course can be taken at one of 300 approved instructors, or online, and the course takes about 6 hours and costs less than \$40. The second measure would require everyone riding in a car to buckle up, not just the driver or front seat passengers. Current law requires that anyone aged under 15 that is in a seat with a seatbelt use it, but SB 1028 by Watson would extend that requirement to passengers of all ages. If the bill becomes law, Texas would join 35 other states in requiring all passengers to wear a seatbelt.

Other bills passed by the Senate this week include:

- SB 2573, by Ogden, would require all state entities currently engaged in biomedical research to report to the Legislature on any research involving stem cells or human cloning,

- HB 205, sponsored by Estes, would exempt farm guard dogs from leash laws,

- HB 1510, sponsored by Jackson, which seeks to educate new parents about the risks of sudden infant death syndrome.

The state Senate on May 14 approved a bill intended to help lawmakers determine the extent of stem cell research being performed by state agencies.

SB 2573 by Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, would require all state agencies involved in biomedical research to submit a report detailing any research involving stem cells or human cloning.



Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister We celebrate the Ascension of Christ as we study Acts 1: 1-11, Psalm 47, Ephesians 1: 15-23 and Luke 24: 44-53

In Acts, Luke tells Theophilus that in his gospel he wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning. In Acts, Luke is telling the story of the Holy Spirit and the Church. Jesus is shown ordering the disciples not to leave Jerusalem until they receive the 'promise of the Father'. The disciples ask if he is going to restore the Kingdom to Israel. Jesus tells the disciples that they will be his witnesses in Jerusalem Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Saying this he ascends into heaven. The disciples stand gazing into heaven. Two men in white robes appear and ask, "Men of Galilee why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." The disciples despite Jesus' explanations of scripture were still looking for the restoration of the old Jerusalem; Jesus was directing them to the new Jerusalem eternal in the heavens.

The Psalmist sings "Clap your hands all you peoples ... " for God has gone up with a shout ... " for "God is king over the nations, God sits on his holy throne."

Paul reminds us that we have received an inheritance hrough our Lord, Jesus Christ. We are marked by the seal of the Holy Spirit. Paul prays that each believer will have a spirit of wisdom (Greek Sophia) which is the wisdom of the deeper things of God. Paul prays that each believer will come to a greater revelation and fuller knowledge of Jesus Christ. Paul then shows us Christ seated in heaven on the right hand of God, the Father, Almighty, where Christ is the ruler of all things and the head of the church, which is his body. With Christ as the head of the church, he is counting on us to continue his work on earth as his 'body'

Luke in his gospel, shows us Christ explaining the scripture to his disciples in the upper room. Christ then leads them out as far as Bethany, blesses them, and while he is blessing them, he is carried into heaven. We are told the disciples returned to Jerusalem with great joy. We see here the reality of the resurrection; we see here the explanation of the necessity of the cross; we see the urgency of our task of spreading the gospel; we see the secret of the power from on high, the Holy Spirit. In this scripture, we see the end of Christ's earthly ministry and the beginning of his heavenly reign. In this scripture we see the beginning of our service on earth to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Dear Christian, sometimes we may feel hostility toward other Christians not of our persuasion; but all who profess Jesus as Messiah, all who are 'sealed' by baptism by the Holy Spirit are part of the church universal, the faith community, the Body of Christ. Let us not be found complaining that our part of the Body of Christ is not receiving due praise; rather, let us be found rejoicing that we are chosen to share our joy in Jesus Christ. May the Holy Spirit be with you now and forever.


SEDCorp Project Holds Open House




In the team competition, Canadian used strong efforts from weight man Caleb Berry on the boys side and sprinter Aven Covin in the girls meet to sweep the team championships.

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
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

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

Early History of Farwell We have another item from the Panhandle Interstate of Lipscomb, Texas written August 19, 1887:

Farwell A. Weatherlt, manager for the Farwell Town Co., Hansford County, Texas, accompanied by James and John McKeever, passed through Lipscomb on Wednesday for their town. He says the Farwell Town Co. is composed of three different companies, one from Harper, one from Sterling, and one from Garden City, Kansas. They have consolidated and laid out their town exactly in the center of the county. The company plans to build all the houses that are needed for the present and sink three wells. There is owned by individuals in the company seventeen sections of land in Hansford County, and it is their aim to build up a county town and help settle up the county. The county has yet only about seventy-five settlers, and they will not attempt an organization this year.

During Memorial Day weekend, Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales and use taxes on purchases of certain energy efficient products. The 2009 Energy Star sales tax holiday begins at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, May 23, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Monday. May 25 (Memorial Day).

The products qualifying for the exemption are: Air conditioners priced under \$6,000 (room and central units) Clothes washers (but not clothes dryers*) **Ceiling fans** Dehumidifiers **Dishwashers** Light bulbs (incandescent and fluorescent) **Programmable thermostats Refrigerators priced under \$2,000**

* Because most dryers use similar amounts of energy, Energy Star does not label clothes dryers.

According to Energy Star, qualified dishwashers use at least 41 percent less energy than conventional models meeting federal minimum standards. Qualified refrigerators use at least 15 percent less energy than conventional models; central air conditioners use 14 percent less energy; room air conditioners use 10 percent less energy; and ceiling fans that have earned the Energy Star are about 50 percent more efficient. Energy Star fluorescent light bulbs use about 75 percent less energy than standard incandescent bulbs.

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
