National Fire Prevention Week

The week of October 9-15, 2005 is National Fire Prevention Week. This was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire, the tragic 1871 incident that killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire began on October 8th, but continued into and did most of its damage on October 9, 1871.

According to popular legend Mrs. O'Leary's cow was the cause of the fire. However in 1871, the cow contended that she was innocent and didi't do the deed. Even

Mrs. O'Leary said that even though the fire started in or near the barn where she kept five milking cows both the she and the cows had turned in early that night. Since there was no proof to the cow being guilty they

think the guilty parties may have been a couple of boys sneaking cigarettes near the barn. Now who ever heard of any boys who might have done things like that? Even some theorize that fiery meteorites falling to the earth that day might have been

Even though the Chicago fire is the best known fire during those

days the biggest fire was the Peshtigo Fire... the most devastating forest fire in American history (October 8, 1871). It roared through Northeast Wisconsin, burning 16 towns, killing 1,152 people, and scorching 1.2 million acres before it ended. Those firefighters and others who lived through the Chicago and Peshtigo fires never forgot what pen during those days, both produced many tales of bravery and heroism. Those fires changed the way people and firefighters thought of fire safety. Some 40 years after the Chicago fire the Fire Marshalls Association of North America decided to observe the anniversary of the "great" fire by proving the public with safety awareness and fire prevention. In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation and since 1922 Fire Prevention Week has been observed on the Sunday through the Saturday period in which October 9th fails. It is recognized as the longest running public health and safety observance on record. The President of the United States has signed a proclamation proclaiming a national observance during that week every

year since 1925. This year the theme is "Candle With Care."


The QRS website reports that the statewide average score is 59, with a range from 13 to 100.

Nationally, the agency has 2,351 county offices across the country. More than 400 of these offices now have two or fewer full-time staff. Nearly 500 offices are within 20 miles of the next nearest office. "FSA is an agency with a strong And, the cost of delivering services varies widely, ranging from less than 1 cent for the delivery of a dollar of program benefits to more than \$2 in expenses for every dollar of benefits delivered.

FSA state executive directors are "Our FSA state directors are currently reviewing analytical information for their respective states. This data includes workload assessments for each office, location of offices in proximity to one another, farm lending volume and density of agricultural activity. The state executive directors will work with stakeholders, local, state and congressional leaders to consider local needs that might not be ranchers long into the future, reflected in the data and submit consolidation proposals by November 15.

The ultimate goal of the modernization proposal is to create a network of state-of the-art FSA offices by upgrading equipment, investing in technology and providing personnel with additional training. Minimal, if any, net reductions in personnel are anticipated.

Our lessons are found in Isaiah 25:1-10, Psalm 23, Phillipians 4:1-13 and Matthew 22:1-14. Isaiah sings praise to God for His deliverance of His people and His deliverance of all peoples.

The Psalmist, in a poem many of us have known since childhood. ings of his faith in the Good Shepherd and His unfailing love for his fol-

Paul again calls for reconciliation in the Church at Phillipi, between wo women leaders. [Yes, in the first century church there were many women in leadership roles].

He advises all to be known for their gentleness and to serve with prayer and supplication. Paul gives the best advice one can follow as a Christian. "... Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." Follow this, dear Christian, and you will have no time for the evil one; remember, "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me."

Jesus again is addressing the Chief Priests, Scribes and Pharisees and chiding them for failing to do God's will. In this parable, a King gives a wedding feast for his son. Amazingly, those who were invited (read the Chief Priests, Scribes and Pharisees, the "good" people of their day) by the King's slaves (the early prophets) refused to attend. The King sends slaves (the latter prophets) to invite them again. The slave messengers were ignored and abused by those invited. The King slays those who refused his invitation and burns their city. The slaves are sent to invite all to the wedding. At the wedding, one guest is found without a wedding garment and the King orders him to be cast out of the feast.

Open Letter to State Representative Warren Chisum

I was shocked to receive your letter of September 16 addressed to 'Senior Pastor', which I assume was sent to all churches in your district and to those of Messrs. Smithee and Swinford, who also signed the letter. Regardless of one's views on Proposition 2 or the issues it raises, the letter and its enclosures are offensive to all mainstream Christians and Texans of other religious preference for whom freedom of religion is among our most cherished rights. For elected officials to attempt to influence elections by exerting pressure on churches is an abuse of the public trust and an infringement of the Constitutionally-guaranteed separation of

The enclosure promoting Proposition 2 is an even more blatant violation of the separation of church and state. The organizations cited as sources include Jerry Falwell's "Liberty Council", James Dobson's "Focus on the Family" and other extreme-right Christian lobby groups. The suggested sermon points include a mixture of half-truths, misrepresentations and demagoguery, all calculated to arouse homophobic anxiety in the public. And their very inclusion in a letter from members of the Legislature should be offensive to all theologically-educated clergy.

On the face of it, Proposition 2 is a thinly-veiled attempt to write discrimination toward gay and lesbian Texans into the Constitution. The existing "Protection of Marriage" law is discriminatory enough, denying basic legal protection and spousal benefits to anyone whose sexual orientation or committed relationship differs from the norm. And the promoters of Proposition 2 are aware that it is probably doomed to be found unconstitutional by the courts - thus their rush to write it into the

What a pity that the last Legislature will be known primarily for failing to fund our children's education and for attempting to deprive many Texans of their rights! Please don't compound the error by eroding the





SPEARMAN - Long-time radio and TV personality, singer, songwriter and comedian, Arthur Lee Nichols, 99, died Saturday, Oct. 1,

Services were at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, October 5, 2005 in the Church of Christ with Victor Schumann officiating. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Born in Amarillo, Texas on September 2, 1906, Lee Nichols began his long career in entertainment in the West Texas area between the Levelland, TX and Clovis, NM area in the

late 40's, after serving in the Navy in WWII. He worked on radio stations and played area dances from Muleshoe, TX to Pueblo, CO. As he so many times pointed out to his family when they passed through towns, "I played a dance there."


He was on Guadalcanal during WWII as a SeaBee. While there, he entertained his fellow troops singing and writing songs to keep up morale. One of the songs he wrote was "Now Hear This (I Wanna Go Home, I'm Sick of Guadalcanal!). He owned radio station KIXZ in Amarillo, was manager of stations KSIR and KFRM in Wichita, KS, KOOO in Omaha, and KRMG in Tulsa, OK. In the late 50's and 60's he was the #1 rated DJ in the state of Kansas on Station KWBB. He was one of the first to play rock 'n roll as "Big Daddy" Lee Nichols. He was a true radio personality, complete with his own fan club.

In 1965, he wrote the country classic "I'm Gonna Tie One On Tonight," recorded by the Wilburn Brothers, and later by Earnest Tubb with Moon Mullican on piano. "Tie One One" was #1 on the Billboard Magazine Country charts, earning him a BMI Country Music Award in Nashville, TN. It has been recently released again on the CD "Louisiana Hay Ride Country Classics." He was emcee for all the Grand Ole Opry shows at the Forum, and later the Coliseum, in Wichita.

Lee was the emcee for Elvis Presley's first appearance in Kansas. In the 60's he toured with KSIR radio with the Plainsmen Gospel Quartet, wrote many songs, and performed at the shows. Their weekly TV shows on KAKE TV in Wichita were very popular. He was counted as a friend by country stars such as Tex Ritter, Loretta Lynn, Roy Clark, Buck Owens, The Wilburn Brothers and many others. Whenever they were in Wichita, they would stop by and get on the air with Lee, who would tell a joke about them and plug their latest record.

Lee is survived by his wife of over 50 years, Melva Lee; a daughter, Marilyn Davis of Conway, Ark.; a son Johnny Lee Nichols of Pueblo, Colo.; four grandchildren, Monica Lee, Alanna Mahan, Jessica Dempsey and Arthur Jacob Nicholos; four great-grandchildren; and three a sistersin-law, Midge Callistrom of Adrian, Tex., Alta May Gonser of Farmington, NM, and Mary Schumann of Spearman, Tex.

He told jokes, laughed, wrote songs, sang, entertained, and was loved by many, many people.

Changes in **Medicare Coverage** Am I eligible for extra help?

People that have a fixed income and limited resources can apply to the social security administration for extra help in paying for prescription drugs. You might have already received an application in the mail. This is a short application and it asks for everyday type of information but can be overlooked easily as a piece of "junk mail" if you are not looking for it to be sent to you. There are a number of ways to make application if you have already discarded or misplaced this mailing.

You can contact the Social Security Administration or your State Medical Assistance Office. Also, you can talk to your local pharmacist about the coverage. {S}he will be very knowledgeable about dates and requirements along with providing practical information on an individual basis. What you need to know about eligibility for extra help:

• annual income below \$14,355 for a single person or \$19,245 for a couple living together

· resources (including your savings and stocks, but not counting your home or car) are under \$11,500 for a single person or under \$23,000 for a couple
