Dr. Ridge closing office to set up shop in Kansas

"I never thought I'd be going to Kansas," said Dr. Charles Ridge, Spearman physician. But at the end of the month, Dr. Ridge will close his office here and move to Coldwater, Kan. to set up a new practice there.

Dr. Ridge has been in Spearman for more than three years.

Ridge graduated from medical school in Dallas, then practiced in Victoria, Texas. After joining the Air Force in 1979, he practiced in the Philippines, Spain, Germany and Burma and South Dakota before retiring.

"I enjoyed military life and the traveling. That was a great experience," Dr. Ridge said.

Dr. Ridge and his wife, Judy, have nine children altogether. Their youngest is in the second grade.

"This is a good town to raise children in. Our little boy has made a lot of friends and feels sad to leave but Coldwater made me an offer I couldn't turn down."

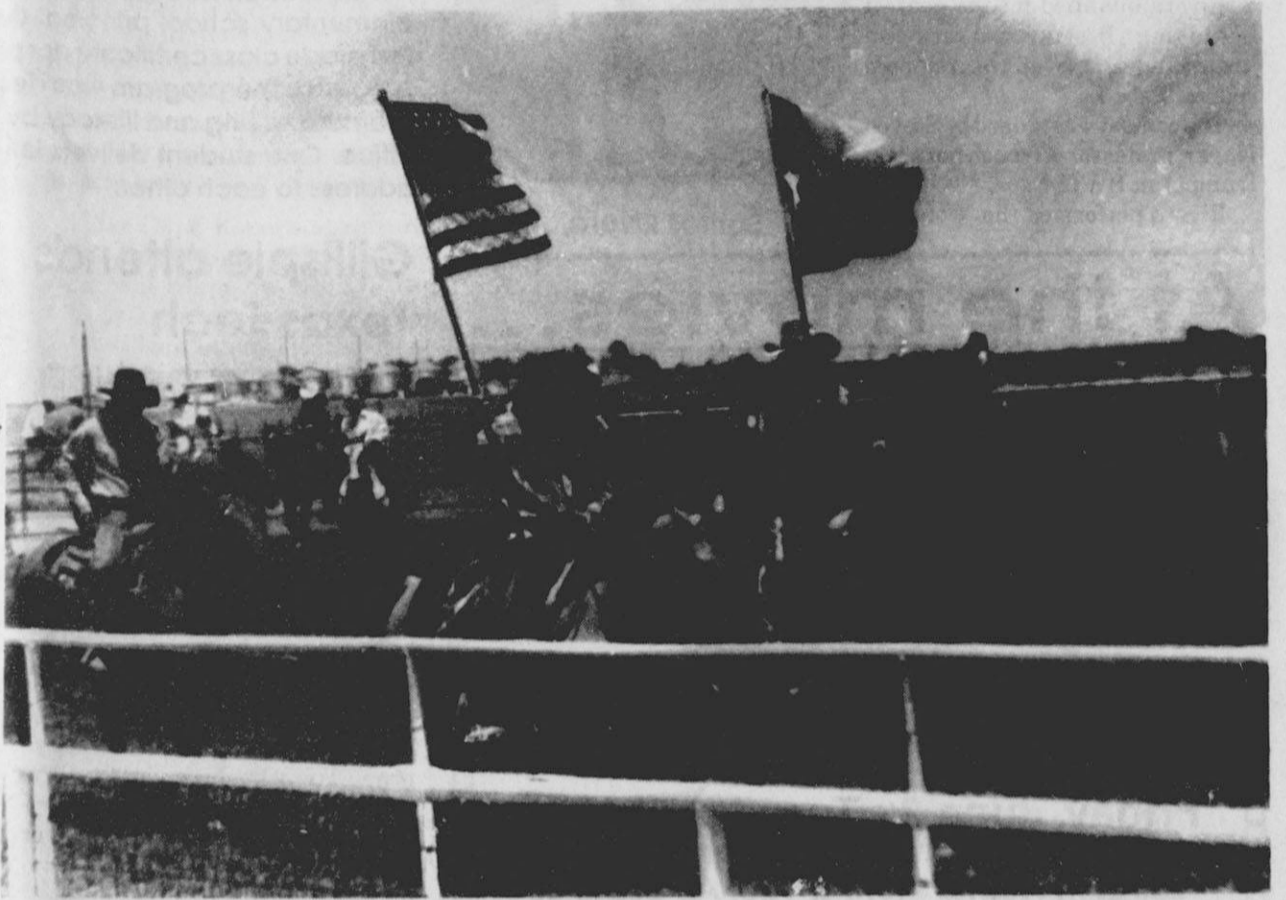
Even though Coldwater is a smaller town than Spearman, Dr. Ridge will have increased practice

Hansford County Appraisal District '94 Property values sent to owners

Property owners receive 1994 value Notices

Texas property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value by local appraisal districts. On May 27, 1994, Hansford County Appraisal District mailed approximately 26,900 property owners their notices showing the 1994 proposed value.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay from this notice," Peddy said.

Peddy emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains for a property owner. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Hansford Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and

other areas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called "ARB," is an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's values. The ARB also hears and settles protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Take special note of the proposed value for 1994," Peddy said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted to the property. The Spearman I.S.D. no longer offers the percentage homestead

exemption. The notice provides last year's value, too.

Peddy asks that a property owner look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no errors. "If the notice contains an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October," Peddy added.

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely. A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address.

Peddy added, "If you did not get notice and want 1994 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at 659-5575 or 733-5139. The deadline for protesting to the ARB is June 27, 1994, for this year."

Holt Cemetery named as historical landmark

Part of Panhandle history was officially recognized Saturday with the dedication of the Holt Cemetery as a Texas Historical Landmark. County dignitaries were on hand to witness the marker dedication.

Anita Eisenhower, daughter of O.C. Holt, presented the history of the Holt Cemetery marker. David, John and Mike T. Holt unveiled the marker.

David Willard, county judge, gave the proclamation and presentation of the marker. Nolan Holt, president of the Holt Cemetery Association accepted the marker.

Guests included County Judge David Willard; County Commissioners, John Bayless, Litch Sparks, J.C. Berry, R.D. Cornelison; and Hutchinson County Museum Director Ed Benz.

A reception at the Holt cemetery followed the dedication.

The marker tells the history of the cemetery and how it relates to the settlement of this area of the Panhandle.

The marker reads: "In the late 1890s Texas enacted colonization and homestead laws that significantly quickened the settlement of the then sparsely populated Panhandle region of

north Texas. Hutchinson County soon recorded the required 150 applications for land purchases in the county to formally organize in 1901. In 1903 early settlers Benjamin and Birda May (Kirk) Holt donated seven acres here to be used as the site of a community schoolhouse and cemetery. The first person buried here was Nola Storrs in 1909.

A new schoolhouse was built here in 1916 and in 1917 the Hols legally recorded their 7-acre donation. Five acres were set aside for school purposes and two acres for the cemetery, which at that time contained about 11 gravesites. When Holt School Trustees deeded the school's five acres and vacated schoolhouse to the Holt Cemetery Association in 1948, about an acre of this property was converted for cemetery use.

In 1907 the Cemetery Association established policies governing the use of this site. The cemetery, which continues to serve the local community, contains the gravesites of many of the area's first settlers and those of veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict."

The landmark is located 16 miles northeast of Stinnett on Highway 207, then six miles east on FM 281.

City Lites

The City of Spearman will be undergoing several staff changes in the next couple of weeks. On June 1, Mr. Christopher Eppley began work as the Assistant to the City Manager. Mr. Eppley holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from Oregon State University and recently completed his coursework towards a Master of Public Administration Degree from the University of Kansas. For the past year, Chris also served as an intern for the City of Overland Park, Kansas. The Assistant to the City Manager position replaces the Public Works Director position, previously held by Jim McWilliams. Mr. Eppley will be responsible for coordinating the environmental reports for the City (that is, preparing all the forms required by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission and other state or federal agencies), purchasing supplies, coding invoices, assisting with the budget

preparation and conducting special studies. Chris will not have direct supervisory authority but will work closely with all departments to coordinate various city activities.

The next change will be selection of a new Police Chief. As of June 10, Joe Raper will be leaving the City to enter private business. Chief Raper's leaving will be a major loss to the city and we will greatly miss him. An interim Police Chief will be appointed within the next few days to assume temporary command until a permanent replacement is named. The City is accepting applications and resumes for the Police Chief position until the position is filled.

After Chief Raper's departure, the Fire Chief and the EMS Coordinator will begin reporting to the city manager. I expect this arrangement will continue even after a new Police Chief is hired.

Statewide elections held for TCPB

In the third statewide election since the Texas Corn Producers Board became a statewide entity in 1990, four board members were elected or re-elected in elections held in April and May. Each person elected will serve a six year term, or until the year 2000.

Prior to the elections, the TCPB had divided the state into eight separate "Voting Regions" so that board members would more closely represent the corn interests of a particular region of the state, and so that all Texas corn producers would have representation on the Board. As there are 15 board seats on the TCPB, the voting regions are designed for each seat to represent 1/15th of the total corn production in Texas as reported by the Texas Crop Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture approved the voting region plan.

There was one seat up for election in Voting Region Two, which consists of Bailey, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer and Hartley counties in the Panhandle. Raymond Schlabs of Hereford won this seat.

Winning the seat in the largest voting region in this election was Neiland Smith of Plainview. This

voting region is Voting Region Three and it consists of Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Armstrong, Donley, Briscoe, Collingsworth, Hall, Childress, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Montague, Foard, Archer, Baylor, Knox, King, Dickens, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Young, Jack, Wise, Throckmorton, Parker, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Shackelford, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Borden, Dawson, Gaines, Andrews, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Earth, Hood, Somervell, Comanche, Mills, Brown, Coleman, Runnels, Glascock, and Midland counties. Smith will also serve until 2000.

Winning the seat in voting region five was Joe Reed of Kress. This voting region consists of Sherman, Randall, Hansford, Moore, Potter and Swisher counties.

The winner of the one seat open for election in voting region seven was Gerald Donaldson of Boling. This voting region is the coastal

bend area and consists of Bexar, Guadalupe, Wilson, Gonzales, Karnes, De Witt, Lavaca, Colorado, Bee, Goliad, Victoria, Jackson, Wharton, Brazoria, Harris, Matagorda, Fort Bend, Liberty, Orange, Jefferson, Chambers, Galveston, Calhoun, San Patricio, Refugio, Aransas, Nueces, and Kleberg.

The four new board members were sworn in on May 24th at South Padre Island by Katie Dickie, Texas Department of Agriculture. The Board then moved to elect officers for the 1994-1996 term. Elected as Chairman was Gerald Donaldson of Boling, Texas; Vice Chairman is Joe Reed of Kress, Texas; and Jerry Don Glover of Muleshoe, Texas was elected as Secretary-Treasurer.

Press releases and legal notices on the election were sent to all major newspapers in the state where elections were to occur. Over two thousand ballots were distributed. The voting period was from April 4, 1994 until May 5, 1994. The next election will be in the spring of 1996.

There will be five seats up for election in 1996, one in the coastal bend area, and four in the Panhandle and West Texas.



Southwestern Bell Changes rules for dialing

San Antonio, Texas, May 26, 1994--Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. customers in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle will soon start including their three-digit area code when making long-distance calls within their area codes, it was announced today.

The dialing change--which will not affect customers' rates for basic telephone service, their long-distance rates or 9-1-1 services--is a result of mandated modifications to the North American Numbering Plan, which were announced last fall. The new dialing pattern will affect customers in the 806 and 915 area codes.

The plan is administered in the United States, Canada, Bermuda and parts of the Caribbean by Bell Communications Research (Bellcore). Last fall, Bellcore and Southwestern Bell announced that the changes would begin in July 1994. Local business and residential customers are being reminded of the change again later this month and in June through letters and bill insert notices. Additional reminders will be provided through newspaper ads, bill inserts and bill messages until the new dialing pattern becomes mandatory.

During the "permissive" dialing period beginning July 1, Southwestern Bell customers may start dialing their area code in long-distance calls within their area code region. Beginning January 3, 1995, customers must dial a "1" or "0" plus the area code and seven-digit number for all long-distance calls.

While the new dialing pattern is just being introduced to Southwestern Bell customers in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle, it already is in effect in major metro-

politan areas in more than a dozen states including Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin, Waco and other Texas markets.

The numbering plan was established nearly 50 years ago by the

old Bell Laboratories, and is being modified to include the numbers "2" through "9" as the middle digit in new area codes. The numeric combination enables Bellcore to create 640 more area codes, which can be assigned as needed through 2025 or beyond, and establishes billions of new phone numbers during the next 30 years.

While no new area codes are projected in the foreseeable future in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle, this new dialing pattern will enable local telephone switching devices to define the call's routing. For most residential customers, this new dialing pattern will be little more than a minor inconvenience until they become accustomed to it.

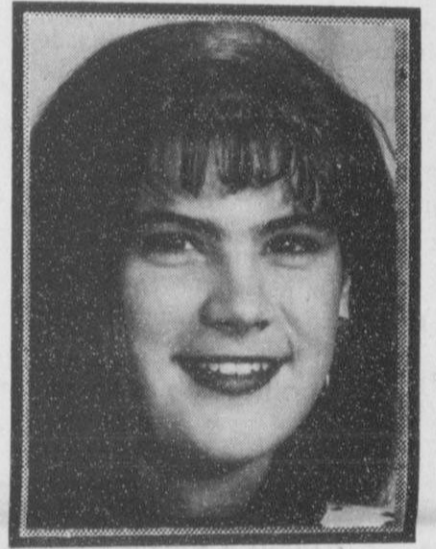

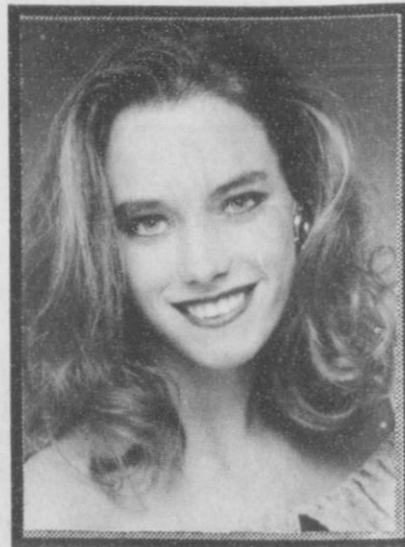

Camps offer three types of fun

LEVELLAND -- Young boys interested in attending Texan Basketball Camp at South Plains College will have the option of choosing three types of fun.

Three one-week sessions, under the direction of South Plains College men's basketball Larry Brown, will be held June 5-9, June 9-10, and June 13-17.

"Our camps will be tremendous teaching camps," Brown said, "and we'll have fun too. This is where dreams begin."

This year, the camps will have three different formats. An Overnight Camp will be held from June 5-9, a special Shooting Camp will be held June 9-10, and a Day Camp will be held June 13-17.

The purpose of the camps is to provide an opportunity for boys and young men to improve their basketball skills in a fun environment. The fundamentals of basketball are stressed, with sportsmanship, team play and self-confidence emphasized as well.

The camps, open to boys in third grade through high school, will be held in Texan dome on the SPC campus. Other facilities for use by the campers are an indoor swimming pool, indoor racquetball courts and tennis courts. In addition, campers also may spend time at the SPC Student Center, which features a video arcade, pool and ping pong tables and a giant-screen television.

Camp participants may commute daily from their homes or spend the week on campus in a college residence hall, depending on which option is selected.

Those attending the Overnight Camp will spend the week on campus in a college residence hall. Day campers may not register for this camp. Registration for the Overnight Camp will begin at 2 p.m. June 5 at Texas Dome, and the

camp will conclude at 4 p.m. June 9.

The Shooting Camp will concentrate on the fundamental skill of shooting the basketball. Solid teaching techniques will be utilized to help young players develop their shooting abilities.

Shooting Camp sessions will be held from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. June 9, and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. June 10. Registration begins at 4 p.m. June 9. Campers participating in the Overnight Camp can also participate in the Shooting Camp and spend one more night in the residence hall for an additional fee. Day campers also may participate in the Shooting Camp for an additional charge.

The Day Camp will provide participants with an opportunity to learn basketball fundamentals while commuting from home. Each day begins at 8:30 a.m. and concludes at 12:30 p.m. Registration begins at 7:30 a.m. June 13.

The cost of the Overnight Camp is \$190. The cost of the Shooting Camp is \$75 for participants who stay overnight and \$60 for those who commute from home. The cost of the Day Camp is \$60.

"We wanted to make it affordable, so that a lot of area kids could come," Brown said. "The Shooting Camp is something new, and I think it will be a good addition."

Included in the camp fees are instruction in fundamentals, insurance, awards and entertainment, as well as a camp report card, certificates, and a camp t-shirt, for each participant.

Camp activities will include ball handling, dribbling, passing and shooting drills, game situations and various contests, including shooting contest, one-on-one, three-on-three and five-on-five contest, and the ever-popular slam dunk contests.

Assisting Brown with the camps

will be Billy Gillispie and Lane Norsworthy, assistant men's basketball coaches at SPC. The camp staff also will include other outstanding coaches from West Texas and around the state, as well as members of the SPC men's basketball team.

Brown guided the Texans to third place in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference and a trip to the state tournament in his first season at the SPC helm. Prior to his arrival at South Plains, he spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Clemson University in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Brown believes that stressing fundamentals is what brings about success for an individual player. He has directed and coached at camps in Spain, Mexico, Australia and Venezuela. He began the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches "Camp of Champs" in 1985, a camp which has grown to more than 1,600 participants annually.

Brown served as an assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1986. He also has worked at basketball clinics and camps with such noted and esteemed coaches as Dean Smith, Bobby Knight and John Wooden.

Camp applications will be accepted as they are received and should be returned as soon as possible. A \$60 deposit should be sent with the application, and the remaining balance will be due at the time of registration. Those registering before May 15 will receive a free Texan basketball as a "signing bonus."

Discounts are available for two or more campers from the same family. The deposit is non-refundable after May 15 for all camps.

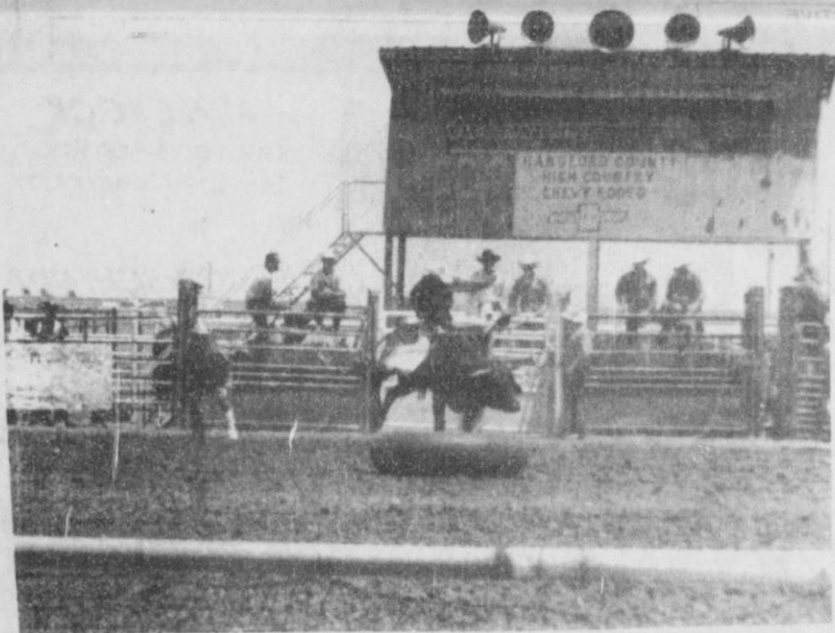

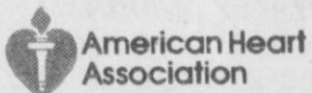

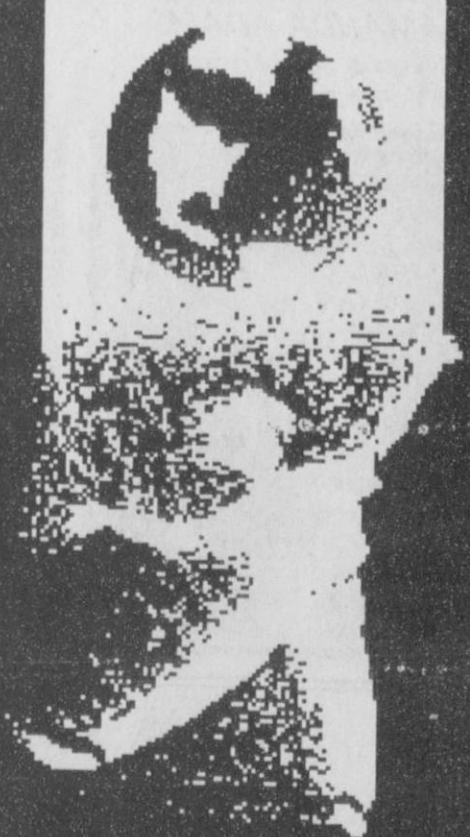

IBM donation helps save a life

A fire extinguisher donated by the IBM Corporation to the Texas Commission on Fire Protection recently proved to be a critical tool in the fight to save a man's life.

In the spring of 1993, the IBM corporation donated 178 fire extinguishers to the Texas Commission on Fire Protection. The commission distributed the extinguishers to small-town and rural fire departments across the state.

According to accident reports, shortly after midnight on Monday, April 25, a car flipped over on FM 535 in Bastrop County. A 44-year old man and his 20-year old nephew were trapped in the vehicle. The younger man suffered a broken neck and died on the scene. The older man was severely injured. Neither of the men was wearing a seat belt.

The first respondents to the accident, Bastrop County Sheriff's Deputy David Easley and Fire Chief

Terry Duval of the Bluebonnet Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) arrived to find the vehicle's engine compartment on fire.

Easley saw that the victims were trapped and that the fire was beginning to engulf the passenger compartment. He called to Duval to bring a fire extinguisher. While Duval worked to assess and stabilize the victims, Easley controlled the fire.

The fire extinguisher from Duval's vehicle was one of the units donated by IBM. Duval and Easley both stated that the extinguisher bought the rescuers a few critical minutes.

"If we hadn't been able to knock down the flames until the truck arrived, the heat and smoke probably would have killed the second man," Duval said. "The extinguisher was critical to the rescue."

The extra time was just enough: Bluebonnet VFD's fire truck arrived

about four minutes later. The fire crew extinguished the blaze and called neighboring Five Points VFD for rescue equipment. Five Points VFD cut the victims from the vehicle and prepared the survivor for a Star Flight airlift to Austin's Brackenridge Hospital.

Mike Freeman, program manager for the Texas Commission on Fire Protection's donations program, thanked IBM.

"We don't often hear the direct results of these kinds of contributions," Freeman said. "But this time, it's pretty clear that one of our small fire departments had the right tool at the right time, and that IBM's donation helped save a man's life."

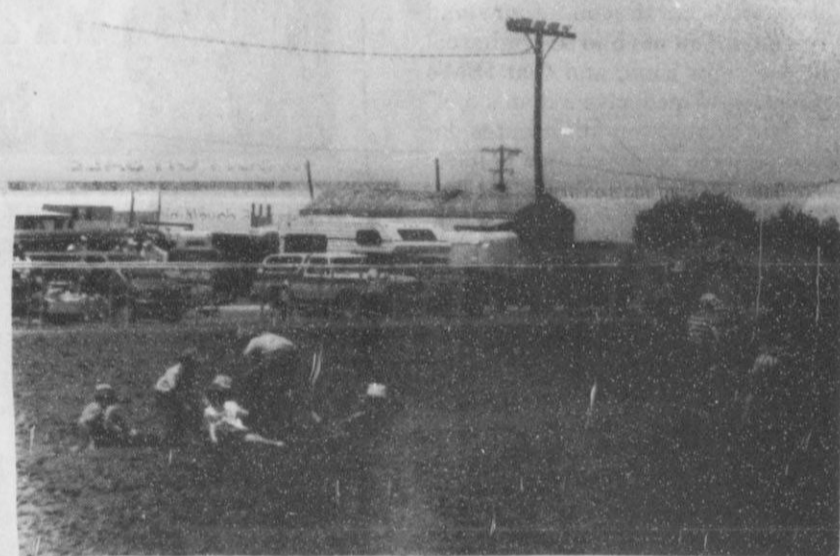

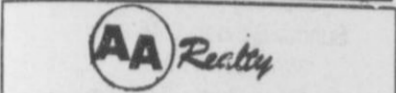

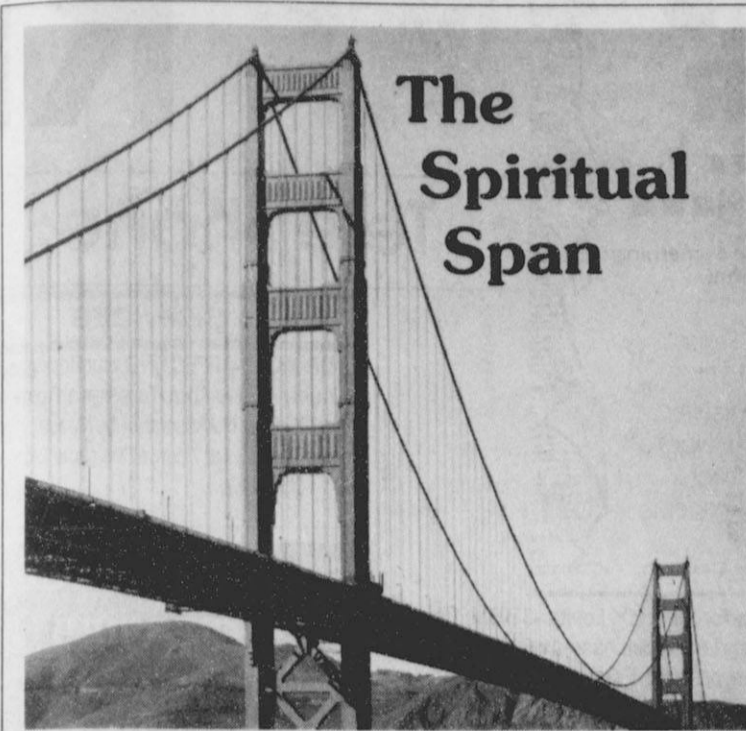
