

TEXAS SAFE FARMING PLAN IS ORGANIZED

BROWNWOOD MEN WHO ATTENDED INITIAL MEETING IN DALLAS, WELL PLEASED.

H. G. Lucas, former secretary of the Chamber of Commerce; O. P. Griffin, county farm agent, and John Yantis, local banker, have returned from Dallas where they attended the organization of the Texas Safe Farming Association which was effected there Saturday. J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls was elected president, and chairman of the executive committee. The executive committee is composed of Nathan Adams, of Dallas; Ed Woodall, of Dallas; R. E. Main Purpose Twofold.

The main purposes of the organization are said to be two-fold: To persuade farmers to raise more food on more acres and to raise better cotton on fewer acres.

The organization has a board of directors composed of one hundred men, practically all of whom have accepted the position indicated.

Clarence Ousley Explains.

Hon. Clarence Ousley thus explains the intent and purpose of the organization.

The immediate problem is plain and the solution is simple. We produced last year more cotton than the world appears willing to buy and use at a price profitable to the grower. The surplus does not appear to be very large, perhaps 500,000 bales, but any surplus will depress values. We have been in this condition many times before, and we have always managed to effect reduced production, and thereby to absorb the surplus the following year. It will not be impossible for us to do the same thing this year. By agitation, by persuasion and if need be, by the restricted use of production credit it can be done and no doubt will be done. The whole country fully appreciates this particular aspect of the situation and I think, may be depended upon to apply the remedy.

But the immediate problem is not the main problem. We have had these experiences in the South ever since I can remember. We have had acreage reduction campaigns, cotton conferences and all sorts of meetings and movements. As a rule they have been addressed to the immediate situation and as soon as that particular crisis passed we have fallen back into the old ways of producing cotton to the limit of acreage and labor under the enticement of occasional high prices, which for the time being make cotton production profitable.

Cotton Easily Produced.

I hope it will not be offensive to say that many of our bankers and credit merchants, as well as many of our farmers, have neglected to look beneath the surface of the cotton situation and have fallen under the temptations which govern the ordinary and unthinking cotton speculator. Cotton is the most easily produced of our staple crops; it recovers more readily from bad weather or from neglect. Cotton is easily saleable; it does not deteriorate when it is protected from the weather. It is good security for the present debt. But that view overlooks the basic and enduring principles which underlie profitable farming as profits are measured in the range of years. No successful commercial or manufacturing enterprise is conducted upon the speculative uncertainties that attend cotton production.

There are certain fundamental truths, which the highbrows call economics, involved in any business enterprise, and successful business enterprises practice them without always being able to define them in terms. One is the rule of low costs of manufacture or low price of purchase. Another is the saving of waste and the utilization of by-products. Another is that operation shall be based upon the rule of averages, rather than upon exceptional conditions. Another is a variety of products or a wide range of customers in accordance with the principle of safe investments by the distribution of risks.

Agricultural Fundamentals.

All these simple rules of business are practiced by successful business men, but nearly all of them are ignored or despised by the man who produces cotton as the sole means of subsistence or the man who furnishes credit for such cotton production.

There are certain fundamental things about agriculture and they apply to the agriculture of the Cotton Belt, as well as to the agriculture of the Corn Belt. One is, that the soil must be preserved, just as the manufacturing plant must be maintained intact by repairs and replacements. No soil can be maintained by continual planting in a single crop. Cotton production is exhausting the very best soil in Texas. The soil east of the Mississippi River can be restored to fertility easily by the use of commercial fertilizer, but some of the best soils of Texas are of such a nature that commercial fertilizers are for the most part impracticable. By the continual planting of cotton we are letting our manufacturing plants run down and that means disaster sooner or later. Another fundamental fact is that the production of cotton does not require full time. In fact, from the planting to the marketing of a cotton crop, requires fewer than half the working days of the year. The man who is producing cotton alone, can produce more than half the crop in less than half the time.

is basing the entire investment of labor for a whole year upon a single risk, and that is extremely hazardous in any undertaking which involves the investment of capital or labor.

It is extremely rare in the price of cotton is high enough to furnish a margin above cost sufficient for the purchase of feed and food for the family and the work teams. It happens just often enough to stimulate the speculative spirit which underlies the production of cotton as the sale income.

We must get it into the every day thinking, into the unconscious understanding of our farmers and the creditors of our farmers, that these basic facts and principles are unalterable, are ruthless, and that we cannot succeed without recognizing them and working in harmony with them.

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for January 31, Jesus Feeds Five Thousand Men.—John 6:1-14.

BY WM. E. GILROY, D. D., Editor of The Congregationalist. THIS lesson concerning the feeding of the five thousand brings us straight into the heart of the whole question of the miraculous. There are many miracles of Jesus that might be explainable upon the basis of higher laws, the nature of which has been partially discovered. We are realizing as never before the power of mind over matter. Undoubtedly remarkable cures have been effected in recent years by those who have rather deliberately followed psychological laws in exercising such influence, sometimes under religious auspices, but also in many instances without any association or profession of religion.

When one thinks of the personality and spiritual power of Jesus one is not amazed that the lame should have walked, that the deaf should have heard, and that many who were sick should have found new health and vigor in his presence.

We do not mean that miraculous circumstances are all to be explainable upon this basis of psychological influence though we should probably find that all circumstances, no matter how seemingly miraculous, have been in accordance with laws that we have not yet discovered. But when we come to an incident like this feeding of the five thousand we are in a realm where nothing that we have discovered of psychological forces can account for what transpired.

Accepting Miracle. There can be no use whatever arguing about this miracle. Some will accept the narrative as literal history and believe it without difficulty. Others may believe that it is of the nature of legend or tradition, a wonderful story that has become attached to the life of Jesus just as wonder stories have become attached to the life of every great leader and teacher in the past.

If the significance of Jesus had been simply that he fed five thousand people with five barley loaves and two fishes, we should have little

the provisions that came in recent years from Christian America, he would not have had much of the time more than one meal a day. Here is where the lesson strikes home to those of us who are well fed and who never know what it means to miss a meal.

Instead of much controversy over whether the miracle happened or not would it not be well if we found in consecration to Christ the power to work modern miracles through the application of God's laws to human problems? At any rate the lesson and its meaning are lost for us unless we find in Jesus the bread of life and feed upon him in our hearts by faith.

GOOD RAIN OVER ALL BROWNWOOD COUNTRY WITH COLD WEATHER

THREE INCHES OF RAIN REGISTERED HERE SINCE FIRST OF JANUARY.

The Ballinger line was out of order, but San Angelo reported snow and sleet there. Coleman reported no rain and plenty of sleet and snow. Mercury reported one inch; Brady reported 1.2 inch; Blanket reported 1.2 inch. Indian Creek reported one inch.

TESTIMONY IN HOFFMAN SUIT PLACES BLAME

POLITICAL SUPPORT GIVEN FERGUSON IN GRATITUDE TO BURKETT.

AUSTIN, Jan. 26.—(AP)—James E. Ferguson is responsible for letting surfacing contracts for more than 1,000 miles to the American Road Company, W. T. Montgomery, San Antonio contractor, testified today Frank Lanham, former Highway Commission chairman, told him. The testimony was given in oral deposition taken in open court where the state's \$421,000 suit against the Hoffman Construction Company is being tried.

Two months ago, the American Road Company confessed in court the state should recover from its \$600,000 excess highway profits, that contracts worth \$2,000,000 should be cancelled and that should be barred perpetually from doing business in Texas.

Creates Sensation.

Deposition of Montgomery created a sensation in the crowded courtroom. The jury was sent from the room as oral deposition was taken. The deposition was taken by the state for use later in the trial if needed.

Montgomery said Lanham called him aside in the Highway Department building either May 10 or 11 and accused him of "ribbing up" John Bickett, Sr. member of the commission, to ask him (Lanham) for a copy of the American Road Company specifications.

Montgomery related he replied "that 30 cents a square yard you are paying the American Road Co. is an unheard of price for such work. I don't see how you expect to get by with it."

According to Montgomery, Lanham answered "I had no more to do with that contract than you did, Monty."

"Who did then?" Montgomery queried.

"Jim Ferguson," Lanham answered.

Montgomery said Mr. Bickett had insisted no contract had been let and the American Road Company, though several days had passed after letting.

Returned Contracts.

"What are you kicking about? We've just given maintenance contracts for seven counties," Montgomery said Lanham told him during their conversation of May 10 or 11, and that he retorted, "Well I'm handling them right back to you."

He said he had been friendly with Jim Ferguson and Frank Lanham, but "now wouldn't vote for either for public office."

Names of James E. Ferguson, husband and chief adviser of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, and United States Senator Earl Mayfield, were injected today into testimony of the state's \$421,000 highway suit against the Hoffman Construction Company.

R. C. Starnes, stockholder of the company, testified through oral deposition he had told Mayfield he could not fight the Ferguson administration because Ferguson had appointed as highway commissioner, or his good friend Joe Burkett.

Moody's Questions.

Attorney General Dan Moody propounded to Starnes the following questions: "Do you recall (twice) making in Austin, once in a hospital and another time in a hotel dining room, a statement that

come what might, or whatever times or days might come in politics that you were obligated to back Mr. Ferguson and back him politically because of your efforts in, and interest in, bringing about appointment of Joe Burkett; that you had thereby obligated yourself to Ferguson, and in any political campaign he might be in you were obligated to support him and you said that gratitude would force you to support him?"

Starnes replied:

"I know what conversation was with. It occurred in a hotel but the man I had talked with was a man I had opposed for public office against Jim Ferguson."

"I said that Ferguson had appointed Burkett and that Burkett was my good friend and that those relations were such that I could not go ahead after Burkett was in and fight the Ferguson administration; that the bridge over which I had crossed the river was not going to be forgotten. The person to whom I talked was Senator Earl B. Mayfield."

Expected Fight.

Through oral deposition, Ray Starnes, a stockholder of the Hoffman Construction Company, testified today in the Hoffman trial he knew a fight would be made on appointment of Joe Burkett as highway commissioner, and that "slanderous" stories were being circulated about Burkett. He declared much of the opposition originated from an influential Dallas politician, the legal representative of a big oil company. He said he told the Dallas man the stories circulated about Burkett were false.

Starnes said he first learned the Highway Commission had let an asphalt surfacing contract to the American Road Company which he talked with men applying asphalt on a Bell county road.

Starnes related his determination to find all about this contract and said that the first time he talked to Chairman Frank Lanham, the chairman "seemed to think it was none of my business."

Later Lanham told him asphalt surfacing contracts for counties in his district had been let and that he would have to get contracts in the district of one of the other commissioners.

Lanham told him "We want a good job. You go look at the roads in west Texas. Referring to whether the company would have to place a two course treatment over all mileage. Lanham told Starnes, "You might not have to do it all. But you had best count on playing a two-course application over all the road."

County Court Is Busy With Civil Work This Week
