**Notices of change in property value are mailed to land owners**

Texas property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value by local appraisal districts. On May 25, 1995, Hansford County Appraisal

District mailed approximately 24,017 property owners their notices showing the 1995 proposed value.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of

the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Pleas do not pay from this notice," Peddy said.

Peddy emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains for a property owner. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Hansford Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership, and other areas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called ARB is an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's values. The ARB also hears and settles protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district.

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# Museum Musings

**REMEMBER:** Saturday, June 10, at 2:00 P.M. is the **Old Timers Reunion** at the Museum grounds. All "Old Timers" come on by for refreshments and a good visit. The parade will pass by the Museum at 3:00 P.M. so you'll be right where you can see it.

You will be able to see Heritage Days Queen, Fannie Venneman pass by, as she will be riding in the parade.

The Museum will be open the day of the parade. One display is dedicated to Gwenford Jones Lackey, 1894-1985. She was one of Hansford County's pioneers, a pioneer rancher.

Gwenford ran her family's ranch by herself from 1918, when her father died, until the fifties when her son, Joel Lee Lackey, took over. She was a real cowgirl, complete with boots and spurs.

As a young girl, Gwenford rode horses a lot. On April 1, 1910, at the Cowboy's Reunion in Guymon, she won the Lady's Pony Race of which there is a picture in the display case.

Gwenford went to school at Pleasant Hill on Palo Duro Creek, 7 miles south of Gruver. Her brother called it Ignorant Ridge. That name stuck! Later, her dad moved his family to Guymon so the kids could be educated at a bigger school.

In 1969, Gwenford was Guymon's

Pioneer Day Queen. For over fifty years she was on the board of Guymon's First National Bank; therefore, she was well known there as well as in Hansford County.

One of the main memories people have of Gwenford is her paintings, especially the Battle of Adobe Walls. Billy Dixon, famed Indian fighter at Adobe Walls, wrote a letter to her and mapped out the buildings. Her dad took her to the battle site in a buckboard so she could get the lay of the land. As a young girl, she painted the battle scene. The original painting in the Museum at Goodwell, Oklahoma. She later painted another picture of this battle which hangs in the Hansford County Library.

Two of Gwenford's paintings, her teddy bear that she had as a little girl, her Pioneer Queen dress, her mother's side saddle, her school annual, boots, spurs, western outfit, and pictures are all on display. These are on loan by her son, Joel Lee Lackey.

I want to thank Joel Lee for taking the time to tell me about his mother's things. One story he told me was that this little 110 pound lady could carry a 100 pound sack of cake on her back to feed her cattle. I think she was made out of a little tougher stuff than the rest of us.

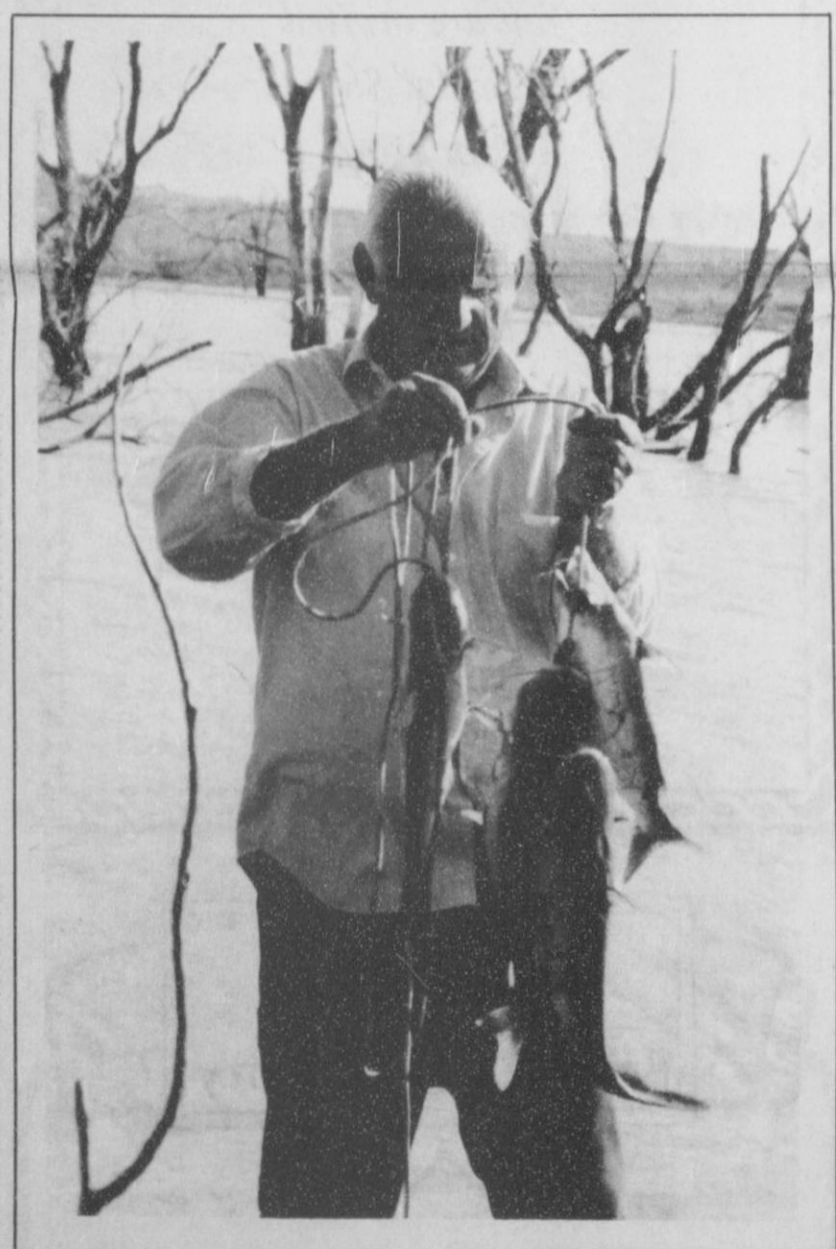

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# Natural sugar is better than artificial sweeteners

HOUSTON-Cakes, pies, candy, ice cream. We all love sweets with a passion. Too bad it's curbed by a little voice taunting "Cavities! Weight gain! Apply directly to hips!" So we dump artificial sweeteners in our coffee and tea, lunge for the nearest low-fat, high-fructose cookie, and boast about our healthy eating habits.

Alan J. Garber, MD, chief of the Endocrinology, Diabetes, and Metabolism section at the Methodist Hospital in Houston would disagree. "If you absolutely have to have something sweet, have something made with real sugar," Garber says. "Small amounts of the real thing may be a better choice than using artificial sweeteners."

According to Garber, some "sugarless" sweeteners have as many calories as sugar. Some cause diarrhea, and others have been shown

to cause cancer in animals. "A small portion of your favorite sweet treat, consumed with a meal, is okay on occasion," Garber says. "Anything in excess can lead to sugar addiction, obesity and, for some individuals, adult-onset diabetes."

Sugar, as we know it, comes in many guises. The granular white stuff that we spoon from the sugar bowl is sucrose. The average American consumes 154 pounds of it per year, or roughly three pounds per week.

"That's far too much," Garber says. "It's part of an addictive cycle. When you eat sugar, it's quickly digested and burned, and it causes peaks and valleys in your energy level that leaves you craving more."

That's why he suggests eating your weekly sweets at mealtime.

Sugar combined with fiber and other solid foods metabolizes more slowly and keeps your blood sugar more stable.

If you're already a sugaraholic, how can you break your addiction? "Go cold turkey," says Garber. "You'll feel lethargic for a couple of weeks, but you'll get over it. You may not even miss it."

Unfortunately, much of what we consume contains hidden sugar: products like ketchup, tonic water, and antacids, not to mention loads of processed foods. Sweetened products may not list sugar, or sucrose on the label because they contain other forms of sugar. Fructose and dextrose, for example, or lactose.

"If you want to cut your sugar consumption, read labels and beware of words ending in 'ose', because that usually means hidden

sugar," Garber says. Even if the label says "sugar-free", watch out. "Sugar-free products may still contain some form of sugar alcohols, like sorbitol, mannitol, and xylitol," Garber warns. "These sweeteners have as many or more calories as sucrose, so your ice cream may be a fattening as the real thing. And these sweeteners can cause diarrhea."

Aspartame (Equal, NutraSweet) and saccharin (Sweet 'n Low) are probably the most well-known sugar substitutes. They're virtually calorie-free, but Garber finds problems with both.

"Aspartame, a combination of amino acids, is risky for seizure-prone individuals," he says. "It can also cause headaches. And saccharin is a coal-tar derivative. Do you really want to eat something made from coal tar?"

Saccharin has also been shown to cause cancer in laboratory animals, which you may have read in small print on the packets. Another sweetener, sucaryl, has already been taken off the market for the same reason.

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## Recycling Words

By April of 1992 shoppers in Germany had to leave secondary packaging at the store. The tooth-paste box had to be left in bins. By January of '93 the actual package (tube, bottle, jar) had to be returned to the store. I have a hard enough time remembering the grocery list let alone remembering to take my trash back to the store for recycling.

Germany has a tighter disposal crunch than America and they are handling it quite aggressively. Our communities are trying to keep most aspects of our recycling programs voluntary, but recently we put together a proposal to join Clean Texas 2000. We made a promise to reduce waste through source reduction, recycling, yard waste management, landfill diversion strategies and buying recycled. The Clean Cities Program is designed to reduce waste buried in our Texas Landfills 50% by the year 2000. We

wrote ourselves a slightly leaner proposal but it is a commitment we mean to keep with the help of all the citizens.

### Here's How

\*Source reduction means not buying it in the first place. Buying a product without excess packaging, buying in bulk, or not taking a sack at the store. No sweat off your brow here.

\*Recycling means taking back what you already have, to be made into new stuff. Mixed paper, white paper, steel cans, newsprint, #1 and #2 plastics, aluminum and glass are all recyclable at the center. Cardboard is collected at airport hanger #15 and oil and oil filters are collected at the city warehouse.

\*Yard waste management means leave your grass clippings on the lawn. (Actually 38% less sweat for the average maintenance lawn care individual) or compost (some sweat may occur during turning).

\*Landfill diversion means chipping the brush and tree limbs for mulching, mixing grass clippings with soil for cover, and setting aside white goods, batteries, and tires for recycling.

\*Buying recycled means buying products made from materials you recycle. This is my favorite...buying stuff. Only my husband breaks a sweat here.

I think we can handle this...if we all do our part!

## Spearman Swimming Club travels to Ulysses for first meet of the year

After a long hot day, many people consider it relaxing to take a nice long dip in a cold pool, but members of the Spearman Swim Club (SPSC) believe that the pool is not only a place to relax, but it's an arena of fierce competition. The team proved that to be true, as several of the super-swimmers took the water and did quite well in last weekend's Grant County Swim Meet in Ulysses, Kansas.

To start off the wet weekend, two of Spearman's relays finished impressively in their respective events. In the girls' 8 and under 100 Freestyle Relay, the team finished with a silver place time of 2:42.24. As for the girls' 9-10 200 Freestyle Relay, the Spearman club added 6 points to the team's total, by capturing a 4th place and a time of 3:34.31. The last of the relays, the girls' 9-10 200 Medley, saw its way to an easy gold, as they captured that event by finishing with a destroying time of 3:45.67.

From there, it was on to the individual events. This year's team is chalked full of young talent, and with as many youngsters who grabbed at least one place at the meet, this was very evident. Abby Winegarner led Spearman in the girls' 8 and under 25 m Freestyle event with a time of 24.88. Winegarner also went on to take a gold in the girls' 8 and under 25 m Back-

stroke, with a time of 28.24.

Later, 9-year-old Jentry Edwards reached gold, as she captured 7 points for the team and a gold medal time of 42.84 in the girls' 9-10 50 Freestyle. She then cinched a silver in the girls' 9-10 50 m Freestyle, with a time of 52.83, and the girls' 9-10 100 Intermediate, with a gold medal time of 1:52.63. The same event also saw Cheryl Gibson nabbing a 4th and a time of 46.61.

As of yet, it appears that the girl's of the team were the only ones racking up the big scores, but Wayne Gibson came in on the boys' 8 and under 25 m Freestyle to change all that. He finished the event with a 6th place time of 31.56. Gibson also went on to capture a 5th in the boys' 8 and under 25 m Breaststroke with a time of 41.18, and he also grabbed a bronze medal time of 32.10 in the boys' 8 and under 25 m Breaststroke.

Colton Miller, who has set many records in this pool, also cinched a gold, but his came in the boys' 9-10 50 Freestyle, with a time of 37.20. Colton was really hot at the meet, as he came in with four other places in the meet as well, which were all gold medals. He finished the boys' 10 and under 100 m Freestyle with a time of 1:38.62, the boys' 9-10 100 Intermediate with a time of 1:42.20, the boys' 9-10 50 Breaststroke with

a time of 53.50, and the boys' 9-10 50 Fly with a time of 45.17.

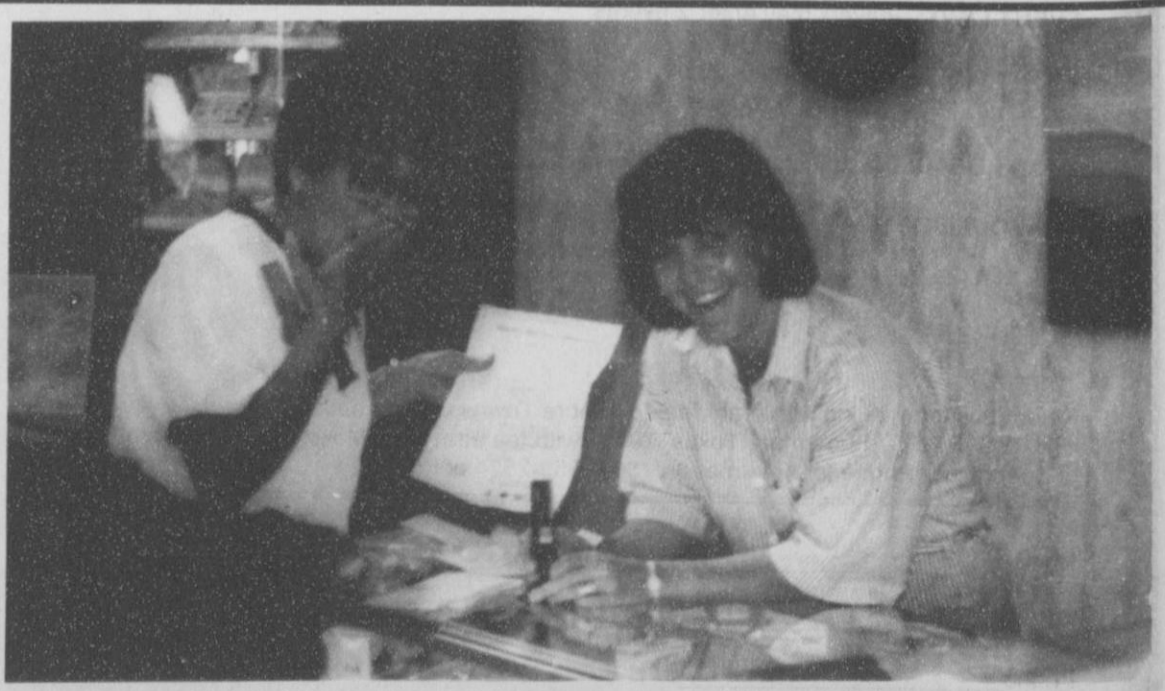
One of the oldest members, as well as one of the leaders of the team, Michele Elliott, really added some big points to the totals. She racked up five big events by placing in the top four of each event. To start off her success, Elliott placed 4th in the girls' 50 m Freestyle, while gaining a time of 32.60. In the 100 m events, she took a silver and a time of 1:22.55 in the Backstroke, and later, she captured another silver in the Freestyle, with a time of 1:13.35. An even younger member, Kaylee Golay, vaulted Spearman into 14 more points. Golay helped her team by nabbing a gold medal in the girls' 8 and under 25 Fly, with a time of 30.25, as well as another gold in the girls' 8 and under 100 Intermediate, with a time

## Farmers given wetlands options

Texas landowner will be able to enroll eligible acreage into USDA's third Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP). Sign is from May 30-June 30, 1995. Landowners can offer their land for the program at their local USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office. The program restores and conserves former wetlands through the purchase of easements from landowners.

The WRP provides a unique opportunity for farmers to retire marginal agricultural lands and reap the benefits of having wetlands on their property. WRP obtains conservation easements from participating landowners and provides

cost-share payments for wetland restoration.

Lands eligible for WRP include restorable areas that have been used intensively for cropping and forage production. Adjacent land necessary to protect the restored wetland will also be included. Limited areas of natural, plus non-wetland areas that buffer the wetland for disturbance or to establish reasonable field boundaries will be included.

NRCS and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) will determine eligibility of both land and landowners during the sign-up. Landowners sign and "intention" to enroll their land in WRP. After the

sign-up period, environmental benefits and cost estimates of each intention will be compiled and ranked. Intentions that provide the most environmental benefits at the least cost will be selected.

## TEA holds meeting for Special Education

Summary of Results Based Monitoring from the Texas Education Agency was presented during the Thursday meeting of the 1994-95 Special Education Advisory Committee held at the Smoke House Restaurant.

Special education director, Marsha Murphy explained to committee members that the Perryton Independent School District has entered into the RBM process this year on a volunteer basis. RBM will be required by all school districts, after the coming year. Its purpose is to monitor the success of eight specific programs, which include special education.

Murphy said that Special Ed RBM committees have been set up at each of the campuses in Perryton to provide designated information for review by the state. Weaknesses, which will be remediated, are being identified as well as strengths of the district.

In other business at the meeting, advisory committee members discussed sending out a survey to parents of special education students on proposed programs for the coming school year. The survey will be prepared and sent through students when they return in August. Suggestions will also be sought by parents on possible programs they would like to see the committee sponsor.

## Extension News

When the weather turns nice, the first thing many of us think of is getting outside and firing up the grill. To make your next barbecue a quick and tasty affair, give some of the tips below a try.

\*For easy, delicious glazes, dilute jams or jellies with a little orange or pineapple juice and brush on meats during the last minutes of grilling.

\*Avoid messy cleanups by lining the bed of the grill with heavy-duty aluminum foil. Be sure to leave holes where air vents are located. When barbecue is over and the coals have cooled, fold the foil into a bundle and toss.

\*To enhance the flavor of grilled foods, toss bundles of fresh or dried herbs such as rosemary, bay, thyme, sage, or oregano onto your coals.

\*Microwave ovens save time on the grill and still allow you to enjoy that great barbecue taste. Pre-cook foods like corn on the cob and whole potatoes before placing on the grill for quick and easy meals.

\*Grilled fruit makes a yummy, quick dessert! Placed bite-sized

pieces of assorted fruit (grapes, pineapple, bananas, apples, peaches, kiwis, or strawberries) on skewers and grill for 5-10 minutes. Baste with butter and sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon or ginger.

Vegetables A La Grill  
2 tomatoes, cut into wedges  
1 zucchini, cut into 1/4 inch slices  
1 yellow squash, cut into 1/4 inch slices

6 broccoli flowerets  
6 cauliflower flowerets  
1 onion thinly sliced  
1 t. beef-flavored bouillon granules

3 T. margarine, cut into pieces  
1 T. brown sugar  
1/4 t. salt  
1/4 t. fennel seeds, crushes  
1/8 t. pepper

Combine all ingredients in a large bowl; toss gently.

Place vegetables on large piece of heavy-duty aluminum foil. Fold edges over, and wrap securely.

Place on grill about 5 inches from medium-hot coals. Cook 12 to 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Yield: 6 servings.

weekly for up to a year. In many cases, a patient is driven to hospitals of clinics by relatives or friends, but even these patients must occasionally seek alternative transportation. That's where Road to Recovery comes in. Many patients' families express relief knowing that there is someone who can help them out with transportation if work conflicts, car trouble or other unforeseen obstacles should arise. A Road to Recovery volunteer can also lessen the emotional burden that patients and their families often place on themselves during these times.

American Cancer Society services provided during the 1993-94 fiscal year (September 1 to August 31) to Hansford County patients

include: 11 Information Services, 14 Transportation trips to Amarillo, 9 gift items, 7 standard equipment loans, and 2 support group participants. The estimated dollar value of these 30 services is \$1,259. Clementine Renner, past Patient Services Chairman for the Hansford Unit added that many additional informal information services are also given through American Cancer Society board member contacts.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Take special note of the proposed value for 1995," Peddy said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemption granted to the property. The notice provides last year's value, too.

Peddy asks that a property owner look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no errors. "If the

notice contains an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October," Peddy added.

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely. A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address.

Peddy added, "If you did not get a notice and want 1995 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at 659-5575 or 1-800-372-5411. The deadline for protesting to the ARB is June 23, 1995, for this year."
